TOPICS OF THE DAY.

The question of the value of real estate in the city has been a standing topic among business men for a long time. That inflated figures are quoted for real estate property cannot be disputed and that the "boom" balloon will burst before many moons goes without saying. We take the liberty to reproduce an article from the Advertiser in which Mr. W. O. Smith, a conservative man, well posted on real is reported as saying:

"My experience," said he, "has taught me that in Honolulu in the past there is a great deal more stability in the market values of land in town, which is called business property, but the value of residence property is more fluctuating and uncertain, frequently depending upon the fancies and tastes of individuals.

"In some cases, I think the prices paid for residence properties have been very high. We are in a state of transition and an unusual degree of development and growth, and it is difficult to establish standards of value, especially for residence property.

"We will probably have the same experience in Honolulu that many have had in the States upon the introduction of electric cars and rapid transit, which is a tendency to enhance the value of suburban property somewhat, to the injury of house lots in and nearer town."

Judge Frear wants \$8000 for making the changes in the Ballou code which must be made according to the organic act, and ex-judge, now Governor Dole, backs the learned Chief Justice in his effort of getting a "sack," and Senator Carter nearly violated rule 77, in insisting of keeping the floor of the Senate in his fight for the outrageous compensation proposed for "patriot" Frear's work. As a matter of fact every attorney had the Hawaiian code revised and corrected, personally, or by his clerk, as soon as the Organic Act was published and there are no reasons, why the country should go to a great deal of expense for the convenience of lawyers. Mr. Frear, it is stated, is a patriot. Mr. Frear also draws a very fine and comfortable salary from the Territory for holding a position, which he has no good sufficient learning or education to hold, and which was given to him, simply through nepotism under the Dole regime; and, although his work as a Chief Justice, amounts to very little, he now wants to be paid \$5000 for a job, that the writer could have done just as well and would have charged \$50 for. The printing and mechanical work connected with Chief Justice Frear's little scheme to pull in the remnants of coin, which may be found in the Treasury should be paid by the Governor, or whoever ordered the unnecessary work done, and for his services patriot Frear should simply receive only the thanks of the Territory.

It is always sad to us to see a Hawaiian go wrong through the flattery or smooth tongues or "convincing" arguments or vague promises offered by the "missionary political party." The trouble is that some young Hawaiians very easily get the "swelled head," because, in their humble position in life, some great millionaire like Baldwin pats their backs, and tells them in eloquent and jingling words, how much good they can do for their country and for Baldwin. Senator Kanuha is a specimen of the Hawaiians to whom we refer. His political career will be very meteoric. He has no qualifications which should entitle him to be a law-maker, he sits in his senatorial chair, as any Hawaiian boy does at his desk in the Kamehameha Schools, to learn, but the taxpayers are not at all anxious to pay for the political education of the tribe, to which Senator Kanuha belongs and which will not stand loyal to party votes passed in caucus. Mr. Kanuha has never yet advanced an original idea or presented a measure of his party in an intelligent manner. He thinks that he is ingratiating himself with the haole by his action in the Senate, but before the session is over he will understand the error he committed in deserting his party in an attempt to be the leader of that party. As we have said we regret to see young Hawaiians with ambition and undoubtedly with the intention of doing the best for their people, "flopping over," and become obstreperous to the older and wiser politicians who represent the party to which they promised allegiance. If it pleases Mr. Kanuha to fall in line with Senator Russel and obey the mandates of the "planters" in the Legislature, he can do so of course. He is of age, we presume, and he thinks he knows more than we do on political matters. We are only sorry for him, because he is a Hawaiian, and, when the honorable gentleman was in knicker-bockers, we were giving battle for the rights and advocating the interests of his people. Mr. Kanuha can go over to the Republican party if he chooses to do so, but he should remember that if such is his intention he should no longer attend the caucus meetings of the independents, as he did last night. His constituents are also justified in calling upon him and ask for an explanation of his conduct and perhaps the versatile, political tailor of the Kamehameha Schools will have some difficulties in answering their demand. Get a band of steel around that head of yours Mr. Senator Kanuha and you may then realize that there are lots of things you don't know.

The Bishop's Attitude.

