THE SPOILS.

From different sources it is learned that the Government will not disturb holders of office except for cause—that is, for incapacity or misbehavior. This policy if adopted throughout will be endorsed by the community in general, while being of benefit to the civil service in all departments. It will leave an experienced contingent to perform the various details of work, also avoid stirring up hostility against the new administration. The recent political movement that succeeded so well was not, we take it, a campaign for office, but above all things for reform in government. That idea should be kept paramount in every act of the new Ministry. While those who have labored much, sacrificed a great deal, and risked all, through long years of struggle and in the final assault against bad government, should be considered to have better claims of preference than those who have not so distinguished themselves; yet the most signal services in a good cause should not of themselves be held to qualify anybody for an office that he is not competent to fill by natural and acquired attainments. Nothing has occurred so far to make the utterance of a caution in this regard necessary, but knowing that office seekers are always plentiful after a change of Government everywhere, it seems expedient to proffer support to the new Ministry in good resolutions, knowing that pressure from within is harder to resist than that from without. There are many scores of people who proved they were ready to adventure their lives to bring the recent misgovernment to an end, but who expected nothing further than their share in the common good aimed at and are now looking for nothing else. This class of people is the reliance of the Ministry to sustain them in honest administration, and may be depended upon to support them in making none but judicious appointments to office. For one opponent made in a disappointed aspirant for office to which he is not suited, the Government will increase the attachment of twenty people prepared at all times to defend the right for its own sake.

THE OTHER VIEW.

Adam Badeau, writing from New York to the Boston Herald, constructs a scathing criticism on what he calls "the preposterous attentions paid to the Queen of the Sandwich Islands." He says "the whole world seems bent on showing how little reality there is in our democracy." The airs put on by some Americans when thrust into official positions, in affectation of those born to greatness in other lands, are mentioned, and then the writer proceeds:

If it were, indeed, the Autocrat of all the Russias, or the Queen of England and Empress of India, who had come to visit us, one could understand that a certain respect for nations and powers equal to our own, though different in government and character, might prompt some show of the ceremony which such potentates are accustomed to receive; but that a woman from a hardly civilized and insignificant island in the Pacific should be treated as if she were in reality a sovereign is nothing more or less than an absurdity. The President and his wife are then hauled over the coals for paying attentions to the Hawaiian Queen which they would not accord to American citizens in even the most exalted stations. Naval, civil and civic functionaries are also treated to sarcastic comments on the excessive zeal they exhibit

ited in heaping honors on the Pacific sovereign. The manner in which any kind of royalty, even to such barbarian despots as the Shah of Persia, receive marked honors at the English court, while distinguished Americans such as General Grant are required to take their places away down in the scale of precedence, is cited to shame Americans for losing their heads over the Queen consort of "an insignificant island." It is good to find writers in the United States able and ready to paint in its true colors such a ludicrous spectacle as that of the greatest democracy the world has ever seen stopping over with ecstatic effervescence at the sight of anybody bearing a royal title, no matter how petty the dominion or meretricious the dignity attached to the title. This fetter in highly civilized communities of every potentate that strays away from his native sands or jungles plays the very mischief with the person so treated, sending him home with the most inflated notions of his importance and making him a continual nuisance until he compels his subjects to club the folly out of him.

D. 1887, abrogate the Constitution granted by his late Majesty Kamehameha V. on the 20th day of August, 1864, being moved thereto by the advice of my Cabinet Council; and in pursuance of such advice did sign, ordain, and publish a new Constitution for considerations appearing therein, which Constitution having this day been duly promulgated is now and from henceforth shall be in full force and effect as the fundamental law of this land.

Of this let all persons take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Given at the Royal Palace of Iolani at Honolulu on the 7th day of July A. D. 1887. KALAKAUA REX.

LOCAL NEWS.

Oranges are again plentiful.

The shot Mexican, Pablo, is still slowly improving.

The steam roller was operating on the Asylum road yesterday.

Pineapples are 10 cents to 15 cents apiece, and two fair ones for 25 cents.

Steamer W. G. Hall sails for Maui and Hawaii at 10 o'clock this morning.

