THE COINAGE CASE.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—The Daily P. C. Advertiser, in reviewing the decision of the full Court in the Government Bond case, implies that the government has been successful in the case.

The fact is that every point of law involved was decided in favor of the petitioners and against the government, except the technical point as to whether the remedy should be mandamus or injunction. This was a mooted point; different members of the bar holding conflicting views in regard to it. The counsel for the government did not agree upon it among themselves; and the Chief Justice in his decision on the first hearing held that mandamus was the remedy. But in the final decision the full Court have held that injunction is the remedy; the Chief Justice thus overruling himself.

When such "success" as this is all the government can find to comfort themselves with, grounds for comfort must be in demand. The government has met with a direct and seathing rebuke, and acts which it avowed it was about to perform are denounced by the Supreme Court of the Kingdom as "illegal." For such a result to be treated lightly shows how reckless the government is.

WORKING MEN.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—You stated the other day that one of the speakers at the Working Men's meeting said, "Here working men only exist." I understand this to mean that the lot of a working man here is a hard one. If I have put the right construction on the sentence, then I think the speaker was wrong. Having had experience as a working man in several other countries, I ought to be able to draw a comparison between

the condition of working men there and here, and I must confess that Honolulu appears to me somewhat of a working man's paradise. Here a working man's hours are not long and his wages are good; and employers, as a rule, are not given to pressing their employees to the full extent of their strength. A working man who is economical can live in moderate comfort and save something out of his wages for a rainy day. I could name some men among my acquaintances, who came here a few years ago moneyless, and have worked for wages ever since, and have to-day quite a pile of cash placed at interest. Besides, I think the majority of my conferees will bear me out in saying that most employers in Honolulu treat their men with more consideration than they would receive in many other countries. They associate and converse with them in a friendly way as fellow men and equals. The servant has not to approach his master with fear and trembling, as an inferior being. "Jack is as good as his master," is truer here than any other place I have had experience of. Such is the testimony of A WORKING MAN.

ISLAND NEWS.

HONOLULU, H. I., FRIDAY, JANUARY 4, 1884.

THE JAVA DISASTER.

Boston, December 7.—The bark William H. Besse and the ship Anahuac arrived this morning, the former from Manila and the latter from Calcutta. The Besse had a voyage of 195 and the Anahuac 139 days. Captain Baker of the Besse says his bark was directly in the vicinity of Anjer, Java, at the time of the terrible disaster which killed thousands and changed the face of land in and around Sunda straits. He left Batavia on August 16th, and on the following morning at daylight those on deck noticed a heavy bank of clouds rising from the west and obscuring the sun. At the same time the barometer dropped to 29.40 and again suddenly rose to 30.70. All hands were called and sail was taken off as fast as possible. Heavy showers of sand and ashes then commenced falling, completely covering the decks, masts and spars to a depth of several inches. By noon it had grown darker than the darkest night and began to blow a hurricane, but, strange to say, the sea remained perfectly smooth. Heavy rumblings, like distant thunder, were continually heard, and at intervals the sky was lighted up by lightning flashes. A strong smell of sulphur permeated the atmosphere and made it difficult to breathe. All hands were affected by this awful scene, and many of the sailors thought the world was coming to an end. Throughout the gale the tide set strongly to the westward and the bark drove through the water at the rate of fourteen knots an hour. At 3 p.m. the sky commenced to grow lighter, but the ashes continued to fall like snow.

On the following day the bark entered the straits of Sunda and the extent of damage done was plainly to be seen. Whole islands had sunk and those that remained had changed in form. The north western part of Krakatia island had disappeared and Verelatin and Lang islands, heretofore covered with trees, were completely bare. The sailors saw a very large number of dead bodies. The water for miles was covered with trees and corpses. The sea for 600 miles was a field of lava. They experienced a hurricane from the north-northeast, with a tremendous sea, which lasted three days. During this time the decks and cabin were flooded with water and a portion of the bulwarks and everything moveable on deck was washed away. "The most fearful thing of all," said the Captain, "was the sea of corpses. For nearly three days we came across body after body of persons who had lost their lives in the earthquake. One man counted sixty in plain sight at once. Thousands must have perished."—S. F. Chronicle.

OPPOSITION TO PROHIBITION.

"Yes," said the Widow Flapjack, who is chief executive officer of an Austin boarding house, "yes, I must say I am very much opposed to prohibition and closing up the saloons, and all that sort of thing. It's all a base scheme against the best interests of the hotel keepers and landladies."

"Why, I am surprised to hear you express such unchristian sentiments, and you a church member, too. How do you make out that prohibition is against the interest of the landladies?"

"If prohibition goes into effect all the saloons will be closed up and then all the free lunches will stop. Now, I've noticed that among my young men boarders the dissipated ones are the most profitable. Before they come to dinner they always step into the saloon and get a sour beer or a schooner of toddy, or something of that kind, and they fill up on the free lunch, and when they come to the dinner table they don't eat hardly anything, while the steady young men who never drink just gorge themselves. O, my, you ought to see 'em eat! They just take the profits off, and if it wasn't for the free lunches and the 'next morning' feeling that some of the borders suffer from occasionally I don't know what we poor landladies would do. There'd be no profit in the business. Yes, I am opposed to prohibition for purely economical reasons."

And the Widow Flapjack sighed, and went out and gave orders to cut the pies into seven pieces instead of six.

AUSTRALIAN EXPLORERS.

Someone years ago wrote, "Fortes virore ante Agamemnon," and substituting post for ante, it stands good to the present hour. Poor Giles and young Shirley, one of the lost ones, recognising the extremity of the situation, shook hands, and solemnly agreed that the survivor (if either) should "break the news" to the mother of the other. One can hardly realise the grand solemnity of such a pious compact in the wild bush, with the remorseless sun drying the life out of them! On the survivor Giles the sad task devolved, and his first attention on being rescued was to carry out his dead comrade's instructions. Who shall say after that the glorious Anglo-Saxon has deteriorated with his transplantation to a southern soil, either in courage, fidelity, or filial piety?—Society.

The entire Pacific Coast Congressional delegation has indorsed Mr. Boruck's suggestion for a World's Fair in San Francisco in 1887, and has notified Governor Stoneman of the fact of their unanimity. It is, therefore, entirely probable that the idea will receive Federal sanction and probably liberal Government aid. As we have reiterated, the first step to be taken is to make our exhibits at the New Orleans World's Fair, in 1884, especially representative, full and attractive. Any failure in that respect will prove a death blow to the scheme for 1887. Steps to properly present California's products at New Orleans should be taken without any further delay. We renew the suggestion that the commercial bodies of our chief cities and State Board of Agriculture call a council, to meet in the first fortnight of the new year, to consider the question of ways and means.—Exchange.

Few queerer stories have been told about the navy of late years than that of the accident to the Royal Albert, at Plymouth, last Friday. If the story is true, the vessel in question was all but sunk through the leaving open of a valve in connection with the engine room. Almost as soon as the mischief was discovered, she had ten feet of water in her hold, and was beginning to settle down. The accident is precisely identical with that in the funny parody of Tom Bowling—"Punch's, I think—in which poor Jack Stoker "left the valve unstopped." Of course the story concludes with the usual official sarcasm—"an inquiry had been ordered." What a lot of light these inquiries must throw on the mysteries of modern seamanship!—Life.