Editor Independent, Sir:—For the silencing of the scribe who is allowed by the P. C. Advertiser to fire from behind the rock of anonymity, please find below copy of "official notice" issued last July, when the Islands became a Territory of the United States of America. ALFRED WILLIS.
March 29, 1901.

Official Notice.

The admission of the Hawaiian Islands as a Territory of the United States calls for one or two changes in the Book of Common Prayer. The order issued on August 9, 1898, is accordingly rescinded, and authority is given by the Bishop for the following alterations:

1—In the order for the Holy Communion:

(a) Omit the Collect for the Queen.

(b) In the Prayer "for the whole state of Christ's Church," the clause beginning, "We beseech Thee," to be read as follows: "We beseech Thee also to save and defend all Christian Kings, Princes, and Governors; and specially Thy servant the President of the United States; that under him we may be godly and quietly governed; and grant to all that are put in authority under him."

2—In the order for Morning and Evening Prayer:

(a) For the versicle, "O Lord, save the Queen," to read, "O Lord, save the State."

(b) At Morning Prayer, when the Litany is not said, and at Evening Prayer to use the following:

A Prayer for the President of the United States and all in Civil Authority.

O Lord, our heavenly Father, the high and mighty Ruler of the universe, who dost from Thy throne behold all the dwellers upon earth:

Most heartily we beseech Thee with Thy favour to behold and bless Thy servant the President of the United States, the Governor of this Territory, and all others in authority; and so replenish them with the grace of Thy Holy Spirit, that they may always incline to Thy will, and walk in Thy way. Endue them plentifully with heavenly gifts; grant them in health and prosperity long to live; and finally, after this life, to attain everlasting joy and felicity; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Or,

Almighty God, whose kingdom is everlasting and power infinite; Have mercy upon this whole land; and so rule the hearts of Thy servants, The President of the United States, the Governor of this Territory, and all others in authority, that they, knowing whose ministers they are, may above all things seek Thy honour and glory; and that we and all the People, duly considering whose authority they bear, may faithfully and obediently honour them, in Thee, and for Thee, according to Thy blessed Word and ordinance; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who with Thee and the Holy Ghost liveth and reigneth ever, one God, world without end. Amen.

3—In The Litany:

(a) Between the intercession for the "Holy Church Universal" and that for "Bishops, Priests, and Deacons" to use the following:

"That it may please Thee to bless and preserve Thy servants the President of the United States, the Governor of this Territory, and all Christian Kings, Princes, and Governors."

(b) Omit intercession for "the Lords of the Council."

The South African War.

LONDON, March 19.—Joseph Chamberlain, the Colonial Secretary, announced in the House of Commons today that Botha had declined the peace terms Lord Kitchener had offered.

General Botha, Mr. Chamberlain said, had conveyed the information in a letter to General Kitchener, in which he announced that he was not disposed to recommend the terms of peace General Kitchener was instructed to offer him, to the earnest consideration of the Government. General Botha added that his Government and its chief officers entirely agreed with this view.

DURBAN, March 20.—Owing to the Klip river being flooded General Campbell's column has been unable to return to Standerton, from which point it went to bring away the garrison at Verde, which the British evacuated. The column had heavy fighting going and coming from Verde. General Campbell has about 200 sick and wounded. There are many bands of roving Bows in the neighborhood of Standerton.

CAPE TOWN, March 30.—A dispatch from Cradock, Cape Colony, says Colonel Goringe's force engaged Kritzinger's commando March 15th. The latter lost nine men killed and had seven men wounded. The British loss was one man killed and ten wounded.

EXECUTED BY THE BRITISH.

CAPE TOWN, March 20.—A dispatch says S. Minaber and J.A. Neuwoudt were shot at De Aar last evening for treason and murder, in pursuance of the sentence of a court-martial. The death sentence was passed a week ago in connection with the wrecking of a train near Taabosch, by which five men were killed. General Kitchener confirmed the verdict. The garrison was paraded and the prisoners were led out at sunset. Death was instantaneous. A Dutch minister and relatives remained with the prisoners until the end. Two others concerned in the train wrecking were sentenced to five years at penal servitude.

BOER STORES DESTROYED.

