THE ASIATIC GRIEVANCE.

Our remarks the other day on the exclusion of the Asiatics from the franchise was more appropriate even than we calculated, for that very day an able Japanese lawyer voiced the matter as a grievance of his own countrymen as well as of the Chinese. The question has now been fairly opened, and we must admit with commendable moderation by the talented Asiatic referred to. It is now in order to consider arguments for and against giving Asiatics the franchise. There is one strong reason, that our Chinese friends will find it very hard to answer, why they should receive no such privilege as some of them are asking. Foreigners in their country receive only enforced consideration, and that to a very limited degree. China is known as much by her policy of exclusion toward men and manners from the outside world, as by any other fact regarding the Empire. It would seem, therefore, to be nothing more than salutary justice above and beyond a mere spirit of retaliation, for other nations to say to Chinese within their gates, "We are prepared to accord you privileges equal to those you grant people of our race in your country." Indeed, it is more than doubtful that a race bred in the narrow exclusiveness of the Chinese is fit to take its place in the free air of liberal Western institutions. Rather is it an axiomatic truth that such a breeding should make its subjects altogether ineligible for the privileges of institutions based on human equality. Just as a man is refused admission into any ecclesiastical organization, the fundamental tenets of which he positively rejects, so does it appear naturally just that a people denying human equality at home should be denied it abroad, at least until their exclusive instincts were bred out of them by long contact with and experience of more liberal theories and practices than obtain in their own land. Political freedom is a heritage of the Caucasian race, and a gift from that race to the Hawaiian. Had the Chinese been the occupants of the soil when the Caucasian came, they would have had the boon tendered them, provided they accepted Caucasian ways with alacrity such as the Hawaiians displayed. The case stands about thus: Hawaiians have civil rights by virtue of original tenure of the soil and their acceptance of them. Caucasians have them because they established the existing political system, working through the primitive sovereignty here. The Chinese came here to furnish labor on the plantations, being only too willing to come for the wages offered. They saved money enough to branch out into enterprises on their own account, and were admitted to commercial equality with all other nationalities, besides being accorded equal civil rights with all other foreigners under the old Constitution. We do not know that they had not the same privileges as other aliens with respect to naturalization or denization, or that they have not the chance under the new Constitution of obtaining letters of naturalization or denization. Certainly there has not been prohibition of Asiatics naturalizing, for the Japanese orator of the other day bore testimony to his own admission to Hawaiian citizenship. What rights have the Chinese been deprived of by the new Constitution that they should complain? They are not in any worse position than before, and if they are well advised they will not agitate their apparent grievance. Designing persons for a selfish purpose may seek to ally

them with the native race, but it is impossible to show any common cause existing between the two nationalities. Leading Chinese have in the recent troubles expressed anything but an aloha for the late administration; on the contrary they derided with hearty contempt the whole drift of native rule. They will gain nothing nor bestow any benefit on their allies by making or being made catspaws of the disaffected Hawaiians. A reason that of itself should have caused the framers of the Constitution to hesitate before giving Chinese the franchise, is that the discontent producing the so called revolution was greatly intensified by corrupt transactions between rulers of the nation and Chinese.

THURSDAY, JULY 21, 1887. LOCAL NEWS.

The Inter-Island Steam Navigation Company is paying a dividend of three dollars a share.

Sheriff Baker of Hawaii is reported as drilling natives nightly at Hilo and lately receiving a case of arms and ammunition.

The Paia plantation has stopped grinding for three weeks. It is reported that there is about 200 tons yet to grind.

There is a possibility of the brig W. G. Irwin being in with later news before the date for the arrival of the S. S. Australia, 26th inst.

The closing exercises of the Royal School take place to-day, and of the Fort-street School to-morrow. Both will probably be, as usual, interesting.

Mr. H. F. Hebbard, Road Supervisor, is having the railroad track put in good condition for hauling in rock for street macadamizing from the quarries.

H. B. M. S. Conquest will leave the latter part of this month for a cruise round the group, to take the British Commissioner on an official visit to various points.

Posters are posted up around town calling for an election by the Fire Department for Chief Engineer and two Assistants to be held Wednesday evening, August 3rd.

Lunailo street is to have a larger water main put in—namely, 8 inch pipe. Larger mains are also to be laid on Fort street, from Beretania toward the harbor, and on Maunakea street.

After a long and serious drought Hamaakua was visited with rain last Monday evening, commencing at six and lasting all night to about eight the following morning. The prospects for more are encouraging.

