The Plague Killer.

This fluid is purely prophylactic in character; is in no sense curative and should not be confounded with anti-pest serum.

It should not be used on those already exposed to the infection of plague, but its employment should be limited to the immunization of persons or communities threatened with the disease.

The prophylactic is a toxin, and should an individual treated with it contract the disease prior to the production of its anti-toxic effects he would probably succumb. In a week or ten days after its use this anti-toxic effect is produced and renders him immune to the disease. The immunity thus conferred lasts an undetermined time, probably several months, and may be increased by a second or third treatment. The inoculation is followed by a reaction.

Each vial contains 1 c. c., or one dose. The fluid is turbid, and should be shaken to break up shreds or clumps which might occlude the needle of the syringe. It should be kept in a cool and dark place.

The fluid should be injected hypodermically into the loose connective tissue of the back, arm or other convenient regions, and with the usual precautions employed in such operations, as sterilizing the area by some antiseptic solution and by boiling the syringe.

In view of the importance of the subject, the Marine Hospital Service requests that you report the effect of the prophylactic to the Director of the Hygienic Laboratory of the United States Marine Hospital Service, Washington, D. C.

Consul Melet, representing the French Republic, received from the Department of Foreign Affairs, Paris, a reply to his request for plague serum, which was cabled via San Francisco in the middle of December. The following is the reply of the French Minister of Foreign Affairs:

"Foreign Office,
Paris, Jan. 8, 1900.

"Sir: In your telegram, which arrived at my Department via San Francisco December 29 last, which informed me of the appearance of bubonic plague in Honolulu, you expressed a desire to have a certain quantity of 'serum anti-Pasteur' for the authorities of Hawaii, who wish to use it in combating the epidemic.

"The Director of the Pasteur Institute, to which I sent your request, has just delivered to me a parcel containing twenty-five vials of the serum, which I immediately forward to you for presentation to the authorities of the country of your residence.

"DELCASSE."

The serum will undoubtedly arrive by the next steamer. In addition to these shipments, Dr. Hoffman's preparation of serum will be ready shortly.

As a precautionary measure President Wood has the vials stored in the cold storage department of the Hawaiian Electric Co.

Proclamation to Samoans.

U. S. S. ABARENDA.
Pago-Pago, Dec. 6, 1899.

To the High Chief Faiva, Leona, Tutulla: I arrived here yesterday from Apia. While in Apia I received information that the three great powers, Germany, England and the United States of America had agreed to divide the government of the Samoan Islands between Germany and the United States. Germany will assume the government and protection of Upolu and Savaii and the United States will assume the government and protection of Tutulla, Manua and the other islands east of Upolu. England will withdraw altogether from the islands.

As the senior naval officer of the United States in Samoa, I have to express the wish that the chiefs will inform all the natives of the change of government in Tutulla and that the chiefs will keep order as they are now doing. It is desirable that all the natives should resume their vocations, plant their gardens and settle down to habits of peace and industry. This course will soon bring great prosperity to the Island of Tutulla.

All danger of war is now averted, but the United States will punish all riots, quarrels and crimes. The chiefs are urged to call upon me to assist them in punishing all persons who commit crimes or create disorder.

The authority of the chiefs, when properly exercised, will be upheld. I shall sail for Auckland, N. Z., in the Abarenda tomorrow, December 7th, but shall return to Pago-Pago in a few weeks to complete the work on the wharf and buildings now being erected here.

THE CITIZENS COMMITTEE.

We think the gang calling themselves the Citizens' Sanitary Committee is going too far and that the moment has come when the "citizens" should assemble and decide to fire out this self appointed committee of a few men representing nobody and having no influence in this community.

We have tolerated the arrogance of the Thurston-Ballou-Colburn-Perry ring long enough. None of them could get sufficient votes at a public ballot to be elected pound-master and yet they have been allowed to take upon themselves the right of running this community during the plague scare. There were no objections raised against the committee as long as its members simply confined themselves to assisting the Board of Health. But when the heads of these self appointed alleged representatives, of the community become so swelled that they cannot understand that they possess no legal standing in their endeavors to enter private houses, delegate their assumed powers as agents of the Board of Health, burn premises, arrest citizens and violate the United States constitution, we think the time has come when a halt should be called.

