HIS MAJESTY'S BIRTHDAY.

To-day is the fifty-first anniversary of the birth of His Majesty King Kalakaua. At 8 o'clock this morning the Royal Hawaiian Band and the Royal School Cadets will pay their respects to the King at Iolani Palace.

SUGAR MARKET.

Williams, Dimond & Co.'s Circular by the Australia. The following is from Messrs. Williams, Dimond & Co.'s circular, dated San Francisco, November 8th:

Our latest mail advices from New York, of the 29th ult., states that the demand for raws has been active and the business transacted comparatively large.

The strength of the situation, together with the active demand, has established a further advance in values. With this exception there is nothing essentially new in the situation, for with firm advices from European and other producing markets, light supplies on the spot as well as to arrive, and an active consumption of refined, the natural course is towards a strong and buoyant market.

Noble Townsend put the following questions to the Minister of Interior: 1. Have any Government lands been leased or sold in a manner contrary to law within the last two years?

2. If so, what is the opinion of the Government with regard to the legality and equity of the titles under which such lands are held?

3. Are any such lands, if any such there be, suitable for division under the Homestead law?

4. What is the policy of the Government in this matter?

UNPAID BILLS, ETC. Rep. Kamaoaha presented the following questions to the Minister of Finance: State the number of bills unpaid and due for six months ending July 1, 1887; particulars of miscellaneous bills amounting altogether to \$280,773 94; the balance in Treasury July 1, 1887, etc.

ORDER OF DAY. Third reading of an Act relating to the number of Justices of the Supreme Court. Noble Castle moved it be laid on the table. Rep. Paehaeole moved it pass.

Rep. C. Brown called for the ayes and noes. The motion to lay on the table having been lost, the ayes and noes were taken on the motion to pass the bill with the following result. Total votes cast 47:

Ayes—Thurston, Ashford, Young, Robinson, Jaeger, Smith, Waterhouse, Foster, Luhiau, Wall, Townsend, Hitchcock, Baldwin, Bailey, Makee, Bertelmann, Dole, Hustace, Dowsett Jr., Kalauka, Naone, Deacon, Kamai, Kinney, Kauhane, Kamouha, Paris, Nawahine, Daniels, Helekuhni, Horner, Kawainui, A. S. Wilcox, Rice, Gay, Nakaleka, Paehaeole—37.

Noes—Castle, Wight, Notley, Richardson, Campbell, Widemann, Kauhui, C. Brown, F. Brown, Maguire—10. The bill passed its third reading.

Second reading of an Act relating to the discharging of duties of the Governors. On motion of Minister Ashford the bill along with another to abolish the office of Governor was referred to a select committee.

Second reading of an Act relating to Chinese immigration. On motion the rules were suspended, the bill read by title and referred to Committee on Foreign Relations.

Second reading of an Act to abolish the settlement for Hon. H. Kuehlanui. The committee reported a new bill providing for a pension of \$600.

Noble Castle moved the bill to abolish the pension pass to engrossment. Noble Smith moved the committee's bill pass to engrossment. It was hardly a fair thing he thought to Kuehlanui that the law

HAWAIIAN PARLIAMENT.

Legislative Assembly—Extra Session of 1887.

Eleventh Day. TUESDAY, November 15th. House met at 10 o'clock a. m. Prayer by the Chaplain. Minutes read and approved.

PETITIONS. Noble Castle presented a petition from 881 Chinese residents protesting against the bill in which a special tax is put on them. Referred to Judiciary Committee.

The Hon. Noble also presented a petition from several hundred Chinese residents, praying that they have equal rights with others under the new Constitution. Referred to Judiciary Committee.

The Hon. member also presented three petitions from Chinese residents of Kohala, Wailuku and Hilo, praying that the opium license be withdrawn. Referred to special committee.

Rep. Helekuhni presented a petition from Honolulu, praying that a hospital be erected in each district; that the friends of lepers take care of them; that lepers who have been cured at Kakaako be released; that no lepers be sent to Molokai who have been sick ten years, etc. Referred to Sanitary Committee.

Rep. Paris presented a petition praying that \$1,000 be appropriated for a schoolhouse at Kahaluu, North Kona. Referred to Education Committee.

PRINTING EXPENSES. Rep. Kawainui presented a resolution that the Secretary examine the records of 1886, or obtain from other sources the amount paid last session for printing, and the rate paid per page. Adopted.

