### REVIEW OF THE CHANGES

Made by House Amendments to the Senate Hawaiian Bill.

The following are the chief changes made by the House amendments in the Senate Hawaiian bill: A large number of minor differences have been made in the House amendments to Senate Bill 222, and some of these are worth noticing briefly. The citizenship section provides that all citizens of the Republic at the date of annexation are citizens of the Territory of Hawaii, as well as citizens of the United States; and further provides that "all citizens of the United States who were resident in the Hawaiian Islands on or since August twelfth, eighteen hundred and ninety eight, and all the citizens of the United States who shall hereafter reside in the Territory of Hawaii for one year shall be citizens of the Territory of Hawaii."

The Contract Labor Law of 1885 and the acts amendatory thereto and supplementary thereof, are extended to and made applicable to the Territory of Hawaii.

It is provided "That no person shall be entitled to register or vote at an election in the Territory of Hawaii unless he shall take an oath to support the Constitution of the United States." The simple clause is substituted for two long paragraphs about eligible voters who failed to register under the Provisional Government, and about idiots, insane persons and criminals.

The section about the punishment of members of the two houses of the Legislature reads: "That each house may punish its own members for disorderly behavior or neglect of duty, by censure, or by a two thirds vote suspend or expel a member." The corresponding section in the Senate Bill provided: "That each house may determine the rules of its proceedings, punish its members for disorderly behavior, and with the concurrence of two-thirds, expel a member." In the qualifications of Senators the age is reduced from thirty years to twenty five.

To the section providing that the Governor shall call the Legislature in extra session at once in case it should adjourn without passing appropriation bills for payments of the necessary current expenses of the Government, are added these lines: "And until the legislature shall have acted the treasurer may, with the advice of the Governor, make such payments, for which purpose the sums appropriated in the last appropriation bill shall be deemed to have been reappropriated. And all legislative and other appropriations made prior to the date when this act shall take effect, shall be available to the government of the territory of Hawaii."

Into the section defining the legislative power of the territory has been inserted a clause providing: "That no corporation, domestic or foreign, shall acquire or hold real estate in Hawaii in excess of 1000 acres; and all real estate acquired or held by such corporation or association contrary hereto shall be forfeited and escheat to the United States, but existing vested rights in real estate shall not be impaired." Two years' residence, instead of one year, are requisite for a divorce. No saloons for the sale of intoxicating drinks shall be allowed; and "no retrospective law shall be enacted." By the house amendment the legislature "may," instead of "shall," create counties and town and city municipalities within the territory of Hawaii and provide for the government thereof; and there is no suggestion about its doing this "at its first regular session" or at any other definite or indefinite time.

An important change occurs in the

### NOTICE TO CATHOLICS

#### TO THE CLERGY AND LAITY OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH IN HAWAII.

It is my duty as your Bishop, now that some people are working to substitute cremation, an old pagan rite, to the Christian rite of inhumation, to acquaint you with the rules adopted by the Church in regard to this matter.

On the 19th of May, 1886, a decree, approved by Pope Leo XIII., declares: 1st—A Catholic can not become a member of any society which imposes cremation. 2d—No Catholic shall ask cremation for himself nor for anybody else.

On the 15th of December, 1886, another decree, approved by the same authority, declares that the ceremonies of the Church must be refused to any one not having retracted his request to be cremated; but the Church allows the ceremonies to be performed on the bodies, at home or in the Church, of those who are to be cremated by orders issued by the Government or by some other authority.

There are the rules of our Church in regard to cremation and my wish is that every Catholic in this country should keep them as the Church has good reasons for imposing them on her children.

SOUND THE BELL.

The next steamer will probably bring the news that the territorial bill has been passed and signed and that within 45 days from the moment when McKinley placed his dashing signature to the document, Hawaii became a full-fledged territory, expected to do her duty.

Are you ready, gentlemen? Ready to uphold our rights, to demonstrate that the Hawaiians and those affiliated with them must show that the day of action has come, that Hawaii, now termed a territory of the United States through the traitorous schemes of a certain clique, is still in the hands of an intelligent, patriotic and loyal people?

