MONDAY : : : November 9th. NATIONAL CHARITIES.

There is no higher proof of advanced civilization than is given by the foundation of institutions for the cure and maintenance of the sick, indigent and helpless. There are countries in which neither Government nor private individuals or associations make any effort to minister to the wants of suffering humanity. But these are not Christian countries, neither are they high in the scale of nations. China, which is in some respects unique as a national entity, having systemized human industrial energy in a way that no other nation has ever done, or probably will do, is almost entirely wanting in provision for the care of sick and destitute. When men and women cease to be useful they are no longer considered of any account, and receive no special attention or care from any one. Hence it happens that China has become the home of leprosy, because no attempt has been made to segregate the diseased, or to improve their general health by care, liberal regimen and medical treatment. Were it otherwise, that fell disease might have been stamped out in China centuries ago, just as it was stamped out in Europe by the complete isolation of lepers, rigorously enforced by Church and State. But instead, China is the great reservoir of human rotteness, which is contaminating all the dark skinned races of the world with which Chinese come into contact, whose vital energy is lower than their own. And therefore we conclude that although there may have been a disease somewhat akin to leprosy upon these Islands before the advent of the Chinese, the later development of the fierce and consuming leprosy which has smitten the Hawaiian people is undoubtedly traceable to them. Chinamen carry it with them wherever they go, and doubtless communicate it, under favoring conditions, to those with whom they are brought in contact.

The outbreak of leprosy on these Islands has been a serious drawback upon national prosperity, as well as a heavy charge upon public and private charity. Indeed, owing to the great natural affection of the native race, it has been an onerous burden upon them in a special degree. Unlike the Chinese, when a member of a Hawaiian family falls sick all the friends and relatives become personally interested. There is no turning the helpless ones out of doors to perish like a dog. They are cared for tenderly and nursed till death ends their affliction. But when that affliction takes the form of leprosy, and the victim is isolated from his more fortunate fellows, the individual alone is not withdrawn from the active duties of life. It may be the husband; if so, the wife accompanies him. It may be the wife; in that case the husband accompanies her, and with the heads of families go the children. This is shown in a very forcible manner by the state of things at the Leper Settlement on Molokai, recently described in the ADVERTISER.

It follows, therefore, that the spread of leprosy in these Islands has been a very serious economic drawback to the native people, thereby creating public burdens which would not otherwise exist. But the country has done its duty well and nobly in the heavy trial it has been called upon to bear. Not only has it provided hospitals and medical attendants for the treatment of ordinary disease, caring also for the poor and destitute, but it has made elaborate provision for the isolation, care and scientific treatment of lepers. This has been done to ameliorate the condition of these unfortunate, because medical science has as yet failed to effect a cure in any case at least in these Islands. But now an attempt is being made to strike at the root of the plague by separating the female children of leper parents, who are not diseased, from those who are so afflicted, and endeavoring, by means of liberal regimen, proper exercise, cleanliness and careful mental and moral training, to give tone to body and mind and prepare the individuals so treated to resist or throw off the disease if it has attacked them.

This is the object of the Kapiolani Home for leper girls, the latest and perhaps the noblest of all our national charities, which is to be formally opened by their Majesties the King and Queen to-day, a description of which appears elsewhere. The Kakaako Branch Hospital and Kapiolani Home occupy five acres of land, leased from Princess Ruth in 1880, through the medium of Princess Liliuokalani, the King's sister and Her Apparent. When leased it was a salt marsh, but it has been converted into dry ornamental ground, approached by a good road from the Immigration Depot. The Branch Hospital was opened December 12, 1881, when forty-eight lepers were ad-

mitted. Six Sisters of Charity, with the Mother Superior of the Convent of St. Anthony, Syracuse, N. Y., arrived November 8, 1883, of whom three went on to the Waiuku Hospital, Maui, where one of them died. The Mother Superior and three Sisters remained here; and on April 22, 1885, four Sisters from the same Convent arrived by the Alameda to help on the good work. In the Kapiolani Home they will have far more promising material to work upon than in the Branch Hospital, and it is the hope and wish of all that they be eminently successful.

