**Visit to a Turkish Harem.**  
A Cairo correspondent of the Globe writes—  
"The wife of one of the consuls, who had  
often heard me say I was 'dying' to see a  
harem, fetched me by appointment, and we  
drove across the Nile to the Palace of Ghiz,  
the residence of Princess Hussein Pasha, the  
wife of the present Khedive's younger brother,  
who is exiled with his father Ismail, and is

instruments, and a thousand other objects  
lay about on every perfect museum.  
Some 20 rooms opened out of the hall,  
and into two of these we were shown by a  
number of female slaves. Let me say in  
parenthesis, that all harem attendants are  
called, and really are, perfect museum  
specimens. I know not what our notions on  
this subject may be in England, but certain it  
is that these servants are treated as the ab-  
solute property of their masters, bought, ex-  
changed and used as property of the highest  
cattle commodity. They appear, however,  
happy enough, for to threaten to turn them  
away is in their eyes the severest reprimand,  
and one which always has its effect. The in-  
evitable coffee then followed, and the ap-  
pearance, with water-pipes and cigarettes,  
after which a superior sort of slave came to  
tell us that the Princess was rather unwell,  
but would be charmed to see us in her private  
room. Passing through her arched saloons,  
arranged in modern French style, but pre-  
serving rather a 'stagey' appearance, we at length  
entered a cosy boudoir, half European, half  
Oriental in its contents; undeniably a charm-  
ing room, the most ideal of a room in which to  
receive *amis intimes*. The half-closed 'mush-  
rabes' allowed a glimpse of the fairy garden  
below, and admitted a subdued light which  
fell on a broad divan covered with rare carpets.  
Extended on either side of the divan, the  
garment of pink satin, topped a rather stout  
little lady, with a look in her hand. The  
volume was closed, and our hostess—for this  
was the Princess—appeared to be engaged in  
contemplating the picture of a young man, who  
would call them 'dainty' slippers, for they  
were certainly 'smallish.'  
The Princess rose as we entered and gave  
a few steps, smiling, to meet us, and  
she led us to a room, where we sat on the  
couch—one on each side of her. A male  
cricht, especially if under five-and-twenty,  
would have pronounced her at once to be  
charming, and indeed, her splendid hair,  
reaching to her eyes, and her eyes, and  
agreeable manners would almost warrant the  
verdict. Her complexion was also exquisite,  
not being of the sickly white generally seen  
in the harem. One woman, however, must  
criticize another in a similar manner, and  
she said that the features were perhaps a little  
'course cut,' and that the height precluded  
her belonging to any of the *boukelle* class  
of beauty. Half a dozen slaves stood motionless  
about the room doing nothing, but ready to  
hurry off to execute any errand. The Princess  
is one in a thousand amongst harem ladies  
as regards intellectual acquirements; she is a  
great reader, especially of modern French  
works, and I noticed in her possession 'Le  
'Le Nabab,' and many other books of the day,  
as well as the *Figaro* and *Journal Amuse*.  
Very different this harem and this princess  
from the others I have seen visited, where the  
fashions of the West are clearly made to fit  
on Eastern manners, involving a sacrifice of  
beauty without any gain of comfort, and  
where the inmates do absolutely nothing from  
morn till eve smoke, drink coffee, have  
their hair dressed, and quarrel. Reading is  
not voted, music a bore, and conversation an  
unnecessary exertion, so that a visit to many  
harems is a very slow affair indeed. Princess  
Hussein is a Turk, and has never been in  
Paris, or indeed in any of the fashionable  
every Parisian, and insists upon sending to  
what Victor Hugo calls the 'capital of the  
world' for everything. We were now taken  
upstairs and shown the Arabic part of the  
Palace, the luxurious bath, the sleeping  
chambers, almost devoid of furniture, the airy  
terraces. I was specially struck with one  
room covered throughout with finest white  
Cashmere, ceiling, walls, and divans, the fur-  
niture inlaid with silver, and a silver lamp  
hung in the center, the floor of snow-white  
marble—the mirrors with frosted silver frames.  
Everything was gold and white in this cham-  
ber—the Princess' favorite retreat—save  
thrown on a divan, a blue robe of cash-  
mere, embroidered with gold. This garment,  
the one point of color amongst all surrounding  
objects, stood out in burning contrast. Chance  
did not have placed it there, and forgotten  
of etiquette forbade an instant to be  
precise, intending to ask for an explanation. But  
a strange look, half pain, half shyness on her  
face, at once checked my purpose. I would  
at any moment have given a month's pocket-  
money to unravel the secret. All I could  
afterwards learn from my friend, who herself  
had never seen the white chamber before, was  
that the scarlet garment was a 'wedding  
gown,' or one worn by a bride at her marriage.  
The Princess seems to have a magnificent  
and the own, a 'souvenir' of happier hours,  
told its tale of late sad hours engaged in the  
bitter-sweet task of conjuring up the past.  
We shortly afterwards took our leave, the  
Princess, who had been for a instant some-  
what silent, once more brightening up and  
presenting us with photographs of herself and  
children. The female slaves kissed our hands,  
the 'hem of our garments,' and their own  
hands, and the best of good-byes. A messenger  
of seventy-four—presented us with glorious  
flowers as we passed out of a house which,  
with its charming mistress, combined Oriental  
hospitality and sumptuousness with European  
refinement and elegance.

