The "Freedman" is a new topic, treating of the negro question is just creating a sensation throughout the country and this has drawn public attention more to the Hampton School where the problem of elevating the blacks is being wrought out. The General says that now at last "the mountain is coming to Mahomet," for the frequent visits to his school of those who wish to see for themselves and who are able to contribute to its support make his periodical tours for money less necessary.

The General is about making a visit to the land of his birth. You may expect him by the steamer of the 12th of June. Twenty years absence will show him many changes, but you will see the heart warm towards his Island home. If he succeeds in inspiring among you something of his own enthusiasm in the work of elevating the dark skinned races his vacation mission will not have been a failure.

I have said nothing as yet about recitations. Sufficient of the various branches of knowledge are to turn out graduates capable of being efficient school teachers for the colored population of this country. Latin, Greek, French or German are not taught here but the English is in a most thorough manner.

The school assemblies morning and evening for prayers where a most agreeable feature is the singing not only of the "Gospel Songs" but also the old plantation hymns which the religious nature of the negro under the old regime inspired. I don't know if I have been more moved than by the plaintive strains of "Swing low, sweet chariot" and "View de Land."

At evening prayers the General is accustomed to talk plainly to the students on such of the common topics of life as circumstances press upon his attention.

On Sunday evening I addressed them on missionary work in the Pacific and never spoke to a more attentive or interesting audience. My letter is long enough but I have not said all I want to.

The Legislature.

FOURTEENTH DAY, MONDAY, MAY 17.

PETITIONS.

By Mr. Gibson, from Lahaina, that a bridge be built across the stream of Kapunua.

By Mr. Philipo, from North Kona, that no liquor license be allowed for North Kona, and that no liquor be allowed to be sold to other nationalities that have no treaty relations with us.

By Mr. Keau, from Honolulu, that the sum of \$200 be appropriated for the road at Puwa, Honolulu.

By Mr. Nawahi, from Hamakua, that no liquor license be allowed for Hamakua.

By Mr. Kaai, from South Kona, that \$15,000 be set apart for the parents of large families, and that fishery rights be free.

By Mr. Mahoe, from Puna, that all laborers under all circumstances should be allowed to cease work at 12 M. on Saturday every week.

By Mr. Mahoe, from Puna, that the importation and sale of opium be licensed.

The Judiciary Committee to whom was referred the bill introduced by Mr. Kuli-kuli, relating to elections, reported that the bill should be returned to the introducer, to amend some defects in wording. Adopted.

The Judiciary Committee to whom was referred the petition from Hilo, that a liquor license be not granted for Hilo and that no natives be allowed to drink, reported that the House have indefinitely postponed a bill to this effect and asked that the petition be tabled. Adopted.

The Finance Committee, to whom was referred the resolution introduced by the member from North Kona, that the sum of \$5 be returned to Kiu, who was double taxed, reported favorably and asked that the sum should be returned. Adopted.

The Minister of Foreign Affairs replied to the resolution introduced by the member from Lahaina the other day relating to ocean cables, and said that this morning he received a letter from our Minister Resident at Washington, stating that he was on his way to see Mr. C. W. Field on this subject. He further stated that when Mr. Green was Minister of Foreign Affairs then a company proposed to lay the cable via these islands but failed on account of the failure of the Glasgow bank.

Mr. Kaulani read a resolution that the monument of Kamehameha I. be placed in the front and on the main side of Alimoham Hale, just where the kamahele tree now stands. Passed.

Mr. Keau gave notice of a bill to regulate the importation of Chinese and a bill to amend Section 25 of the Penal Code.

Mr. Keau gave notice of a bill to amend Section 28 of the Civil Code. On suspension of the rules the bill was read for the first time and passed under the rule.

Mr. Hanson read for the first time a bill to amend the law relating to tax on animals and to amend Sections 461 and 467 of the Civil Code. Passed under the rule.

Mr. Nawahi read a resolution asking whether the Minister of Finance had any rule forbidding the landing of foreign vessels at a certain port in this kingdom to which the same vessel had a permit to land her freight.

