AGUINALDO FLEES FROM AMERICA.

Pilar Disheartened—Deserted by the Filipino Government, the General Desires "Honorable" Surrender.

Special Cable to the Call and New York Herald.

At the front with Lawton's column, San Miguel, Sunday (via Manila, May 15.)—The insurgent General Gregorio del Pilar believes that he has been deserted by the Filipino Government, and desires to surrender, if he can secure what he regards as honorable terms from the Americans.

It is now said that Aguinaldo has fled into the province of Nueva Ecija. On April 29 he retreated by carriage from Balinag through San Isidro, and nothing has been heard from him in the two weeks since.

The 5,000 Spanish prisoners who are reported to be held by the insurgents have been carried into a northern province and scattered among the small garrisons. They are beyond American succor this season unless the Filipino surrender takes place within three weeks.

The insurgent hospital near San Isidro is reported to be overwhelmed with the wounded. General Pilar's main subsistence depot is five miles in front of Lawton.

The indignation of the natives has compelled the insurgent generals to countermand their orders to burn towns as they retreated.

The American policy of not destroying property is creating a reversion in our favor. Five American prisoners were carried through this town last week. Their names are unknown.

Natives are returning through the American lines to their own homes.

McKinley Will Meet Returning Volunteers.

HOT SPRINGS, Va., May 15.—It is the intention of President McKinley to be in the Western States at the time of the return of the volunteers who have done heroic service in the Philippines. It is expected that the necessity for the return of the volunteer in the island of Luzon will not exist much longer, and when the volunteers reach their native States for muster out Mr. McKinley hopes to be there to greet and honor them. If the trip to the West already planned should not occur when the volunteers are returning another journey will be made to carry out this purpose.

The organ admits frankly that the new company will drive the Thurston-Dillingham syndicate to the wall, but the people in the Hilo-Hamakua districts are rejoicing by a prospect of getting rid of the curse of another monopoly.

AROUND THE WORLD.

Condensation of the Foreign News Brought by the City of Peking.

It is claimed that the situation in Cuba is becoming most alarming and that the natives threaten to rebel. The Cubans claim that they are being brow beaten by the Americans.

Aguinaldo cables to London that the Filipinos will fight to the death, and this in spite of his being deserted by his leading generals.

President Krueger and the British High Commissioner are to hold a conference over Transvaal differences.

Miners have offered to turn State's evidence in the Bunker Hill Mine riots and murders, and their lives are consequently threatened.

Archbishop Ireland favors disarmament.

America and Great Britain are endeavoring to have the international arbitration scheme made the first instead of the eighth, plank at the Peace conference at the Hague, when opened on the 18th inst.