MAPEKING, Basutoland, March 20.—A force which is sweeping over the southeast portion of the Orange River Colony has reached Wepener, where the troops found heavy stocks of grain and cattle. They carried away as much as possible and destroyed 3,000 bags of grain. The houses at Wepener were found to be intact.

LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS.

Delegate Wilcox writes that he is on his way home.

The captain and officers of the British man-of-war Icarus called upon the Governor yesterday.

The Senate and the House will meet in joint session tomorrow in regard to the apportionment of Senators. It will be a very touching session.

By the last mail from the Coast, Commissioner Wray Taylor received from the Agricultural Department, Washington, a consignment of alfalfa seed. This he will distribute to those who wish it.

Mario Rapozo, a Portuguese was tarred and feathered at Honolulu early this week by a number of indignant citizens. The trouble was caused by a serious offense against the moral code.

The United States Army transport Pak Ling arrived off port last night a little before 11 o'clock. She is from San Francisco, and brought several days' later news and mail from the Coast.

An important caucus was held at the headquarters of the Independents last night, and on Monday it is probably that Dr. Russell will resign from the Senate and go into his political grave together with his Dispensary bill.

Company A, of the National Guard, held a meeting last night, and unanimously accepted a challenge of Company B for a competitive drill on Saturday next. The drill will take place at 8 p. m., in front of the Drillshed.

There was a big row between American soldiers and British blue jackets last night, and the police had to take a hand in the fracas and make several arrests. The British although in the minority had decidedly the best of the set to, and the police although in a still smaller minority won the day, as it should.

After the House had taken a recess yesterday an unpleasant occurrence took place between a Bulletin reporter and the Sergeant-at-Arms, Representatives Hoogs, and Makekau stopped the rumpus which was caused by the sergeant-at-arms refusing to furnish a copy of the County bill to the newspaper, and giving his refusal in a language which was certainly unparliamentary.

A bill for advice and instruction to the trustee, was filed in the Circuit Court yesterday by J. O. Carter, trustee of the estate of H. A. P. Carter, deceased, in an action against Sybil A. Carter, George R. Carter, Francis I. Crehore (formerly Carter), Agnes C. Galt (formerly Carter), Cordelia J. Carter, Mary H. S. Davis (formerly Mary H. S. Carter), Henry A. P. Carter, a minor, and Grace S. Carter, a minor.

The Healan masquerade will take place this evening at the boathouse. A large number of tickets have been sold, and the event promises to be one of the most successful affairs ever undertaken by the club. Many novel costumes will be worn. Dancing will commence at 8 o'clock, and the unmasking will take place at 10:30 o'clock. Refreshments will be served immediately afterward.

Death of a Teacher.

Word was received yesterday by Mr. Fred. Hayselden, that Professor John A. Moore, for many years connected with the bureau of the Board of Education, had died at the Hayselden residence at Lahaina. The decedent was at one time principal of Lahainaluna Seminary and an assistant inspector of schools. Mr. Moore was a native of Alabama and served in the Confederate army during the Civil War as a major. He was about seventy years of age. He leaves two daughters, Mrs. S. D. Hesphy, who is at present in Europe, and Mrs. John S. Bishop of Astoria, Oregon.

Will Go to Buffalo.

Hawaii will be represented at the Pan-American Exhibition, and Mr. W. M. Tobin, who is here, has made arrangements to make the Hawaiian exhibit interesting.

Among those who will go are the Kamehameha Glee Club, made up of graduates from Kamehameha School. A number of mat-makers, fan-makers and hat-makers have also signed contracts and will give the American public object lessons in Hawaiian industries.

Two Hawaiian ladies, who are well known in Honolulu as soprano and alto vocalists, have also been engaged, as has David Nape, the celebrated composer and musician and Meka, for a long time the leading flute player in the Hawaiian band. Meka is an excellent piccolo soloist and made a tour of America a few years ago.

Mr. Tobin has decided to take with him Kimoko and Opu, two of the best swimmers in the Islands. Kimoko has beaten Dan Renear, the ex-sensur 100 yard swimmer of the world twice, and Opu has beaten Kimoko three times. Mr. Tobin intends to have the men properly trained and to challenge the world's best short-distance swimmers on their behalf.

