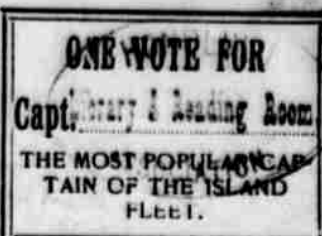

OBJECT TO THE EVIDENCE

Legality of Supreme Court Is Further Questioned.

Speeches of Attorneys Gear and Humphreys—Mr. Long Also Presents An Extensive Argument—Government Takes No Part.

Attorney General H. E. Cooper appeared in the case of J. M. Bush et al. vs. Republic of Hawaii before the Supreme Court this morning, and filed affidavits on the question of the Court's legality by President Dole, A. F. Judd Jr and Auditor General H. C. Austin.

Geo. D. Gear, intervening according to the invitation of the Court yesterday, spoke as follows: The resignation speaks for itself and any effort to contradict it would be as incompetent in this Court or any Court of law. Here especially it is inadmissible in that it seeks to place before this Court evidence as to what was in certain letters.

On the other hand some of the merchants have not appreciated the necessities of the situation and guards have been forced to turn back small packages, which under the regulations are required to be fumigated for twelve hours.

A. S. Humphreys remarked: I desire to join in the same objections for the same reasons. The Court—I presume the best course would be to have the affidavits filed and received subject to the objections as to how far the evidence is relevant.

Mr. Gear—On the affidavit of the Auditor General being filed, resumed: I make the formal objection to the affidavit that it is incompetent, irrelevant and immaterial. The question of whether he drew his salary or not is immaterial and it cannot affect his resignation.

Mr. Humphreys—I desire, in order that I may get my contentions before the Court, to state on behalf of my clients that I shall contend that there is an absolute resignation without reference to its acceptance. I shall contend furthermore that there has been an abandonment of the office, and I shall contend furthermore that the office is vacant by reason of the insanity of the Chief Justice, as provided in article 44 of the Constitution.

J. A. Magoon, one of the attorneys for plaintiffs in the case at bar, stated that he did not attack the position of the Chief Justice on the ground of incapacity. So far as this case was concerned he would not consent to such an attack.

S. S. CLEVELAND DISABLED

Supposed to Be Drifting With Broken Shaft Off Kaula.

Boat Crew Spoken by Captain of the Eric—Possibility They Are Deserters Suggested—Location of Steamer Peculiar.

The schooner Eric, from Seattle bound for Yokohama, that put into port yesterday on account of the severe illness of the captain's wife, spoke a small boat with three sailors of the steamer Cleveland about forty miles leeward of Maui.

They stated that the Cleveland had broken her shaft about three hundred and twenty miles northwest of Maui and that they were making for Kahului, where they had loaded a cargo of sugar, to telephone for assistance.

Now that the Health regulations have opened the way for business with the other islands, there is a general rush for shipments that far exceeds the capacity of steamship companies to care for. The waterfront has assumed its old time crowded appearance and today many merchants are fuming on account of their inability to despatch their orders for the other islands.

Alexander & Baldwin, Ltd., charterers of the Cleveland, applied to both the inter-island steamship companies for a steamer to go in search of the disabled vessel. Neither of them, however, had an available steamer for the purpose.

Consul General Haywood was asked late this afternoon if the Iroquois would be dispatched on the expedition. He replied that he had been in consultation with Lieut. Pond on the subject, and their conclusion was that the station steamer would not be ordered out.

SEMINOLE SAILORS OBJECT.

The crew of the Seminole, that arrived here on the 17th of February from Newcastle, put in a complaint this morning in the consul's office, asking that the ship be surveyed and that if found in the condition they claim that she is in they be discharged and let go.

TRANSFER OF \$100,000

The Minister of Finance was authorized by the Executive Council today to transfer \$100,000 from the current cash to loan fund cash, as provided for under Section 1, Act 63, Laws of 1898.

Paul Neumann appeared at the meeting and the application of the Bow Wong Progressive Association was discussed. President Dole read a letter from W. A. Henshall setting forth that the association was formed for the objects stated in its proposed charter and no other.

Attorney General Cooper stated that the appointment of a Court of Claims brings up the question of defending the Government's liability and this would require the services of an outside attorney. The personnel of the court was also discussed.

The President read a communication from the agents of the Board of Health at Hilo, addressed to the Board, asking for a properly equipped quarantine station, which should be at the same time utilized for a detention camp if necessary.

COMMITTEE OF FINANCE

The Only Committee Ready With Report to Council of State.