Theo. H. Davies & Co. will open a store at Kealia, Kauai, in a few weeks.

Rate-payers will find an important notice from the Honolulu tax assessor in this paper.

Remember the closing exercises of St. Alban's College at ten o'clock this morning.

A court martial by the officers of the Honolulu Rifles will take place to-night at the Armory.

Prince Ferdinand of Saxe-Coburg wants Great Britain to boost him on to the Bulgarian throne.

Flags were flying in all directions yesterday in honor of the anniversary of the Fall of the Bastille.

Major H. F. Hebbard has been made Road Supervisor. His appointment seems to give general satisfaction.

Mr. Goo Kim is declaring war on his own account, being resolved to carry on a merciless slaughter of prices for the coming month.

Mr. J. D. McVeigh, painter, wishes to state that he is not the John McVey who appeared in the Police Court report in yesterday's paper.

The Royal Hawaiian Band will play at the Queen's Hospital this afternoon at half-past three o'clock, when all interested in the institution will be welcome to attend.

Persons having Springfield rifles who would kindly exchange them with the Honolulu Rifles for another pattern, by either bringing them to Lieutenant-Colonel Ashford's office on Merchant street or sending word, will confer a favor.

During the last few days a very strong smell of acid was noticed along Fort street. Upon inquiry several parties gave as their belief that some chemist was trying to make tooth powder out of the bones dug up the other day.

Wednesday evening the Kawaihau Glee Club held a meeting. They decided to have a concert at the Opera House within a few weeks. The proceeds to be divided themselves and the Engine Co. No. 4, whose room they have been occupying free.

Brevity was the soul of a mistake in an item in yesterday's paper about Geo. W. De Long Post's action on the proposed pension bill. The pension of \$12 per month desired is only for soldiers or sailors, of three months' service, who are disabled from any cause other than their vicious habits.

Mr. Chas. Hammer says that the new Constitution must have a decidedly good influence on the people. One of our most wealthy and influential citizens has just ordered at his harness shop a \$500 set of double harness, which has never been known before in the country. The article will be on exhibition at Mr. Hammer's shop in about fifteen days. Better times coming, boys.

SUPREME COURT.

July Term, before Judge Preston.

Alisin vs. Uilama et al. was on trial all day yesterday before the following mixed jury: Chas. Mahoe, David Bent, S. Kalli, Wm. D. Hunt, Kalama, John Gilliland, C. J. Fisher, T. C. Porter, S. Roth, G. D. Tenney, Henry Davis and Hugh Gunn. It was a suit for damages for false imprisonment against the Deputy Sheriff of Waialua and three or four policemen. W. A. Kinney for plaintiff; A. Rosa for defendant.

Shortly before four o'clock Mr. Kinney was examining a witness, when the Court informed him that his questions were irregular, as he was trying to discredit a warrant on which he had relied his case.

Mr. Kinney thanked His Honor for deciding a point before it was raised by counsel, and without giving an opportunity for argument.

Judge Preston repeated the grounds of his ruling and informed counsel in effect that the matter was too plain for argument.

Mr. Kinney protested against the decision of the Court, saying that under such ruling he would have to discontinue the case.

His Honor stated that counsel could do as he pleased.

Mr. Kinney retorted that he should do as he pleased, therefore he discontinued the case.

The Judge told him to be careful or he might have to discontinue practice. Mr. Kinney replied that he should stand his trial in that regard.

The Court then discharged the jury from further attendance, told the Hawaiian jurors that their presence would not be required until Monday morning at 10 o'clock, and notified the foreign jurors to attend this morning at the same hour.

AT CHAMBERS.

Before Judge Bickerton, July 14. Alepau (k) et al. vs. Rahapa (w.) et al. Bill for partition. Kahapa, Lonohena and Honokaa Sugar Co. by their attorneys, Smith and Kinney, file their answer, and hearing is set for Monday, Aug. 1. W. C. Achi for plaintiffs.

Two assumpsit appeals were continued to future dates.

The Queen's Hospital.

From the very interesting statistical report for the twenty-four months ending June 30, 1887, furnished by Purveyor Eckhardt, we call the following facts, which will no doubt prove of interest to many of our readers:—

PATIENTS ADMITTED.

