Hawaii has received a \$83,640 Land and Water Conservation Fund grant from the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation to assist the state (Hawaii) in developing the Wainapanapa State Park recreation area, 200 acres of scenic ocean beach shoreline near the eastern tip of Maui Senator Inouye's office announced today.

The project will cost \$167,000 to complete development and Hawaii will match the grant with an equal amount of money.

The project includes construction of roads, parking areas, picnic facilities, trails, campgrounds and family vacation cabins.

Two University of Hawaii professors will receive grants of \$173,900 from the National Science Foundation for research into the human and marine sensory processes, Senator Daniel K. Inouye announced today.

Nobel Prize winner Georg von Beksey and Dr. A. Leonard Diamond, Director of the Laboratory of Sensory Sciences, have received a two year grant beginning November 1, 1967.

The two men will study similarities in the way sense organs in men and marine animals respond to stimulæ and the amplification and inhibitory processes which operate within the sensory apparatus itself. In a joint effort with the Kaiser Foundation Hospital the pair will also study the losses in the ability to sense.

Senator Inouye said, "I am very much interested in the progress of the University of Hawaii's Laboratory of Sensory Sciences. The grant shows the growing respect it has received from the National Science Foundation."

The University of Hawaii today received an additional \$255,732 NASA (National Aeronautics and Space Administration) grant for the continuing development of a lunar-planetary-stellar observatory atop Mauna Kea volcano on the island of Hawaii, according to Senator Daniel K. Inouye.

The University of Hawaii has already been awarded NASA contracts totaling nearly \$2 million on the project which calls for the completion of an observatory with an 84-inch reflecting mirror.

The latest contract award covers the assembly, evaluation and tests of prototype evaluation equipment to be used in an earth satellite.

A \$301,625 urban beautification grant for the City and County of Honolulu was today approved by the Department of Housing and Urban Development, according to Senator Daniel K. Inouye.

Honolulu, Hawaii, has received approval of a \$301,625 Federal grant under the Urban Beautification Program to aid in its county-wide beautification efforts. Announcement was made today by Secretary Robert C. Weaver of the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

The total estimated cost of urban beautification activities in the Honolulu program for the present year is \$1,711,083. Of this amount, \$603,250 represents the city and county's increased annual cost of beautification activities over and above previous annual expenditures for comparable activities. The Federal grant covers 50 percent of this increased amount.

Activities to be undertaken under the new program include an accelerated street tree planting program for beautification of city streets and highways, and improvements such as parking stalls, picnic facilities, general landscaping, better drainage and water systems, and basketball and volleyball courts in such areas as Kahana Bay Beach Park, Kaiona Beach Park, Kamanele Square, and Keana-Pikoiloa Playground.

Federal grants under the Urban Beautification Program are authorized by the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1965. Purpose of the program is to assist communities in providing those amenities that make the urban complex a better place in which to live. Activities such as citywide tree planting, waterfront beautification, and park renovation and improvement are eligible for Federal assistance.

SENATOR DANIEL K. INOUE, D- HAWAII, WILL OPPOSE AN IMMEDIATE U.S. TROOP WITHDRAWAL FROM VIET NAM IN A DEBATE WITH TOP STUDENT SPEAKERS AT THE UNIVERSITY OF SYRACUSE, DECEMBER 7.

THE PROGRAM IS SPONSORED BY THE DEBATE UNION OF SYRACUSE UNIVERSITY AND IS DESIGNED TO GIVE STUDENTS THE OPPORTUNITY TO DEBATE WITH OR QUESTION AND TRADE IDEAS WITH PROMINENT NATIONAL FIGURES.

IN A STUDENT POLL, SENATOR INOUE RANKED FIRST IN A FIELD OF EIGHT U.S. SENATORS AS THE MAN STUDENTS WOULD MOST LIKE TO HAVE FEATURED ON THE PROGRAM.

HE AND TWO STUDENTS WILL TAKE THE AFFIRMATIVE ("It is the opinion of this house that the U.S. should not immediately withdraw its troops from Viet Nam.") IN THE DEBATE WHILE THREE STUDENTS WILL SEEK TO UPHOLD THE CONTENTION THAT A U.S. TROOP WITHDRAWAL SHOULD GET UNDERWAY. THE DEBATE WILL BE CONDUCTED BEFORE A STUDENT BODY OF FROM 500 TO 700 STUDENTS.

"I AM DELIGHTED TO HAVE THIS OPPORTUNITY AND I THINK THE DEBATE UNION OF SYRACUSE UNIVERSITY SHOULD BE COMPLIMENTED FOR DEVELOPING THIS ORIGINAL FORMAT," SENATOR INOUE SAID.
