EXPLOSION OF A BOMB FOR GOVERNMENT WHARVES

By W. O. Smith in the Cabinet Meeting This Forenoon.

Kohala and Hilo Railway Co. Secures Sub Lease to Large Amount of Land Along Hilo Bay.

The session of the Cabinet today to meet the representatives of the two rival Hawaii railway companies took from the usual time this forenoon until after 2 o'clock this afternoon. The greater part of the time was taken up in the discussion of the application of the Hilo Railway Co. for a terminal on the Hilo harbor and the Wailoa river.

A bomb burst when W. O. Smith, representing the Kohala & Hilo Railway Co. announced that corporation had acquired a sub-lease from the Waiakoa Sugar Co. of a piece of land on the Hilo harbor and Wailoa river covering the waterfront from the fish ponds at the head of the river to Coconut Island.

An animated discussion followed this announcement. Mr. Smith stated that it was not the intention of his company to use the advantage gained. The land had been obtained for protection as it had been learned that the Hilo Railway Co. was making a move to secure a lot of land from the Government. Mr. Smith urged that action be delayed until the arrival of the head men in his company.

The representatives of the Hilo Railway Co. asked for an immediate decision as the rails and other materials were now on the way.

The Government favored the idea of granting the Hilo Railway Co. a location substantially as asked for, with modifications. No final action was taken, but there is no doubt as to the granting of terminal points on Hilo bay and Wailoa river. The only hesitancy on the part of the Government is in regard to the area applied for.

The land sub-leased by the Kohala and Hilo Railway is nearly all under an eighteen years' lease by the government to the Waiakoa Sugar Company. Some of the minor portions are private lands. However, this harbor front stretch runs across the land applied for by the Hilo Railway Company in three or four places.

Speaking of the matter President Dole said: "The Government will not tolerate any land grabbing policy on the part of either company. There will have to be a granting of rights of way on the part of some one."

The Cabinet discussed further the instructions of A. S. Hartwell but no information regarding these could be obtained.

PEARL HARBOR NAVAL STATION.

Commander Merry and Mr. Dodge went down to Pearl Harbor yesterday on business connected with the proposed Naval Station there.

Commander Merry said that an option on certain lands at Pearl Harbor had been applied for, but that the trustees had not yet decided what to do in the matter.

"We are expecting the Solace most any day now, as she left Manila on the 3rd instant and is a fast boat."

Johannesburg Excited.

Johannesburg, Sept. 8.—The anxiety here in regard to the crisis has been intensified by the tone of the debate in the Raad. The railroad offices continue to be besieged by those wanting to get out of the country.

Wotal and Lumber Arrived in Schooners Annie Johnson and Olga.

Work Soon To Begin—Large Importation of Copper—Cotton Bros. & Co.—To Use Island Labor.

The schooners Annie Johnson and Olga that arrived on Saturday and Monday respectively have aboard the material for the two government wharves to be built near the office of the pilots. As soon as the Nippon Maru has sailed for the Orient these two vessels will haul alongside the Pacific Mail wharf extension and discharge their cargoes. The material will then be carted away and placed in convenient places.

Included in the cargo of the Annie Johnson are 50,800 pounds of copper and the iron work necessary for the government docks. The Olga has 395,000 feet of lumber and 463 piles.

Cotton Bros. & Co., wharf and bridge constructors of Oakland, Cal., are the people in charge of the work. They are the heaviest contractors on the Valley Railway of California. They are now engaged in the work of building three immense drawbridges over the San Joaquin river.

The first work on the new docks will begin in the near future with the covering of the necessary piles with copper. E. J. Cotton one of the contractors, was expected on the 27th inst., but, owing to an accident sustained recently by his brother, it is not probable that he will be here as soon as that.

The foreman who will have charge of the laborers and their work will be here early in October. It is likely that he will bring along one or two men to form a nucleus for a gang. It is most likely that all the other laborers will be secured here.

The fellow had climbed up on the pile for a sleep during the night and when the sun's rays became warm in the morning, he rolled over the edge and fell quite a distance, breaking one or two bones and bruising himself considerably. He was removed to Buena Vista hospital for treatment.

British Reply Received

Pretoria, Sept. 13, 11:30 a. m.—The British cabinet's despatch of Friday has just been handed to the Transvaal government.

Cornelius Vanderbilt's Sudden Death.

New York, September 12.—Cornelius Vanderbilt died at 5:15 o'clock this morning at his home at Fifty-Seventh street and Fifth-avenue, this city.

