Landowners threaten to close hi-way

Ten landowning families are threatening to close down some portions of the W2 Highway in Chalan Laulau which they claim fall on land they own, after the Marianas Public Land Corporation (MPLC) allegedly failed to act on the issuance of their land exchange titles.

The families are seeking MPLC's compliance with an agreement granting them ownership titles to alternative parcels of land in exchange for their land.

The MPLC reportedly entered into a land exchange deal with the families due to CUC's installation of underground electrical cables beneath the vast

tract of land they originally own.

Under the law, land exchange is executed only if the private land in question is meant for public purpose.

The project required that the affected families move out from their land but were given the option to acquire other pieces of land in return.

A series of public hearings, drafting, and land appraisals resulted to agreeable terms to both the MPLC and the families. The deal was consummated although the actual granting of the land exchange titles have yet to be completed.

A spokesman for the families, Placido Tagabuel claims that the MPLC has since been sitting on the title case resulting to a delay

in the actual signing of the documents.

Moreover, Tagabuel claims that the MPLC may have reneged on the mechanics of the land deal after the latter ruled a reevaluation of the appraisal on some of the real estate in question.

It was learned that the MPLC was acquiring the services of a Hawaii-based contractor, Allan Conboy to study the validity of the land appraisal of the piece of land owned by the Malus family as represented by Tagabuel.

This has elicited a howl of protest from some family members who contended that the issue of appraisal has already been settled, and that only the actual

ACT wants educational issues addressed

A month after former Commissioner of Education Elizabeth Rechebei stepped down from her position, members of the Association of Commonwealth Teachers (ACT) are scheduling meetings with key officials of Acting Commissioner Lee Torres' administration to discuss about several educational issues which the educators feel, should be addressed immediately.

Among the issues that the

educators want the administration to look into include the mandatory retirement for off-island teachers who had signed a two year contract, the establishment of a substitution pool should the need for a teacher substitute arises and the deletion of summer schools which educators are required to take.

The ACT have also included in their list of concerns the lack of curriculum in several academic areas, the need to compensate teacher aides and professionals who are performing

teacher functions to be paid at the rate the teachers get, and the concern to abide the teacher/student ratio policy which the Board of Education has set.

This is not the first time that the higher-ups at the PSS have become aware of the current situation in the school and administrative level of the educational system.

The ACT made public their agenda through a letter addressed to the former Commissioner outlining the group's concerns and through the testimony of

ACT president Joe Borja during the board's regular monthly meeting held on early March.

The Commissioner responded through a letter dated March 2, a message, which Borja said, the teachers viewed as threatening.

Instead of official correspondences in response to the Commissioner's comments, Borja said that a series of meetings were then held where it was decided that the ACT will meet with several key PSS staff to resolve the matter.

"Unfortunately, that never

materialized because we staged the walk-out," Borja said.

Borja however is still hopeful that the new administration will continue to listen to the concerns of the organization.

"Despite the change of hands in the administration, we will still continue to schedule discussions so that the ones at the helm of the department will become more aware of what our needs are," Borja said.

Observers note that aside from

Harmonized coding system begins July - Reyes

Local business stands to benefit in terms of faster release of imported merchandise at the ports once the harmonized coding system is implemented by the CNMI Division of Customs on July.

This was the gist of the statement made by Customs Chief Maj. Pete Reyes yesterday before members of the Saipan Chamber of Commerce during its general meeting held yesterday at the Hyatt Regency Hotel.

Reyes, who was guest speaker for the event, said that the system will not only expedite Customs procedures in the release of goods coming into our ports, it will also help in the diversification and expansion of local businesses.

During the open forum,

Reyes explained that the new system is vital in maintaining statistical records and other information regarding the flow of business in the Commonwealth.

The system provides a six-digit number that corresponds to a specific category of merchandise. As the data is entered into the computers, the tax due a specific merchandise is immediately assessed, thereby providing faster release of goods and a more efficient Customs process.