It is a sad fact that these men are upheld in their unlawful attitude by the District Magistrate who as a rule is independent but at present evidently considers it good policy to uphold this self-appointed committee and from his decision to whom can a man appeal on a case of violating Health Regulations established by Messrs Ballou-Thurston and Perry?

Surely not, as Mr. Creighton said in the Court yesterday to Judge Perry, who is the boob-bah of the committee and actually showed his inbred lack of tact by assisting the prosecution yesterday when a poor devil of a Chinaman was tried for spending a night away from his premises while enjoying his New Year. Can an appeal be made to Judge Stanley, who has also shown the extremely bad form of going on the committee, or, as suggested by Mr. Creighton, will an appeal lie to Mr. Ballou, the boss of the committee, when he gets his long cherished commission as federal judge for the Hawaiian Territory.

The case was an outrageous scandal, and the decision resulting in the fining of the man was a surprise to those who have admired Judge Wilcox for his fairness and independence.

The man did not change his residence or abode. He simply spent one or two nights at a friend's house and then he went home. Where there not people in the Court at the time of the trial who would be very unwilling to state where they spend their nights when not at their abode? And yet the poor Chinaman was frowned at and punished as if he had committed an offense. If the sanitary gentlemen and the learned judge would look into the Century dictionary or some other standard work on the English language they will find that the word abode can never be construed to mean a place in which a man must necessarily sleep.

We claim that until martial law has been declared a citizens having a fixed residence has the right to walk around the town during the whole night, call on his best girl if he has one and never disturb the bed in his own room, and that right can not be taken away under the U.S. constitution by conceited "citizens" of the stripe of Mr. Perry who does not understand the dignity due to the office which he yet may hold for a few months.

The sub-inspector stated that he considered himself entitled to enter any house in his apau at any hour in the day or night. He admitted that he held no commission as agent of the Board of Health but that W. R. Castle had told him that it was an excellent idea to enter the houses in the night and see whether the people were there. We respectfully warn Mr. W. R. Castle not to call around at night on the premises of the writer because his gun has the bad habit of going off when intruders appear and the bulldog is very fond of a fat leg, now that meat is going up and the Rapid Transit stock are going down.

The amusing thing in this affair is however that attorney Creighton, this morning received a call at his house of Judge Perry and two other inspectors who demanded to go through his house. Mr. Creighton submitted through the force of number and the Circuit Judge was permitted to waltz through the rooms with his men.

We leave it to every decent householder and rate payer and family man whether it isn't time to check the bubonic swelling of the heads of the Citizen's Sanitary Committee.

A Proper Step.

The Supreme Court by Judge Frear has granted Mr. John M. Vivas a license to practice law in all the Courts of the Hawaiian Republic. Mr. Vivas as attorney in the inferior courts has shown his marked ability and his integrity has never been disputed. The license granted him is not alone a compliment to Mr. Vivas but to the Portuguese Colony of which he for many years has been a staunch representative and fearless defender of their rights. We congratulate the Supreme Court on having admitted Mr. Vivas to practice before them. We congratulate the Hawaiian Bar on a valuable addition to the ranks of full-fledged lawyers, and we congratulate Mr. John M. Vivas on this acknowledgment of the highest Court of his merits and ability.

Ordered To The Caucasus.

PERHAPS ANOTHER CASE.

J. Weir Robertson Stricken Down Under Suspicious Condition.

At 10 o'clock last night J. Weir Robertson, American, an employee in Waterhouse's grocery store, was conveyed to the Pest Hospital with symptoms of the plague. He had been ill since Wednesday but suspicious indications only appeared yesterday. He was at once treated with the Pasteur anti-pestic serum received from the health authorities of the United States through Dr. Carmichael. Mr. Fred. Waterhouse is of the impression that the apparent plague symptoms are the result of an accident. Mr. Robertson met with on Tuesday when a box weighing 100 pounds fell upon his abdomen. Mr. Roberts was not a night wanderer but a stay at home man, so it is difficult to conceive how he should be brought into contact with the plague.

