THE arraignment as Julien D. as a "common nuisance" is the "most unkindest cut of all." The high-minded reformer can scarcely be pleased with the mean appraisal.

PROJECTORS of the Third House state their desire and intent to make the institution popular and profitable. The purpose is represented to be solely the drawing out of public opinion.

THE discussion in a calm and quiet way of a public question by Bishop Willis may fairly be called an encouraging sign of the times. He needs, however, to study the opium traffic quite a bit yet.

THERE is something radically wrong with a building regulation that forces a stone and iron structure to face a flimsy house of tin. There is discernible also the element of injustice to the citizen who puts his money into a creditable business block.

THE work of Representative Richards in the House should be the pride of his constituency. He is a much bigger man than a mere district agent. While jealous of the interests of Hawaii and Hilo, he insists upon consideration of all legislation on a broad national basis.

EUGENE HALE of Maine made as strong a speech in the United States Senate against snap judgment on Spain as he delivered to the same branch of the American Government in urging the necessity for a Hawaiian cable. On the latter occasion Mr. Hale spoke favorably of "closer political union."

A REGULAR session of the Japanese Diet or Congress was recently suspended for an indefinite period by the Emperor, acting within his constitutional prerogative. This was because of opposition attacks upon the Ito ministry. Here is a case in which it seems that almost any sort of a movement in the direction of a vote of want of confidence might be made to take a side track.

A GRAVE responsibility rests with the House in disposing of the Military Item. Before voting the gentlemen should contemplate the past, view the present situation and glance into the future as presented by thoughtful and experienced publicists. The drift in this field has not been in the direction of a military craze, but carefully planned movement to the end that public peace might be guaranteed.

IF THE pair of British warships that recently left Esquimaut in a hurry are really bound for Hawaii, the naval war of the Honolulu harbor will soon present quite an imposing appearance. It will contain, with the arrival of Yankee craft from the Asiatic side, three vessels with the banner of Uncle Sam and the team in the service of Her Majesty, Victoria. This will make affairs lively in business and society ashore.

THE black men who have lately wiped out Italian columns are practically savages, but are up to date in the line of war equipment. They have repeating rifles, plenty of revolvers and many pieces of Hotchkiss mountain cannon, like the neat little couple in charge of the Hawaiian regulars. The Abyssinians eat raw meat, take their women and children along on campaigns and at battle depend entirely on rushes in overpowering numbers.

To the new Japan, Hawaii is but a bite or an incident. But to the people here the group is all and to the United States it is more than many of the leaders there will believe.

FOREIGN OFFICE NOTICE.

FOREIGN OFFICE, March 18, 1896. The President has received an autograph letter from the President of Peru of which the following is a translation: Nicholas de Pierola, Constitutional President of the Peruvian Republic to His Excellency the President of the Republic of Hawaii.

Great and Good Friend:—Having been raised to the Presidency of the Republic by the free suffrages of my countrymen and having been proclaimed as such by the National Congress I have the honor to inform Your Excellency that on the 8th day of the current month I assumed the exercise of executive authority after taking the oath provided by the Constitution.

I am confident that Your Excellency will receive this announcement with the interest that you must have taken in events which by their importance have materially influenced the destinies of Peru, and I am happy to assure you that I will endeavor to strengthen more and more, if possible, the relations of sincere friendship and good understanding which happily exist between the Republic and that of Hawaii in order that they may be as lasting and advantageous as the necessities of both States require.

I most sincerely pray for the prosperity of the Hawaiian people and for the well being of Your Excellency and am pleased to subscribe myself Your Excellency's

Buried the Steel. "Everybody has read Mark Twain's story of the man who got woven into 14 yards of carpet, how they gave the strip containing the remains to his widow, who had it buried standing up for a monument," said O. P. Wesley of Baltimore. "Well, that was a funny enough conceit, but when I was traveling in England six or seven years ago a thing occurred in actual life which describes the carpet story. A workman named Mortuary was engaged in coating metal for the manufacture of canisters at the Woolwich arsenal, when he lost his balance and fell into a huge ingot containing 12 tons of molten steel. The metal was at white heat, and of course the unfortunate man was utterly consumed in less time than it has taken to tell it. The English respect for the dead is praiseworthy enough, but in this instance it was carried to a ridiculous extreme. The solemn old fogies of the war department held a conference and decided not to profane the dead by using the steel in the manufacture of canisters, and that enormous chunk of metal was actually interred, and a Church of England clergyman read the services for the dead over it."—St. Louis Globe-Democrat.