Noble Smith said he wished the Secretary joy. A committee had been looking for the books of account, but were unable to find them. Evidently they had disappeared. An unusual rate was charged last session, the "Elele" office being paid \$5 per page. The bills for printing amounted to between \$16,000 and \$17,000.

LEGISLATIVE EXPENSES. Minister Green read a first time an Act to appropriate moneys for the expenses of the Legislative extra session of 1887. The bill provides for \$10,000 to defray the expenses. Passed to second reading.

A CORRECTION. Minister Green said if it was in order he would like to make a correction. Mr. Macfarlane had called his attention to what he had said in the House, that he, Macfarlane, believed there was a contract price. Mr. Macfarlane says there was a contract price. It does not matter much. He would rather the House refer to his written reports. A wrong impression had seemed to gain ground with regard to the \$15,000. He would refer to Armstrong's letter in Macfarlane's report, which gave full particulars of that amount. There was no doubt in his mind that these amounts were paid to the issuing house.

THE LEPROSY QUESTION. Rep. A. S. Wilcox put the following questions to the Minister of Interior: 1. Has this Government taken any steps to procure the services of any one to make a scientific study of leprosy in a way similar to the way Dr. Arning was doing when here?

2. If the Government has not taken any such steps, does the Government intend doing so in the near future?

3. If steps have been taken, or if steps have not been taken, please state what the intentions of the Government are in the matter.

3. Are any such lands, if any such there be, suitable for division under the Homestead law?

4. What is the policy of the Government in this matter?

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Noes—Castle, Wight, Notley, Richardson, Campbell, Widemann, Kauhui, C. Brown, F. Brown, Maguire—10. The bill passed its third reading.

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Noble Castle moved the bill to abolish the pension pass to engrossment. Noble Smith moved the committee's bill pass to engrossment. It was hardly a fair thing he thought to Kuehlanui that the law

should be repealed. There was a certain moral obligation in this matter. Under the circumstances of this case it would be unjust and unfair to repeal it. They would be taking all from him. In the case of Poomakelani there was nothing to appeal to the House, and no reason for a pension for her. Mr. Everett did not avail himself of his, while Mr. Parke's circumstances were such that he did not need a pension.

Noble Castle said Kuehlanui was a very affable and amiable gentleman. The committee to whom the bill was referred have given no particulars of their recommending him a pension of \$600. There is not one word of information in their report, nor does it state any special reason why he should receive a pension. He wanted some information and he believed other members did also. His impression about Kuehlanui was that he was doing his duty as police justice of Wailuku. His office was wanted for someone, and he was given a pension to clear out. Under those circumstances they had no right to give him anything.

Noble Widemann thought Noble Castle's motion a little too premature. It was an ungracious and unpleasant thing for a committee to have to report and say that so and so was a pauper. He was in the House when that bill was passed, though he opposed it. It having passed he was now on the other side. If that Kuehlanui had in consequence of that bill given up his position as district magistrate they were in duty bound to help him in his old age. That was why he recommended this new bill.

Rep. Kinney asked if any member of the committee could state whether Kuehlanui owned any real estate in his own name; whether the land he had made over to Mrs. Sam Parker was owned by her now, and whether he was still employed as collector of rents of Crown lands at Wailuku.

Noble Widemann believed he had lately acquired a piece of land, part of the church lot, but could not vouch for it.

Noble Smith said it had been stated before the committee that Kuehlanui owned some land from which he derived a few dollars per year, but had absolutely nothing else. The land conveyed to Mrs. Parker was for the consideration of the payment of his debts, which saved him from bankruptcy. If his pension were now taken away he would be dependent upon his friends.

Noble Widemann did not know whether he held the appointment of collector or not, but he certainly was no longer competent to hold it.

Rep. Kamaoaha thought in the payment of this pension during a number of years the Government had already done enough for him, and it was time to stop it.

Noble Baldwin contended that if he deserved it in the past he did still, now that he was eighty years old. He used to be considered one of the good and substantial natives. He would support the amendment.

Noble Castle asked if the Government were under any obligations to him for any services rendered.

Noble Smith said the committee understood that although he was not a regularly appointed officer of the Government, yet had rendered many services to the country in the time of the Kamehamehas, to the Legislature and was police judge at Wailuku.

Dr. Wight pointed to the man's constant attendance to duty as a member of the last Legislature, notwithstanding ill health, as an evidence of his faithfulness. He had been induced to give up his position as police judge on the understanding that a pension would be provided for him, and the Government, to keep faith with him, must at least give him half his previous pension.