Compared to the current system of classifying merchandise which is done manually, the new system will be efficient as the error factor involved in the procedure will be significantly lessened.

The idea of the harmonized coding system was broached in an international forum which

U. S. has sovereignty in the Commonwealth, Guerra

Honolulu (AP) - The Pacific Islands over which the U.S. flag flies must become more self-reliant and less dependent on United States' funding for their economic and social growth, a federal official said Thursday.

The islands' governments also must learn there are times when the U.S. Constitution and federal law takes precedence over their desire for greater political autonomy, Assistant Interior Secretary Stella Guerra said.

"The past era of federal largess and turn-key development has gone with the winds of change," she said in remarks prepared for delivery to the Pacific Science Congress at the East-West Cen-

ter in Honolulu.

Referring to various political status concerns in Guam, the Northern Mariana Islands and the trust territory of Palau, Guerra said the United States views self-determination as a key mechanism "for our relations with the islands."

She said, "Freedom to choose a political status carries with it the responsibility, first, to make an informed choice, and second, to live with the benefits and responsibilities of that choice."

Guerra said, "For insular leaders to argue that what they freely chose 15 years ago is not what they thought they were choosing is a criticism of those

who chose, not those who offered the choice."

Her reference was to the Commonwealth of the Northern

Mariana Islands whose leaders want more sovereignty and less U.S. interference.

"It is clear from the plain English of the historical documents involved that the United States has sovereignty in the commonwealth. . . Sovereignty is not conditional and does not lend itself to subject-by-subject applicability," she told the delegates.

As to Guam's quest for commonwealth, Guerra said through compromise the Guam Commission on Self-Determination had determined it has authority to make some changes in its draft commonwealth act to fit with U.S. constitutional and

federal policy parameters.

"We have agreed to disagree on some issues and to send out comments to the U.S. Congress for disposition," she said in her prepared remarks.

Guerra said that the U.S. government still supports free association for Palau and its trusteeship status "needs to end. If free association will not do the job, then it is appropriate for Palau to consider an alternative status. This is not pressure. It is choice. It is common sense."

Guerra's office of territorial and international affairs administers Palau's affairs under a U.N. trusteeship agreement.

Inspector General, Territories waste millions due to carelessness

Honolulu (AP) - The Interior Department's inspector general says nearly one-quarter of a billion dollars in federal and nonfederal monies have been wasted in U.S. territories due to carelessness.

The inspector general criticized Interior's Office of Territorial and International Affairs for ineffective oversight of government operations and financial management in Guam, the Northern Mariana Islands, American Samoa and the Virgin Islands.

Audits of territorial programs over the past five years found \$255 million in "large-scale waste of both federal and local funds," the office of Inspector General James R. Richards says in its semiannual report to be made public this week.

The monetary amounts are questioned costs, funds that could be put to better use and potential additional or lost rev-

enues, the report says.

The report said OTIA "does not appear to be making maximum use of its authority and influence in persuading territorial governments to achieve significant management improvements in financial activities and other related operations."

The report said during the past five years more than 150 audits showed that "territorial governments continue to experience deep-seated, unresolved problems in areas such as budgeting, procurement, accounting, tax collection, deficit spending and personnel and payroll practices."

The IG report said OTIA has declined to withhold funds until "meaningful improvements have been achieved. Instead, OTIA officials have suggested that the Inspector General conduct fewer audits (and) . . . have advised that Inspector General audits of local funding may no longer be necessary."

In Washington, OTIA spokesman Larry L. Morgan said island governments "consis-

tently have raised questions over the IG's authority to audit local funds. They prefer to handle their own auditing procedures."

The report gave these examples of some of its recent audit findings:

The commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands Housing Authority borrowed \$10 million to make an advance payment to a contractor who had been awarded a sole-source construction contract. The Housing Authority then borrowed funds from the contractor to pay interest on the borrowed money. As a result, \$683,000 was paid in interest to finance the \$10 million advance.

