## TO OBSERVE NEUTRALITY.

Japanese Consul General Miki Saito's letter of warning to the people of his country resident here is timely and should be heeded by them. Wishing to keep the neutrality of these Islands inviolate, he warns them in the following language:

"I hereby request, with all the earnestness in my power, that the Japanese in this country may be orderly and quiet in all things. It is especially desirable at this time that laborers on the plantations should be reasonable, diligent and obedient to the proper authorities, and in no case to strike or be disorderly in any sense.

"Again I must impress upon you and upon your patriotism and love for your native country so that you will be an honor and not a disgrace to Japan."

## To Purify Party Machinery.

The anticipated changes in the complexion of the Republican Territorial Central Committee we believe to be in the right direction. It is just what it should be, that all Government officials should be excluded. The movement is being urged by good and staunch men in the second of the Fourth for the wholesale purging of the Committee from being in the control of office-holders and incidentally, the Government. We earnestly hope that they will succeed in the attempt at purification of party council, and thereby, its machinery. We are and have always been averse to office-holders being in politics, although we do not deny them the right of thinking and acting for themselves like what all good citizens should do, but for them to control a party's machinery, it is abominable and pernicious, because they are paid by the taxpayers, and yet they undertake to do the taxpayers up and keep on doing it in their own interests. We sincerely hope that John A. Hughes will succeed in having adopted what he wishes to carry through at the meeting tomorrow evening of his precinct club and in favor of a "new primary plan."

## Its Political Complexion.

Yesterday's Star made a dissection of the political complexion of the Federal grand jury now sitting in special session. It, therefore, has accordingly made it fifteen Republicans, five Democrats, one Home Ruler and one doubtful. But as far as we are concerned, there should be no doubtful one, and from our view of those sworn, they consist of fifteen Republicans and seven Democrats. The one credited as a Home Ruler is not one now, although he was once; but once upon a time in the remote past, he became a turn-over Republican, is an employee of the Morning Kicker and a participant from its office, probably by special order of the manager, in the Business Men's parade on the last Saturday noon before election day. Those given as Democrats are known as out and out Democrats, but we claim two more Democrats, unless we are badly mistaken. But their political complexion is neither here nor there, for they were not called to do politics, still we believe that they will try to do it even there. Their duty is to investigate the matter in hand, that of the illegal practices employed on election day, fearlessly and with justice to all concerned, regardless of any political affiliation whatsoever. Its two to one in favor of Republican.

## Looks Like Fleece Game.

Senator Achi stated yesterday that in the matter of the sale under foreclosure proceedings of his Kona ranch and plantation property, the Circuit Court ordered the sale while the property was in the receiver's hands and before a report had been made by said receiver. He further said that this seemed like a very peculiar proceeding and is the first of the kind ever begun here. If this is really the case, then there must be something very peculiar indeed in all these proceedings. He also said that at one time, an offer was made by a man on his behalf to give a note to square his indebtedness to the mortgagees backed by his per-

sonal security, but was refused, and then to see his property going for only \$13,000 is at most very heart-rending and unsatisfactory. In such an event, we don't blame Mr Achi for kicking, because it looks like a game to fleece him out so as to gain control of that property to others, which has been shown by the proceedings so far enacted. But that is the Senator's business, and not ours, we having enough troubles of our own than to look after those of others and their affairs.

## TOPICS OF THE DAY.

So Ex Judge Dickey wants a juvenile court established. Did he mean it? That was suggested time and time again by THE INDEPENDENT years ago, but no heed was ever taken of it. In making the suggestion now, he must have had an eye to business in being its first judge. He's all right, you bet. His father, one of the holdover Republican Senators, may undertake to do it for his legal son. We wish the son every success in his efforts for our young, and the same to the father if he will see to its going through by its being taken up by the next Legislature.

"Prophet" Dowie, of Zion City, fame, "has paid off his indebtedness," so stated a dispatch yesterday. If he has really succeeded in squaring all his debts, he is most assuredly a wonderful man and financier. We only wish that he could give the secret of his success in manipulating to our Secretary "Jack," now in New York on a financing expedition. Do show him the way, please, old man, so that he could come home and show us the way out of financial difficulties and complications. That would be fine, indeed.

When our only "Jack the Jollier," the respectable, left here hurriedly on his junketing trip after another loan of a million dollars, he undoubtedly went away on the former successful financial reputation of his chief. So far as now known, the Jollier has fairly well succeeded, but, kiddish like, he jumps at conclusions too soon. And yet, we wish the boy success, as it may result in another venturesome streak towards Republican success the next election. Go it, Jackie, that's a good boy; daddy is growing old every day and has the "shakes" or "shivers," whatever the malady is known by.

About two years ago THE INDEPENDENT exposed the *quid pro quo* transactions between Senator Achi and the then Superintendent of Public Works, Henry E. Cooper, since retired to private life and now a practicing attorney. Elsewhere is a statement given us by Senator Achi and is a leak as regards that transaction, when he admits getting the best of the Government then, and would do it again and every time, if given the chance. And who wouldn't? That's an instance in which Achi, a member of the Senate, got the best of Cooper as an official, but now as an attorney, the latter is employed to do up the former.

No meeting of the Board of Health this afternoon.

Prof A Marques has resigned the leadership of the Honolulu Symphony Club.

Tonight's band concert will be at the Moana Hotel, Waikiki, beginning at 7:30 o'clock.

Mrs D McConnell has moved from No 9 Carden Lane to No 1223 Emma street. Furnished rooms.

The Likelike arrived this morning and will be out again this evening, at 5 o'clock, for Molokai and Maui.

