AS WE NOTE THE OFFICIAL CASUALTY LISTS FROM SOUTH VIETNAM, WE ARE PAINFULLY REMINDED THAT ON SEPTEMBER 29 OF 1943, THE FIRST CASUALTY WAS SUSTAINED BY THE 100th INFANTRY BATTALION -- A CASUALTY WHICH WAS SOON TO BE FOLLOWED BY AN ALMOST NEVER-ENDING STREAM OF THE WOUNDED AND THE DYING. THE LENGTH OF THAT CASUALTY LIST COULD ONLY BE MATCHED BY THE DEPTH OF THE LOYALTY AND BRAVERY SHOWN BY THE MEN OF THE PURPLE HEART BATTALION. THEY WHO REPOSE TODAY IN THE STILLNESS OF PUNCHBOWL AND THEIR SURVIVING COMRADES HAVE GAINED AN IMMORTAL PLACE IN THE ANNALS OF GREAT MEN OF VALOR EVERYWHERE.

As we note the official casualty lists from South Vietnam,
~~there may be a tendency among many to forget~~ *we are peacefully abandoned* that on September 29
of 1943, the first casualty was sustained by the 100th Infantry Battalion --
a casualty which was soon to be followed by an almost never-ending
stream of the wounded and the dying. The length of that casualty list
was such that it could only be matched by the depth of the loyalty and
bravery shown by the men of the battalion ~~which was to gain an immortal~~ *They who have reposed in the stillness at Punchbowl*
~~place in the annals of great men of valor everywhere as the Purple~~ *these surviving comrades have gained an immortal*
Heart Battalion.

Men of valor do not fight without a cause. And the men of
valor of the 100th Infantry had the greatest of causes to fight for. They
fought with the purpose of vindicating themselves to both the believer
and disbeliever of their patriotism. In this battle, they have ~~unques-~~ *irrevocably*
~~tionably~~ won.

They ~~also~~ fought to show their gratitude for the blessings
bestowed by the American way of life and to ~~vanquish~~ *they fought* those who would
deny that privilege to them and to their sons and daughters. In this
battle, they have also won.

This ceremony today, therefore, should signify not only a
sacrifice made but the beginning of a victory which was to be eventually
won.

Today, there is no question in the minds of their fellow Americans as to the loyalty of the Nisei. Today, the sons and daughters of the men of the 100th, as well as the offsprings of those who followed them, have continued to enjoy those rights and privileges for which many gave their last full measure of devotion.

~~And so~~ I join with you all today in expressing my eternal gratitude to the 100th's first casualty, to all those who followed him, and to all those who came back to see to it that they, indeed, did not die in vain.

Today is also a day of challenge. The turmoil in Southeast Asia & India, the battle of the minority for a rightful place in the sun, the war against need & poverty are but continuing roadblocks to the better life that the men & women who lie here died for. I urge each of you to keep their faith and to continue the eternal march for peace.