Opu will attempt to swim the rapids at Niagara. He was at the World's Fair and has seen the rapids and signified his willingness to make the attempt. Dan Renear says that with proper training the men should more than hold their own. Several native chanters and ukulele players will also make the trip and add the proper weirdness to the exhibition of the Burning Mountain of Hawaii.

At a meeting of the shareholders of the American Sugar Company, Limited, held at the office of C. Brewer & Co., in Honolulu, on Wednesday, March 6, 1901, the following action was taken:

Resolved: Article fifth of the Articles of Association is hereby amended by striking out all the words after the third line thereof and inserting in place thereof the following: "And two additional directors, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum; and that in case of resignation, death, inability to act as said director, or officers, or absence from the country of any director or officer, the board of directors may appoint any other person to act as and be an officer or director in the place of the officer or director so resigning, dying, becoming unable to act, or absent from the country, and every officer and director so appointed shall have all the authority and power of the person in whose place he shall have been appointed."

Yesterday copies of the original articles of incorporation of the American Sugar Company, Limited, and a copy of the same with the proposed amendment were filed with Treasurer Lansing. The matter will be placed in the hands of the Attorney General for consideration.

A Serious Accident.

A runaway accident occurred yesterday afternoon near the High School, which resulted in serious injuries to the occupants of a private carriage driven by Mr. Boltman. The gentleman received a fracture of the thigh and several cuts in the face. Fortunately the ladies and children in the carriage escaped without serious injuries. The horse attached to the carriage became frightened and unmanageable, and the vehicle was overturned and the occupants thrown to the ground.

Peking Will Be Late.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 21.—While the steamer City of Peking was in dry dock Tuesday it was found that a slight crack existed in the hull at the stern, making it necessary to provide a new tail shaft. On this account the steamer, which is scheduled to sail Saturday, may not be able to leave port until Tuesday or Wednesday.

At the Mint.

On March 16, there will be a meeting of the directors of the Mint, to discuss the question of coinage, and the size of the equivalent to be poured out for a quarter. The stockholders are requested to meet later on in the new beer garden, back of the Mint, and there express their views on dividends and reserve funds. The President hopes that there will be a full attendance.

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

The question of the value of real estate in the city has been a standing topic among business men for a long time. That inflated figures are quoted for real estate property cannot be disputed and that the "boom" balloon will burst before many moons goes without saying. We take the liberty to reproduce an article from the Advertiser in which Mr. W. O. Smith, a conservative man, well posted on real is reported as saying:

"My experience," said he, "has taught me that in Honolulu in the past there is a great deal more stability in the market values of land in town, which is called business property, but the value of residence property is more fluctuating and uncertain, frequently depending upon the fancies and tastes of individuals.

"In some cases, I think the prices paid for residence properties have been very high. We are in a state of transition and an unusual degree of development and growth, and it is difficult to establish standards of value, especially for residence property.

"We will probably have the same experience in Honolulu that many have had in the States upon the introduction of electric cars and rapid transit, which is a tendency to enhance the values of suburban property somewhat, to the injury of house lots in and nearer town."

Judge Frear wants \$8000 for making the changes in the Ballou code which must be made according to the organic act, and ex-judge, now Governor Dole, backs the learned Chief Justice in his effort of getting a "sack," and Senator Carter nearly violated rule 77, in insisting of keeping the floor of the Senate in his fight for the outrageous compensation proposed for "patriot" Frear's work. As a matter of fact every attorney had the Hawaiian code revised and corrected, personally, or by his clerk, as soon as the Organic Act was published and there are no reasons, why the country should go to a great deal of expense for the convenience of lawyers. Mr. Frear, it is stated, is a patriot. Mr. Frear also draws a very fine and comfortable salary from the Territory for holding a position, which he has no got sufficient learning or education to hold, and which was given to him, simply through nepotism under the Dole regime; and, although his work as a Chief Justice, amounts to very little, he now wants to be paid \$5000 for a job, that the writer could have done just as well and would have charged \$50 for. The printing and mechanical work connected with Chief Justice Frear's little scheme to pull in the remnants of coin, which may be found in the Treasury should be paid by the Governor, or whoever ordered the unnecessary work done, and for his services patriot Frear should simply receive only the thanks of the Territory.