LOCAL AND GENERAL.

Colonel Z. S. Spaulding, of Kealia, Kanai, is in town.

The Y. M. C. A. bookkeeping class meets this evening at 7:30 o'clock.

The Oceanic steamship Mariposa is due at noon to-day from San Francisco.

A clean docket was recorded at the Police Court on Saturday morning.

There will be a meeting of Pacific Hose Company at 7:30 o'clock this evening.

The missionary barkentine Morning Star will leave at the end of the week for the South Seas.

Work on the woodwork of the second steeple for the Kaunakapili Church is progressing.

Messrs. Lewis & Co. expect fresh fish, fruits and vegetables by the Mariposa to-day. Leave orders early.

The steam roller will be at work on Merchant street, between Fort and Nuuanu streets, to-day. Owners of teams should take notice.

Merchants and others should remember that the steamer Kinan leaves this afternoon at 4 o'clock for Maui and Hawaii and the Volcano.

The sloop Sarah was offered at auction on Saturday by Messrs. E. P. Adams & Co. It was bought by Mr. Charles Phillips for \$112. His Majesty the King attended the sale.

We are glad to state that Captain A. B. Hayley is so far convalescent as to leave by the Kinan this afternoon for Waikapu, Maui, where he will be the guest of Mr. W. H. Cornwall.

The matinee performance at the circus Saturday afternoon was well attended, and in the evening the house was crowded in every part. The stepphase, as usual, caused great excitement.

There was some trouble at the Chinese Theater on Saturday evening between two Chinese. One of them had a knife in his hand, but, fortunately, did not use it. A warrant has been taken out for his arrest.

Any one wishing to send articles for the missionaries at Micronesia should leave them to-morrow at the residence of Mrs. Dickson, Beretania street, and they will be packed and forwarded by the Morning Star.

Mrs. Jules Tavernier and sister leave by the Kinan this afternoon to join Mr. Tavernier at Hilo for a few weeks. Tavernier writes he will have an exhibition of his work at King's art gallery about New Year's Day.

From now up to February next included, the evening religious service (benefaction of the Blessed Sacrament) at the Roman Catholic Cathedral will take place at 4 p. m., instead of 4:30 p. m. All other services as usual.

It commenced to rain quite heavily last evening about six o'clock and continued so throughout the evening. It had the effect of somewhat thinning the attendance at the different churches. The rain was very acceptable and will do a great deal of good.

The season of the Royal Australian Circus is drawing to a close, and those who have not already witnessed the excellent performance should do so without delay. This evening a special programme will be given, consisting of the choice acts of the company's repertoire.

The sale of awa licenses for the Island of Oahu for one year from January 1, 1886, will take place at the front entrance of Aliolioli Hale on Thursday, December 24, at 12 o'clock noon. The upset price for Honolulu will be \$500 each. There are three licenses for this city.

Officers Tell and Dale arrived from Molokai by the steamer James I. Dowsett on Saturday. They took the two leper prisoners Monona and Lohilo, the former being charged with murder, the latter as accomplice, from Katalawo to Lahaina, where they are locked up to await trial at the December term of Court.

Mr. Albert Sala, brother of George Augustus Sala, was married October 17th at Napoopo, Hawaii, to Miss Kanehahini. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. S. H. Davis, rector of South Kona, Hawaii. Mr. Sala is the Government school teacher at Napoopo.

Prince Alex of Kusale, Strong's Island, attended service at Kawaiahao Church yesterday morning, and occupied a seat on the rostrum. The church was filled with a large congregation. The Rev. H. H. Parker delivered an able sermon, after which Prince Alex said the Lord's Prayer in his own native language.

