THE PROPOSED CABLE.

To judge from the *Advertiser's* report this morning of the cable transactions that have taken place between the government and Messrs. Mercer and Fleming representing the British and Canadian government respectively, it would appear as the bargain was closed, and that a full and binding agreement had been entered upon.

The terms of the contract mentioned include a lease of an island, an annual subsidy and even a scale of transmission rates.

We understand that no such agreement has been made although propositions have been made and suggestions advanced by the cable agents. The government has simply observed a strict attitude of non-committal and if we are correctly informed virtually left the whole matter in the hands of the United States with which it at present is negotiating a treaty that will establish an American protectorate over Hawaii.

Should the United States give Hawaii *carte blanche* to do what she can in regard to a cable negotiations with Canada will be continued, but the cabinet will leave future devices and final arrangements absolutely in the hands of the Legislature.

The commissioners from Canada have been met in a most friendly manner by the government, and have been listened to with interest. Mr. Fleming's enthusiasm over the cable scheme has been hailed with pleasure as it proves the sincerity of the Canadian government, but nothing has been said or done which could lead the commissioners to believe that they gained anything besides friendship, courtesies and good dinners. If Mr. Hatch is responsible for this attitude of his government, he has proven himself a better diplomat than we honestly thought he were, and we believe he has struck the right key-note. It is just as well to know exactly where we stand before making any arrangements that may prove entanglements. We can wait a little longer for the cable.

ONLY ONE.

Mr. H. Klemme is the only Independent Candidate for Legislative honor. Mr. Emmeluth, although, petitioned by many voters refused to run and the "machine" is triumphant. The coming elections of no more interest to the people, and there is virtually no reason to incur the expense of holding an election. Klemme will undoubtedly be elected, and if it was not for that fact the "machine" ticket could as well go by acclamation.

That the government and the country will regret this policy we have not the slightest doubt of. To believe that the people in the long run will stand such a state of affairs would be childish. We fully admit, that the people are to be blamed, because it was their duty to place themselves in a position to bring forth an opposition ticket. Nevertheless, we consider it a poor stroke of policy on the part of the government to have allowed the machine system to predominate and Oahu to be represented by such non-representative men as McCandless, Wright, Winston, Cluney and others of the nominated gentlemen undoubtedly are.

Imagine the laws that will be framed by an assembly in which legal knowledge and ability are represented only by Cecil Brown, Chas. L. Carter, and Joseph! The presence of the Attorney General will of course materially assist, in the "good" work to be done.

We do not mean that a Legislative assembly should be dominated by men of legal training, and we are perfectly well aware,

that the ability of Mr. Brown and Mr. Carter is beyond the average. But it seems absurd to form a law making assembly in which the majority are men without education and without experience in the branches of a government, which deal with judicial and financial elements.

However, the die is cast and the government has crossed its Rubicon. With thirty Candidates of its own nomination and only one "independent," it certainly has no cause of complaint.

ON TO PEKIN.

A JAPANESE ARMY INVADES CHINA.

The End of the War Approaching.

Shanghai, Oct. 4.—The Japanese forces which recently landed in the Gulf of Pe-chi li are now on the march inland, and a decisive battle is impending between the invaders and the Chinese forces.

The latest news regarding the army of thirty thousand Japanese which landed to the north of Tien Tsin is that the force has reached the city of Lan Chu, in the province of Kilia, about fifty miles from the sea coast, and a considerable distance to the north of Tien Tsin.

The Chinese troops are being concentrated at the town of Lan, near Lan Chu, in order to resist the Mikado's soldiers.

The Chinese military authorities continue to make every possible preparation to resist the threatened Japanese invasion, and the wretched condition of their defense force, and the triumphant progress of the enemy through Korea into China, and onward toward Peking, afford small hope of these efforts being successful.

There is a frightful disorganization in the Chinese army, showing little or preparation for war, while the Japanese afford evidence of long and careful training.

The Chinese are badly clothed, and complaint is made of the scarcity of the food, whereas the victorious Japanese are reported to be provided with every comfort and convenience known to experts in modern warfare.

The Chinese seem to have been betrayed within their own ranks and to this cause recent defeats in some degree attributed.

It is stated that large quantities of arms and cartridges purchased by the Chinese Government, and for which payment has been made, cannot be found because of the disappearance of these quantities of war has caused a great sensation at headquarters and the matter will be the subject of careful investigation.

The Chinese army, hurriedly brought into action, is found to be in every way badly prepared for the emergency, and disorders rampant throughout the service.

The northern portion of the seaboard of China is swept by Japanese cruisers.

It is feared in Peking that Japan intends seizing the Chinese arsenals, and in blocking access to the supply of war material.

News has reached here from Yokohama that the Japanese government has decided to risk a foreign loan for the purpose of carrying on the war with China.

Five Japanese cruisers have arrived off Chusan, which is a large island near Niagpo, in the southern part of the Yellow Sea, and south of Shanghai.

It is reported that Mr. O'Connor, the British Minister at Peking, has cabled alarming advices as to the attitude of Chinese toward foreigners.

European women and children at Hankow are removing to Shanghai.

The Viceroy of Hankow is fortifying the city against attack by a mob.

A rising of the populace against the foreigners in that city is feared.

Hankow, which is a large city some four hundred miles inland,

on the Yang-tse-Kiang, contains many British residents, and it is stated that inflammatory placards inciting the Chinese to attack and drive out the white people, are being distributed in the city.

The Times says that England will allow France a free hand in Madagascar within reasonable limits. No question of dispute is likely to suddenly threaten the good relations of the two countries.

Mrs. Annie Besant is now in Auckland, and will probably be in Honolulu shortly.

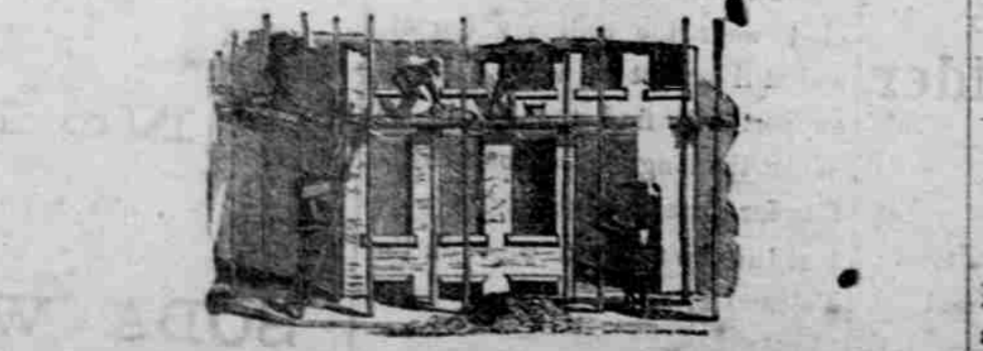

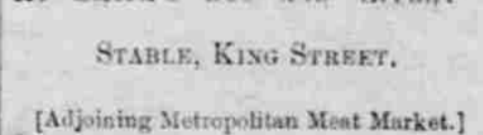
