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

POOR ENCOURAGEMENT.

Hon. S. G. Wilder said in the House this morning that he declined the privilege of supplying Hilo with water, with the restrictions imposed by the House. We do not wonder at it. The honorable gentleman was quite willing to proceed with the undertaking, with the condition that the Government could at any time deemed proper take over the works, at the price of construction, with six per cent, per annum added during the possession of the constructor. This was apparently not satisfactory to the House, and restriction was sought to be tightened. Mr. Wilder declined to go farther. It appears to us that by the action of the House in this matter a desirable enterprise which should be encouraged is being killed.

THE REASON FOR REJECTION.

It is strange that some intelligent gentlemen who write for the public press are slow to recognise the difference between private individuals and public men, in so far as the latter are legitimate subjects of public comment and criticism while the former are not. The same slowness is evinced by the same gentlemen in distinguishing between the public acts and the private lives of public men. Their public acts are legitimate matter of public criticism; their private lives are not, only in so far as they affect their public acts.

Ministers of the Crown and Members of the Legislature are public men, but beyond their offices and the walls of the House, and within the precincts of their social and private life, a public writer should not recognise their existence. That is, it is the true policy of a public writer to be utterly unconscious of public men beyond the position to which their ambition has directed their footsteps.

Judges, lawyers, clergymen, government officials, and many others. are, permanently or on occasions, public men; but they all have a private seclusion, the sacredness of which no public writer has a right to violate, and into which no "gentleman" of the profession will ever stick his pen.

In the legislative hall, in the administrative departments, on the forum, in the halls of justice, in the associations of speculative adventure, and on the printed sheet, the names, the words, the deeds of the actors, are, by the conditions inseparably connected with the paths of glory they have selected, the property of the public, and the target for every newspaper pop-gun. But to follow these same actors from these stages of public action into their private pastimes and home circles, is not within the proper province of a public journal.

The foregoing has been written because of a communication treating of private matters, sent to us for publication, and contains the reason for rejecting the communica-

THE NEW TREATY OR WHO IS

FOOLED? In the speech that the present ministers made King Kalakana read at the opening of the present session, it was distinctly stated-in connection with the renewal of the Treaty -that the session of Pearl River harbor was only granted as a temporary quid pro quo for this treaty, and only to last as long as the treaty would.

Now, in the official proclamation of this transaction, it is simply stated:

Article II.: His Majesty the King of the Hawaiian Islands grants to the Gov-ernment of the United States the exclusive right to enter the harbor of Pearl River in the Island of Oahu, and to establish and maintain there a coaling and repair station for the use of vessels

trance to said harbor and do all other things needful to the purpose aforesaid.

As it can thus be seen, this article must, to any sensible person, read as a permanent, absolute cession of privilege, since there is no clause in it to authorize the King of these islands to cause it to be ended when the treaty ends, and nothing at all to prevent the U. S. Government claiming that this privilege was really meant as permanent.

The only authority (?!!) we have on the matter is a quibbling pretended explanatory letter of Secretary Bayard, in which-whilst acknowledging his incompetency "to qualify, expand or explain" anythinghe expresses his own personal opinion that no other explanation or limitation is needed to this article as to its terminating with Article I. But what seems to Mr. Bayard personally so clear, will undoubtedly appear just the contrary to his successors, who will not by any means feel bound by his assertions any more than those who come after them, will feel bound by the opinion of the Green and Brown Ministry.

And furthermore a recent example, connected with this same treaty, has already shown what value can be placed on the words and opinions of Mr. Bayard, who is not the infallible "Chevalier sans puer et sans reproche." But even if Mr. Bayard's letter was written in perfect good faith, what government would consider itself tied by the opinion of a subaltern officer? Verba volant, scripta manent, and I shall ask our clever leaders where in the whole of history are the smart diplomats who have ever consented to accept such an important thing as a treaty "in simple good faith" without its being

properly and earefully worded? Had it therefore been wished by our ministers to make the clause clear and indisputable, as announced in the royal message, instead of bungling the job in such an untimely rush, they ought to have refused to sign the document unless something more binding than Mr. Bayard's opinion had been added, in the shape of an additional phrase, something in this way: "such aforesaid privilege to terminate with this same