Four bad boys, between the ages of twelve and sixteen years, were brought from Maui on Saturday and taken to the Reformatory School. They were all convicted of larceny at Waiuku, by Police Justice Aholo. Three of them, who were found guilty in the third degree, were committed to the Reformatory School for six years, while the other, the youngest of them, who was convicted in the fourth degree, was committed for six months. They are four bad boys, well known to the police, and the Maui people are glad to get rid of them.

KAPIOLANI HOME.

A Noble Institution to be Dedicated To-day by Her Majesty the Queen.

Description of the Home - A Word About the Branch Hospital - Programme of the Ceremonies.

The formal dedication of Kapiolani Home for the female children of leper parents to-day is an event of more than passing interest. It is the initiation of an experiment in the treatment and cure of leprosy, which will be watched with interest by scientific men and Governments in all parts of the world, more especially in countries where leprosy is established. It is to the credit of the Hawaiian Government and people that this institution has been founded, and especially so that during a period of extreme depression money has been forthcoming for that purpose. The Legislature last session appropriated \$15,000 to build and equip Kapiolani Home, but owing to causes which need not be specified in this place the money was not available, and it became necessary to resort to other methods to raise the requisite amount. Accordingly a subscription list was started, and \$6,575 was subscribed by the inhabitants of Honolulu and vicinity—a very liberal sum, when the frequent calls upon them for charitable purposes is borne in mind. This money is now in course of collection, and will be used to defray the cost of the building and equipment, supplemented by the Treasury.

Their Majesties the King and Queen have taken great interest in the institution, and it is to their unwearied exertions in great measure that the auspicious event of to-day takes place. Queen Kapiolani has been incessant in her efforts to insure the success of this enterprise, the Home being named after Her Majesty as a tribute to her love and sympathy for the afflicted of her own race and sex.

Kapiolani Home has been founded to provide for the care and education of girls, the children of leper parents, or who may themselves be suspected of having leprosy, and who are on that account barred out of public and private schools. It will accommodate fifty inmates, besides the matron, and will be under the supervision and control of the Sisters of Charity, of whom there are now seven, including the Mother Superior attached to the Convent of the Holy Family, which is within the enclosure of the Branch Hospital. Three of the Sisters are also at Waiuku. The Home is a two-story building, on the mauka side of the Branch Hospital, and separated from it by a high fence. The building is 70 feet by 60 feet, and is surrounded by open-railed verandas, 10 feet wide, which furnish a cool and sheltered place for play in all weather. On the ground floor, which is approached by a wide flight of steps to the lower veranda, are two store rooms, an office, class room and refectory. The last two are spacious rooms, well lighted and ventilated, the height of the ceiling being 13 feet 1 inch. A wide flight of stairs on the outside leads to the upper floor, on which are situate two large dormitories, two bath rooms and matron's room. The arrangement of these dormitories deserves mention. The one on the mauka or land side, which is the breeziest, from the prevailing wind, will be occupied by girls who have developed the disease; the other will be occupied by girls who are as yet free from it, but who, having been born of leper parents, may be reasonably suspected of having the disease latent in their blood. There will be no communication between these rooms. Separate closets and baths have been provided for each class of inmates. In this way it is hoped to minimize the risk of contagion, by preventing the clean breathing the same atmosphere with the unclean at night. During the daytime, when there is a free circulation of air, the risk of contagion is so slight that it need hardly be estimated. At the same time it should be stated that no bad case of leprosy will be admitted to the Home, but only such as gives hopes of yielding to cleanliness, wholesome food, moderate exercise and kind and scientific treatment. This is the purpose for which Kapiolani Home has been founded, and if it fulfills its purpose it will have solved what has heretofore been a mystery in the curative treatment of leprosy.