Disregard of federal and commonwealth laws, policies and procedures found the commonwealth's economic development loan fund principal decreased by at least \$8.5 million, \$939,000 in potential interest income was not collected and loans totaling \$5.7 million were in default.

Guam's government may lose

\$25 million in property tax revenues because the required property appraisal had not been completed in time for 1990 tax assessments.

Guam's government couldn't locate \$4.3 million of property acquired with federal funds.

American Samoa's government consistently underestimated the amount of local revenues collected and available for government operations in annual budget submissions to the U.S. Congress. As a result, requests for federal assistance were overstated by \$36 million during fiscal years 1984 through 1988. The IG's report said Interior's Office of Territorial and International Affairs "neither reduced the federal grants" nor informed Congress of specific differences between estimated and actual revenues.

American Samoa's government within a 3-year period paid \$1.5 million to lease a golf course for 50 years when it should have paid only \$305,000, the value of the future lease payments.

Inspector general auditors also found elected Guam government officials who had retired received both their retirement annuity and their salaries. All elected officials accrued annual leave "a practice which we found unusual and unique to Guam." Non-elected government employees were denied the same benefits. Guam incurred \$1.9 million in excess personnel costs from leave benefits during October 1988 through February 1990.

Guam could lose \$130 million in tax revenues because of the Guam Economic Authority's improper handling of business qualifying certificates.

The Mariana Islands Housing Authority used \$2 million for low income housing programs for non-program purposes. Loans totaling \$1 million either were delinquent, in default or in need of foreclosure. "The Office of Territorial and International Affairs did not provide adequate oversight to the program" and it collapsed, the report said.

New agenda strengthening the US-Insular relationship

"If I can accomplish nothing else in my present service to the nation, I would wish that it be the development of a coherent and coordinated federal voice in conducting relations with the Islands," said Assistant Secretary of the Interior Stella Guerra in

remarks prepared for an address to the 17th Pacific Science Congress, according to a release from the OTIA.

The organization, with social and physical scientists from over 45 countries, is meeting this week in Honolulu, Hawaii on the theme

"Towards the Pacific Century: The Challenge of Change."

Guerra's speech on the major political and economic challenges facing US relations with the American Pacific Islands was titled "A New Agenda: Strengthening the United States-Insular Relationship."

"The major issues facing America's insular areas have been shaped in profound ways by major events over the past decade," she said.

"These shaping events include—the termination of the US administered trusteeship over three island groups, the rapid growth of Japanese economic influence in the Pacific region, the increasing pressure on the Federal government to reduce its spending and balance its budget, and major changes in East-

West relations, Guerra said in the release.

"Foremost, understandably, the US affiliated islands want the political flexibility to take maximum advantage of regional economic trends, she said.

"Another item on the islanders' agenda is often expressed as the need for greater political autonomy.

"We understand and appreciate these aspirations. There are many benefits in US citizenship and affiliation. The protections, rights, freedoms, and economic privileges gained by being an American are unsurpassed in the world," she mentioned.

The Assistant Secretary said the challenge facing federal policy-makers is effectively meeting the islands desires and

aspirations within the constitutional, legal and economic framework in which the Federal government must operate.

Guerra reviewed for the conference participants the views of the Bush administration in the areas of self-determination, consequences of political status choices, self-government, insular consultation and self-reliant economic development, the OTIA release said.

"Perhaps the greatest challenge facing all of us in this effort" she said, "is the need to change the 'mid-set' that has prevailed in Washington and in the islands over the past few decades. To become reality, this new agenda will require new thinking and a fresh approach to our relationship."

Governor first to sign public land use request

CNMI Governor Larry I. Guerrero recently told the Marianas Public Land Corporation that request for use of public land should first bear his signature before taken into consideration.

This 'Protocol for Request for Use of Public Land' was contained in a letter to MPLC Executive Director William Concepcion from the Governor last week.

MPLC on the other hand, have provided a positive response to this correspondence.

