THE MUTINY OF THE WEST.

The captain of the whaleship John P. West, lying off the harbor of Honolulu, reported at the Police Station, yesterday, that his crew were in a state of mutiny, and that he was in need of help from the police. Captain Larsen, of the Honolulu police, with a squad of five policemen, accordingly went out to the whaler in the steam tug Elen, to render assistance. On arriving at the ship, the men were found to be quiet and peaceable; but when asked, positively refused to resume duty. They were therefore, to the number of 20, brought ashore, and lodged in the Station House, where they now are.

Judging from their appearance and from their general behavior since they came into the hands of the police, these men seem to be a quiet, respectable set of sailors. They have been eight months at sea without liberty, and we understand their grievance to be that they were not allowed to come ashore. For this reason they refused duty. It certainly is a great hardship for men who have been eight months at sea, to be denied the privilege of a little recreation on land when an opportunity occurs, and every man of feeling must sympathize with the poor fellows who are so unfortunately circumstanced. To be sure, the captain may have refused liberty to his men for fear of their deserting, and leaving him in the awkward predicament of being in command of a ship without a crew to sail her; but we are not aware whether the men had any such intention or not; and anyhow the hardship of being kept so long a time on shipboard is none the less. It seems to us a proper subject for consular enquiry.

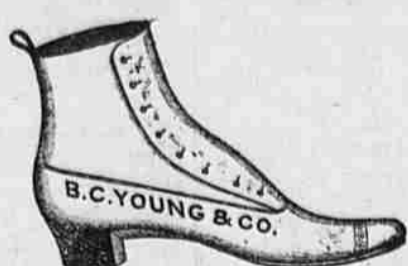

As Mr. Bowen was closing, at 6 o'clock, a telephone message was received, telling him to remain open until the usual hour and open again this morning. To-day, at 12 o'clock, the Marshal closed the saloon and sealed the doors. The Keystone's licence has expired, and a renewal of the licence has been refused.

RESULTS OF SALES.

SUPREME COURT—IN CHAMBERS.

THE CONSPIRACY CASE.

The case was resumed at 1 p. m. yesterday, W. S. Luce was arraigned on a charge of conspiracy; that on the 28th day of January, 1887, he with one A. B. Haley, did conspire to defraud the Government out of certain duties to the amount of \$500, by falsely representing to the Customs officials that the liquors called for in the order were for the private use and consumption of one A. de Souza Canavaro, then Portuguese Commissioner, and that upon said order the said W. S. Luce did obtain from the Custom House liquors, the duties on which would have been \$501.15, and placed to the credit of the said A. B. Haley the sum of \$300, thereby fraudulently cheating and defrauding the Government out of the said \$501.15.

The Court asked the Counsel for defendant if he was ready to plead. Mr. Hartwell stated that he was not prepared to advise his client about pleading, as he had come to argue the motion to quash the search warrant.

The judge said the search warrant was not yet before the Court. He was in doubt whether it had anything to do with the case. He also wished the counsel to understand that the defendants were not on trial for an offense before the Supreme Court, but were before a Committing Magistrate.

Mr. Hartwell urged that the Court should hear argument on the motion to quash, before the Attorney-General brought in his evidence. If the Court waited until then the mischief they were trying to avert might be done.

Mr. Hatch argued that the motion to quash the search warrant was not a matter of evidence, either as to the guilt or innocence of the accused, but simply to stop process of the search warrant, that instrument being illegal and unconstitutional. He submitted that counsel had a legal right to be heard as to whether or not the Marshal shall retain the custody of the books taken under the warrant. Have we not a right to be heard before the Attorney-General sees fit to produce the books in Court? He contended that his client could not be deprived of his property without being heard.

The Deputy Attorney-General stated that it was premature—all this talk about the legality of the warrant. If the warrant is illegal they have their remedy at law in an action for damages.

The Attorney-General thought it a rather queer proceeding to take away from the crown the evidence legally obtained, thought it unreasonable for the motion to be sustained at this time, and asked that it be dismissed.

The Judge still thought that there was no motion before him.