Honolulu has been divided up into districts similar to the precincts or wards in the United States. Each district will have its register of voters and persons must vote at the polling places of the district in which they reside.

Mr. Thomas E. Evans, who was recently acquitted by a jury of criminality in the shooting of a Chinaman while in discharge of his duty, has been reinstated as Deputy Sheriff of Lahaina, Maui, and left for his post by the Kinau.

Persons of the name of Freist and Reis have been published by contemporaries as "Reist" on different occasions lately. What has the Second Deputy Clerk of the Supreme Court done that his name should be given to anybody who happens to have an "ei" in the middle of his cognomen?

Mr. Geo. C. Beckley, who was known on his recent travels as "the Commodore," has resumed the position of purser on the S. S. Kinau, happy, no doubt, in being home again and away from the reach of the Chicago reporters, who recorded all he said, and doubtless a great deal more, in that city.

On the departure of the Kinau, Monday afternoon, a native woman who was a passenger arrived just as the steamer was leaving the wharf. Everybody but the woman thought her "too late." Running along the wharf to the point where the boat was nearest she jumped. In a second many hands were stretched out and grasped her arms. For a few moments she hung with every prospect of a ducking, being a very heavy piece of humanity. However, after a great deal of pulling and tugging and puffing she was pulled aboard over the railings head first, amid great applause and laughter.

The Status of the Boodlers.

Commenting on the verdict in Sharp's case, the New York World presents the status of every person connected with granting the franchise to the Broadway road. Three are in Sing Sing Prison; ten are indicted and out on bail; one clearly is out on bail, the jury having disagreed; two are informers; one is insane; one died, one in Germany and five in Canada. The papers generally approve the verdict. The World says Jacob Sharp would seem to be eligible to membership in the Thirteen Club. He bribed thirteen aldermen, the jury convicted him after thirteen minutes' deliberation, and he is to be sentenced on the 13th of July.

Police Court.

Before Justice Dayton, July 20th. One case of drunkenness was fined \$6.

Mow Oni was discharged for common nuisance. Koloa Sugar Company vs. Kanakale. Deserting service for about three years. Defendant having been committed to the Insane Asylum, the suit was withdrawn.

Wm. Foster vs. F. J. Hills. Action to recover \$100, the amount of purchase money for a horse. Judgment for defendant; costs \$3.90. Plaintiff notes appeal.

N. S. Sachs vs. F. Hilder. Assumpsit for \$116.66. Defendant admitted a debt of \$45.20, and after evidence was taken on both sides plaintiff consented to judgment for that amount, with expenses making the amount of \$53.52. It appeared one Montano owed plaintiff a bill, and told him that if he got a customer for milk he could collect the proceeds to the amount of his bill. Plaintiff succeeded in getting defendant to take milk from Montano. Defendant received from Montano \$76.46 worth of milk, but the latter collected \$35 for the first month's bill and told defendant not to pay Mr. Sachs. Mr. Hilder has changed his milkman. Smith & Kinney for plaintiff.

S. Lesser vs. Geo. Wilson; S. I. Shaw, garnishee. Assumpsit for \$19. Case dismissed at request of defendant's counsel, as plaintiff's attorney was not ready and had sent his client away.

John E. Bush vs. John L. Kaulukou, Marshal of the Kingdom. Replevin for a horse. W. C. Achi for plaintiff. Defendant levied on the horse under execution of W. H. Luce. Judgment for plaintiff for the horse; costs \$5.70.

N. B. Emerson vs. Jas. F. Noble. Assumpsit for \$88.50 and interest. Defendant claimed to have been rendered a reduced bill for \$60. Judgment for plaintiff for \$88.50, with expenses bringing amount up to \$117.95. Appeal noted.

Two civil cases were continued and one settled out of Court.

Shipping Notes.

The Kilauea Hou had as cargo 1,902 bags sugar, and 100 bales of wool from Ookala.

The schooner Caterina from Hanalei had a cargo of 55 bags rice; and schooner Canute from Kuau 2,636 bags sugar.

The bark Hope from Port Townsend had 540,000 feet lumber for Lewers & Cooke.

The barkentine Ella is expected to sail for San Francisco on Friday with a cargo of sugar.

The steamer Surprise while at Kuau had her boiler spring leak. It was too bad to continue her trip and so she turned back to port, arriving here at 10 a. m. yesterday. She will lay up here for a few weeks to receive a general overhauling. The schooner Canute will receive what freight there is on board and will sail for Hilo and wayports in charge of Capt. Weisbarth.