Most of Items Are Approved and Some Entered—Discussion on Authority for Same on Question by Mr. Kennedy.

At yesterday's meeting of the Council of State there were present President Dole and Ministers Mott-Smith, Young, Damon and Cooper; Councillors Aebi, Ema, Allen, Kennedy, Bolte, Ka-ne, Gonsalves, Robertson, Kaulokou, Robinson, Jones, Gear, Nott and Iseberg. Mr. Kennedy asked if President McKinley had called the Council of State to pass the appropriation bills, and if so why were the regular appropriation bills for the biennial period not presented.

President Dole and Minister Cooper both replied. President McKinley had not called the session, but only gave the Council permission to appropriate money for necessary expenditures until the meeting of a regular Legislature.

Mr. Robertson, on behalf of the Judiciary Committee, and Mr. Robinson, on behalf of the Foreign and Education Committee, requested and were granted more time to report on items referred to them.

Mr. Jones, from the Finance Committee, presented the following report, which was laid on the table to be considered with the bill:

Honolulu, March 20, 1900. To the President and Members of the Council of State. Sirs:—Your committee to whom was referred items in the Finance Department of Act 2, now before the Council, beg to report as follows: Under the head of Department of Finance in Act 2, the following appropriations are asked for: "Interest on all loans and advances, including remittances to London, \$45,000."

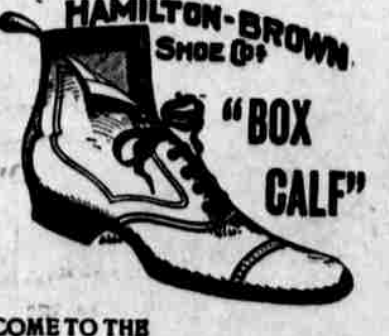
We are advised by the Minister of Finance that he has allowed for the payment of interest only \$125,000, which will not be sufficient to pay the amount of interest on amounts to become due during the next two years, especially if the items asked for in Bill 4 are appropriated by the Council of State, for which bonds are to be issued. We therefore recommend that this item be appropriated. The next item is "Redemption of outstanding bonds, Act of Oct. 24th, 1890, \$43,000; the total bonded indebtedness and the Government and Postal Savings Bank, as per Minister of Finance report, is \$4,890,351.49, of which amount the United States Government is to pay \$4,000,000, leaving a balance to be borne by the Hawaiian Government of \$890,351.49."

These bonds will become due on December 12th of the present year, and if our affairs are not fully arranged by that date it is our duty to make provision for payment of same, as it will be unfair to the holders of the bonds not to receive the money due them, especially as it will make no difference in adjusting our settlement with the United States Government. We accordingly recommend that this amount be appropriated.

The decision of the Executive Council to call for no appropriations for public buildings, when the necessity for such buildings cannot be questioned, is a type of territorial economy that finds small favor with the people.

The Board of Health may depend upon universal support from the people in instituting a continued and effective campaign against the rats. The Board now has full swing and in view of the indifferent results from the Citizens' Committee campaign, a new line of attack will be readily accepted.

In view of the Health Board having established regulations admitting increased shipments to the other islands, it is up to the steamship companies to make an equally strenuous effort to provide prompt despatch for the large amount of goods offered for shipment.

Whether Gen. Cronje will find the climate of St. Helena conducive to general comfort is of practically little moment in its influence on American opinion when compared with the spirit with which they receive the announcement of the British to practically exile their worthy prisoner.

THE CHINATOWN EMERGENCY.

What is to be done with Chinatown is a problem still before the people. With the Council of State taking the place of the Legislature, the chances are that the next legislative session will not be held for a year to come whether the Territorial bill is passed or not.

Meanwhile the people must depend upon the Board of Health to hold the burned district in its present condition until some legislative power extends the fire limits and provides for the proper construction of the streets and business blocks.

Honolulu bids fair to wake up in the near future to the fact that its fire limits have not been extended, the authorities powerless to prevent the construction of wooden buildings in the old Chinatown district and powerless to prevent the construction of blocks on the old street lines.

demands nor is it all that the people have a right to expect.

The Executive seems determined not to consider the appointment of a commission to consider the matter. Some action should be taken, however, if the authorities have any desire to properly protect the business district of this growing and progressive city.

that he was satisfied with the composition of the Court. He shortly afterward withdrew, leaving Deputy Attorney General Dole to represent the Republic in the case before the Court.