According to Governor Guerrero, several government agencies and non-profit groups asks public land for various projects...the MPLC, of course...ultimately grant permission for use of public land."

"But the Governor does play a role...." Guerrero stressed.

The letter said that the executive branch is being used as a conduit to press for the approval of such request, which procedure has to be "formalized or standardized."

"To this end, we ask that MPLC, from now on, look exclusively to the Governor to make requests on behalf of any agency...for use of MPLC administered lands," it said.

It added that applications without his signature should not be considered...only those with my signature."

He stressed also that requests on behalf of non-profit groups "will be made by my signature, only."

The letter explained that such process will help "simplify" MPLC's task of going about

with land use requests.

Moreover, it will likewise prioritize projects ensuring that public land resources are not exhausted and would also be in harmony with the government's administration program goals.

On the other hand, MPLC Executive Director Bill Concepcion, in an interview, described the Governor's communication as good.

He said that it reminds government agencies that "if they will request for public land, it should be channeled first to the Governor."

He said that the land corporation is currently receiving a lot of request for public land use from various government agencies.

"But agencies on the other islands, such as Rota and Tinian, believe that they are separate

departments from the central government here in Saipan."

He explained of the issuance of the Governor's letter, by citing a "classic" example—the resident director of the Department of Natural Resources in Tinian requested the MPLC to transfer a 25 hectare land for farming purposes.

"But that request was not cleared from the DNR office in Saipan... came the situation whether the position of the DNR here in Saipan differs from that of the resident director's position in Tinian..."

Concepcion said that although they will provide for the transfer of the requested land, it should first be coordinated to the DNR on Saipan and to the Governor.

Concepcion also mentioned that under the existing law, land exchange can only be conducted

only after the Governor requested and certified it as public purpose.

With the Governor's clarification...there will be no doubt in everybody's mind, this is a requirement of the law PL 5-33."

Caesars World Inc. to operate casino on Tinian

Carson City, Nev. (AP) - A preliminary plan by Caesars World Inc. to run a casino on the tiny island of Tinian, about 1,000 miles off the coast of Japan, has been endorsed by the Nevada Gaming Commission.

"It's wonderful thing for Nevada licensees to lead in the development of gaming around the world," said Commissioner Bob Lewis as the panel voted unanimously Thursday for the preliminary approval.

Tinian is in the Mariana Islands chain, and only a few minutes by air from Saipan which gets about 300,000 tourists from Japan each year, the Control Board was told.

Robert Kingsley, president of Caesars World Resorts, a Caesars

World Inc. subsidiary, said he's dealing with a Japanese company that is one of seven applicants for five gaming licenses that will be granted on Tinian.

The company has set up a Marianas-based subsidiary, Universal Resort Development Inc., to build the project over a period of about three years. Caesars would run the casino.

Kingsley said Caesars considers the Tinian project an ideal venture mainly because it's an American trust territory and U.S. laws apply there.

The commission also was told the 1,200 residents of Tinian voted overwhelmingly two years ago to bring in gambling. The islanders now support themselves by farming and cattle-

raising.

Under state law, Caesars must return for another approval once a definitive agreement is worked out with Universal Resort Development.

In other action, the commission delayed until June action on an open-ended proposal by Promus Companies Inc. to get involved in gaming ventures in other states and in areas such as Australia and the Caribbean.

Promus' proposal is more indefinite than that of Caesars, and amounts to a "shelf offering" that would enable its subsidiaries, including Harrah's and Embassy Suites Inc., to start negotiations for an out-of-state casino venture without first coming before Nevada gaming officials.

CNMI contractors invited to join Guam group

An invitation to join the Guam Contractors' Association was announced before members of the CNMI Contractors' Association by their guest speaker during its monthly meeting held Saturday.

The association's guest speaker was GCA Business Manager Karen Storts, who, aside from inviting the local contractors to their association, briefed them also of their activities back in Guam.