Pohukaina Girls' School.

During the past three days closing exercises have been held at the Pohukaina school for native girls. The exercises were well attended by the pupils' parents and friends. Miss Corney and her assistant teachers cannot but feel greatly encouraged in their good work by the manner in which the pupils went through the different branches of study. Throughout the recitations the English was excellent, an attainment difficult for a teacher to procure from a native pupil. The singing, which deserves special mention, was assisted, through the kindness of Mr. Berger, by several saxophones.

There are about one hundred pupils in the school, ranging from five to seventeen. The teachers are Miss Corney, principal, Miss W. B. Luce, Mrs. Wood and Miss Dudoit.

Additional Rifle Prizes.

Lieut. C. W. Ashford (Attorney-General) has presented three additional prizes to be competed for at the semi-annual practice of the Hawaiian Rifle Association. The first (No. IX.) is the Ashford medal valued at \$75, open to all members of the Honolulu Rifles. Second (No. X.) is a Springfield rifle open to members of the battalion who have not beaten 80 per cent. at any meeting of Association or Rifles. Third (No. XI.) same as second, open to members of the battalion who have not beaten 65 per cent. These prizes form a material addition to the list of the approaching meeting on Saturday next.

Engin Co. No. 2 and Hook and Ladder Co. both held meetings last night, and each unanimously nominated the former ticket: C. B. Wilson, for Chief Engineer; Frank Hustace, First Assistant, and Jas. F. Morgan, Second Assistant.

The monthly meeting of the W. C. T. U. will be held in the parlors of the Y. M. C. A. at 2:30 this afternoon, when devotional exercises will be conducted by the Rev. Dr. Beckwith.

SUPREME COURT.

July Term, before Judge Preston.

Wednesday, July 20th. H. Ackerman vs. J. H. Congdon. Assumpsit. S. B. Dole and F. M. Hatch for plaintiff; C. W. Ashford and Paul Neumann for defendant. The following jurors were drawn: S. Roth, A. J. Cartwright, Jr., J. H. Soper, L. Way, G. C. Stratemyer, E. H. Woodworth, R. J. Creighton, H. Davis, T. J. King, W. E. H. Deverill, J. Emmeluth and H. W. Morse. The case for the defendant was in progress when Court rose at 5 p. m.

Summary Naval Discipline Ashore.

At about half past five last evening the attention of pedestrians and others was attracted by one of the men of the Conquest chasing another down Nuuanu street near King. The pursued ran down the Makiki side of Nuuanu across King, recrossed Nuuanu and came to a stand still at Afong's door. The pursuer, who was some petty officer, on coming up, struck him several times with his open hand, then carrying him to a muddy pool on the corner, threw him bodily into it head first. Picking the bellowing form up again, the pool was made more slushy by another plunge. Not content with this the prosecutor rolled and rolled the unfortunate victim until he resembled a bundle of filthy rags instead of a human being. Then using his hands as a scoop he threw what mud and water was left into the victim's face, filling the mouth, which was open imploring mercy, and eyes, until those organs were completely stopped up. The affair was witnessed by a large number of the Conquest men. They explained that it was a punishment for stealing money while on board from several of the men.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

Mr. D. L. Aphart wishes to explain that he only spoke at the mass meeting the other day as the interpreter of Mr. Katsura. His speech as reported in this paper should therefore be attributed to the gentleman last named.

The arms and ammunition that have been stored in the Palace grounds have all been removed to the Barracks. That is a move in the right direction, but public safety should require the appointment of an arsenal and magazine farther from the heart of the city.

Complaints having come from Hilo about Mr. J. T. Baker, Sheriff, occupying himself too much in drilling the natives, the Attorney-General has written him instructions to discontinue his military operations, on the ground that the responsible office of Sheriff of Hawaii should have sufficient business to engage his undivided attention.

The Bulletin, echoed by the Advertiser, has seen fit to contradict, in emphatic terms, with a lecture attached, the statement published in this paper that bullet proof shutters had been ordered for the Palace windows. All the same the statement was correct, the evidence to the contrary being similar to that given by the fifty witnesses before the Arab sheik, who swore they did not see the defendant steal the camels.