# Hawaiian Gazette Supplement, Oct. 13, 1880.

## LATEST FOREIGN NEWS.

**Four Towerson, September 30.**—The steamer *California* left Sitka on September 19th, at 6 p. m. The military expedition under Major Morris and Captain Boardman were absent fifteen days. They went as far as 59 degrees north latitude, visiting all the principal Indian villages and holding audiences with the leading chiefs. They ascertained that three Hittah canoes from Fort Simpson, fitted out by the Hudson Bay Company, had been to the Sea Otter grounds in Alaska waters, and that a few Otter had been taken. These canoes had escaped by an inside channel, otherwise Major Morris would have captured the outfit. The Hittahs are much excited over the circumstances, and are ready for war in the event of their coming again. It is reported that during the latter part of this month a fleet of sixty canoes, manned by King George Indians, will leave Fort Simpson for Cross Sound to hunt the Sea Otter. If this is proved in war and bloodshed must be the result, for the Hittahs, Chilkats, and other tribes who hunt these animals, are resolved to protect these grounds, cost what it will. The situation is very grave. The United States has no vessel in Alaska which can prevent these incursions. The expedition of the *Fennell* was highly successful. The Indians were taught by Captain Boardman what they must expect if they make war upon or kill white men. Major Morris instructed them in the customs laws, and forbade them scuttling. The Indians are trading principally at home instead of going to Fort Simpson. Important hydrographic work was done by Master G. F. Harris, of the United States Navy. A large bay, heretofore uncharted, was discovered north of Jay Strait, and sunken rocks located. The islands and reefs were surveyed, and other useful work done.

When the *Fennell* reached Portage Bay, where the Northwest Trading Company have located a post, the officers found a battle raging between the Chilkats and Chilkoots. The Indian had been killed, and three wounded. Messengers were sent to each hostile camp, and on the next day the leading warriors of both tribes assembled on board the *Fennell*, and were addressed by Captain Boardman and Major Morris, who both counseled a cessation of hostilities. This they agreed to do, and to settle the dispute in their own fashion. Chawgan, Chief of the Chilkats, agreed to reimburse the relatives of the man killed by giving them a number of furs and blankets. The Hittahs were then loaded with shell, shrapnel, grape, and canister, and fired, and afterwards the sailing gun, much to the astonishment of the natives. They were particularly awed by the deadly fire of the sailing gun.

Mount Lagomble is beginning to get on a Winter appearance, and prospecting is at an end until next Spring. The Silka mines are looking well, and work is progressing favorably. A 30-stamp mill is to be erected immediately on the Henrietta mine. Steamboat navigation on the Stickeen has closed for the season. There are still about a thousand miners to work at Cassiar.

**New Bedford, Mass., September 23.**—The members of the expedition headed by Lieutenant Fred Schwatka, which sailed from New York on June 1st, 1875, for Baffin's Bay, and King William's Land, for the purpose of seeking further data upon the fate of Sir John Franklin, have arrived. Though the special object of the search was for the recovery of the records of the Franklin expedition, which, according to Esquimaux testimony, were known to exist at specified points, has not been attained, the explorers have nevertheless obtained many relics of Franklin's party, including the remains of Lieutenant Irving. They have, moreover, carried out to the latter the instructions of the promoter of the expedition to make it a geographical success. The longest sledge ride on record, both in regard to time and space, has been achieved in the face of phenomenally cold weather and deprivation of customary food. Important rivers and coasts have been discovered and serious errors on other charts have been corrected. The adventures of the Schwatka expedition add pages of interest to the romance of relic explorations, and furnish all the world is ever likely to know of the fate of Sir John Franklin. The conduct of Captain Berry, of the *Esthian*, in reference to the supplies of food intended to be deposited for the expedition, is unaccountable, and needs explanation, as the absence of those supplies on their return, after very near proving fatal to Lieutenant Schwatka's party. The result of the expedition has shown that it is possible for white men to adapt themselves to the climate and life of the Esquimaux in prosecuting journeys in the polar regions, and they are not particularly restricted to any season of the year for that purpose, but can travel at any time and in the same way which the natives travel.