Total number, 932. The highest number in any month was 54, in January, 1887; lowest number, 20, in December, 1885. Monthly average, 39, of which 12 were Hawaiian.

DISCHARGED.

Total number, 785. Highest number, 44, in October, 1886; lowest, 22, in November, 1885, and November, 1886. Monthly average, 33, of which 11 were Hawaiians.

DEATHS.

Total number, 135. Highest number, 9, occurring in January, February, June, 1886, and March, 1887; lowest number 1, in December, 1885, and October, 1886. Monthly average, 6, of which 1 was a Hawaiian.

PATIENTS TREATED AT HOSPITAL.

Total number 2,316. Highest number, 112, in August, 1885, and March, 1886; lowest, 73, in November, 1886. Average 96, of which 25 were Hawaiians.

NUMBER IN HOSPITAL AT END OF EACH MONTH.

Highest, 70; lowest, 46; average, 57.

DISPENSARY.

Total number, 3,521. Highest number, 345 in February, 1886; lowest, 41, in December, 1886, and April, 1887. Average, 145.

RECEIPTS FROM PAY PATIENTS.

Total amount, \$17,590.75. The highest amount, \$1,300.50 in January, 1887; lowest, \$395.30 in November, 1885. Average twenty-four months, \$732.95.

CURRENT EXPENSES.

Total amount, \$43,176.89. Highest amount, \$2,080.50, March, 1887; lowest, \$1,553.17, July, 1886. Average, \$1,799.93.

Repairs to the Opera House.

A new stage was put in the Hawaiian Opera House before the Fourth of July ball. The posts holding up the elevated platform at the south side entrance are found to be rotten where they entered the earth, and they will be renewed and placed on stone supports. Fresh paint will be applied to the woodwork all around the building. There has been some touching up of the scenery under direction of Mr. Tavernier, but nothing in the way of a general renovation as yet undertaken in that respect. Mr. E. E. Mayhew is doing the wooden repairs. He has had experience as a stage carpenter.

The horse "Amadine," the property of Col. Spalding, will be sent to the Coast on the 19th inst. in care of W. Kerrigan.

HONOLULU FIRE DEPARTMENT.

Adjourned Meeting of the Board of Representatives.

The adjourned meeting of the Fire Department from the previous Thursday was held last night at the Bell Tower. Called to order by Acting Chief Wilson, eighteen delegates were present at roll call. A communication from the Minister of the Interior was read and accepted.

His Excellency, Mr. Thurston, after acknowledging receipt of a letter asking for instructions, written by Mr. Henry Smith, Secretary of the Department and Chairman of Election, cites the law on the subject of an election misarranging as the late one. He said: "The object of the law is to have an election, and the time of holding the election not being the essence of the matter, I am of the opinion that the regular time for holding the election having elapsed without an election having taken place, an election can and should be ordered." But the law was silent upon such a contingency, except as to filling vacancies, when the Chief Engineer should act. As this case involved the election of the Chief himself, also of both Assistants, he was of opinion that the article did not apply. The Department being under the general supervision of the Minister of the Interior, it was his duty to see that it was properly organized; therefore in the absence of specific law he ordered that a new election be held on the first Monday in August.

Mr. Henry Smith, Chairman of Election, submitted in print an opinion that it was not only highly expedient but perfectly legal to hold a new election. If the acting Chief Engineer declined to order a new election, the Board should do so, and this he recommended as the only course to pursue. Every member of the Department had the right of a voice in choosing executive officers—"a right which cannot be delegated to the representatives of the Honolulu Fire Department."

After the reading of the Minister's letter Mr. M. D. Monsarrat spoke in favor of his recommendations, as he thought a speedy election was most desirable. It would put an end to the unpleasant jar now existing between the constituents of the respective candidates for chief and put the Fire Department once again, on a sure and clear foundation. He hoped there was nothing personal meant in the display of partisanship, but still they should have another election at the earliest date possible. Delegate Morgan thought Monday night not a good time. Wednesday would be better.