It is always sad to us to see a Hawaiian go wrong through the flattery or smooth tongues or "convincing" arguments or vague promises offered by the "missionary political party." The trouble is that some young Hawaiians very easily get the "swelled head," because, in their humble position in life, some great millionaire like Baldwin pats their backs, and tells them in eloquent and jingling words, how much good they can do for their country and for Baldwin. Senator Kanuha is a specimen of the Hawaiians to whom we refer. His political career will be very meteoric. He has no qualifications which should entitle him to be a law-maker, he sits in his senatorial chair, as any Hawaiian boy does at his desk in the Kamehameha Schools, to learn, but the taxpayers are not at all anxious to pay for the political education of the tribe, to which Senator Kanuha belongs and which will not stand loyal to party votes passed in caucus. Mr. Kanuha has never yet advanced an original idea or presented a measure of his party in an intelligent manner. He thinks that he is ingratiating himself with the haole by his action in the Senate, but before the session is over he will understand the error he committed in deserting his party in an attempt to be the leader of that party. As we have said we regret to see young Hawaiians with ambition and undoubtedly with the intention of doing the best for their people, "flopping over," and become obstreperous to the older and wiser politicians who represent the party to which they promised allegiance. If it pleases Mr. Kanuha to fall in line with Senator Russel and obey the mandates of the "planters" in the Legislature, he can do so of course. He is of age, we presume, and he thinks he knows more than we do on political matters. We are only sorry for him, because he is a Hawaiian, and, when the honorable gentleman was in knicker-bockers, we were giving battle for the rights and advocating the interests of his people. Mr. Kanuha can go over to the Republican party if he chooses to do so, but he should remember that if such is his intention he should no longer attend the caucus meetings of the Independents, as he did last night. His constituents are also justified in calling upon him and ask for an explanation of his conduct and perhaps the versatile, political tailor of the Kamehameha Schools will have some difficulties in answering their demand. Get a band of steel around that head of yours Mr. Senator Kanuha and you may then realize that there are lots of things you don't know.

The Bishop's Attitude.

Editor Independent, Sir:—For the silencing of the scribe who is allowed by the P. C. Advertiser to fire from behind the rock of anonymity, please find below copy of "official notice" issued last July, when the Islands became a Territory of the United States of America. ALFRED WILLIS.
March 29, 1901.

Official Notice.

The admission of the Hawaiian Islands as a Territory of the United States calls for one or two changes in the Book of Common Prayer. The order issued on August 9, 1898, is accordingly rescinded, and authority is given by the Bishop for the following alterations:

1—In the order for the Holy Communion:

(a) Omit the Collect for the Queen.
(b) In the Prayer "for the whole state of Christ's Church," the clause beginning, "We beseech Thee," to be read as follows: "We beseech Thee also to save and defend all Christian Kings, Princes, and Governors; and specially Thy servant the President of the United States; that under him we may be godly and quietly governed; and grant to all that are put in authority under him."

2—In the order for Morning and Evening Prayer:

(a) For the versicle, "O Lord, save the Queen," to read, "O Lord, save the State."

(b) At Morning Prayer, when the Litany is not said, and at Evening Prayer to use the following:

A Prayer for the President of the United States and all in Civil Authority.

O Lord, our heavenly Father, the high and mighty Ruler of the universe, who dost from Thy throne behold all the dwellers upon earth:

Most heartily we beseech Thee with Thy favour to behold and bless Thy servant the President of the United States, the Governor of this Territory, and all others in authority; and so replenish them with the grace of Thy Holy Spirit, that they may always incline to Thy will, and walk in Thy way. Endue them plentifully with heavenly gifts: grant them in health and prosperity long to live; and finally, after this life, to attain everlasting joy and felicity; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Or,

Almighty God, whose kingdom is everlasting and power infinite; Have mercy upon this whole land; and so rule the hearts of Thy servants, the President of the United States, the Governor of this Territory, and all others in authority, that they, knowing whose ministers they are, may above all things seek Thy honour and glory; and that we and all the People, duly considering whose authority they bear, may faithfully and obediently honour them, in Thee, and for Thee, according to Thy blessed Word and ordinance; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who with Thee and the Holy Ghost liveth and reigneth ever, one God, world without end. Amen.