On the motion of Rep. Kinney, the ayes and noes were taken on the motion to pass the bill to engrossment as amended: Ayes—Green, G. Brown, Thurston, Ashford, Wilder, Robinson, Young, Jaeger, Castle, Waterhouse, Foster, Luhiau, Wight, Notley, Wall, Townsend, Hitchcock, Bailey, Widemann, Makee, Bertelmann, Dole, Hustace, Dowsett, Jr., Naone, Kauhui, F. Brown, Deacon, Kamai, Kauhane, Kamaoaha, Paris, Nawahine, Daniels, Helekuhni, Horner, Kawainui, A. S. Wilcox, Rice, Gay, Paehaeole—41.

Ayes—Richardson, C. Brown, Kinney, Maguire, Nakaleka—5. The item then passed as in the bill.

H. R. H. Heir Presumptive, 1,250 00. Rep. F. Brown moved it be stricken out. Noble Townsend moved it pass as in the bill.

Rep. Kauhui moved it pass at \$1,500. The item passed as in bill.

The committee then rose and the Chairman reported progress and asked leave to sit again.

The report of the committee was adopted. THE LOAN ACTS. Noble Castle, on suspension of the rules, presented the following report: Hon. S. G. Wilder, President Legislative Assembly—Sir: The select committee, to which was referred the bill to amend the Loan Acts of 1886, and all reports and other matters relative thereto, ask to present a preliminary report.

It appears to your committee that besides other questions to be considered by them, there are two at least which require some preliminary consideration, to wit: What is the duty of the Government in the premises? This being purely a question of law, your committee recommend that it be submitted to the Justices of the Supreme Court with a request for their opinion thereon, as provided by the Constitution.

The second question, namely, the policy of the Government, would not arise unless it shall be decided by competent authority that the Government is not bound in law to issue the bonds under existing circumstances, or, on the other hand, if there is a legal obligation resting upon the Government to issue those bonds, the sooner that duty is performed the better, at whatever cost.

We therefore recommend that the construction of the Loan Act be requested of the Justices of the Supreme Court, and that the report and statements of the Minister of Finance and the form of bond now proposed by him, together with the amended Act authorizing the same proposed by him, be submitted to said Justices, and in connection therewith their

Noble Smith said the bill aimed at jobbers; there had been many complaints against them. Rep. F. Brown—Will you name them? Noble Smith—I could, if necessary; but would rather not. The bill was referred to the Printing Committee.

Second reading of an Act to amend sections 913 and 922 of the Civil Code, relating to Justices District Courts. Minister Ashford moved it be referred to the Judiciary Committee.

Noble Smith moved it be referred to the Committee on Governors Bills. It appeared to him that everything had been done to centralize power in the Ministers. The House must be careful.

The motion was carried and the President appointed the following committee: Attorney General, D. H. Hitchcock, C. F. Horner, J. U. Kawanui and C. Bertelmann.

President Wilder also appointed the following special committee on the internal police bill: Attorney General, W. O. Smith, W. R. Castle, J. Maguire and G. N. Wilcox.

REDUCING EXPENSES. Second reading of an Act to amend an Act entitled "An Act making special appropriation for the use of the Government during the two years which will end with the thirty-first day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight," approved October, 1886.

The rules were suspended and the bill read by title. The House resolved itself into Committee of the Whole, Noble Smith in the Chair.

The bill was read item by item. The following items were passed without debate: CIVIL LIST. Her Majesty the Queen. H. R. H. Princess Kaiulani.

PERMANENT SETTLEMENT. H. R. H. Princess Poomakelani. Hon. W. C. Parke. Thomas W. Everett.

The next item was salary of Auditor General. Rep. C. Brown said there was a bill to abolish the office. If it was properly conducted in the interests of good government it ought not to be abolished. He moved the item be passed for the present.

Noble Hitchcock moved to strike the item out. Minister Thurston said the Cabinet recognized the importance of the office. They had decided to stop the salary in order to get the present incumbent out. He could be legislated out quicker than he could be investigated out. They could abolish the law this session and renew it at the next.

The item passed as in the bill. Rep. Kinney moved to insert the following two items under the heading of Judiciary Department: Salary Third Associate Justice. Salary Fourth Associate Justice.

The two items passed. Noble Richardson moved to insert "Salary District Judge, Honouaia, Maui." The motion was lost.