Mr. Vanderbilt arrived from Newport with Mrs. Vanderbilt at 9 o'clock last night. He appeared in excellent health and spirits and retired soon afterward.

About midnight he was seized with a serious stroke of paralysis, the second which he has suffered. The household was roused. Everything possible was done for the patient, but he grew rapidly worse and died at a quarter past 5 o'clock. He was semi-conscious until death.

Chauncey M. Depew reached the Vanderbilt house at 7:30 o'clock. He remained but ten minutes.

William K. Vanderbilt, brother of the dead man, arrived soon after Mr. Depew left. He was much agitated. He said when asked for information: "My brother died suddenly at 5:15 o'clock from heart failure, brought about by an attack of acute paralysis which occurred at midnight. When he died his wife, his daughter Gladys and son Reginald were with him. Mrs. Vanderbilt and her daughter Gladys are prostrated by the shock. The disposition of Mr. Vanderbilt's estate is a matter of some doubt. Cornelius Vanderbilt, Jr., was alienated from his family by his marriage two years ago with Miss Grace Wilson, daughter of R. T. Wilson, the banker of this city, and it is thought probable that this son will not be the principal heir. The opposition to young Vanderbilt's marriage was based upon his youth and the fact that Miss Wilson was eight or ten years his senior."

At the time of his death, Mr. Vanderbilt was president or director in some thirty railroad companies.

VANDERBILT WORKED HIS WAY UP.

New York, September 12.—Cornelius Vanderbilt was born on Staten Island, November 27, 1843. William H. Vanderbilt, his father, was at that time a farmer and Cornelius at the age of 16 left school and secured a place as messenger in the Shoe and Leather Bank. His grandfather, the Commodore, learning of this sent for him and asked why he had not applied to him for a place.

"Because I did not want to ask you for anything," was the reply. This pleased the Commodore, and it is said that he made a codicil to his will a few days later, leaving \$1,000,000 to his grandson.

Cornelius left the Shoe and Leather Bank to go into the employ of Kissam Brothers, bankers, but later his grandfather asked him to enter the railroad service. The young man was making \$600 a month and declined to leave his place unless he got more money. He was given \$65, and accepted it. He was then about 21 years old. The first place he was given was that of assistant treasurer of the New York and Harlem railroad.

His rise was rapid and he succeeded his father as head of the Vanderbilt system. Mr. Vanderbilt's active career was practically closed when he suffered a paralytic stroke in July, 1896.

Despite his enormous business interests, he found time to devote to church and Sunday-school work which he began early in life.

When Mr. Vanderbilt was 23 years of age he married Alice Gwynne, the daughter of a Cincinnati lawyer. His first born son, William H., died in 1892, while he was a student in Yale University.

Mr. Vanderbilt left five children—Cornelius, Gertrude, Alfred, Reginald and Gladys. Cornelius married a daughter of Mr. Wilson, the banker, about two years ago and later Gertrude became the wife of Harry Payne Whitney, son of former Secretary of the Navy, William C. Whitney.

Mad Coincidence of Death.

Wailuku, Sept. 16.—The two year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Keliikuli of Kona, Hawaii died a few weeks ago at Halawa valley whether they went on their way to Wailuku. The dead body of the child was put in a coffin, and was taken in a canoe to Wailuku during that afternoon. When Mr. and Mrs. Keliikuli arrived at Wailuku with the body of their dead child, their five months old child was being buried, she having died the same morning of precisely the same sickness as their eldest daughter. During the same evening the father was stricken with the same malady but recovered the next day. To the simple minded natives these coincidences seem to them as the work of some unknown Kahuna.

British Reply Accepted.

Cape Town, Sept. 12.—It is understood that the reply of the British Secretary of State for the Colonies, Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, to the last Transvaal note has been received by the British High Commissioner, Sir Alfred Milner, and forwarded to Pretoria.

Plague at Oporto.

Oporto, Sept. 12.—There has been one more death from the plague but the situation is unchanged. Dr. Irving, an American, pronounces the plague to be of a mild form.

Amunition for Transvaal.

Lourenco Marquez, Delagoa Bay, Sept. 12.—A consignment of 745 cases of amunition for the Transvaal, has been landed here.

Government bills for August will be paid tomorrow.

AMBULANCE RUNS.

A Portuguese laborer working on the pile driver near the office of the pilots fell from quite a height yesterday afternoon, receiving internal injuries and bad bruises. The ambulance was sent for, and the man removed to the Q.

Japanese Stowaways.