Storts explained that their association exists to promote the business interest of their more than 150 members, composed of contractors, subcontractors, material suppliers, equipment lessors and many others.

The association gears itself

towards improving the image of the construction industry "by stimulating interest among its members."

This can be done by providing "quality workmanship in construction, disseminating information on the construction industry, and striving for the betterment of the construction industry and to better serve the community."

According to Storts, their association holds monthly luncheons and cocktail parties so that members and guest in the industry can relate and inform one another on topics of mutual interest.

GCA, Storts said, has been "working closely" with the various agencies of Guam, such as the Department of Labor, Guam Community College, De-

partment of Education etc.

GCA coordinates with these agencies primarily to help solve problems being faced by the contractors: such as in permits, labor and immigration laws, among many others.

Storts cited that they also sponsor an annual golf tournament, where members are asked to donate prizes to winning individuals.

Funds raised from the tournament are for use in an Apprenticeship Program by the GCA.

The Apprenticeship Program a "big thing on Guam," she said, being held at the Guam Community College, trains workers for employment in the construction field.

She added that those people under the program or educational workshop, are given the tuition

fees and the needed books.

She mentioned that they also do the function of a "legislative watchdog" as they monitor bills up for legislation that could affect the industry.

She further said that they were also instrumental, side by side with the Guam Government, in establishing the wage rates applicable to the territory in 1972.

Among many other activities, GCA also conduct seminars on arbitration or in settling disputes, as it will definitely speed up the settlement or resolution of any disputes between the contractor and the client.

Moreover, GCA also has several publications, and one of which is the "Construction News Bulletin" which contains information of current events regarding the construction indus-

try.

Storts, also told CNMI contractors that it is very important to make sure that every member of the association is always informed of what is happening with the industry and their inputs should likewise be taken into consideration.

After her remarks, contractor president Richard Szumiel called on Larry Moen, who informed and distributed copies of "issue papers" from the Zoning Board.

Moen said that recommendations from the association's members are needed to help push through the proposed zoning code for Saipan which is already completed.

A new member to the group, American Water Works International, was also announced.

Airport ad firm gets set to capture CNMI tour industry with new concept

There is a new business on the island that aims to provide not only useful information to the tourists but also serves as an advertising medium for the thriving tourist-oriented business in the CNMI.

Airport Images, Inc., a company headed by its president Bruce Lloyd, reaches arriving passengers through a television advertising system installed at the arrival area of the Saipan International Airport.

Only recently, the company contracted with Duty Free Saipan (DFS) Ltd. to handle the new

television advertising and under the long standing agreement between the two companies, DFS will oversee all the advertising at the airport.

Most of the proceeds of the ads go to the Commonwealth Ports Authority for the needed airport improvements.

"You do not have to be a genius to recognize that a ten minute to half-an-hour wait in the arrival area can be a pretty boring experience. We want to run advertising that will promote our island tourism industry while being both attractive and entertaining," Lloyd said.

The system planned for the airport will provide three channels with totaling 40 to 80 second commercials running simultaneously, a press release from the company stated.

Large screen monitors will be placed at intervals above the belt where passengers wait for their luggage and prepare to clear Customs.

The commercials will differ from what is normally seen on TV. It will have brief subtitles in English and Japanese. However, there will be no "voice-over" announcement of messages.

The commercials will feature island music with popular Saipan musician Alex Sablan providing some of the music that will be used in the advertisement. The music will be at a low level so

that the operations in the area will not be interrupted.

The commercial messages will be programmed so that at any given moment, three different messages will be playing on the monitors, the release from the company stated.

Lloyd said he hopes to attract a range of tourist industry advertisers ranging from large to small. Not only will Airport Images provide advertising but, it also plans to provide public service announcements promoting CNMI tourism.

"If you think about it, most tourism businesses need to be attractive visually to survive. We're betting that the natural beauty of our islands and the constant efforts of our local businesses to become more attractive will play well on the airport screen," Lloyd said.