The men of the opposition, we mean the Dole clique who hate those loyal to their country have raised the color question hoping thereby to gain sympathy from the "nigger" haters of the South. We stand victorious beyond doubt, and it is hardly necessary to say that the Hawaiians at this day have no intention to draw a political line as to the accidental color of the skin, but certainly will draw a cross against the men who in 1893 cried "rub it in," "turn the rascals out," and who in 1895 signed petitions for the slaughter of the, perhaps misguided patriots, who took up arms in a futile rebellion.

The day of reckoning has come but the missionary clique will be surprised when it sees honorable and sensible men elected for offices, when it sees a legislature composed of the ablest men in Hawaii and see justice done, even to those who "rubbed it in."

"We were bitter foes perhaps and our treatment at the hands of the ruling powers made us so; but we are generous victors, and beyond all considerations patriots and servants to the best interest of Hawaii nei." So say the Hawaiian National Party, and The Independent echoes its words.

## THE LIQUOR QUESTION.

Hawaii has relegated the prohibition question to her political waste basket years ago, and in spite of the efforts of the alphabetical societies the attempt to place an obnoxious clause in the Hawaiian territorial bill in regard to the saloons in Hawaii was frustrated.

We are surprised, however, to see a man like Littlefield, a representative who is gaining honors for himself, making an egregious ass of himself by speaking about matters he is not acquainted with, and referring to the Hawaiians as of the same tribe as the natives of Africa.

Mr. Littlefield is evidently not an educated man, and his constituents must have chosen him for reasons that we cannot fathom to-day. He is cordially invited, however to visit Hawaii, where he will be shown social conditions, refinement and exquisite hospitality, the like of which he evidently never encountered in his abode in an obscure State. If he ever raises coin enough to visit the islands, he may find that the "native tribes" of Hawaii will not eat him, but content themselves by making him the laughing stock of

the whole community. Little Field is a good name for him, and the Field is evidently enclosed in his cranium. It is so very "little" indeed.

## DEWEY'S NOMINATION.

Even professional politicians have for years been clamoring for a new party on new and popular and practical issues, and it appears not improbable that the next Presidential election will see party leaders overthrown and a non-partisan but popular President in control of the White House.

The opposition to Admiral Dewey's nomination emanating as it does from the recognized leaders of the "political" press of the United States in itself almost ensures his election.

The straightforward words of Ex-President Grover Cleveland will have more weight with the voting masses of all classes of public or party opinion than even the united opposition of the Press of the States.

Party lines will be wiped out to honor the Sailor and Statesman who brought unexampled honor to his country during a dreaded crisis. The Labor party, however, may possibly for the first time poll its full strength in favor of a man in whom they can repose strong faith and confidence.

Mr. Cleveland is alleged to have spoken as follows:

PRINCETON, N. J., April 4.—Former President Grover Cleveland can find no words too strong in which to express his delight at the announcement of the candidacy of Admiral Dewey for President.

"This is fine," was his exclamation when he first heard the tidings; then he added to me:

"Look at his record in the Philippines. Such diplomacy was after my own heart—cool, solid, firm, unchangeable. Long ago I picked him for a great statesman. I knew that once a man of his personality—firm and far-sighted—took the reins into his own hands, the Democratic party would no longer be honeycombed with the rottenness of Bryanism, but would again become the great compact organization of Jefferson's days."

Should Admiral Dewey succeed in obtaining the nomination there will be such a tidal wave that McKinley, his bosses, Mark Hanna and the Trusts, will be washed away down Salt River, and the people at large under THE FLAG wherever it may float, whether on the mainland or over newly acquired territory, will enjoy the fullest of their rights under the Constitution and laws of the United States.

And yet after all there is the sad reflection that in these days of concentrated money power, the greed of wealth, and the rampant bribery and corruption so prevalent in the States that Dewey may not even reach a nomination.