There are in all, some twenty stowaways among the last lot of Japanese who must be returned to their native country as soon as possible. They have no money and, when being examined by James Hakuole, the Custom House interpreter and inspector of immigrants yesterday, stated that they came to be merchants.

London Boycotts Exposition.

London, Sept. 12.—The movement to boycott the Paris exposition continues. Several additional firms announced this afternoon their intention to suspend preparations of their exhibits until "the Dreyfus blot is wiped out."

New Commander for Adams.

A change in commanding officers will soon take place on the training ship Adams, which is now stationed at Goat Island. Captain Book will be relieved, to be superseded by Captain Goodwin.—S F, Sept 12.

MAY HAVE BRITISH CABLE

Probable Honolulu Branch of the Canadian-Australian Cable.

British Cable Survey—Cruiser Egeria Has Completed Work On the Main Line—Painted Cook's Monument—Other News.

The British cable-survey cruiser Egeria now lying in Naval Row, arrived Sunday evening from a southerly cruise. She will leave at the end of this week for Esquimault.

The line of the proposed British Canadian Australian cable has been surveyed and the Egeria has completed her labors in that respect.

It is stated aboard the vessel that "the deepsea soundings made between the proposed cable-line and these Islands are purely for scientific purposes. As the whole of the Pacific Ocean has to be sounded anyhow no particular significance is attached to the survey between the Hawaiian Islands and the main line."

It is not at all improbable, however, that a branch cable extending to Honolulu, and so connecting this port with the American Coast and Australia, will be established. The British cable will very likely be the first telegraphic connection between Hawaii and the rest of the world. A Honolulu branch would greatly increase the value of the British cable."

The officers aboard the Egeria are at present very busily engaged making up their reports. Not only are they surveyors, but they do their own calculating, and draughting.

Microscopists they must also be, for the examination and analysis of the specimens of the ocean's bottom must be made.

On September 2nd, the Egeria was in Kealekekua Bay, Hawaii. During their stay there the officers saw that Cook's Monument was repainted, after which they were feasted by parties who had been notified by the Honolulu friends of the Egeria's officers of the latter departure for the big Island.

On her recent southerly cruise the survey ship went about 700 miles toward Fanning's Island, taking soundings every twenty miles and on her return, soundings each day.

Some Police Raids.

Deputy Marshal Chillingworth, and police officers were out for business Saturday night and Sunday.

Early Monday morning Chase's place along the new beach road and, in the neighborhood of John Epa's place was raided. The case will come up tomorrow.

Sunday afternoon Chillingworth and Spillner went down into Kihale and Kamanuawai where they emptied thirteen large barrels of swipes. Drunken people were found in large numbers all about.

Late Sunday afternoon a raid was made on a lot of "seven eleven" players in Niolopa, Nuuanu Valley. Nearly all the gamblers got away. One of the principals in the game was arrested and is now furnishing the police with a list of the names of the players.

Mauna Loa—Claudine Race.

Wailuku, Sept. 16.—The race between the steamers Mauna Loa and Claudine from Honolulu to Kaunakakai, Molokai, last Tuesday afternoon was won by the former by just 22 minutes according to Capt. Simerson of the Mauna Loa. Time: Mauna Loa: 4 hours and 35 minutes; Claudine: 4 hours 57 minutes. As the two steamers approached Kaunakakai they presented a magnificent sight. They were abreast of each other off Kalaekalau Point.

Gladys vs La Paloma.

A rumor was current on the streets this morning that T. W. Hobron, owner of the Gladys, had challenged Clarence W. Macfarlane for a race against his La Paloma to the Kahala buoy and return. Mr. Macfarlane made the following statement to a BULLETIN reporter.

"Mr. Hobron challenged me yesterday and I accepted this morning. It is possible, I shall make arrangements to have the race start at 12 o'clock Monday next. Should Mr. Hobron leave for the States before that time, Minister Mott-Smith will sail the Gladys. I intend to handle the La Paloma myself. The winner of the race will be awarded a silver cup."

Sunday School Exhibition.

Wailuku, Sept. 16.—The quarterly exhibitions of the Wailuku and Halawa Sunday schools will be held in Halawa Church, Halawa, Molokai, next Sunday the 24th inst. As the natives of these valleys are fond of good church music, some rare music will be heard on this occasion. After the exhibition a luau will be held on the church grounds.

Exhibition in Boxing.

Another athletic exhibition is soon to be given by the Oceanic Athletic Club. Krueger and Decker, who made the bit of the evening on the opening night, will appear again in a ten round boxing match. Martin Denny and a local unknown will also give a fifteen round exhibition.

Wailuku Case Briefs.