Mr. Magoon asked if they should proceed with their argument, to which question Justice Frear nodded assent. Mr. Gear desired to know what position he and Mr. Humphreys were in. They claimed the right to object on the ground of the Chief Justice's incapacity.

Mr. Magoon did not consider it necessary to inquire whether the Chief Justice had abandoned his office. I would consider the decisions of this Court valid if it could be shown that the Chief Justice has not resigned.

Mr. Gear would not insist on that point in this case, but would let it go over to one of his own cases. The Court in the meantime might render that question unnecessary by a decision on the sole matter of the resignation.

Justice Frear Decides.

Justice Frear, after consulting Justice Whiting and Judge Perry, announced that the Court thought it best to consider the question on the grounds raised by counsel in the present case.

Mr. Long, associated with Mr. Magoon, then began his argument for the plaintiffs, beginning with the documentary evidence as to the legality of the Court. Did the endorsement by President Dole vacate the office of Chief Justice? Was there anything left to do or to be performed to make the resignation complete? No. Parole evidence to qualify a plain, simple and unqualified resignation would be without authority and without parallel.

It was noticeable that, while the attorney for the plaintiffs was arguing the legality question, the Deputy Attorney General absent himself in the lobby, apparently in keeping with the Attorney General's tacit declaration that the Government declined to fight the objections.

To Save Women.

The Illinois House of Correction is about to try an interesting experiment in the reformation of women criminals. Superintendent Sloan has built three large greenhouses, covering a space of 4,000 square feet, in which it is intended to grow roses, carnations and chrysanthemums for the Chicago market.

It is announced from Illinois that the contest over the census patronage in that State, which it was expected by his opponents would be an obstacle to the return of Senator Cullom to Washington, has been adjusted by an agreement whereby the patronage of the eighth Illinois Congressional district represented by Democrats has been turned over to Senator Cullom.

We have no legislative machinery for sifting out pauper aliens and returning them to their own countries, as they have in the United States.

Trouble on the St. Katherine.
The crew of the St. Katherine will have a hearing before Consul Haywood this afternoon at 2 o'clock. The sailors and second mate claim that the captain misused them from the day they left New York until they arrived here. Second mate Chase states that he was locked up in his room for forty-five days; after being released from custody he was abused and ill treated by the captain and first mate, the only ones in authority above him. Cabin boy Se Rey also claims to have been shamefully abused by the head steward; being cursed at and put to severe work in different capacities until on the verge of exhaustion. He says that some strutting accusation will come up at their hearing today. One of the sailors took sick after being out one day and he so lacked the proper attention he all but died. If the statements made by the second mate and cabin boy are at all true the captain will have to answer to some very serious charges.

Police Court Notes.
The case of Geo. Miller, held for the different charges of larceny in the second degree, was again postponed.

H. E. Vincent will have a hearing on the 23d inst for three charges of larceny in the second degree against him.

Language of the Fish.
Prof. Kolliker, of the Naples Aquarium, recently went down into the Mediterranean in an iron cage lit up by electricity. With the aid of a powerful receiver and a specially constructed phonograph he registered the expressions of surprise with which the fish welcomed his appearance. He notes that the sound made by one fish differs greatly from that of another, and has summed up the results of his experiment in the conviction that the sounds by fishes will yet be recognized as a language.

Historic Church Burned.
St. James' rectory, near Friendship, Md., has just been burned. The communion service belonging to the church, and presented by Queen Anne in 1702, was destroyed, as was also the silver baptismal bowl given by a Mrs. Loche many years since. The church records dating from 1867 were also destroyed. The aims plate presented to St. James' by the wife of the first rector, the Rev. Henry Hall, in 1732, was also destroyed. This rectory was probably the last of the old rectories in Southern Maryland, and was a commodious, hip-roofed building.
The two chief States of the North and South respectively, New York and Georgia, still adhere to annual sessions of the Legislature, and in both last year the biennial session project was sidetracked. There are now six States only having annual legislative sessions, of which the Empire State of the North and the Empire State of the South are two.

NEW TO-DAY BY AUTHORITY.
SANITARY DISTRICT, HONOLULU.
Office of the Board of Health, Honolulu, H. I., March 21, 1900.

"The Sanitary Regulations of the Board of Health shall apply to, and be in force within, that portion of the District of Honolulu included within a radius of five miles from the Executive Building."

The master is given to understand that it is the trustees' intention to realize, for this purpose, on all the personal property, it being their intention to keep the realty intact. The master acknowledges that he was much assisted in his examination and audit of the accounts by the expeditious manner in which they were presented.