## The Camarinos Estate.

In the P. G. Camarinos estate, the temporary administrator, D. G. Camarinos, filed his accounts of the business of deceased yesterday, also an inventory of the estate. The business accounts from Jan. 1, 1898, to April 23, 1900, show receipts amounting to \$63,495.71, and contra the same. The inventory shows that at the time of the death of deceased, there was \$2000 cash in hand, merchandise in stock \$100, 2 horses \$75, 1 wagon (sold) \$40, good will and book accounts \$385, and ranch at Kalibi of no value. Expended on the care and funeral expenses of deceased, besides other matters, amount to \$2,064.78. A footnote is appended to the inventory saying "bad debts \$1950." The business of deceased for six months prior to his death, i. e., from July 1, 1897, amounts to \$14,801.60 and contra the same. Hearing is set for Saturday morning.

Besides it is nearer to the Government headquarters and is of about equal distance from the Station House as Leleco is, if not much nearer.

George Manson has accepted the position of Business Manager of the Robt. Grieve Publishing Co., and the company may be heartily congratulated upon having secured his valuable services.

Commissioner of Agriculture Haugh has received a large quantity of useful seeds from the Agricultural Department at Washington. Several different kinds of Sorghum are included among them.

The funeral of the late Horace H. Lewis took place at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon from the residence of his mother Mrs. Catherine Auld, Marshfield, Pawa, Honolulu, Oahu. Interment took place at the Catholic cemetery alongside of his father.

Count Festetic's yacht, the Tolna, which was with us in 1893, has been wrecked in the Indian Ocean with the loss of all on board except the owner and two servants. The Countess was in New York at the time.

The Tahitian Government has accepted the Oceanic Steamship Company's proposal for a direct steam service from San Francisco to Tahiti. The steamers will not call at this port. Arrangements in this direction have been pending for the past ten years.

An entirely new program is announced for the Orpheum to-night. Hogan's Minstrels assisted by the Orpheum Stock Company will appear in a screaming two-act farce-comedy and Baby Ruth and the Divine Dodson will render their clever specialties.

The members of the Philippine Commission, together with the attaches will be conducted through the Bishop Museum to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock by W. F. Allen and other trustees of the institution. President Dole will be one of the party which will later lunch with Mr. George R. Carter.

**Down With the Yellow Flag.**

On motion of Geo. W. Smith, seconded by Dr. Emerson, the Board of Health decided yesterday afternoon to raise the "plague" quarantine on Monday morning next, provided "no further outbreak of bubonic plague occurs in Honolulu before that time."

**TOPICS OF THE DAY.**

It may be just to defer any opinion in regard to the Examiner's yellow article upon abused Tyrolese laborers, until Mr. J. A. Lucas, the agent has been seen and a statement made from some of the men. The Advertiser's statement that the men were starving in their own country is of the same color as its statement that men working on farms in St. Josquin valley in California are treated worse than the coolies are in Hawaii. The Advertiser naturally has a great deal of sympathy for "hobos."

If Mr. Harold Sewall should be appointed the first governor of Hawaii, we will take our political hat off to him and give him a hearty welcome, any man who can lay the claim—as Sewall can—to knifing Dole politically will be hailed with a hearty aloha by the Hawaiians. We do not say that Sewall is the choice of the Hawaiians, but even he is preferable to Dole, and with an assured two-thirds vote in the territorial legislature, a harmless body after all.

Arrangements are now being perfected to establish the followers of the "necessary evil" at Iwilei near the prison. The Marshal abandoned the original scheme of locating the unfortunates mauka of King street at Lele, owing to a pressure of public opinion. If the Marshal gives may to "public opinion" on every question, instead of using his own judgment he will hardly be fit to hold a responsible position under our territorial law. The new location however seems to meet with the approval of the citizens who understand the necessity of the evil and in a few days the Japanese and French women will be located at Iwilei under strict police regulations. Officers will be on duty day and night and the agents of the Board of Health will have an office on the premises. There will no longer be any parading through the streets of the fallen women and every thing will be carried on according to the most approved regulations of the leading cities in the world. If Marshal Brown succeeds in carrying out his program he will deserve the thanks and gratitude of the whole community.

**Court Notes.**

John English, the blind son of the late Capt. Harry English, who died at the Queen's Hospital on Dec. 13, 1899, petitions for letters of administration to issue to him on his deceased father's estate, which comprises money, amounting to \$156.60, now in the hands of Bruce Cartwright, capitalist, of this city. Hearing has been set for Friday, May 25th next.