CIVIL LIST. His Majesty's Privy Purse and Royal State \$5,000 00. Rep. C. Brown moved it be stricken out. Minister Thurston moved it pass.

Rep. Helekuhni moved it pass at \$6,000, and Rep. Kauhui at \$5,625. This item brought about a long discussion, in which Ministers Ashford and Thurston, Nobles Widemann, Castle, Hitchcock, Young and Richardson, and Repts. Kinney, Kauhane and Kauhui took part.

Noble Hitchcock moved the ayes and noes be taken. The ayes and noes were then taken on the motion to strike out, with the following result: Total votes cast, 46.

Ayes—Richardson, C. Brown, Kinney, Maguire, Nakaleka—5. The item then passed as in the bill.

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We therefore recommend that the construction of the Loan Act be requested of the Justices of the Supreme Court, and that the report and statements of the Minister of Finance and the form of bond now proposed by him, together with the amended Act authorizing the same proposed by him, be submitted to said Justices, and in connection therewith their

opinions be requested on the following questions, namely: First—Under the Acts of 1886, where would such bonds be payable? Second—Is section 5 of the Loan Act, dated September 1, 1886, in force? Third—If said section 5 is in force, does it exclude payment of any expenses for floating the loan, etc., other than 5 per cent commission.

Fourth—In any case, is the item of \$100,000 in section 3 of the amended Act intended to be in addition to such 5 per cent commission? Fifth—Is any engagement for bonds payable in sterling money valid under said Loan Acts of 1886?

Sixth—Is the Government responsible for the engagement of its agent to pay \$15,000, as mentioned in the Minister's report, provided such engagement was not authorized by the Loan Acts of 1886? Seventh—If the Court shall say that the Loan Acts of 1886 do not authorize the engagement to pay \$15,000 in addition to the 5 per cent as commissions earned therein, would the Government then be justified in refusing to issue bonds to cover the \$15,000 if it shall also appear that the Government has contracted for the payment of such \$15,000 in addition to the commissions and has actually received the remainder of the money?

Eighth—Is the form of the bond herewith submitted authorized by the Loan Act of 1886 with its proposed amendment? In the last question attention is particularly called to the form of the bond of stating what the bond calls for in its final payment. Your committee therefore ask that upon return made by their Honors the Justices of the Supreme Court to the questions herein asked, together with the exhibits attached, such matter may be referred back to this committee, and that they may have further time for a report thereon.

Honolulu, November 15, 1887. Noble Baldwin agreed to the report, but was not present to sign it. AN INVITATION. President Wilder read a communication from Mr. Walter M. Giffard, the Regatta Secretary, inviting the members of the House to attend on the flagship W. G. Hall, to witness the regatta on the occasion of His Majesty's birthday.

Noble Castle moved the House adjourn to 10 o'clock Thursday morning, and it be entered on the minutes that the House adjourned to then out of respect to His Majesty's birthday. Agreed to. The House adjourned at 4:15.

ADVERTISER—There is a seeming gauziness about some of the pretensions of retrenchment which are now being paraded before the public as intended acts of the present Legislature, the diaphanous appearance being made plainly apparent by the impolitic manner in which the political reduction ax is proposed to be yielded. For instance, it is noticeable that intended reductions in salaries are placed opposite the heads and deputies in some of the bureaus, and in the most important departments, while the incumbents of like positions in less important branches of Government service appear to be privileged to hold the fort in perfect security against a decrease in their salaries. The Police Judge of Honolulu is an important personage in the judicial branch and has but little leisure time. The salary is now not exorbitant for a competent person, and with such a person in that position the salary should remain intact. In the Post Office bureau, a most important branch of the public service, it is noticed that the salaries of both the Postmaster and Deputy Postmaster are to be trimmed by a reduction of \$1,500. This may be called reduction, truly, but is it economy? The deputy of the Collector-General, the Deputy of the Attorney-General and the entire Survey Department escape unscathed in this reduction movement, and the question naturally arises, why? The Ministers seem to be magnanimous, but the country will undoubtedly feel well satisfied to pay \$500 per month to Cabinet officers who merit and hold the confidence of the public.

Wilder-Kimball.

On Tuesday evening, November 7th, Mr. G. P. Wilder, son of the Hon. S. G. Wilder, was married at Mills' College, Oakland, to Miss Lillian Kimball, one of the alumne, a member of the class of 1887. It was the first wedding that had ever taken place at Mills' College, and was a most brilliant affair. Mr. and Mrs. G. P. Wilder arrived on the Australia yesterday and were warmly congratulated by a large number of friends.