Two briefs in the case of Soper vs. Dillingham have been filed. One by F. M. Hatch and the other by A. S. Hartwell of counsel for the plaintiffs. The briefs are both analyses of the testimony in the case and are along the same lines as the arguments of the respective counselors.

Trixie Coleman, the Orpheum soubrette, is suffering from a jarred spine. On Trixie's first appearance her heel slipped from under causing a somewhat violent fall. Last night, acting under medical advice, she appeared only in the farce played during the early part of the performance. Sympathetic friends anxiously wish her a speedy recovery.

GOVERNMENT FOR NEGROS
 Chicago, September 6.—A special to the Times-Herald from Washington says:
 Copies of General Otis' order granting home rule to the people of the island of Negros were received by the State and War Department today, together with a constitution proposed by the inhabitants of the island, upon which they seek to have established for themselves a republican form of government.
 The government of the Island of Negros shall consist of a Military Governor appointed by the United States Military Governor of the Philippines, who shall command the United States troops stationed therein, a Civil Governor and an Advisory Council elected by the people.
 The Military Governor shall appoint Secretaries for the Treasury, Interior, Agriculture, Public Instruction, an Attorney-General and an Auditor, who shall act under his immediate instructions.
 The military governor shall exercise the supreme executive power. He shall see that the laws are executed; shall appoint to office and fill all vacancies in office not herein otherwise provided for and, with the approval of the military governor of the Philippines, remove from office.
 The civil governor, to be elected by the people, shall advise the military governor of all public civil questions and shall preside over the advisory council. He shall countersign all grants and commissions of civil nature which are executed by the military governor attend every session of the advisory council and in case of a tie vote in said body he shall cast the deciding vote.
 The military governor of the island shall have the right to veto all bills or resolutions adopted by the advisory council, and his veto shall be final if not disapproved by the military governor of the Philippines.
 The advisory council shall discharge all the ordinary duties of a legislature.
 The duties of the secretaries of the treasury, interior and agriculture and auditor are of practically the same character as those of officials of the United States.
 The judicial power shall be vested in three judges, who shall be appointed by the military governor of the island. Inferior courts shall be provided for and established under the order and recommendation of the civil governor and advisory council.
 Free public schools shall be established throughout the populous districts of the island in which the English language shall be taught and this subject will receive the careful consideration of the advisory council.

Could Dreyfus be allowed to hold receptions during the Paris Exposition at a small admission fee, his financial future would be assured.

Judge Wilcox's decisions in the case of the hackmen who were unfortunate enough to have to eat, indicates that the marshal of the islands does not run everything in connection with the police department.

No less a personage than Queen Victoria stands between Great Britain and war with the Transvaal. The Queen's steadfast purpose that war shall not mark the closing years of her reign is a powerful lesson to her people and the nations of the world who are quick to redress real or imagined wrongs by appeal to the arbitration of arms.

After a meeting of the Executive Council yesterday Mr. Dole said that the instructions for Special Agent Hartwell were discussed, but nothing relative to the matter could be made public as the discussion was confidential. If, as the government organs have proclaimed, the mission of this special agent is to represent the people of this territory, why is it necessary that his instructions or a "discussion of his instructions" be kept carefully secret from the public? Is it necessary for Mr. Hartwell to receive private instructions in order that he may establish before Congress that, as one organ has put it, "Hawaii is an American community?" Or has the Executive Council come to the conclusion that it made a mistake in publishing the assertion that President McKinley favored the appointment of this unofficial official, consequently all future deliberations in the matter will be strictly confidential? In either case the personal nature of this delegate's mission is made manifest.

DREYFUS AND THE EXPOSITION.

The conviction of Dreyfus, though it does stand for perversion of justice, is not unexpected. The trial has served to convince the public of the guilt of the army and the innocence of Dreyfus.

The finding of the court, however, gives strength to the belief that Dreyfus is condemned that France may be saved from revolt and widespread rioting. The French army is a power that demands recognition even in the courts supposed to deal justice with an impartial hand; in dealing with it France has to consider a condition, not a theory. To save the government, France is forced into an admission to the world that justice to the individual is impossible.

The curious condition is presented of the French officials banding all their energies to make the Paris Exposition successful with the first result on international protest. To prevent civil strife and its consequent damaging effect upon the Exposition it was necessary that Dreyfus be convicted. On the other hand the condemning of this innocent man has roused the people of other nations to suggest a boycott on the Exposition. Thus does the protest of the people find its first expression. It is not probable, however, that this boycott will reach proportions which will seriously endanger the suc-

cess of the exhibit of the century. The exposition is a business enterprise and business men are not disposed to forego financial gain in order to protest against injustice to one man. This is apparent in the every day life of every nation. If France can guarantee safety to the visitors, the crowds will be on hand, and the nations and business men will not see their way clear to lose what money they have already invested in the exposition.