The Attorney General replied on behalf of the Minister of Finance, and said that no foreign vessel would land except at a port of entry.

Mr. Kaulani gave notice of the following bills: first, a proposed amendment to Article 36 of the Constitution relating to the pay of representatives; second, to amend Section 480 of the Civil Code; and third, to amend Section 29 of Chapter 41 of the Penal Code.

On suspension of the rules the proposed amendment to Article 36 of the Constitution was read for the first time and passed under the rule.

On further suspension of the rules the bill to amend Section 480 of the Civil Code was read and passed under the rule.

ORDER OF THE DAY.

The bill to regulate the sale of opium was read a third time and passed.

The bill to amend Section 2 Chapter 41 of the Penal Code was read a second time and passed to amendment.

The bill to amend Section 1 Chapter 41 of the Penal Code was read a second time and on motion was laid on the table to be brought up again after two weeks.

The bill to amend Section 1 Chapter 30 of the Penal Code relating to the Board of Health was read a second time. Referred to a Special Committee consisting of Messrs. Nalaka, Gibson, Kipapa, Wilder and Harawa.

The bill to amend Section 47 of the session law of 1878, making nine hours a day's work and to pay 10 cents for every hour over, was read a second time and referred to a Special Committee consisting of Messrs. Liliakoa, Kaka, Kamehameha, Wood and Philipo.

FIFTEENTH DAY, TUESDAY, MAY 18.

PETITIONS.

By Mr. Wahine, from Hilo, that the book kept now used by the boards to the Konoiki be returned.

By Mr. Keau, from Honolulu, express wagon drivers, that the rules for the regulations of hacks be changed.

By Mr. Kamehameha, from Kailua, that the government do not take the water rights from the people of that valley.

By Mr. Gibson, from the Chinese residents, that one-half of the amount paid by the Chinese to the support of the Queen's Hospital as passengers tax be set apart for building a hospital for them.

By the Minister of the Interior, from Kailua, that a road be laid there.

By Mr. Philipo, from Hilo, that the sum of \$200 be paid to him as his withdrawn pay while he was a mail carrier for Oahu.

The petitions were all referred to the proper Committees.

The majority of the Judiciary Committee, to whom was referred the petition setting aside the election of the member from Kailua, recommended that the House decide upon what they think best.

After some discussion the report was indefinitely postponed and the member was declared duly elected.

Mr. Martin gave notice of a bill to amend the law regulating contracts between masters and servants. Passed under the rule.

Mr. Keau read for the first time a bill to amend the 10th article of the Constitution. Passed under the rule.

Mr. Baker gave notice of a bill to amend Section 181 of the Civil Code. On suspension of the rules the bill was read for the first time and passed under the rule.

Mr. Nawahi gave notice of a bill to amend Section 184 of the Civil Code.

Mr. Kaulani read for the first time a bill to amend Section 29 of Chapter 41 of the Penal Code.

ORDER OF THE DAY.

The bill to amend Sections 1188, 1189, and 1190 of the Civil Code, was read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill to regulate the practice of law in this kingdom was read a second time and ordered to be engrossed.

The bill to regulate the sale of opium was read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill to amend Section 1419 of the Civil Code was read a second time and during the discussion the House adjourned.

SIXTEENTH DAY, WEDNESDAY, MAY 19.

PETITIONS.

By Mr. Keau, from Honolulu, that the sum of \$1,000 be appropriated for a bridge at Maunaloa.

By Mr. Wahine, from Hilo, that additional importations of South Sea Islanders be granted.

RESOLUTIONS.

The Minister of Interior read a resolution that Thursday May 20 be set apart as a day for this House to consider the question of South Sea Immigration. Passed.

Mr. Keau gave notice of a bill to amend Section 1 Chapter 41 of the Penal Code, relating to government lands.

Mr. Glendon gave notice of a bill to amend Section 467 of the Civil Code.

Mr. Wilson read a resolution that the sum of \$50,000 be appropriated for the establishment of hospitals on all the Islands.