"ADMIRAL" GRESLEY JACKSON.

He is interviewed in San Francisco.

The following appears in the San Francisco "Alta" of November 6th: Admiral G. E. G. Jackson, who arrived on the steamer Tuesday from Honolulu, was interviewed by an "Alta" reporter at the Brooklyn Hotel last night. From newspaper articles of ten years ago the reporter expected to find a black-bearded monster of the pirate stamp, but he found instead a pleasant gentlemanly appearing man of about fifty years of age, intellectual and perfectly at his ease. When asked by the reporter as to the present state of affairs in the Kingdom and his experience with the Kanakas, he replied: "At present there is a stagnation in business throughout the Kingdom, resulting probably from the retrenchment and reform now in progress. Many of the plantations are on the verge of bankruptcy, and the Government is heavily in debt. For this reason I think that the depression will last some time. Then the Government action toward Claus Spreckels has made him a deadly enemy, when of all times he should be a friend. The revolution has taken out of office the unscrupulous natives and put in their places more honest and competent white men. I was in the Government service ten years, leaving the British navy to accept the position. I was Captain of the gunboat Kaimioa, which is now to be sold, and during my official career have had ample opportunity to become acquainted with the habits and customs of the Kanakas."

"Why is the Government's only gunboat to be sold?"

"Well, I'll tell you. The fitting out of the man-of-war was a complete farce, as there is no use for a navy, and then the natives are too cowardly to make sailors, much less fighters. The native is devoid of all the characteristics of an officer, is dishonest and has none of the habits of a gentleman—fit only to drink gin. After ten years' service, I could not be induced to go back. There is no education there, and the natives are ignorant, consequently vicious. You notice that I speak disparagingly of them, but I am thoroughly disgusted with the whole lot. Leprosy is spreading in Honolulu, and the sanitary condition of the city is very poor."

By the steamship Australia, which arrived from San Francisco yesterday, we have dates to November 8th, inclusive: The Condemned Anarchists.

The Supreme Court at Washington has unanimously denied the application for a writ of error in the cases of the seven condemned anarchists, whose execution was fixed for Friday, the 11th instant. Three of their number have signed a petition for mercy, and numberless appeals have been sent in on their behalf, but public opinion is for the most part in favor of the law taking its course. Engel made an attempt at suicide. Dynamite bombs have been discovered in Lingg's cell, and it was thought that this would effectually prevent any commutation of his sentence. That any of the others will be commuted is exceedingly doubtful. Two full regiments were to be held in readiness on the fatal day to quell any incipient rioting.

Jenny Lind, the renowned singer, is dead.

Another nihilist plot against the Czar has been discovered. Eighteen army officers have been convicted.

A terrific gale is reported on the English Channel, causing much damage.

Jay Gould has arrived in London.

An explosion of gasoline in a grocery store at St. Louis resulted in the wreck of the building, the death of six persons and serious injury to three others.

An expedition is to leave New York on the 26th instant to complete the final location of the Nicaragua canal route and prepare the work of construction, to be commenced in the winter.

The canal between Lake Union and Lake Washington, W. T., has been opened.

New York, November 8.—An election in the State of New York was to be held on the 8th inst. for Secretary of State, Controller, Attorney-General, State Treasurer, State Engineer and Surveyor, Members of the State Legislature, together with local tickets in this and other cities. There are elements in the canvass which make foreshadowing the result a difficult matter. The difficulty lies in the fact that there are five State tickets, Democratic, Republican, United Labor (or Henry George), Progressive Labor (or Socialistic) and Prohibition.

The Duke of Connaught is spoken of as the prospective Commander-in-chief of the British army. The Duke of Cambridge is getting too old for the position.

Emperor William is still bedridden. The German Reichstag is to meet on the 24th inst.

President Cleveland's Cabinet is to be recast when the heads of departments have completed their annual reports.

The political situation in France is still critical.

O'Brien resisted an attempt to force him to put on the uniform of the Tullamore Jail. The prison doctor then directed the Government to desist on account of the unfavorable state of O'Brien's health.