Considering his attitude on the Philippine question, it is very probable that Senator Pettigrew will have considerable to say when the Hawaiian bill comes under discussion, more especially as he made a very careful study of the situation and conditions while here.

The decision of Attorney-General Griggs that war vessels sunk in action cannot be counted as prizes will make a vast difference in the amount of prize money to the fleets of Admirals Dewey and Sampson and their men. We trust there has been no advance by hypothecation of these claims.

Mr. Dole is presumed to have closed his appointive political career with a seat on the commission to frame the bill for the governance of Hawaii. If he has a spark of moral manliness about him he will decline any further appointments to office, and go before the people as a candidate for delegate to congress. He will then learn whether, or not, the people endorse his career of the past seven years. If he has a clear and clean conscience he will do this, and the family compact may aid him with all their "push and pull."

It is strange that the English speaking races while bold fighters are not a military people in the sense of having their War Departments ever ready for the war as are those of Germany and France. The same unpreparedness that assailed Great Britain in the present war is identical with that of the United States in the civil war and in the Cuban affair. In the Civil War on the Union side generals were frequently changed until Grant arose and conquered. The secret probably lies in the facts that Americans and British will not stand conscription as is enforced on the continent of Europe.

A young congregational Minister of Oakland, Cal. named MacInnes, having left the ministry has stirred up a hornets nest of persons around him. Instead of quietly resigning, he had the indiscreet presumption to say that he believed in dancing, and a long list of other things that were tabooed by church goers when indulged in by ministers. "If a man needs a drink let him take it." But worse than all he said: "The church is burdened with fake ideas and is full of sinful hypocrites and some of my friends who might called "lushers" are infinitely better than these frauds of piety.

The fumigation of the clothes of the Drilled camp was carried out to perfection by Mr. Doyle and the able physicians in charge. The Chinese held in the camp are especially pleased at the consideration shown to the "small-footed" women. The bathing of the Japanese women took place under the supervision of two Japanese matrons, while a prominent Chinese lady gave her services while the Chinese women went through the ordeal of fumigation. That Chester Doyle is popular among the Japanese is a well known fact, but it is a big feather in his bonnet that the Chinese in the camp call him their best friend, a "velly good man," and swear by him. Doyle is beginning to speak Chinese quite fluently.

BY AUTHORITY.

SANITARY REGULATIONS OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH FOR HONOLULU DISTRICT.

The following regulations shall
apply to, and be in force within, the
portion of Honolulu described as
follows:

Beginning at the seashore, at the
west corner of Loko Kuwili 2 near
the east corner of the Kapalama
Detention Camp and running mauka,
along the Waipilopilo road to the
old line of the Oahu Railway, thence
along Oahu Railway to the boundary
of Maunakea, thence mauka, along
the Mokauea boundary and the Ka-
lihi road to the survey station at the
lower end of Mokauea ridge, thence
in a straight line to the survey sta-
tion above the north end of Wyllie
street, thence along the central line
of Wyllie street to Nuuanu street,
thence in a straight line to the forks
of the Manoa road, thence in a
straight line to the corner of the
Waialae road and the Kapahulu
road, thence down the Kapahulu
road and along Campbell Avenue to
Monsarrat road, and thence in a
direct line over the summit of Dia-
mond Head to the seashore at high
water line, and thence to the initial
point.

REGARDING BUILDINGS AND YARDS RAIN WATER.

1. Where the space between the
buildings is less than fifteen feet,
the water from the roofs of the
buildings on the sides of such space
shall be conducted in water tight
leaders and made to discharge into
suitable drains leading into street or
alley gutters; and if the building
abuts on an alley or roadway of like
width the same rule shall apply.

AIR SPACE BETWEEN BUILDINGS.