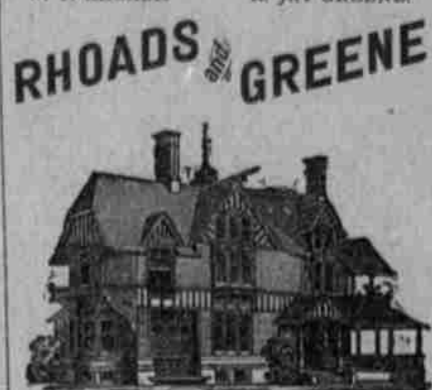

LOCAL NEWS.

The Inter-Island Steam Navigation Company is paying a dividend of three dollars a share.

Sheriff Baker of Hawaii is reported as drilling natives nightly at Hilo and lately receiving a case of arms and ammunition.

The Paia plantation has stopped grinding for three weeks. It is reported that there is about 200 tons yet to grind.

There is a possibility of the brig W. G. Irwin being in with later news before the date for the arrival of the S. S. Australia, 26th inst.

The closing exercises of the Royal School take place to-day, and of the Fort-street School to-morrow. Both will probably be, as usual, interesting.

Mr. H. F. Hebbard, Road Supervisor, is having the railroad track put in good condition for hauling in rock for street macadamizing from the quarries.

H. B. M. S. Conquest will leave the latter part of this month for a cruise round the group, to take the British Commissioner on an official visit to various points.

Posters are posted up around town calling for an election by the Fire Department for Chief Engineer and two Assistants to be held Wednesday evening, August 3rd.

Lunalilo street is to have a larger water main put in—namely, 8 inch pipe. Larger mains are also to be laid on Fort street, from Beretania toward the harbor, and on Maunakea street.

After a long and serious drought Hamakua was visited with rain last Monday evening, commencing at six and lasting all night to about eight the following morning. The prospects for more are encouraging.

Honolulu has been divided up into districts similar to the precincts or wards in the United States. Each district will have its register of voters and persons must vote at the polling places of the district in which they reside.

Mr. Thomas E. Evans, who was recently acquitted by a jury of criminality in the shooting of a Chinaman while in discharge of his duty, has been reinstated as Deputy Sheriff of Lahaina, Maui, and left for his post by the Kinau.

Persons of the name of Freist and Reis have been published by contemporaries as "Reist" on different occasions lately. What has the Second Deputy Clerk of the Supreme Court done that his name should be given to anybody who happens to have an "ei" in the middle of his cognomen?

Mr. Geo. C. Beckley, who was known on his recent travels as "the Commodore," has resumed the position of purser on the S. S. Kinau, happy, no doubt, in being home again and away from the reach of the Chicago reporters, who recorded all he said, and doubtless a great deal more, in that city.

On the departure of the Kinau, Monday afternoon, a native woman who was a passenger arrived just as the steamer was leaving the wharf. Everybody but the woman thought her "too late." Running along the wharf to the point where the boat was nearest she jumped. In a second many hands were stretched out and grasped her arms. For a few moments she hung with every prospect of a ducking, being a very heavy piece of humanity. However, after a great deal of pulling and tugging and puffing she was pulled aboard over the railings head first, amid great applause and laughter.

The Status of the Boodlers.

Commenting on the verdict in Sharp's case, the New York World presents the status of every person connected with granting the franchise to the Broadway road. Three are in Sing Sing Prison; ten are indicted and out on bail; one Cleary is out on bail, the jury having disagreed; two are informers; one is insane; one died, one in Germany and five in Canada. The papers generally approve the verdict. The World says Jacob Sharp would seem to be eligible to membership in the Thirteen Club. He bribed thirteen aldermen, the jury convicted him after thirteen minutes' deliberation, and he is to be sentenced on the 13th of July.

Police Court.

Before Justice Dayton, July 20th. One case of drunkenness was fined \$6.

Mow Oni was discharged for common nuisance.

Koloa Sugar Company vs. Kanakole. Deserting service for about three years. Defendant having been committed to the Insane Asylum, the suit was withdrawn.

Wm. Foster vs. F. J. Hills. Action to recover \$100, the amount of purchase money for a horse. Judgment for defendant; costs \$3.90. Plaintiff notes appeal.

N. S. Sachs vs. F. Hilder. Assumpsit for \$116.66. Defendant admitted a debt of \$45.20, and after evidence was taken on both sides plaintiff consented to judgment for that amount, with expenses making the amount of \$53.52. It appeared one Montano owed plaintiff a bill, and told him that if he got a customer for milk he could collect the proceeds to the amount of his bill. Plaintiff succeeded in getting defendant to take milk from Montano. Defendant received from Montano \$76.46 worth of milk, but the latter collected \$35 for the first month's bill and told defendant not to pay Mr. Sachs. Mr. Hilder has changed his milkman. Smith & Kinney for plaintiff.