Mr. Wilson stated that the department had no alternative. The instructions from the Minister of the Interior stated Monday evening, the first of August, and on that day the election must be held. However, he did not think, if the election on Monday night would prove much of an inconvenience, that the Minister of the Interior would refuse to grant the concession, allowing the election to be held Wednesday.

An amendment, changing the election day accordingly, subject to the proper approval, was carried, same Judge and Tellers to be retained. The acting Chief, taking the floor, stated that it was not wholly on constitutional points that he contested the last elections. He considered that a great many supposed voters from the Pacific Hose Company had no right to that privilege. He thereupon stated several instances which he considered violations of the election laws. He closed his remarks saying, "I am working for the firemen, not for such sharp practice."

Mr. Wilson submitted a legal opinion from Mr. W. Austin Whiting, upon the election and qualification of members of Pacific Hose Company, drawn up after examination of the laws of the Department, of the Kingdom, and of the company named. He found that candidates receiving less than three black balls against them in the company are members upon signing the constitution and by-laws, and obtaining a certificate of membership from the secretary; and that notice of a special meeting must specify its objects, particularly whether candidates are to be proposed for election, to make election at such meeting legal. After quoting laws of the Department and of the Kingdom, the opinion holds it absolutely necessary that a member shall receive a certificate of membership before he can legally vote, and that no roll of membership is correct legally unless made up of certificate members only. Further: "If candidates were proposed and elected at a supposed special meeting of Hose Co. No. 1 without any notice of such meeting being given to regular members of such company, then the meeting and election are illegal and such candidates cannot legally be given a certificate of membership."

Mr. M. D. Monsarrat stated in reply that he had been absent from several meetings of his company, Pacific Hose. He had fought for limitation of membership before. The Hose Company could have had a thousand men by this time if desired. Their roll, referred to by the acting Chief, was written up about one year ago with forty-three names enrolled. As to rushing things, he had known of a company holding a special meeting on Sunday when members were proposed to be elected on the following Monday.

A motion providing for a committee of six, composed of one member from each company to be appointed by the chair, to investigate the roll of each company in the Department and see that every member is supplied with a certificate and is fully equipped, was carried.

The election for Secretary and Treasurer was declared in order. Mr. Henry Smith, present incumbent, was unanimously elected.

Mr. J. W. McGuire, the present Fire Marshal, was unanimously re-elected to that office.

A communication was received referring to the fact that a Mr. Jas. McLean was on two companies' books as a member of each. How could a person be a member of two companies at the same time? Foreman Monsarrat, of Pacific Hose Company, promised to look into the matter and ascertain how the feat was accomplished.

A resolution from No. 2 was next presented. It read as follows:—

Resolved: That this Board limit each company to fifty active men and that this resolution become a by-law of this department.

After considerable debate the question was put, resulting in a tie of nine to nine. The chairman gave his casting vote in favor of the resolution, to take immediate effect. Adjourned.

D. 1887, abrogate the Constitution granted by his late Majesty Kamehameha V. on the 20th day of August, 1864, being moved thereto by the advice of my Cabinet Council; and in pursuance of such advice did sign, ordain, and publish a new Constitution for consideration appearing therein, which Constitution having this day been duly promulgated is now and from henceforth shall be in full force and effect as the fundamental law of this land.

Of this let all persons take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Given at the Royal Palace of Iolani at Honolulu on the 7th day of July A. D. 1887. KALAKAUA REX.

LOCAL NEWS.

Oranges are again plentiful. The shot Mexican, Pablo, is still slowly improving.

The steam roller was operating on the Asylum road yesterday.

Pineapples are 10 cents to 15 cents apiece, and two fair ones for 25 cents.

Steamer W. G. Hall sails for Maui and Hawaii at 10 o'clock this morning.

Theo. H. Davies & Co. will open a store at Kealia, Kauai, in a few weeks.

Rate-payers will find an important notice from the Honolulu tax assessor in this paper.

Remember the closing exercises of St. Alban's College at ten o'clock this morning.

A court martial by the officers of the Honolulu Rifles will take place to-night at the Armory.

Prince Ferdinand of Saxe-Coburg wants Great Britain to boost him on to the Bulgarian throne.

Flags were flying in all directions yesterday in honor of the anniversary of the Fall of the Bastille.