2. There shall be a clear air space
of ten feet between all buildings
except those fronting on a street.
No building except such as fronts
on a street shall be built within five
feet of a boundary line. The word
"buildings" in this paragraph shall
be construed to mean and include
sheds, lean-tos, privies, and all other
structures.

LIGHT AND VENTILATION OF DWELLINGS.

3. Each and every room intended
or used for human habitation
shall be provided with at least eight
square feet of window area having
unobstructed access into the open
air for each 100 square feet of floor
space in said room, and free access
shall at all times be had to the same
by the occupants of the room; and
at least one-half of such window
space shall be movable and available
for ventilation.

AIR SPACE UNDER BUILDINGS.

4. Every building shall have on
an average at least twenty inches of
clear space for the circulation of air
between the floor timbers and the
ground, and shall have sufficient
openings for ventilation in the outer
walls to admit a free circulation of
air; but, in case this air space cannot
be secured without reaching "ground
water level" then there shall be no
air space, but the floor shall be of
concrete or masonry.

YARDS, AREAS, COURTS, ETC.

5. Yards, areas, courts, alleyways
and other open spaces within or be-
tween buildings, where water is used
for washing of any kind, shall be
properly graded and cemented, or
paved so as to be water proof, and
drained into trapped drains properly
connected with sewer or cesspool,
and no permanent wooden floor or
grating shall be maintained over the
same.

WATER TIGHT FLOORS.

6. All houses, structures, rooms
or parts thereof, in which water is
used or intended to be used, in such
quantity as to render the floor or
floors thereof constantly damp, shall
have such floor or floors, made abso-
lutely waterproof, with proper drain-
age into trapped leaders conveying
the water away into cesspool or
sewer; and the water proofing of all
such floors shall be done in a man-
ner satisfactory to the Board of
Health.

7. No building or structure shall
be used as a residence or place for
human habitation or abode which is
situated upon land where there is
standing water within eighteen in-
ches of the surface of the ground;
nor shall any building or structure
be so used that is placed on land
that has been made by filling in with
refuse or garbage, or that is declared
by the Board of Health to be of
foul or corrupt material.

REGARDING PRIVY-VAULTS AND CESSPOOL.

8. No privy-vault, sink or cess-
pool in Honolulu, shall hereafter be
located or constructed within fifty

feet of any stream, lake, pond, well
or spring of water, nor within two
feet of the line of any lot; nor shall
it be made more than eighteen or
less than six feet deep, or placed in
such a position that it is not easily
accessible for emptying and clean-
ing.

9. When deemed necessary by
the Board of Health, the sides and
bottom of any privy-vault, sink or
cesspool, shall be made either wholly
or in part water tight, so as to pre-
vent any saturation of the ground
about the said vault, sink or cess-
pool, and shall be provided with
suitable ventilating arrangement.

10. No structure or cover shall
be put upon or over any privy-vault,
sink or cesspool, until it has been
inspected by the proper Agent of
the Board of Health and approved as
meeting the requirements of these
regulations and of public health.

11. Any privy-vault, sink or cess-
pool, already constructed in Hono-
lulu which has become a nuisance,
or in any way dangerous to life or
detrimental to health, shall be re-
moved, re-constructed, or altered to
meet the requirements of these re-
gulations and of public health, as
directed by the Board of Health or
its Agent.

12. The Board of Health or its
Agents may cause the emptying or
disinfecting of any privy-vault, sink
or cesspool that may be deemed of-
fensive, or when required by public
health, at the expense of the owner
or occupant of the premises.

13. Within thirty days after the
public sewer system is put into
operation the use of privy vaults
and cesspools shall be entirely dis-
continued within the limits of such
sewer system, and all privies shall
be removed, except in so far as per-
mission may be granted by the
Board of Health to transform the
same into approved water closets
connected with the sewer system.

14. No privy-vault or cesspool
shall be excavated or maintained
within ten feet from any dwelling-
house or inhabited building or cook-
house or place where cooking is
done.

15. No privy vault or cesspool
shall be maintained or excavated in
any place where for any reason free
and unimpeded access may not be
had to the same by an excavator
cart.

