The Cyclone in Bengal.

The calamity which befell Bengal is almost unparalleled in history. A number of islands lying about the estuary of the river Megna, which in part of its course is identical with the Brahmaputra, were entirely submerged by a storm-wave on the 21st of October, and nearly all the inhabitants were destroyed. As the wave swept forward for 5 or 6 miles inland, and as one island alone—Dahin Shabakpore—had a population of 140,000 souls, probably not less than 200,000 human beings were overwhelmed in the catastrophe. With the exception of the great earthquake at Antioch, in 430 A. D., in which, according to Gibbon, 250,000 people perished, history affords nothing like so wholesale a destruction as this. The only other convulsion of nature which can be compared to these is the great earthquake of 1753 in Calabria, which probably caused the death of at least 100,000 people, and was felt distinctly in a large part of Europe. Originating under the centre of Calabria, the disturbance passed under the sea, and raked up a mountain of water which destroyed the city of Messina. On the morning of November 1st, 1755, an earthquake struck down the principal part of Lisbon; the sea retired, leaving the bay dry, and then returning, in a wave fifty feet high; in six minutes 60,000 people perished. The battle of Actium was fought thirty-one years before the Christian era, while the great relief and ebb of water under the feet of the soldiers on land as they watched the sea fight in which they could take no part. This convulsion of nature destroyed about 10,000 people. In 1512, 30,000 people perished in a similar way at Caracas. Of memorable inundations the following are noted ones: In the early part of the fifteenth century the sea broke in at Dort, in Holland, and drowned seventy-two villages and over 100,000 people, and about a hundred years afterwards a general inundation, caused by the failure of the dykes in Holland, is said to have destroyed 400,000 souls. It is not too much to say that within historic times recorded calamities by flood and earthquake have killed off between 2,000,000 and 3,000,000 people. Of all that have occurred in recent years, the flood in Bengal is by far the most disastrous.

Lord Connaught and the Queen.

A young nobleman, whose family had not been in court since the accession of Her Majesty, a firm, tall fellow, of manly bearing, was presented the last. As his name, Lord George Alfred Connaught, was being announced, he passed Prince Albert and the young princess in an apparently haughty manner, without removing his cap. They seemed enraged; but as it might be a mistake, arising from embarrassment, no notice was taken of the approaching rudeness. When he reached the Queen, however, he uncovered his head, and bowed most gracefully before her. Lord Connaught is right? and the lady, in a positive manner upon his head, and turned to address Prince Albert. The latter drew back; his face flushed scarlet. It looked like an intended insult to the Prince Consort in the presence of his wife and sovereign. A murmur of indignation ran through the throng-room. The old Duke of Wellington, leaning under the weight of seventy-eight years, and covered with decorations, stepped forward to interfere. The Lord Chamberlain, however, was before him, and when just upon the point of arresting the offender, the Queen interposed, saying "Right! right! Lord Connaught is right!" and the lady, explained the transaction to the Prince, the young nobleman meanwhile looking on. It was some time before this strange conduct could be understood by those present. Lord Connaught, the only person whose head was covered, moving with great self-possession among bishops and chancellors, leaders of the Commons and dons of the universities, the observed of all observers. It seemed that, for special services rendered to the King by a Lord Connaught, in the reign of Henry VIII., a right had been given by a patent in perpetuity to the head of the house in each succeeding generation, to remain with covered head in the presence of the ruling sovereign. This right had been in abeyance during the minority of the present Lord Connaught, and had been forgotten by all but the Queen. He had succeeded his head to her as a woman; but, jealous of the inherited privilege, had resumed his chapeau upon rising, and endeavored to wear it afterwards.—Curt Circular.

Curious Thanksgiving Custom.

At the annual dinner at Clement's Inn, London, after the banquet of that learned society, members and guests rise on the removal of the white cloth, and witness the following thanksgiving in pantomime: Before the president of the second table the butler puts a man of bread, consisting of four loaves, and to each other by their kneeling count. Taking this man of bread in his hand, the president of the second table slowly rises it above his head to the full reach of his arm, and after a few moments' pause brings it down with a thundering whack on the oaken table. A second time the bread is elevated and struck upon the resounding board. Yet a third time the same feat is performed; and then, before strangers have had time to recover from their astonishment, the grace altar has thrown the bread so that it slides and spins down to the bottom of the long table, where it is caught up by the butler, who instantly runs out of the dining-hall with it in his outstretched hands. The whole grace is typical. The four loaves represent the four gospels; the three elevations are in reverence of the three persons of the sacred trinity; the manner in which the bread is laid down the table indicates the liberality with which the bread of life was given to mankind; and the alacrity with which the butler ran out of the hall expresses the alacrity with which zealous servants hasten to distribute the bread of spiritual knowledge of those who hunger after it.

The Agricultural Ant.

Wonderful stories have been told of the intelligence of various species of the ant inhabiting different parts of the globe, but it is doubted much if fallen ever contributed to them more than they really possess. The "Agricultural Ant" of Texas is far from being a myth. Dr. C. Lincoln, a man noted for his scientific attainments, and a resident of Texas for some twenty years or more, studied the habits of various species of ants very closely, and to him we are indebted for the history of the "Agricultural Ant." In a communication to the Smithsonian Institute in 1874, he says: "To last, the year I came to Long Point, Texas, there was but one agricultural ant city within a mile of the place. This was situated in a nearly barren little spot on top of an elevation undecid with stratified sandstone. Here there was but little grass and weeds to interfere with their seed-collecting labors. The ant city which they so carefully cultivate was flourishing in a regular circle near the outer border, but inside of the pavement. There were little patches of the same grass scattered about on the little dunes, which had doubtless been planted there by some experienced ant, for it had been nearly cleared of all other vegetables—in fact, cultivated by them." Dr. Lincoln then proceeds to give a minute description of all their operations in regard to planting, keeping clear of weeds, and finally harvesting and storing the crop in holes made in the ground for the purpose. If the stored grain happens to get wet during heavy rains, it is all taken out and spread in the sun to dry, for our little agriculturists know that moisture will cause it to sprout prematurely or become mouldy and rotten. There are other equally interesting and intelligent species of ant inhabiting Texas, but we have a meagre knowledge of them.