Major H. F. Hebbard has been made Road Supervisor. His appointment seems to give general satisfaction.

Mr. Goo Kim is declaring war on his own account, being resolved to carry on a merciless slaughter of prices for the coming month.

Mr. J. D. McVeigh, painter, wishes to state that he is not the John McVey who appeared in the Police Court report in yesterday's paper.

The Royal Hawaiian Band will play at the Queen's Hospital this afternoon at half-past three o'clock, when all interested in the institution will be welcome to attend.

Persons having Springfield rifles who would kindly exchange them with the Honolulu Rifles for another pattern, by either bringing them to Lieutenant-Colonel Ashford's office on Merchant street or sending word, will confer a favor.

During the last few days a very strong smell of acid was noticed along Fort street. Upon inquiry several parties gave as their belief that some chemist was trying to make tooth powder out of the bones dug up the other day.

Wednesday evening the Kawaihau Glee Club held a meeting. They decided to have a concert at the Opera House within a few weeks. The proceeds to be divided themselves and the Engine Co. No. 4, whose room they have been occupying free.

Brevity was the soul of a mistake in an item in yesterday's paper about Geo. W. De Long Post's action on the proposed pension bill. The pension of \$12 per month desired is only for soldiers or sailors, of three months' service, who are disabled from any cause other than their vicious habits.

Mr. Chas. Hammer says that the new Constitution must have a decidedly good influence on the people. One of our most wealthy and influential citizens has just ordered at his harness shop a \$500 set of double harness, which has never been known before in the country. The article will be on exhibition at Mr. Hammer's shop in about fifteen days. Better times coming, boys.

Police Court.

The Chinamen arrested for gambling at the Chinese Theatre on the 12th inst. were yesterday discharged.

Hatula was found guilty of disturbing the peace.

Kaia was committed to the Insane Asylum on the testimony of Dr. E. C. Webb.

R. G. Hagaman, arrested for house-breaking on the 9th inst., was discharged.

SUPREME COURT.

July Term, before Judge Preston.

Alisin vs. Uilama et al. was on trial all day yesterday before the following mixed jury: Chas. Mahoe, David Bent, S. Kaili, Wm. D. Hunt, Kalama, John Gilliland, C. J. Fishel, T. C. Porter, S. Roth, G. D. Tenney, Henry Davis and Hugh Gunn. It was a suit for damages for false imprisonment against the Deputy Sheriff of Waiialua and three or four policemen. W. A. Kinney for plaintiff; A. Rosa for defendants.

Shortly before four o'clock Mr. Kinney was examining a witness, when the Court informed him that his questions were irregular, as he was trying to discredit a warrant on which he had relied his case.

Mr. Kinney thanked His Honor for deciding a point before it was raised by counsel, and without giving an opportunity for argument.

Judge Preston repeated the grounds of his ruling and informed counsel in effect that the matter was too plain for argument.

Mr. Kinney protested against the decision of the Court, saying that under such ruling he would have to discontinue the case.

His Honor stated that counsel could do as he pleased.

Mr. Kinney retorted that he should do as he pleased, therefore he discontinued the case.

The Judge told him to be careful or he might have to discontinue practice. Mr. Kinney replied that he should stand his trial in that regard.

The Court then discharged the jury from further attendance, told the Hawaiian jurors that their presence would not be required until Monday morning at 10 o'clock, and notified the foreign jurors to attend this morning at the same hour.

AT CHAMBERS.

Before Judge Bickerton, July 14. Alepau (k.) et al. vs. Rahapa (w.) et al. Bill for partition. Rahapa, Lonohena and Honokaa Sugar Co. by their attorneys, Smith and Kinney, file their answer, and hearing is set for Monday, Aug. 1. W. C. Achi for plaintiffs.

Two assumpsit appeals were continued to future dates.

The Queen's Hospital.

From the very interesting statistical report for the twenty-four months ending June 30, 1887, furnished by Purveyor Eckhardt, we call the following facts, which will no doubt prove of interest to many of our readers:

PATIENTS ADMITTED.