While nothing coming from the France relative to Dreyfus will be a surprise, the late dispatches indicate that the prisoner will not be forced to spend many more days in prison. The army has been placated by the action of the court martial; it is likely the public will be esterred to by the release of the prisoner.

COMMUNICATION.

Editor EVENING BULLETIN:—Believing that all public offices are a legitimate subject for discussion, I desire to say a few words in regard to the office of city physician. In a city the size of Honolulu there is enough work among the indigent to occupy the full time of one man. The office is now occupied but three hours a day, while the Telephone Directory shows the present city physician is in his private office four hours each day. The fault is not with the official, but with the Board of Health which allows the city physician to maintain a private practice. There are physicians in the service of the board in the outer districts amply able to fill the office of city physician, and who would give all their time to the office for the present salary, in case the present incumbent's time is too valuable to do so.

Taro Planting and Electricity.

However a large work shop is being put up, and the ice house which furnishes Lahaina town with about 200 lbs. of ice every week is run by electricity, and the sight of these was a source of great delight to him, for to him the younger generation are being taught modern ideas, and the old fossilized method of digging in taro patches has been discarded.

Road Building on Molokai.

Wailuku, Sept. 16.—Japanese laborers are now working on the new carriage road from Halawa Valley to Pukoo, Molokai. There was an appropriation of \$2000 passed by the last Legislature for this purpose but this amount is not sufficient to complete the road. During light showers last week some parts of the newly built road gave way, but the workmen will fix the damaged parts before proceeding any further. A little beyond Honouliuli is a very dangerous turn around the point, and nothing but missionary carriage horses should be used on this road at that point.

In the Police Court this forenoon, Geo. Milton was fined \$5 and costs on the charge of assault and battery on a native.

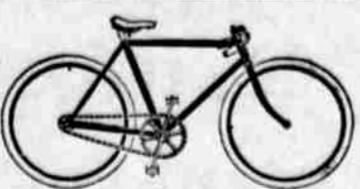

KAUAI LAND CASE SETTLED.

At the Fifth Circuit Court, Isl-
and of Kauai, Judge Stanley pre-
sided last Friday and Saturday
over the case of the Koloa Sugar
Co. vs. William Brown and Lukia
Nakapahu. M. F. Prosser and J.
L. Kaulukou appeared for the
Company and T. McCants Stewart
for the defendant. The dispute is
over three acres of land, which the
Company claims under a lease,
but which the defendants
claim by adverse possession.
It was tried last term before
Judge Hardy and a jury, and the
defendants won; but the Supreme
Court granted a new trial.

The jury at this trial rendered a
verdict for the defendants, three
dissenting. Judge Stanley's charge
was an exhaustive discussion of
the law of adverse possession and
was so satisfactory that neither
side took any exception to it.

A COMMUNICATION.

EDITOR EVENING BULLETIN:—
As the verdict of the Coroner's
Jury in the case of the deceased
soldier Wm. J. Murdon does not
relieve the public mind of the im-
pression made by reading the
death certificate signed by Dr.
Yule. "The cause of death. Cata-
rhal pneumonia induced by an
anaesthetic administered by a
dentist in the city for the extrac-
tion of a tooth." I would ask you
to kindly allow me space in your
columns to repeat some of my
testimony as given before the
jury. Namely that I had not ad-
ministered a general anaesthetic to
any adult (soldier or civilian)
since commencing practice in
this city. In your issue of Sep-
tember 12th I am correctly report-
ed as having stated that I had ad-
ministered anaesthetic to soldiers.
But that was not a general but a
local anaesthetic, the latter affect-
ing only a small area at the point
applied whereas the former has
an influence over the whole sys-
tem. The medical fraternity of
course understand this but the
general public I find do not dis-
criminate, hence this letter.

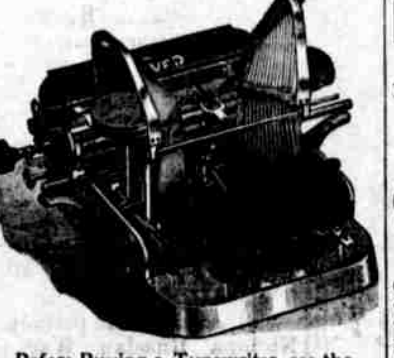