Mr. Kamehameha read a resolution that the Minister of the Interior be requested to report in writing about the \$20,000 borrowed by the President of the Board of Immigration. Tabled to be considered to-morrow.

Mr. Kaka read a resolution that the sum of \$4,000 be set apart for a saw at Waiala, Kona, and \$600 for the keeper thereof.

Mr. Gibson read for the first time a bill to put a tax on the property of deceased persons, whose value is more than \$1,000.

Mr. Keau gave notice of a bill to sell no more government lands.

Mr. Buckley read a resolution that the sum of \$1,000 be appropriated for a boy, chain and anchor at Puwa. Tabled.

Mr. Martin gave notice of a bill to regulate the tax on contracted laborers.

Mr. Wood read a resolution that \$2,000 be appropriated for a Court House at North Kohala. The Minister of Interior pointed out that this had been provided for.

ORDER OF THE DAY.

The bill to amend Section 1419 of the Civil Code was brought up for consideration and was referred to a Special Committee consisting of Messrs. Kaulani, Kaka, Attorney General, Parker and Judd.

The proposed amendment to Article 30 of the Constitution was read a second time and laid on the table till the introducer was present.

The bill to regulate the importation of opium was read by its title and was referred to a Special Committee, consisting of Messrs. Wilcox, Nawahi, Keau, Kaka, and the Attorney General.

The bill to regulate the carrying of Chinese passengers among these Islands was read.

During the discussion the House took a recess. On re-assembling at 1 P. M. the bill was indefinitely postponed.

The bill allowing laborers to be free was read and on motion was indefinitely postponed, 22 yeas and 18 noes.

SEVENTEENTH DAY, THURSDAY, MAY 20.

The report of the Special Committee to whom was referred the subject of immigration, was tabled.

The report of the Judiciary Committee to whom was referred the petition relating to the Board of Health reported, was on motion ordered to be printed.

The Special Committee to whom was referred the bill making the masters pay their laborers 10 cents for each day every hour over work, reported that the bill be indefinitely postponed. Adopted.

The Special Committee to whom was referred the resolution relating to the advisability of erecting a barrier on the wharves of this city reported that the resolution be indefinitely postponed. Adopted.

Mr. Nawahi read for the first time a bill to amend Section 384 of the Civil Code, which was referred.

Mr. Kuli-kuli read for the first time a bill to regulate the candidacy of judges, tax collectors and assessors as representatives which was referred.

Mr. Kaulani gave notice of the following bills: to amend Section 780 of the Civil Code and to regulate the sitting of the Circuit Court.

On suspension of the rules the bill to amend Section 780 of the Civil Code was read and passed under the rule.

The House took a recess, and on re-assembling at 1 P. M. Mr. Keau gave notice of a bill to amend Section 388 of the Civil Code.

Mr. Kaulani read a resolution that the Judiciary Committee be instructed to make their report in regard to the bill introduced by him, relating to the school money. During the debate, the House proceeded to the

ORDER OF THE DAY.

The Minister of Interior moved that the subject, immigration, which had been set down for this day, be laid on the table till the Finance Committee present their report. Carried.

The bill to amend Sections 1410, 1411, 1413, 1420 and 1421 of the Civil Code was read a second time and laid on the table.

The bill to repeal Section 294 of the Civil Code was read a second time and ordered to be engrossed.

The bill to regulate contracts between masters and servants, which was approved in 1878, was read a second time and referred to a Special Committee consisting of Messrs. Baker, Nawahi, Kaka, Attorney General and Martin.

The proposed amendment to Article 30 of the Constitution was read a second time and was indefinitely postponed.

The proposed amendment to Article 36 of the Constitution was read a second time and indefinitely postponed.

Under suspension of the rules Mr. Philipo read a resolution that the Sergeant-at-Arms be requested to provide carriages for all the members of the Assembly on Saturday noon to enable them to visit the different government buildings and the artisan well at Makiki. Carried.