3—In The Litany:

(a) Between the intercession for the "Holy Church Universal" and that for "Bishops, Priests, and Deacons" to use the following:

"That it may please Thee to bless and preserve Thy servants the President of the United States, the Governor of this Territory, and all Christian Kings, Princes, and Governors."

(b) Omit intercession for "the Lords of the Council."

The South African War.

LONDON, March 19.—Joseph Chamberlain, the Colonial Secretary, announced in the House of Commons today that Botha had declined the peace terms Lord Kitchener had offered.

General Botha, Mr. Chamberlain said, had conveyed the information in a letter to General Kitchener, in which he announced that he was not disposed to recommend the terms of peace General Kitchener was instructed to offer him, to the earnest consideration of the Government. General Botha added that his Government and its chief officers entirely agreed with this view.

DURBAN, March 20.—Owing to the Klip river being flooded General Campbell's column has been unable to return to Standerton, from which point it went to bring away the garrison at Verde, which the British evacuated. The column had heavy fighting going and coming from Verde. General Campbell has about 200 sick and wounded. There are many bands of roving Boers in the neighborhood of Standerton.

CAPE TOWN, March 30.—A dispatch from Cradock, Cape Colony, says Colonel Goring's force engaged Kritzinger's commando March 15th. The latter lost nine men killed and had seven men wounded. The British loss was one man killed and ten wounded.

EXECUTED BY THE BRITISH.

CAPE TOWN, March 20.—A dispatch says S. Minaber and J.A. Newwoudt were shot at De Aar last evening for treason and murder, in pursuance of the sentence of a court-martial. The death sentence was passed a week ago in connection with the wrecking of a train near Tsaabosch, by which five men were killed. General Kitchener confirmed the verdict. The garrison was paraded and the prisoners were led out at sunset. Death was instantaneous. A Dutch minister and relatives remained with the prisoners until the end. Two others concerned in the train wrecking were sentenced to five years at penal servitude.

BOER STORES DESTROYED.

MAFERING, Basutoland, March 20.—A force which is sweeping over the southeast portion of the Orange River Colony has reached Wepener, where the troops found heavy stocks of grain and cattle. They carried away as much as possible and destroyed 3,000 bags of grain. The houses at Wepener were found to be intact.

LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS.

Delegato Wilcox writes that he is on his way home.

The captain and officers of the British man-of-war *Icarus* called upon the Governor yesterday.

When you want a hack ring up 191. On that stand you will get a reliable and good driver, a fine hack, and no overcharging.

The Senate and the House will meet in joint session tomorrow in regard to the apportionment of Senators. It will be a very touching session.

By the last mail from the Coast, Commissioner Wray Taylor received from the Agricultural Department, Washington, a consignment of alfalfa seed. This he will distribute to those who wish it.

Maute Rapozo, a Portuguese was tarred and feathered at Honolulu, early this week by a number of indignant citizens. The trouble was caused by a serious offense against the moral code.

The United States Army transport *Pak Ling* arrived off port last night a little before 11 o'clock. She is from San Francisco, and brought several days' later news and mail from the Coast.

An important caucus was held at the headquarters of the Independents last night, and on Monday it is probably that Dr. Russell will resign from the Senate and go into his political grave together with his Dispensary bill.

Company A, of the National Guard, held a meeting last night, and unanimously accepted a challenge of Company B for a competitive drill on Saturday next. The drill will take place at 8 p. m., in front of the Drillshed.

There was a big row between American soldiers and British blue jackets last night, and the police had to take a hand in the fracas and make several arrests. The British although in the minority had decided the best of the set to, and the police although in a still smaller minority won the day, as it should.

After the House had taken a recess yesterday an unpleasant occurrence took place between a Bulletin reporter and the Sergeant-at-Arms, Representatives Hoogs, and Makakau stopped the rumpus which was caused by the sergeant-at-arms refusing to furnish a copy of the County bill to the newspaper, and giving his refusal in a language which was certainly unparliamentary.

A bill for advice and instruction to the trustee, was filed in the Circuit Court yesterday by J. O. Carter, trustee of the estate of H. A. P. Carter, deceased, in an action against Sybil A. Carter, George R. Carter, Francis I. Crehore (formerly Carter), Arnes C. Galt (formerly Carter), Cordelia J. Carter, Mary H. S. Davis (formerly Mary H. S. Carter), Henry A. P. Carter, a minor, and Grace S. Carter, a minor.