Lloyd also aims to include in their videos the progress that the local hotels and businesses have made in beautifying the areas surrounding them.

Lloyd, who together with his wife Remedios, is also known as producing television documentaries and commercials for a number of government and private clients.

He was once connected with Saipan Cable TV as CNMI correspondent and has served as a public information officer at

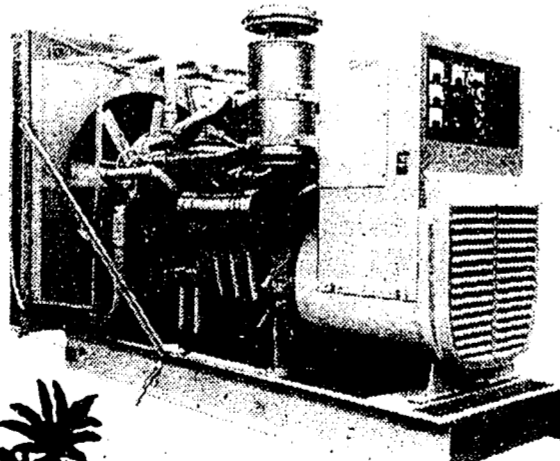

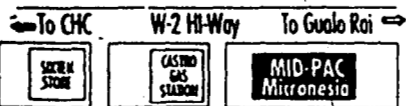

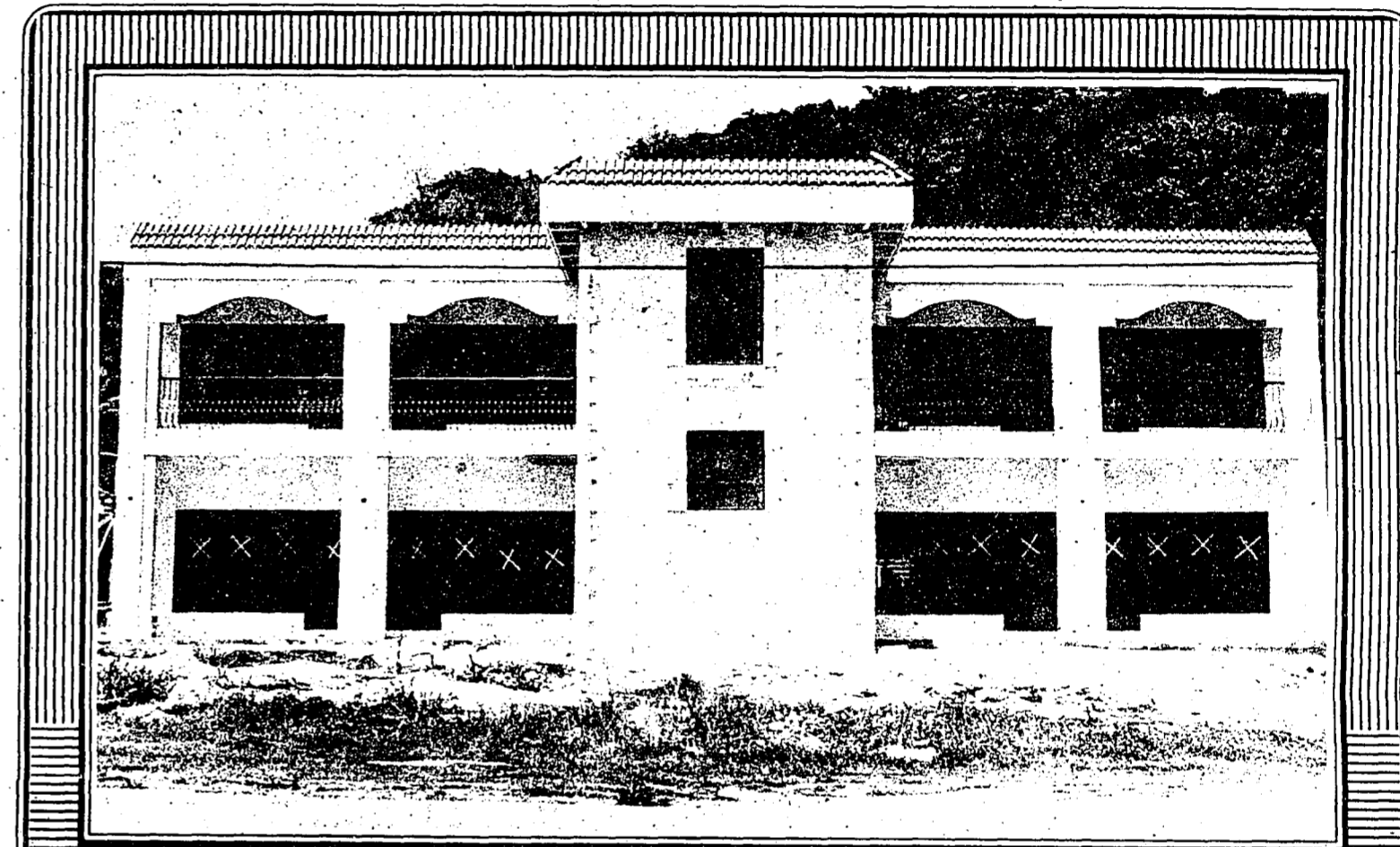

Kids summit against drugs held

The Public School System yesterday sponsored a Kid Summit Against Drugs at the Hotel Nikko Saipan in order that awareness of the drug menace is adequately instilled in the minds of the public school students.

The two-day affair was organized by Jackie Quitugua, PSS Science and Drug-Free Coordi-

nator, along with a Task Force composed of some 24 to 30 teachers from various member schools of the PSS.

The summit is being held in order that an existing drug awareness segment in the curriculum is enhanced and to better equip public school students with the facilities to refrain themselves from being involved in drugs.

According to Quitugua, peer pressure and how to be strong against it will be one focal point of discussion during the summit since this is one common reason why most kids turn to drugs.

"Some kids may entertain the notion that they can try drugs just because their friends are doing it, and that is one thing we can't just unchecked," she said.

Another segment of the summit is the development of self esteem among the children so they may not feel inadequate in fighting the menace.

An intensive information segment on the ills of drug abuse will also form part of the discussion along with the importance of decision making among prospective drug users.