Mr. Hartwell said there was a motion before the Court, and the Court has jurisdiction to hear the argument. If one's books and accounts can be seized in order to procure evidence against him on a criminal charge, and his counsel cannot be heard before the books have been used, to argue that the seizure is unlawful, he would never have the honor to appear in the Court again, for he should regard this as a kind of tyranny, and did not believe it to be the law.

The Judge stated that strong language was not argument. He wanted to hear the arguments and points why the motion should be sustained.

Mr. Hatch asked if they had not a right to file a motion against any process. If we are entitled to file a motion, we certainly should have the right to be heard on that motion. The Judge said, your argument

then, should the Court decide in your favor, is that the books be returned to the owner, and thus deprive the Crown of the evidence said to be contained therein.

Mr. Hatch held that the rights of individuals could not be violated with impunity, and our argument is that we may be greatly wronged by Your Honor not hearing the argument on the motion. Where is the wrong committed by considering the motion? He asked the Judge to hear the argument in favor of the motion. Mr. Neumann said that the Judge was not sitting as a Committing Magistrate, as the question now before the Court was a motion to quash a search warrant, issued by the Chief Justice, and there was no one to commit.

The Court decided to hear arguments and take the matter into consideration.

Mr. Hatch presented the argument from the statutory standpoint, and Mr. Hartwell from the constitutional.

Mr. Peterson replied to the statutory and Mr. Ashford to the constitutional.

The Judge then took the matter into consideration.

Mr. Ashford asked for a remand in W. S. Luce's case, until Monday, in order to obtain the evidence of the Minister of the Interior for the Crown.

The request was granted and the Judge arranged to meet the respective counsel at 11 a. m. to-day.

TO-DAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

The Court resumed at 11 a. m. this morning, when Chief Justice Judd gave his decision in regard to vacating the search warrant.

OPINION OF THE CHIEF JUSTICE.

The case stated briefly is this: A search warrant was issued by me on the affidavit of the Attorney-General, the object of which was to procure the books of account of the accused with the purpose of using them as evidence of certain transactions which it is alleged will show a conspiracy between the accused and another to defraud the Hawaiian Government of duties on imported liquors.

I think a cursory reading of the statute defining and authorizing the Writ of Search Warrant, Chap. 48 of the Penal Code, would give the impression that it could legally be used for such a purpose.

Section 3 of the Act defines the purposes for which this warrant can be granted and among them is this: "To discover articles necessary to be produced as evidence or otherwise on the trial of any one accused of a criminal offense," and it might be said that as the books of the accused are "articles" and are deemed "necessary to be used as evidence" the statute applies.

After hearing argument and having taken time to reflect upon it, I have come to the opposite conclusion. I think the true meaning of this clause in the statute is that in order to authorize the seizure of "articles" to be used as evidence the "articles" themselves should be evidence, that is, that they should form a part of the corpus delicti; as, for example, the weapon by which a homicide was committed, or the bloody clothing worn by the victim of an assassin, etc., these forming a class of articles distinct from those the bare possession of which is criminal, as for example, the implements and material for making counterfeit coin.

The mere possession of a weapon which could produce death is not criminal, but if such a weapon has been used, as the instrument by which a murder was effected, and it is necessary that it be used as evidence on the trial of the person accused of this murder, a search warrant can issue to obtain it.

But in the case before me the books of accounts as articles, that is as material objects or chattels are not evidence to be used. They are desired by the prosecution for the records they contain, that is, for the entries of certain transactions, which will have to be testified to and read in order to be evidence.

These transactions, if they have occurred, could be testified to by witnesses if there were witnesses to the transactions (even if not recorded). The books and accounts are merely succinct registers of the transactions themselves. In this view I am of the opinion that the search warrant was improvidently issued.

There is much force in the argument made by counsel for the defendants that Sec. 2, defining search warrant limits this process to the searching for articles illegally obtained or detained or which are kept for the purpose of using them illegally.

I think, however, that this section is a mere definition, and that a warrant might issue to obtain an article necessary to be produced as evidence against a third party, from the possession of one who is not the party accused.