Total number, 932. The highest number in any month was 54, in January, 1887; lowest number, 20, in December, 1885. Monthly average, 39, of which 12 were Hawaiians.

DISCHARGED.

Total number, 785. Highest number, 44, in October, 1886; lowest, 22, in November, 1885, and November, 1886. Monthly average, 33, of which 11 were Hawaiians.

DEATHS.

Total number, 135. Highest number, 9, occurring in January, February, June, 1886, and March, 1887; lowest number 1, in December, 1885, and October, 1886. Monthly average, 6, of which 1 was a Hawaiian.

PATIENTS TREATED AT HOSPITAL.

Total number 2,316. Highest number, 112, in August, 1885, and March, 1886; lowest, 73, in November, 1886. Average 96, of which 25 were Hawaiians.

NUMBER IN HOSPITAL AT END OF EACH MONTH.

Highest, 70; lowest, 46; average, 57.

DISPENSARY.

Total number, 3,521. Highest number, 345 in February, 1886; lowest, 41, in December, 1886, and April, 1887. Average, 145.

RECEIPTS FROM PAY PATIENTS.

Total amount, \$17,590.75. The highest amount, \$1,300.50 in January, 1887; lowest, \$395.30 in November, 1885. Average twenty-four months, \$732.95.

CURRENT EXPENSES.

Total amount, \$43,176.89. Highest amount, \$2,089.50, March, 1887; lowest, \$1,553.17, July, 1886. Average, \$1,799.93.

Repairs to the Opera House.

A new stage was put in the Hawaiian Opera House before the Fourth of July ball. The posts holding up the elevated platform at the south side entrance are found to be rotten where they entered the earth, and they will be renewed and placed on stone supports. Fresh paint will be applied to the woodwork all around the building. There has been some touching up of the scenery under direction of Mr. Tavernier, but nothing in the way of a general renovation as yet undertaken in that respect. Mr. E. E. Mayhew is doing the wooden repairs. He has had experience as a stage carpenter.

The horse "Amadine," the property of Col. Spalding, will be sent to the Coast on the 19th inst. in care of W. Kerrigan.

HONOLULU FIRE DEPARTMENT.

Adjourned Meeting of the Board of Representatives.

The adjourned meeting of the Fire Department from the previous Thursday was held last night at the Bell Tower. Called to order by Acting Chief Wilson, eighteen delegates were present at roll call. A communication from the Minister of the Interior was read and accepted.

His Excellency, Mr. Thurston, after acknowledging receipt of a letter asking for instructions, written by Mr. Henry Smith, Secretary of the Department and Chairman of Election, cites the law on the subject of an election miscarrying as the late one. He said: "The object of the law is to have an election, and the time of holding the election not being the essence of the matter, I am of the opinion that the regular time for holding the election having elapsed without an election having taken place, an election can and should be ordered." But the law was silent upon such a contingency, except as to filling vacancies, when the Chief Engineer should act. As this case involved the election of the Chief himself, also of both Assistants, he was of opinion that the article did not apply. The Department being under the general supervision of the Minister of the Interior, it was his duty to see that it was properly organized; therefore in the absence of specific law he ordered that a new election be held on the first Monday in August.

Mr. Henry Smith, Chairman of Election, submitted in print an opinion that it was not only highly expedient but perfectly legal to hold a new election. If the acting Chief Engineer declined to order a new election, the Board should do so, and this he recommended as the only course to pursue. Every member of the Department had the right of a voice in choosing executive officers—"a right which cannot be delegated to the representatives of the Honolulu Fire Department."

After the reading of the Minister's letter Mr. M. D. Monsarrat spoke in favor of its recommendations, as he thought a speedy election was most desirable. It would put an end to the unpleasant jar now existing between the constituents of the respective candidates for chief and put the Fire Department once again, on a sure and clear foundation. He hoped there was nothing personal meant in the display of partisanship, but still they should have another election at the earliest date possible. Delegate Morgan thought Monday night not a good time. Wednesday would be better.

Mr. Wilson stated that the department had no alternative. The instructions from the Minister of the Interior stated Monday evening, the first of August, and on that day the election must be held. However, he did not think, if the election on Monday night would prove such an inconvenience, that the Minister of the Interior would refuse to grant the concession, allowing the election to be held Wednesday.