"These activities are being done to tell our kids that they are not alone in the battle against drugs, and that we, their teachers will always be there to lend a hand in shunning drugs," Quitugua further maintained.

During the Summit, recommendations for future plans of action against drugs will also be discussed on how to handle case to case situations for other problems like alcoholism and sexually transmitted diseases, especially AIDS.

Participants for the summit were chosen among the students of some eleven schools with each one given a specific task to pass on their experience during the summit to their other classmates so as to further disseminate information to be a drug-free environment.

PSS Vice Chairman or the Board Juan L. Babaula, who was on hand to keynote the occasion underscored the importance of a drug-free awareness among the student.

"It is worthwhile that we get the message across in order that the children may have better knowledge to control themselves and steer away from the menace in order to build a better CNMI", he stressed.

"One thing I'm optimistic about is that those children who were not able to make it to this summit may have access to what transpired here through the stories the participants have to tell."

Babaula expressed regrets that the PSS just can't accommodate 5,000 students in one gathering and therefore had to contend with being able to cater only to a select few. "We just hope they can pass what they learned to other students said.

The Vice Chairman also disclosed the Board's apparent full support of the drug-free program and was pleased to announce that the summit is bound to become a yearly affair.

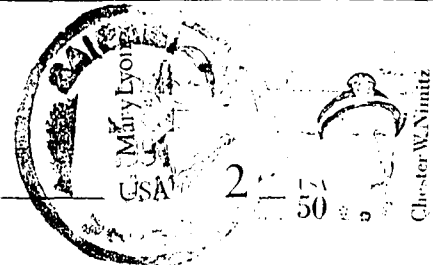