It may be said that the withholding from the prosecution of such an article is illegal, that is, it is an offense against the law. But from such an examination of our Penal Code as I have been able to make I cannot find that such an act would be punishable, and I am not willing to say that a search warrant could not be applied to such a purpose,

for otherwise, an offender could deposit with his friends the indicia of his guilt and they be protected in these acts. In such case the examination to be made by the magistrate of the person in whose possession such articles are found would be for an explanation as to how they came into his possession.

A further objection is made to the search warrant in that it does not order the arrest of the person in whose possession these articles should be found. I think this is sufficiently complied with by the warrant of arrest which was issued contemporaneously.

Having found that the statute which is invoked for the issuing of this search warrant does not authorize its use for the particular purpose for which it was asked, it is unnecessary for me to decide whether it is inhibited by the 9th Article of the Constitution which prescribes that no one shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself. I merely remark that I am still of the opinion that where a constitutional question is raised, if the Justice before whom it is raised has grave reasons for believing that the procedure or act in question is forbidden by the constitution he should reserve the question for the consideration of the Court, otherwise serious rights of the Government might be lost as the prosecution cannot appeal.

There remains to be determined the question of practice, as to whether I am authorized to quash the search warrant in advance of the articles for the production of which it was issued, before offered in evidence against the accused. It is to me a novel request and no precedent for it is shown by defendants' counsel. It is certainly unprecedented to ask a Court when the accused has not been brought before it, to ask that a process of the Court which is auxiliary to the proceeding against him, should be quashed.

In the cases I have had access to, viz. U. S. vs. Bryd 116 U. S. 616, the Court held that the inspection by the District Attorney of the books of the accused, which was a compulsory production by him of evidence against himself, and its admission in evidence were erroneous and unconstitutional proceedings.

So in Commonwealth vs. Dana 2 Metcalf 333, the search warrant was offered in evidence by the prosecution "to the admission" of which the defendant's counsel objected, on the ground that the same had been issued improvidently and was void in law," and the Court first proceeds to discuss the question whether the search for lottery tickets the possession of which with the intent to sell them was a violation of law, was such a "reasonable search" as was authorized by the Bill of Rights.

I still think that the motion was premature and though I allowed argument on the main question as to whether the search warrant was authorized before this motion was decided I did so for the convenience of myself as well as of counsel. I do not hold it correct practice to ask the Court to vacate its process before the defendant is before the Court and before the evidence which is urged to have been illegally obtained is offered.

I think that although there is much authority for the position that when papers are offered in evidence the Court can take no notice how they were obtained, whether lawfully or unlawfully, nor would it form a collateral issue to determine that question, the later cases are against this view, viz.: the case cited from 116 U. S., and the recent Anarchist Case. Spies vs. People of the State of Illinois, where the Court contemplate that objections should be taken at the trial when this evidence is offered.

I think the examination must proceed and, having reached the conclusion that the books of account procured by the search warrant can not be received in evidence, I will order them back to the possession of the defendants, if offered in evidence, and if not offered, will make the same order at the conclusion of this examination.

The trial of Mr. G. W. Macfarlane was resumed at 1 p. m., and Mr. W. S. Luce was remanded to appear on Monday next at 10 a. m.

AMERICAN NAMES.

DAVID DUDLEY FIELD WANTS INDIAN NAMES FOR NEW STATES.

Washington, Feb. 15.—David Dudley Field was before the House Committee on Territories this morning to protest against the retention of certain of our Territorial names when the Territories to which they belong shall become States. On general principles he held that a country so rich in Indian names as this, ought in no case to perpetuate European names, and he cited New York as about the worst designation that could have been given to a State. The only thing he cherished against the memory of Mr. Lincoln was the fact that he admitted a West Virginia when he might have had a Cumberland or a Kanawha. He protested against North and South Dakota as unnecessary and confusing. He objected to New Mexico because it was meaningless, except as a remnant of Mexico. He suggested instead Montezuma, holding that the personage of that name was the greatest of our aboriginal chiefs and deserved to have his memory perpetuated. He protested against Washington, as likely to lead to confusion, and suggested Tacoma as both euphonious and distinctive.