The Healan masquerade will take place this evening at the boathouse. A large number of tickets have been sold, and the event promises to be one of the most successful affairs ever undertaken by the club. Many novel costumes will be worn. Dancing will commence at 8 o'clock, and the unmasking will take place at 10:30 o'clock. Refreshments will be served immediately afterward.

Death of a Teacher.

Word was received yesterday by Mr. Fred. Hayselden, that Professor John A. Moore, for many years connected with the bureau of the Board of Education, had died at the Hayselden residence at Lahaina. The decedent was at one time principal of Lahainaluna Seminary and an assistant inspector of schools. Mr. Moore was a native of Alabama and served in the Confederate army during the Civil War as a major. He was about seventy years of age. He leaves two daughters, Mrs. S. D. Heaphy, who is at present in Europe, and Mrs. John S. Bishop of Astoria, Oregon.

Will Go to Fufilo.

Hawaii will be represented at the Pan-American Exhibition, and Mr. W. M. Tobin, who is here, has made arrangements to make the Hawaiian exhibit interesting.

Among those who will go are the Kamehameha Glee Club, made up of graduates from Kamehameha School. A number of mat-makers, fan-makers and hat-makers have also signed contracts and will give the American public object lessons in Hawaiian industries.

Two Hawaiian ladies, who are well known in Honolulu as soprano and alto vocalists, have also been engaged, as has David Nape, the celebrated composer and musician and Mekia, for a long time the leading flute player in the Hawaiian band. Mekia is an excellent piccolo soloist and made a tour of America a few years ago.

Mr. Tobin has decided to take with him Kimoko and Opu, two of the best swimmers in the Islands. Kimoko has beaten Dan Renear, the ex-sar 100 yard swimmer of the world twice, and Opu has beaten Kimoko three times. Mr. Tobin intends to have the men properly trained and to challenge the world's best short-distance swimmers on their behalf.

Opu will attempt to swim the rapids at Niagara. He was at the World's Fair and has seen the rapids and signified his willingness to make the attempt. Dan Renear says that with proper training the men should more than hold their own.

Several native chanters and ukule players will also make the trip and add the proper weirdness to the exhibition of the Burning Mountain of Hawaii.

The American Sugar Co.

At a meeting of the shareholders of the American Sugar Company, Limited, held at the office of C. Brewer & Co., in Honolulu, on Wednesday, March 6, 1901, the following action was taken:

Resolved: Article fifth of the Articles of Association is hereby amended by striking out all the words after the third line thereof and inserting in place thereof the following: "And two additional directors, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum; and that in case of resignation, death, inability to act as said director, or officers, or absence from the country of any director or officer, the board of directors may appoint any other person to act as and be an officer or director in the place of the officer or director so resigning, dying, becoming unable to act, or absent from the country, and every officer and director so appointed shall have all the authority and power of the person in whose place he shall have been appointed."

Yesterday copies of the original articles of incorporation of the American Sugar Company, Limited, and a copy of the same with the proposed amendment were filed with Treasurer Lansing. The matter will be placed in the hands of the Attorney General for consideration.

A Serious Accident.

A runaway accident occurred yesterday afternoon near the High School, which resulted in serious injuries to the occupants of a private carriage driven by Mr. Boltman. The gentleman received a fracture of the thigh and several cuts in the face. Fortunately the ladies and children in the carriage escaped without serious injuries. The horse attached to the carriage became frightened and unmanageable, and the vehicle was overturned and the occupants thrown to the ground.

Peking Will Be Late.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 21.—While the steamer *City of Peking* was in dry dock Tuesday it was found that a slight crack existed in the hull at the stern, making it necessary to provide a new tail shaft. On this account the steamer, which is scheduled to sail Saturday, may not be able to leave port until Tuesday or Wednesday.

At the Mint.

On March 16, there will be a meeting of the directors of the Mint, to discuss the question of coinage, and the size of the equivalent to be poured out for a quarter. The stockholders are requested to meet later on in the new beer garden, back of the Mint, and there express their views on dividends and reserve funds. The President hopes that there will be a full attendance.