S. Lesser vs. Geo. Wilson; S. I. Shaw, garnishee. Assumpsit for \$10. Case dismissed at request of defendant's counsel, as plaintiff's attorney was not ready and had sent his client away.

John E. Bush vs. John L. Kaulukou, Marshal of the Kingdom. Replevin for a horse. W. C. Achi for plaintiff. Defendant levied on the horse under execution of W. H. Luce. Judgment for plaintiff for the horse; costs \$5.70.

N. B. Emerson vs. Jas. F. Noble. Assumpsit for \$88.50 and interest. Defendant claimed to have been rendered a reduced bill for \$60. Judgment for plaintiff for \$88.50, with expenses bringing amount up to \$117.95. Appeal noted.

Two civil cases were continued and one settled out of Court.

Shipping Notes.

The Kilauea Hou had as cargo 1,902 bags sugar, and 100 bales of wool from Oookala.

The schooner Caterina from Hanalei had a cargo of 55 bags rice; and schooner Canute from Kuau 2,636 bags sugar.

The barkentine Ella is expected to sail for San Francisco on Friday with a cargo of sugar.

The steamer Surprise while at Kuau had her boiler spring leak. It was too bad to continue her trip and so she turned back to port, arriving here at 10 a. m. yesterday. She will lay up here for a few weeks to receive a general overhauling. The schooner Canute will receive what freight there is on board and will sail for Hilo and waypoints in charge of Capt. Weisbarth.

Pohukaina Girls' School.

During the past three days closing exercises have been held at the Pohukaina school for native girls. The exercises were well attended by the pupils' parents and friends. Miss Corney and her assistant teachers cannot but feel greatly encouraged in their good work by the manner in which the pupils went through the different branches of study. Throughout the recitations the English was excellent, an attainment difficult for a teacher to procure from a native pupil. The singing, which deserves special mention, was assisted, through the kindness of Mr. Berger, by several saxophones.

There are about one hundred pupils in the school, ranging from five to seventeen. The teachers are Miss Corney, principal, Miss W. B. Luce, Mrs. Wood and Miss Dudoit.

Additional Rifle Prizes.

Lieut. C. W. Ashford (Attorney-General) has presented three additional prizes to be competed for at the semi-annual practice of the Hawaiian Rifle Association. The first (No. IX.) is the Ashford medal valued at \$75, open to all members of the Honolulu Rifles. July Term, before Judge Preston.

The case for the defendant was in progress when Court rose at 5 p. m.

Summary Naval Discipline Ashore.

At about half past five last evening the attention of pedestrians and others was attracted by one of the men of the Conquest chasing another down Nuuanu street near Kipp. The pursued ran down the Makiki side of Nuuanu across King, recrossed Nuuanu and came to a stand still at Afong's door. The pursuer, who was some petty officer, on coming up, struck him several times with his open hand, then carrying him to a muddy pool on the corner, threw him bodily into it head first. Picking the bellowing form up again, the pool was made more slushy by another plunge. Not content with this the prosecutor rolled and rolled the unfortunate victim until he resembled a bundle of filthy rags instead of a human being. Then using his hands as a scoop he threw what mud and water was left into the victim's face, filling the mouth, which was open imploring mercy, and eyes, until those organs were completely stopped up. The affair was witnessed by a large number of the Conquest men. They explained that it was a punishment for stealing money while on board from several of the men.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

Mr. D. L. Abphart wishes to explain that he only spoke at the mass meeting the other day as the interpreter of Mr. Katsura. His speech as reported in this paper should therefore be attributed to the gentleman last named.

The arms and ammunition that have been stored in the Palace grounds have all been removed to the Barracks. That is a move in the right direction, but public safety should require the appointment of an arsenal and magazine farther from the heart of the city.

Complaints having come from Hilo about Mr. J. T. Baker, Sheriff, occupying himself too much in drilling the natives, the Attorney-General has written him instructions to discontinue his military operations, on the ground that the responsible office of Sheriff of Hawaii should have sufficient business to engage his undivided attention.

The Bulletin, echoed by the Advertiser, has seen fit to contradict, in emphatic terms, with a lecture attached, the statement published in this paper that bullet proof shutters had been ordered for the Palace windows. All the same the statement was correct, the evidence to the contrary being similar to that given by the fifty witnesses before the Arab sheik, who swore they did not see the defendant steal the camels.