**New York, September 24.**—The *Herald* publishes a letter of a correspondent who accompanied the Schwatka expedition to King William's Land. The story refers more particularly to the incidents of the great sledge journey. This is supplemented, however, by the discovery of relics and the examination of native witnesses which lead to the sad conclusion that the fate of the officers and crew of the *Esthian* and *Terror* was terrible, even to the utmost limit of the imagination, and that the records of the Franklin expedition are lost beyond recovery. Old men and women of the Esquimaux tell the story of those who were doubtless the last survivors of these unfortunate vessels with a minuteness of detail and evident truthfulness which place their fate beyond a doubt. Of what became of their great leader, and a large number of men who constituted the crews, nothing could be discovered. Only a small party of officers, black about the mouth, with no flesh on their bones, were seen dragging a boat across the ice, and then they disappeared, and nothing more was seen of them until their skeletons were found under their boat and in a tent, a prey to wild beasts, and with dreadful evidences that they had been driven to feed on the weaker of their companions before finally yielding to starvation and cold. Such is the sad conclusion which the discoveries of this expedition irresistibly lead to. What became of the records of the Franklin expedition that were with the party is also painfully evident from the testimony of natives, who naturally considered them of no importance, and by whom they were allowed to be around as playthings for children, and were eventually destroyed.

**Tasmanian, N. Y., September 25.**—There is great interest in the celebration of the 100th anniversary of the capture of Major Andre. Salutes were fired this morning and the factories responded with whistles, churches with bells, and locomotives with whistles. A bronze statue of Patriotism was placed on a monument, and unveiled with ceremony. There was a procession at eleven, and 30,000 people witnessed it. The exercises took place in a tent with a seating capacity of 5,000. Every seat was occupied. On the platform was Samuel J. Tilden, Chairman of the Day, and the Order of the Day, Chancellor M. Depew, was then introduced, and made a stirring address. Governor's band then gave a concert, patriotic airs predominating. All the time the exercises were in progress, people were coming into town, and the roads and streets were blocked with teams. It is estimated that at least 30,000 people were on the grounds. Governor Cornell was unable to be present, because of illness. In the evening the public and private buildings were illuminated, and a grand display of fireworks was given from Mt. Andre.

**Havana, September 25.**—Carillo and the few remaining insurgents in the villa have surrendered, and now there is not an armed insurgent in the whole island.

**London, September 25.**—In Mining Lane, sugar was unfavourably affected by the prospects of the European beet supply, which appears likely to reach 1,000,000 tons, the largest amount on record, but the result must depend on the weather of the next two or three weeks.

**Dublin, September 24.**—Rumor that the Government intends to prosecute the members of the Land League for participation in meetings, was considered at a private meeting of Irish members yesterday. The meeting resolved that, in the event of prosecution or arrest of members, the entire active section of the Parliamentary party shall be summoned to Ireland, to co-operate still more vigorously with the local leaders.

**New York, September 25.**—A Paris dispatch to the *Herald* says: Our Berlin correspondent telegraphs as follows: I learn from trustworthy sources a totally different attitude from what it has heretofore held towards the Russian Government. Having seen the little that has been accomplished in the way of attaining their objects, the Nihilist leaders have decided to adopt in the future a totally different line of procedure from that which they have hitherto pursued. It has been determined, so I am informed, that the movement henceforth shall be conducted in the way of secret political agitation. The leaders are now watching the progress of events on the Balkans, and are said to be in constant communication with Russian Poland, whose sympathy they expect to secure, in the event of war between Russia and Austria. The visit of the Emperor of Austria to the Polish provinces is, however, considered by European politicians as showing too clearly to Russia the danger she would incur by a war with Austria, and that she will hesitate before plunging into one.

**Rome, September 25.**—The anniversary of the entry of the Italian troops into Rome was enthusiastically celebrated to-day. The members of the

Cabinet and municipality took part in the procession. Premier Carloti and other distinguished men made patriotic speeches at Porta Pia.

**Cape Town, September 20.**—Captain Carrington, while working a reconnaissance with seventy men of the Cape mounted rifles, was unsuccessfully attacked by 1,500 Basutos. A Lieutenant and two men were killed. The enemy suffered great loss. Captain Carrington is being reinforced.

**Bombay, September 21.**—Following are the details of the land ship at Naini Tal, Bengal, which resulted in the death of a number of British officers and soldiers, and other persons. Rain began falling heavily on Friday, and poured steadily until Saturday afternoon, when the gage showed a fall of twenty-five inches in forty hours. The effect of such an enormous mass of water pouring down into the confined settlement, which is simply a basin formed by a circle of hills, can be imagined. All the roads were cut to pieces. In the forenoon of Saturday it was rumored that the Victoria Hotel was in a dangerous state. The alarm was given to the visitors in the hotel, who took shelter elsewhere before the building fell. About thirty natives were buried in the ruin. The police and a band of laborers and soldiers were quickly on the spot. About noon there was a sudden roar and rumbling, followed by a vast cloudburst. The lake rose in a moment far above its usual height and swept in a massive wave toward the weir, where an enormous land slide came down, burying the hotel and the band of rescuers, with the disastrous result already mentioned.