16. No privy shall be built or
maintained so as to entirely cover
the cesspool or vault under the
same, but the cesspool or vault shall
project out on one side beyond the
superstructure in such a manner as
to allow the inspection and removal
of the contents of said cesspool or
vault. The contents of any privy
vault or cesspool shall not be al-
lowed to rise within eighteen inches
of the top of the same or to such a
height as to flow out onto the sur-
face of the ground.

17. No cesspools or privy vault
shall be built or maintained in any
location except the same shall have
a substantial water-tight curb which
shall retain the earth without and
the contents of the cesspool or vault
within, and shall be provided with
a substantial water-tight cover, hav-
ing a small, movable lid in the same
to facilitate examination and re-
moval of the contents.

18. All cesspool or privy vaults
shall have four-inch cast-iron vent
pipes with caulked lead joints, or
galvanized iron pipes, extending not
less than twelve feet into the open
air, and if within twenty feet of an
inhabited building the top of such
vent pipes shall extend above the
roof of the highest building within
a distance of twenty feet of the same.
All such vent pipes shall run as
direct as possible. Every privy
shall have proper seats with hinged
lids to cover the opening of same,
which shall be kept closed when not
in use.

19. All connections to cesspools
or privy vaults shall be made with
cast iron, lead, or vitrified sewer
pipe. All urinals shall be connected
to cesspools, vaults or sewer by
trapped waste pipes.

20. All cesspools shall be pro-
perly cleaned out at once, and here-
after at least once every four
months, and shall be thoroughly
disinfected at least once each week
with such disinfectant as the Board
of Health shall direct; all such
cleaning and disinfecting to be at
the expense of the owner of the
property.

21. All waste, soil, sewer or drain
pipes shall be of cast iron, lead or
vitrified clay. If of iron or lead the
joints shall be caulked with molten
lead; if of vitrified clay, they shall
have tight cement joints, all joints
to be smooth in the inside; open
drains may be of water tight masonry.

22. All cesspool or privy vaults
when abandoned and the use there-
of discontinued shall be at once en-
tirely emptied of liquid and solid
contents, and shall be disinfected
and filled with earth, sand, ashes, or
other such clean materials; and the
wooden curbing about the same re-
moved to a depth of at least four

feet below the surface of the ground.
In no case shall refuse, garbage or
any unclean material be used in fill-
ing such privy vault or cesspool.

23. All buildings and premises
which do not conform in every re-
spect to the requirements of the
foregoing regulations are hereby de-
clared nuisances and dangerous to
the public health.

REGARDING GARBAGE.

24. Garbage will be carried away
free of charge by the Board of
Health carts within these limits, i.e.:
School street mauka; Alapai street
east; Liliha street west; and sea-
ward by the waterfront.

25. It shall be the duty of each
house owner, householder, lessee, or
tenant who is a housekeeper, within
the district in which the free re-
moval of garbage is provided, to
supply, and keep ready for use suit-
able container or containers, of not
more than eighteen cubic feet cap-
acity and provided with tight
covers, for the reception of all gar-
bage, and to cause the same to be set
out in such places and at such
times as the Board of Health shall
direct for the convenience of gar-
bage collectors. All empty containers
shall be kept clean and thoroughly
disinfected.

26. Yard scrapings, tree cuttings
and stable manure will not be re-
moved by the Board of Health carts.

27. All garbage and refuse which
is subject to decay shall be collected
by householder or occupiers of dwell-
ings each day; and if within the
limits named in section 24 the same
shall be placed in containers as pro-
vided in section 25 for collection;
and if beyond said limits the same
shall be burnt or removed.

28. No garbage shall be used for
filling house lots or other tracts of
land.

29. No garbage shall be deposited
in any place not authorized by the
Board of Health.

Extract from Penal Code:

"Section 874. Every person who
shall violate any regulation of the
Board of Health, after the same
shall have been published, as pro-
vided in the last preceding section,
shall be fined not exceeding one
hundred dollars."