The steamer Aorangi arrived this morning from the Colonies and leaves at 3:30 o'clock this afternoon for Vancouver.

The vacant lot fronting the Young hotel is being planted with manie grass, which was begun yesterday by prison labor.

In crossing the Kaula Oahu channel last night, the Mikahala encountered strong north-east winds and moderate seas.

The American-Hawaiian steamship Nevada left San Francisco yesterday and is due to arrive here on the 21st instant with mail and freight.

The office of THE INDEPENDENT is in the brick building next to the Hawaiian hotel grounds on Bereahia street, Waikiki of Alakea. First floor.

Briefs in the habeas corpus case on behalf of Mrs Mikala Kaipu, held by the Board of Health as a leper, were filed in the Federal Court yesterday afternoon.

The Iwalani, Capt Geo Piltz, will probably get away for Midway on Saturday. She expects to receive 200 tons of freight by the Alameda and has already taken in a similar amount, making 400 tons in all that she will take down.

The two Tantalus lots of Fred Harrison recently bought by R C A Peterson turn out to have been on an order of Olive Davies. They are alongside of two acres already owned by Mr Davies, who now has a good sized lot with two more acres added.

So the two jackasses, some of Kona's nightingales, brought down by the Mauna Loa yesterday, are destined for Midway, and are being kept at the Territory stables, under Jim Quinn's care, prior to "deportation" or "transshipment" by the Iwalani.

Work on the Normal school building, which is to occupy the old quarry site at the junction of Lunaliilo, Hackfeld and Quarry streets, has been begun. It will cost about \$45,000, for a three story structure, and is expected to be opened a year hence.

The funeral of the late William Wallace Swinton took place yesterday afternoon from the family residence on Spencer street, interment being at the Makiki cemetery. A detail from Co G, N G H, attended, he being a member of its drum corp.

Following is the inward freight report of the Mikahala, which arrived this morning: 4900 bgs Sugar, 44 bbls Hides, 71 Hides, 12 Wine Casks, 13 bgs Bottles, 12 Sheep, 77 bgs Taro, 45 bgs Rice Bran, 13 bgs Cocoanuts, 12 bbls Poi and 85 pkgs Sundries.

Matsumoto Moritane, the Japanese murderer of the Kaula engineer Glennan, will pay the penalty for his crime tomorrow within Oahu prison, where he is to be hanged by the neck till dead. The Governor says the execution will be carried out unostentatiously, only a few privileged persons being admitted.

WHEN ACHI GOT AHEAD.

Under the caption of a "Contested Ranch Sale," yesterday's Advertiser had the following to say:

"W C Achi, a member of the Senate and of the bar of Hawaii, on the witness stand in court yesterday admitted he had 'got ahead of the Government' in a certain land transaction, adding: 'Everybody got ahead of the Government. I would get ahead of the Government every chance.'"

"J M Mensarrat's examination was concluded, after which W C Achi was called for the contestants. His evidence was intended to show that the lands were sold below their true value. Nearly every question was the subject of objection and exceptions were noted to almost every ruling. When Mr Achi told what he paid for a certain tract Mr Cooper queried, 'That's when you got ahead of the Government?'

"'Everybody got ahead of the Government,' the witness replied; 'I would do it every time I got the chance.'"

Mr Achi feels that he was not fairly reported in all that he stated before Court and so has given us his version. He admits answering as above and further that "when he (Cooper) was Superintendent of Public Works, he made the deal. That's when I got ahead of Mr Cooper and the Government, and would do it every time I got the chance, and so would anybody. I tried to get the same deal through when Mr Boyd was in office, but he hesitated doing. When you (Cooper) got into office, I had the deal closed. Why shouldn't I? Others doing it all the time.

With regard to its being sold below their true value, he said that "a certain gentleman would have given his personal note and security for \$25,000 towards relieving the mortgagees. This person is good for it and more. But the property sold only for \$13,000, much less than what the gentleman would have stood good for."

The sale was confirmed and an appeal noted to the Supreme Court by the contestants.

District Court Doings.

At yesterday's forenoon session, a number of cases went over to other dates. For leaving his horse untied, Lee Saong was only taxed with the costs, \$1; of eleven gamblers, five were reprimanded and discharged, five were fined \$3 each and one \$5; Hanale, for assault and battery on Kamao, had sentence suspended for 30 days, and another suspended sentence was that against Mrs William Orth for selling liquor without a license, which was for thirteen months; James Kawai was fined \$5 for assault. One drunk forfeited \$6 bail and four were assessed as usual.

Forty one cases were on today's calendar and many of them received the usual treatment of going over. Three Hawaiian women charged for malicious injury were discharged; one Porto Rican, for vagrancy, and a Chinaman, for having chee-fa tickets in possession, were nolle prossed; Maoda Aloy was sent to the Reformatory school till July 1, 1905, for playing the truant; Kwai Tong was fined \$8.60 for assaulting David Kailihiwa; two Japanese women had sentence suspended for thirty days each for gambling, the four Japanese men arrested at the same time with them being found guilty and fined \$5 each; Humoku, for being a vag, was sent to jail for four months; Jim Kailianu and Puhia (w), for disturbing the quiet of the night, were both fined, the man \$5 and the woman \$2, the latter being also fined \$3 for being drunk. C K Chow, for common nuisance in hanging out an awning as to endanger others, was fined \$1, but he noted an appeal.

News From Kalaupapa. From the Leper Settlement comes the news that Jno S Wilmington, captain of police, was lately arrested for adultery and fined \$75 and has lost his job in consequence. The woman in the case was fined \$15. Superintendent Mc Veigh is now the acting policeman until a new man is appointed. It is understood that there are many applicants for the place.