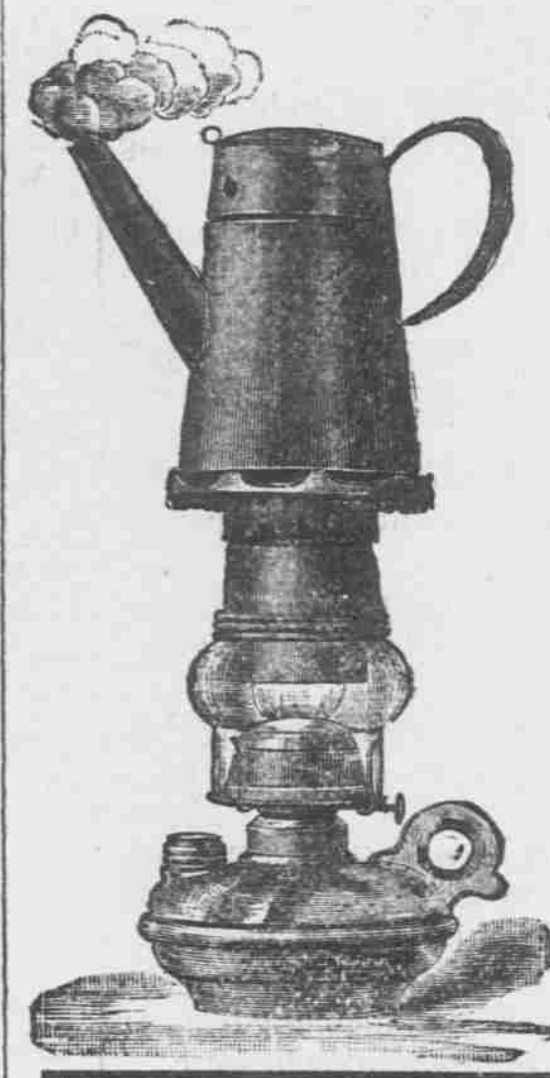

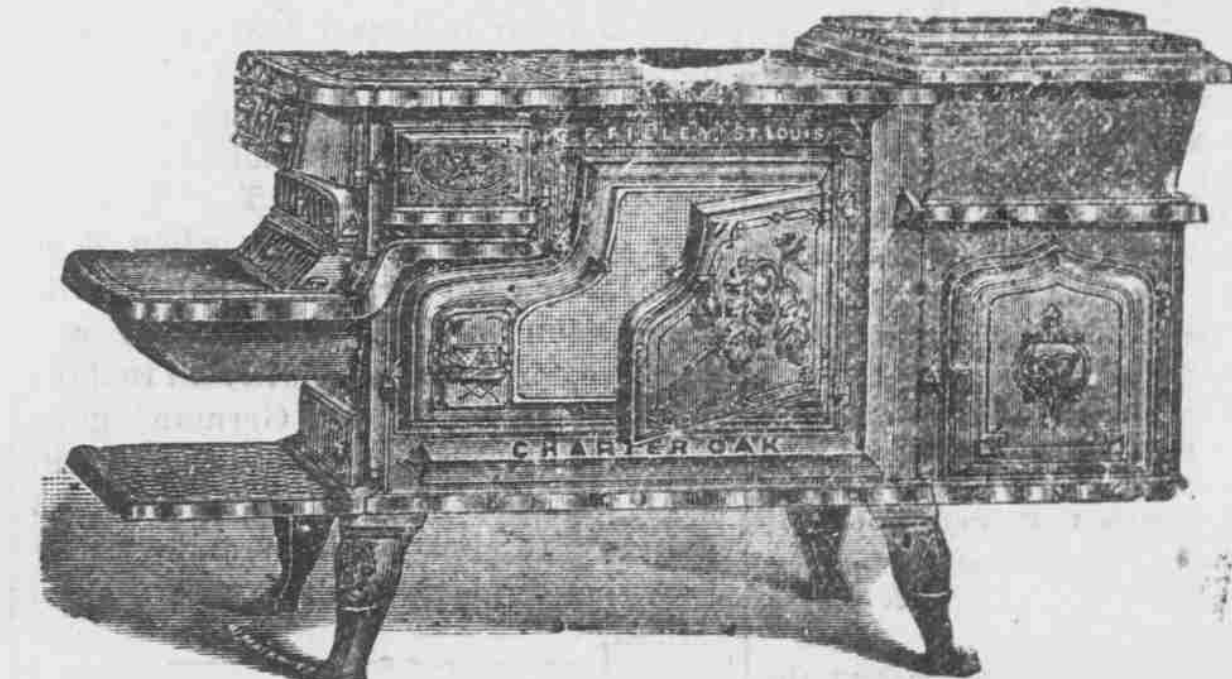