EIGHTEENTH DAY, FRIDAY, MAY 21.

PETITIONS.

By Mr. Kamehameha, from Honolulu, that leper hospital be established on every Islands; that the parents of large families be exempt from taxes; that the sale of government lands be tabued. Referred.

Mr. Wahine read a resolution that \$5,000 be appropriated for widening and repairing the Lock Up at Hilo. Tabled.

On motion of Mr. Abolo the credentials of the member elect from Ewa and Waianae was referred to the Judiciary Committee.

Mr. Kamehameha gave notice of a bill to amend Article 61 of the Constitution. By the same gentleman, a resolution asking \$1,000 for the road at Waianua, Hamakua.

Mr. Kaulani gave notice of a bill to amend the butcher law.

Mr. Kaulani read for the first time a bill to make the Circuit Courts of Hawaii sit at Hilo, Waimea, and Waiohinu. Passed under the rule.

Mr. Wood read a resolution that \$1,000 be appropriated for the road from Kawahine to Waiau.

Mr. Philipo read a resolution that foreigners and natives' letters be delivered at the same time from the Post Offices and that the Minister of Interior instruct the Postmaster to this effect. Adopted.

Mr. Nalaka read a resolution that the Editor of the Hawaiian Gazette be summoned to appear before the bar of this House and to answer who was the writer of the article insulting this House which appeared on the 19th of May.

The House after a long debate, indefinitely postponed the resolution.

On suspension of the rules the Judiciary Committee, to whom was referred the credentials of the member from Ewa & Waianae, reported that they found the credentials in due form and recommended that the member be sworn in. Adopted.

Mr. Hanson read a resolution that \$700 be appropriated for the landing at Punahoa, Hana. Tabled.

ORDER OF THE DAY.

The bill to amend Section 6 of the law, providing a Hawaiian Board of Health and approved June 25, 1878, was read a second time and during the debate the House took a recess.

On re-assembling at 1 P. M. the bill was referred to the same Special Committee to whom was referred the bill regulating a new Board of Health.

The bill to amend Section 29 of the law relating to the laying of railroads, and which was approved in 1878, was read a second time and indefinitely postponed.

The bill to repeal Section 1 of the law to amend the animal tax, and also Sections 461 and 467 of the Civil Code, and which were approved in 1870, was read a second time and was laid on the table to be taken up with the bill introduced by the Attorney General.

The bill to amend Section 29 Chapter 41 of the Penal Code was read a second time and was laid on the table.

The bill to put a tax on the property of deceased persons was read a second time and rejected.

NINETEENTH DAY, SATURDAY, MAY 22.

Mr. Kaulani moved that the bill to put a tax on the property of deceased persons be reconsidered. Passed.

PETITIONS.

By Mr. Hanson, from Hana, that a law to borrow \$1,000,000 be enacted.

By Mr. Kaka, from Hanalei, that the \$10,000,000 loan be granted.

By Mr. Glendon, from Makawao, that \$300 be appropriated for the road at Makua.

By Mr. Kaka, from Hanalei, that \$1,500 be appropriated from Hanalei to Kainalana.

By Mr. Kaulani, from Waiala, that the \$10,000,000 loan bill be not enacted.

All petitions were referred to the proper Committees.

Mr. Hanson read a resolution that the secretary of the Board of Education be requested to pay to Mr. D. Keaganahahi the sum of \$345. Referred to a Special Committee consisting of Messrs. Kipapa, Hanson and Kaka.

Mr. Kaulani read a resolution that the sum of \$5,000 be appropriated for a bridge at Waimea. Tabled.

Mr. Nalaka read a resolution that the sum of \$5,000 be appropriated for compiling all amendments of the Civil and Penal Codes and to supply each member with a copy of the same. Returned.

Mr. Kaka read a resolution that the Legislature do not sit on Monday next, the same being Queen Victoria's birthday. Passed.

Mr. Kamehameha read a resolution that the sum of \$800 be appropriated for a Court House and Lock Up at Waimea and Ewa. Tabled.
