Much as we Americans pride ourselves in the pursuit of peace, sadly, our nation in its history of 200 years has been involved in too many wars. Our foes have been the Indians, British, French, Spanish, Mexicans, Moros, Germans, Italians, Japanese, Vietnamese, Koreans, and our brother Americans. Twice we have engaged in world wars. Also, we have been involved in two wars that are not officially considered wars: one was a "police action" in Korea and the other, a conflict some wish very much to forget --Vietnam.

For the most part, our nation has been deeply grateful to our war veterans and has treated them with appropriate respect and appreciation. But this gratitude has not been constant and equal.

Like many who forever rest in these hallowed grounds, I was privileged to serve in the great crusade to rid the world of Fascism, totalitarianism. Japanese imperialism and German Nazism. This was considered a glorious war, a righteous war, one in which the cause of justice was clearly on our side. At the end of World War II, we veterans were greeted with huge parades -- the largest in New York City's history -- and in Hawaii, there were parades on every Island, luaus too numerous to count, and community parties to honor our returning heroes. It was a proud time to wear the American uniform.

The political leaders of our grateful nation responded by enacting far-reaching laws, in particular, the G.I. Bill of Rights. One can consider this post-World War II period the educational renaissance of the United States. The World War II veteran, like those before him, was perceived as a hero and accorded all the honors of a hero.

The Vietnam War was a different story. For these returning veterans, there were no victorious parades, no happy community gatherings, although by every standard of measurement -- length and severity of combat, courage under fire, and sacrifice in blood -- the Vietnam veteran was as much a hero as those who fought before him.

Instead of receiving a hero's welcome, the Vietnam veteran was called a killer, a junkie, an instrument of oppression. Instead of providing him the preferred status of a veteran, we refused him employment and reduced his GI Bill benefits.

For many returning Vietnam veterans, the battle was not yet over:

- -- 56,000 Americans gave their lives in Vietnam. Between 58,000 and 60,000 Vietnam veterans have given their lives through suicides.
- -- 33 percent of the Vietnam-era veterans are unemployed or underemployed.
  - -- Our psychiatric wards have admitted 67,000 Vietnam veterans.

Our nation's involvement in this war was tragic, but we compounded this tragedy by venting our bitterness and guilt on those least responsible -- the veterans. Never before, and I pray, never again, in the history of our nation have we failed to bestow on our veterans the respect and dignity they so richly deserve.

Today, we are gathered to dedicate this columbarium. Many who will rest in this beautiful edifice served in Vietnam.

Let us take this occasion to join in a celebration of unity, to rededicate ourselves to properly honoring both those interred here and also their comrades still living amongst us, whose wounds of the flesh may have healed, but whose wounds of the spirit are painful and lasting.

Let us devote ourselves to ensuring that all who have served and sacrificed on behalf of our nation are recognized as the heroes they are. In paying tribute to these veterans in memory and in life, we are as well reaffirming our traditions and ideals as a nation.