But it really seems as if the matter had been purposely left ambiguous. It seems as if it was the intention of the ministers of consenting to the grant of a perpetual cession of Pearl

River, without their having the courage of acknowledging it openly. Therefore, I shall ask who is fooled, and who is fooling in this

Did the Ministers fool the King by making him sign a deed, the true inwardness of which he was not

aware? Or did the U. S. Government fool our wise Ministers here, by conveniently refusing to insert a most important clause, mentioned in our

Royal speech? Or did King Kalakaua wish to fool his own subjects, whom he knows to be opposed to all idea of cesssion of

territory? This last hypothesis is not sustainable an instant, but the other two need an answer.

At any rate, I say, as a Hawaiian citizen that the restrictive clause I have mentioned above, ought to be even now inserted in the Treaty.

If not, it will appear hereafter that the present convention, through connivance of the Ministry, did contain a virtual and perpetual cession of territorial privilege, in exchange for a mere 7 years' extension of what eminent men term a "worse than

useless" treaty. And, at this stage, I say that the Ministry had no right to accept so lightly a treaty involving even the most remote chance of a future squabble over a possible cession of territory, without the approval of the Parliament and most probably even an appeal to the people, to the native Hawsiians to whom the coun-

Furthermore, I say that if the Ministers have imprudently committed a blunder, they had better con-

fess it and try to attenuate it. But if they have been trying to fool the people, or have carelessly allowed themselves to be fooled, they might before they know it, be called to account by the indignant Hawai-

At any rate, it is a serious matter, which ought to be taken up at once, in the present House, if not by the foreigners, at least by the Hawaiian A. MARQUES. members.

THE VETO.

EDITOR BULLETIN: - Some confusion appears to exist in the minds of Ministers, the Legislature and the public (as represented in degree by the "Gazette,") about the King's MINISTER OF INTERIOR. veto. From the Premier's reply to a question on the subject some time ago, the conclusion is drawn that the veto can only be exercised by the King by and with the consent of his Ministers. If the King should veto a bill which Ministers advised him to sign, the Premier did not know what the Cabinet might do; and the "Gazette" followed this reply with a suggestive hint that something dreadful might happen in

such a case. Now, if there be anything plainer than another in the Constitution it is, that the veto is a personal right in the Sovereign, to be exercised at

his discretion. Article 48 reads: "Every bill which shall have been passed the Legislature shall, before it becomes law, be presented to the King. If

of the United States, and to that end he approves he shall sign it and it shall there's become a law; but, if not, he shall return it, with his obections, to the Legislature, which shall enter the objections at large on their journal and proceed to reconsider it. If after such reconsideration it shall be approved by a two-thirds vote of all the elective members of the Legislature it shall become law."

How a question could possibly arise as to the personal right of the King to veto any bill he pleases, in in view of this Constitutional provision, is a point which only Ministers can determine. Their duty is to present bills to the King, tendering such advice as they may deem expedient; it is then the King's prerogative to determine whether he will sign or not. Should he refrain from signing the Constitution makes his subsequent course plain. It then becomes a question between the King and the Legislature, of which he is, by the Constitution, an integral part. Ministers are excluded from participation in the vote on a vetoed bill.

It might be interesting to know what Ministers would do were they to advise an exercise of the veto, or were the King to veto a bill contrary to their advice. Would they consider it their duty to countersign the veto under Article 41 of the Constitution, which provides that "no act of the King shall have any effect unless it be countersigned by a member of the Cabinet, who by that signature makes himself responsible?" Judging from the confusion of ideas on the subject, on and off the Ministerial seats, this is the only inference to be drawn. If so, it is evident that Minister's do not in the least understand their duty as Constitutional advisers of the King. But while they are taking lessons in Constitutional forms the Constitution itself is being trampled

in the mire. Constitutional Government.


