County Searchlight

If Wrong Exists, Will Reveal Graft

PROBING GARBAGE AND ROAD EXPENSES

The spirit of investigation is in the air and the County administration is doing the hustling, although its work will mean that some Territorial officers will do their share of probing.

The exclusive article in Saturday's Bulletin in reference to peculiar facts connected with certain garbage and road department wage warrants, discovered in the office of Treasurer Trent led the County Treasurer to address the Board of Supervisors which met in the afternoon. Trent's letter and a report of the Supervisors' meeting appear on another page.

In substance, Trent's communication draws attention to the fact that men received more money than they thought was coming to them and that alternating gangs of laborers, supposed to work a week at a time, averaged, in some cases, twenty days and more to the half-month. The Garbage Committee

of the Board of Supervisors now has the matter under investigation.

There will also be other matters, heretofore unnoted, to receive attention as far as the garbage and road departments are concerned.

The Acting Governor, A. L. C. Atkinson, inasmuch as Territorial interests are also involved in road matters, is anxious that all appearance of irregularity be thoroughly investigated.

Auditor Fisher is engaged in the pursuit of facts, as in the Public Works Department, Clarence White being now occupied in looking over the payroll.

It is considered unfortunate that Road Supervisor and Garbage Superintendent Sam Johnson is not here to explain matters, though, possibly, the seeming peculiarities would surprise him as much as they surprised some of

Kellett

Is Again Arrested

P. D. Kellett, former clerk in Judge De Bolt's court, charged with embezzlement of trust funds, arrested and now before Judge Robinson's court, being out on bail, was again placed under arrest early this afternoon on warrants reciting two more counts, one alleging embezzlement of \$1,700, another charging the embezzlement of \$100 from the Barre estate.

He was, for the time, released on his own recognizance, to appear before Judge Robinson at 2 o'clock, when additional bail, if any, will be fixed.

P. D. KELLETT DENIES THAT HE TOOK TRUSTEE BOND

P. Danson Kellett, the former clerk of Judge De Bolt's court, who is now charged with embezzlement of the funds of the estate of the late M. A. Barre, of which he was the trustee, was seen by a Bulletin reporter this morning shortly before the beginning of the preliminary hearing before Judge Robinson. Kellett was asked what he knew about the \$3500 bond which he furnished as trustee, and which is now missing.

"I never saw that bond since the time I filed it," said Kellett. "When Simonton asked me about it on the Saturday before last, I looked for it but could not find it. I did not then consider it such a serious matter, but later I saw that its disappearance would place me in a still worse light. I therefore looked all over for it, but I could not locate it. I thought it might possibly be among my estate papers, which I keep at home, so I made a thorough search of these but it was not there."

"It has very frequently happened that papers have been missing up here. In some cases they have been found later mixed up with other documents. It is absurd to accuse me of taking the bond away. As a matter of fact I wish that I could find it myself. I think that if I had been able to find that bond I would have escaped this criminal proceedings altogether."

Okolehao Business at Kahana Entirely Broken Up

FEDERAL OFFICERS MADE A RAID

The Federal authorities last Saturday made a strenuous trip to Koolau to look into the okolehao situation. Collector Chamberlain, Marshal Hendry, Deputy Drake, Deputy Roentz, Editor Shozawa and a Bulletin reporter started from the city Friday at 6:30 p. m. The trip had been perfectly organized, the idea being to travel through Koolau to Kahana in the darkness to escape observation. Drake, Roentz and the reporter travelled in one of Lewis' automobiles, the others used a double team carriage.

It had been arranged to meet saddle horses between Kahana and Kaaawa at midnight and this point was reached at the hour designated, the auto having to halt several times, not to arrive too early.

Drake, Roentz and the reporter immediately started on horseback for the uplands of Kahana, a country which has much fame as being the greatest okolehao producing place on Oahu. Recent rains had flooded the countryside and the trails were obliterated by coats of mud, broken branches and logs, while swirling streams traversed the hau thicket through which the party had to progress on every hand. The three men made their way about half way up the valley when finally they became unable to progress further on account of the total darkness. The only dry place in which a halt could be made was a heap of rocks and here

White Tells Story

Of How Money Is Handled

C. M. White, the chief clerk of the Public Works Department, who is in charge of the Garbage Department during the absence of Sam Johnson on the mainland, made the following statement this noon regarding the alleged "graft" which is supposed to have been discovered incidental to the paying off of the garbage employees:

Honolulu, T. H., Aug. 7th, 1905.

Editor Evening Bulletin:—In the absence of Mr. Samuel Johnson, on the Coast, and as I have, by the direction of the Supervisors, assumed charge of his office, during his absence, I desire to submit an explanation of the Garbage Pay Rolls which is at present the subject of considerable newspaper controversy.

It is true that Mr. Johnson has left but he is not, as stated in the Advertiser, the only person who is capable of explaining the apparent discrepancy.

Embezzlement Law Can, Says Kellett's Counsel, Not Reach Trustees

PRELIMINARY HEARING BEFORE ROBINSON

The preliminary hearing of P. Danson Kellett took place this morning before Judge Robinson. County Attorney E. A. Douthitt appeared for the prosecution while the defendant was represented by J. A. Magoon and J. Lightfoot.

Lightfoot opened the proceedings by reading a motion for a bill of particulars, asking that the charges against Kellett be further specified. Information was wanted especially on the following points: How, when, where and by what means Kellett became entrusted with the \$334.40, which he is charged with having embezzled; how, when, where and by what means the said sum became the property of the heirs and legatees of M. A. Barre, deceased; how, when, where and by what means these heirs and legatees authorized Kellett to take possession of the \$334.40. Finally the names, ages and addresses of the heirs and legatees were wanted. This motion was supported by an affidavit by J. A. Magoon, wherein it was stated that the matter could not safely be proceeded with unless information was given about the above points.

Douthitt said that this was merely a preliminary hearing to determine whether the evidence against Kellett was sufficient to warrant his commitment to the Grand Jury. It was not a trial. The charge against Kellett charged him with embezzling a specific sum on a specific date and thus met all the requirements. The other facts asked for by the defense were matters of proof. The only bill of particulars

Absence Of Breakwater Asserts Board Of Trade, Is Great Loss To Hilo

The great sum of \$208,291.75 was the charge. The greatest benefit, however, will result in the increase of shipping last year through the absence of a breakwater in the harbor shipped from the island. According to figures just prepared to the letter this will increase from \$1,000,000 to \$1,680,000 tons, nearly 100% figures were gathered by the Board of Trade for the Kohala ditch when completed will be of great benefit.

Lieut. Slattery received the estimate and an accompanying letter last Saturday afternoon, as well as a sketch of the proposed improvement made by E. D. Baldwin, of Hilo. This sketch follows very closely the line as Lieut. Slattery proposes it. The breakwater begins at a point about a quarter of a mile east of Coconut Island and extends to the present whistling buoy.

The Hilo Board of Trade in presenting the matter claims that the improvement will double the available anchorage.