In the Kamalo stock case for injunction of Hitchcock et al. vs. Huataca et al., an argument was held this morning before Acting Judge Silliman. After the hearing of arguments, the Court issued a temporary injunction restraining the sale of stocks until the termination of the proceedings now pending. Defendants asked that plaintiffs file a bond for \$30,000, at which the defendants objected, stating that the present financial value of the stock in question does not warrant such a bond of so large an amount, but the Court ordered plaintiffs to file a bond in the sum of \$15,000 in the course of the next two days. method of voting for Representa-  
tives. The clause now reads: "That  
each voter for Representative may  
cast a vote for as many Representa-  
tives as are to be elected from the  
representative district in which he  
is entitled to vote." The corres-  
ponding paragraph in the original  
Senate bill read as follows: "That  
each voter for Representative may  
cast as many votes as there are Rep-  
resentatives to be elected from the  
representative district in which he  
is entitled to vote. He may cast  
them all for one Representative, or  
may apportion them among the sev-  
eral in such manner as he sees fit:  
Provided, however, that any frac-  
tional division of a vote shall be  
void." This means that voters may  
not mass their votes. If five Rep-  
resentatives are to be elected from a  
given district, no voter can poll  
more than one vote for any one can-  
didate. The minority, no matter  
how large, could secure no represen-  
tation at all, except in case of a split  
in the ranks of the majority.

The fifth paragraph of the section  
dealing with the qualifications of  
voters for Representatives has been  
amended to read: "Prior to such  
registration have paid a poll tax of  
one dollar for the current year, due  
by him to the Government;" in-  
stead of "prior to such registration  
have paid, on or before the 31st day  
of March next preceding the date of  
registration, all taxes due by him to  
the Government."

Where the original Senate Bill  
provided that the Governor "shall  
reside within the Territory," the  
amended bill provides that he "shall  
be a citizen of the Territory of Haw-  
aii." Precisely the same change  
is made with regard to the secretary  
of the Territory, who also is to be  
appointed by the President.

The section dealing with the dis-  
position of public lands has been  
amended by the insertion of the  
proviso: "That all sales, grants,  
leases, and other dispositions of the  
public domain, and agreements  
concerning the same, shall be re-  
ported in writing each month to the  
Secretary of the Interior, who shall  
have authority to confirm, reverse,  
modify, suspend, and annul any of  
said transactions. That all of said  
transactions so reported upon  
which no action shall be taken by  
the Secretary of the Interior within  
sixty days from the filing of such  
reports in his office shall thereupon  
and thereby be confirmed and ratif-  
ied."

"The Secretary of the Interior is  
hereby authorized and required to  
provide and promulgate the rules  
and regulations relative to all con-  
tests on the disposition of the pub-  
lic domain and appeals to him."

Franchises granted by the Govern-  
ment between July 7, 1898, and  
Sept. 28, 1899, are ratified and con-  
firmed. Judges, commissioners,  
members of boards, inspectors, and  
other officials to be appointed by  
the President or the Governor are  
to be citizens of this Territory.

The paragraph about the present  
officeholders now reads as follows:  
"All persons holding office in the  
Hawaiian Islands at the time this  
act takes effect shall continue to  
hold their respective offices until  
their successors are appointed and  
qualified, but not beyond the end of  
the first session of the Senate of the  
Territory of Hawaii unless reappoin-  
ted as herein provided." The  
original paragraph provided that  
they should continue to hold their  
offices "until such offices become  
vacant, but not beyond the end of  
the first session of the Senate, un-  
less reappointed as herein pro-  
vided."

The Judges of the Supreme Court  
are to be citizens of the Territory of  
Hawaii, and are to be appointed by  
the President, by and with the ad-  
vice and consent of the Senate of  
the United States, and are remov-  
able by the President. "No person  
shall be convicted in any criminal  
case except by unanimous verdict of  
the jury."

The Delegate to Congress "shal  
possess the qualifications necessary  
for membership of the House of

Representatives of the Legislature  
of Hawaii;" and "every such Dele-  
gate shall have a seat in the House  
of Representatives, with the right  
of debate, but not of voting."  
P. C. A.