The Home stands upon a plot of made ground, and will be surrounded by a lawn, bordered by flowers and beautified by shade trees. Considerable progress has been made in this work, and on the occasion of the visit of a P. C. ADVERTISER representative to the place, he found a party of prisoners at work leveling, making paths and drives, and otherwise cleaning up under the eyes of the President of the Board of Health, who has been unremitting in his efforts to perfect as far as possible the benevolent designs of their Majesties, the Legislature and the public. Indeed, very few days have passed since the work began without his visiting the Branch Hospital and Home, and the creditable showing which the latter makes, as well as the neat and trim condition of everything about the Hospital and grounds, is due in a great degree to his watchful supervision. Mr. E. E. Mayhew is the contractor, and he has done his work well. The building originally projected was a very modest

structure, at an estimate of \$2,900; but the design was enlarged until the present very creditable structure is the result. A kitchen, 26 feet by 14 feet, and a wash-house are to be built in the Home yard, the purpose being to keep it entirely separate from the hospital. There are closets in the yard for use during the day. THE BRANCH HOSPITAL AND SISTERS OF CHARITY. A notice of this kind would be incomplete were no mention made of the Branch Leper Hospital contiguous to the Home, and the noble Christian work performed therein by the Sisters of Charity. The Branch Hospital was established in 1881, and as in the case of the Leper Settlement at Molokai, it was not well managed at the outset, nor indeed, until after the arrival of the first party of the Sisters two years ago precisely yesterday. It were well to draw a veil over the condition of things at Kakaako up to that date, and it is not the purpose of this article to remove it. The Sisters are of the Order of St. Francis, and came from St. Anthony's Convent, Syracuse, New York, in consequence of representations made by His Excellency Mr. Gibson through the Bishop of Oloha, regarding the deplorable condition of the inmates of the Branch Leper Hospital here. His letter was read by the Mother Superior, and twenty-four noble women, Sisters of Charity indeed, volunteered to leave their native country and dedicate their lives to the loathsome task of nursing and caring for—body and soul—the plague smitten people of these islands. A selection was made from this number with the result already mentioned. The sisters encountered great obstacles in the beginning, but their unwearied kindness and gentleness, combined with firmness, won the day at last, and the leper establishment at Kakaako is now as different an institution in all its aspects from what it was before their advent as night is from day. Their labor, however, is a never-ending one, but they are cordially aided and assisted in their good work by Dr. Webb, the present medical attendant, and the President of the Board of Health, who visit the Hospital daily, and look into all the details of management.

The separation of the sexes is now complete, and it is therefore possible to enforce order and cleanliness with greater ease than formerly. The cottages occupied by the female inmates are neat and clean, the rooms being tastefully ornamented in several instances. Cleanliness and order prevail in the men's department. The grounds are neat and well kept, and in a few years the algaroba trees that are growing will afford grateful shade. The children of both sexes in the Branch Hospital spend most of their time in open air recreation after school hours. They are trained in habits of cleanliness by the Sisters, who appear to have very great influence over the young inmates.

Prayer: By His Lordship the bishop of Oloha. Song: "E Ola ka Moi, 'Long Live the King," by Leper Children, accompanied by the Royal Hawaiian Band. Discourse: By His Excellency Walter M. Gibson, Pres. of the Board of Health. Song: "Hoe a Mau"—(tune: Pull for the Shore), by Leper Children, accompanied by the Royal Hawaiian Band. Presentation: To Queen Kapiolani—as Lady Patroness—of the Keys of the Home, when Her Majesty will declare the institution opened. Delivery of Keys: By Her Majesty, to the Reverend Mother Superior in charge of the Branch Hospital.

Hymn: "The Hawaiian Lepers' Hymn"—Hawaiian version composed by His Majesty the King—arranged to music by Prof. H. Berger, and sung by Leper Children, accompanied by the Royal Hawaiian Band. The Almighty's chastening hand, A sore affliction sends; But trusting still we feel His wrath with mercy blends.

The Christ—His blessed Son The Lepers' woe did feel; He touched the unclean sores Th' incurable did heal.

Ascended to His Throne He sees us from above. Feels for our woes and sends His Messengers of Love.