An amendment, changing the election day accordingly, subject to the proper approval, was carried, same Judge and Tellers to be retained. The acting Chief, taking the floor, stated that it was not wholly on constitutional points that he contested the last elections. He considered that a great many supposed voters from the Pacific Hose Company had no right to that privilege. He thereupon stated several instances which he considered violations of the election laws. He closed his remarks saying, "I am working for the firemen, not for such sharp practice."

Mr. Wilson submitted a legal opinion from Mr. W. Austin Whiting, upon the election and qualification of members of Pacific Hose Company, drawn up after examination of the laws of the Department, of the Kingdom, and of the company named. He found that candidates receiving less than three black balls against them in the company are members upon signing the constitution and by-laws, and obtaining a certificate of membership from the secretary; and that notice of a special meeting must specify its objects, particularly whether candidates are to be proposed for election, to make election at such meeting legal. After quoting laws of the Department and of the Kingdom, the opinion holds it absolutely necessary that a member shall receive a certificate of membership before he can legally vote, and that no roll of membership is correct legally unless made up of certificate members only. Further: "If candidates were proposed and elected at a supposed special meeting of Hose Co. No. 1 without any notice of such meeting being given to regular members of such company, then the meeting and election are illegal and such candidates cannot legally be given a certificate of membership."

Mr. M. D. Monsarrat stated in reply that he had been absent from several meetings of his company, Pacific Hose. He had fought for limitation of membership before. The Hose Company could have had a thousand men by this time if he desired. Their roll, referred to by the acting Chief, was written up about one year ago with forty-three names enrolled. As to rushing things, he had known of a company holding a special meeting on Sunday when members were proposed to be elected on the following Monday.

A motion providing for a committee of six, composed of one member from each company to be appointed by the chair, to investigate the roll of each company in the Department and see that every member is supplied with a certificate and is fully equipped, was carried.

The election for Secretary and Treasurer was declared in order. Mr. Henry Smith, present incumbent, was unanimously elected.

Mr. J. W. McGuire, the present Fire Marshal, was unanimously re-elected to that office.

A communication was received referring to the fact that Mr. Jas. McLean was on two companies' books as a member of each. How could a person be a member of two companies at the same time? Foreman Monsarrat, of Pacific Hose Company, promised to look into the matter and ascertain how the feat was accomplished.

A resolution from No. 2 was next presented. It read as follows:—

Resolved: That this Board limit each company to fifty active men and that this resolution become a by-law of this department.

After considerable debate the question was put, resulting in a tie of nine to nine. The chairman gave his casting vote in favor of the resolution, to take immediate effect. Adjourned.

The Publishing of Law Books
 There is one branch of the publishing business that is under a serious cloud just now. It is the publishing of law books. I was told recently by a gentleman connected with a law-publishing house in this city that the demand for books of that character has fallen off most remarkably within the past few years. Publishers are very chary about bringing out new works, seldom finishing the undertaking profitable. The rush into the legal profession has greatly abated. There is not the money in the practice that there once was. Some old-established firms are able still to divide large fees, of course, but, taken as a whole, the profession has had rather short-picking for several years. It has been the experience of the older members of the bar that there is a growing disinclination on the part of their clients to litigate. The marked leniency of the courts toward the settlement of differences by compromise is also a factor. In this city, it has come to be generally understood that lawsuits are expensive, in time, in costs, and in lawyers' fees. Many business men have come to believe that it is better to take half and settle amicably than to get or lose all at the end of a lawsuit. It is doubtful whether, for many years to come, if ever again, the legal profession will be as generally prosperous and lucrative as it has been in the past.—*Chicago Journal.*

Souvenirs of Beauty.
 A gray-headed man was recently brought before a court in Berlin, charged with picking a lady's pocket of her handkerchief. During the trial it was proved that he had as many as 100 costly handkerchiefs in his possession, obtained in the same manner. His defense was not kleptomania, but a mania which impelled him, whenever he saw a beautiful woman, to try and obtain some object from her as a souvenir. He was acquitted.—*Chicago Herald.*
