It has been suggested that the BULLETIN should suggest that in preparing the plans for the projected Sailor's Home provision should be made for a hall in which sailors may hold concerts for themselves. The suggestion has a smack of sense in it.

The major part of that portion of the town which was destroyed by the great fire of April, 1886, and since rebuilt, has not from that time to this had anything done to its streets. Not that they are or have been in such good condition as to render attention needless. Indeed, their best state during the entire period could not be called anything better than creditable. What justification does the present Administration, which has ruled for nearly three years, offer for this glaring neglect?

Our street electric lights have been sufficiently long in use to become a necessity. We are now so accustomed to them that we cannot do without them. But this does not mean that they fully satisfy the highest expectation. As a matter of fact they do not. They are not so reliable as desirable. At times, especially in rainy weather, they are liable to fits of flickering and irregularity of illumination, and occasionally a lamp suddenly goes off watch at an early hour in the evening. Is there no remedy for these shortcomings?

The public have no means of learning with certainty the contents of the proposed treaty as long as it is withheld from publication. Bewildering assertions and contradictions regarding its provisions are encountered daily, and will be as long as the text is kept a secret. All citizens have a positive right to know what the Government proposes in this document, and the Ministers, as the servants of the people, should recognize this fact. The secrecy observed naturally creates suspicion in the public mind. Let us have the text.

It is current talk that a squad of men searched Palama, high and low, for the purpose of finding a white elephant, on Tuesday night. The peaceable and law-abiding inhabitants of that locality know of no white nor even black elephant in that district. Haven't heard of such an animal being there. But the national lunatic asylum is in the neighborhood, and the white elephant searchers were near it. It would have been in perfect harmony with "the fitness of things" to have stepped in and surrendered themselves to the keeper.

THE SOCIAL QUESTION IN HAWAII.

The following is the conclusion of a letter on the above subject, two of which appeared in the BULLETIN of Jan. 29 and Feb. 1, respectively. This part was crowded out by campaign news and then mislaid:

What do we see on the other hand, not mentioning the steadily increasing price of sugar, the introduction of vacuum pans, double effects, diffusion processes, etc., to extract the last particle of saccharine matter out of the workingman's excuse, out of the cane?

Have we to make the picture more vivid, to speak of plantation life? Have we to mention the rudeness of overseers, our slavlike contract system, the hovels the laborers have to live in, parents and children, boys and girls, packed together without even the needed privacy, as one can hear all that goes on in his neighbor's room? Have we to remember that flour costs \$1.75 a bag, that clothing and fish are almost out of price, and the laborer has to pay taxes and doctor's bills, provide for a wife and often six or seven small children, give them, besides food and clothing, school books, etc., and all this out of \$20 or \$24 a month, or less, as he has to lose very often a day or two, on account of bad weather, holidays, sickness, or in hunting for fuel? We know a plantation on Hawaii where the laborers worked but 16 days during the month of December, owing to bad weather. And some people are astonished that, once in a while, a fire is started. If the planters were to live 24 hours on the fare, and in the so-called houses, their employees have to be satisfied with, and toil as they have to, the newspapers, if, however, they would see the day through, would be too small to hold their complaints. And still slave owners will speak of liberty, Pharisies will uphold charity.

In our planters' paradise it is almost admitted as an axiom, that cheap and contracted labor is a vital question in cane planting. If so, if sugar cannot thrive but bedeviled with the misery and starvation of thousands (which is by no means proved), for Christ's sake, as you profess to be Christians, leave cane alone.

Early in the sixties the southern planters of the United States of America declared, also, that slavery was life or death to their industry, but the good sense of the nation taught them that, needed or not needed, death or life, the odious blot of slavery should be wiped out, if need be, by rivers of blood, from the code of the country. What do we see in our days? The plantations live, slavery is buried.

We hope against hope, that by next Legislature, not only the Asiatic trade will not be restricted, but altogether damned; and that the shameful and slave-like contract laws will be completely and forever abrogated in Hawaii. If not, we dare predict that ere five years have elapsed, natives and foreigners alike will clamor and work with might and main to have our planters' paradise, not protected, but annexed to the United States, that glorious land of the free, where neither Asiatics nor slave-like contracts are allowed. THAT TREATY.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—The P. C. A. of the 23d inst. seems to know all about the treaty the Ministers are trying to foist on this country. We the outside public would like to know something about this treaty. Of course we are ignorant, until the P. C. A. or one of its "bright lights" gives us some information on the subject. What the present Cabinet proposed has been "hid under a bushel." Whether we were to be bound down by an ironclad treaty has never been admitted or denied. I for one think that the Cabinet maxim is, "Rule or ruin." RAJAH.

ANOTHER SUGGESTION.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—Your correspondent "Suggestion" in last evening's paper touches on a matter of great concern to the whole community.

At present it is common practice for the friends of those unfortunate at the Receiving station to meet them at the batten gates in such close intercourse that, in effect, the purposes of segregation are frustrated. The suggestion of telephone connection for the station as a possible means of intercourse must prove acceptable alike to inmates and their friends.

Acting on the same the Board of Health could extend its privileges to the poorest member of the community by setting apart a small room on the veranda of the Government Dispensary where friends would be free to communicate with inmates of the station.

I am well aware of some objectionable features in this proposition, but they would be more than counterbalanced by lessening the risk of contagion through intercourse at the gates.

HOW BROWNE GOT HIS SHERRY.

For several years before his death, in 1850, frequent draughts of sherry became a necessity with Browne. Owing to poverty, however, he was ill able to provide it. Attracted by the announcement, "Funerals supplied," Browne one day, when fatigued in his rambles, waited upon an undertaker, his face buried in a handkerchief, his voice inaudible from emotion. The man ran for a decaanter of wine; Browne drank and was relieved. He asked several questions about scarves and handkerchiefs, collars, hosiery, mutes and coaches. The undertaker assured him that he would provide all Browne at last stood up to leave.

"But you have not told me where I am to find the remains," remarked the undertaker.

"You said you would find everything—find the body," exclaimed Browne, as he left the house and rapidly turned the corner.—[Correspondence of Daniel O'Connell.]
