ELECTION PROCLAMATION.

In accordance with Chapter LXXXVI. of the Session Laws of 1890, being "An Act to amend and consolidate the Election Laws of the Kingdom," notice is hereby given that a General Election for Nobles and Representatives will be held throughout the Kingdom between the hours of 8 o'clock a. m. and 5 o'clock p. m. on WEDNESDAY, the 3rd day of February, 1892.

The Election for Nobles shall be as follows:

FOR THE ISLAND OF HAWAII.

Two for the 6-year term and one for the unexpired term (2 years) to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Hon. E. Burchard.

FOR THE ISLANDS OF MAUI, MOLOKAI AND LANAI.

Two for the 6-year term.

FOR THE ISLAND OF OAHU.

Three for the 6-year term, one for the unexpired term (4 years) to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Hon. H. A. Widemann, and one for the unexpired term (2 years) to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Hon. E. Muller.

FOR THE ISLANDS OF KAUAI AND NIHAU.

One for the 6-year term.

A letter from Wailuku says, "Politics up here very quiet as far as national politics are concerned, but there is quite a stir concerning the road boards." The intense interest taken by the people in this the first election of road boards is illustrative of the great importance of the matter of roads in public affairs. It depends a great deal upon the manner in which the people acquit themselves of their responsibility in this instance, whether the law creating elective road boards shall be given permanence. Indeed, it may be held that the question of the extension of the elective system to other public offices depends, in a very great measure, upon the degree of wisdom the electors throughout the kingdom shall employ in selecting men to undertake the charge of road building and maintaining.

In reply to Mr. Marques only a few words are necessary. What that gentleman was contending for, in regard to the Census bill, was "impracticable," and in referring to it from memory it was not a great error to say that he was the author of an impracticable measure. He tried to make the pending measure impracticable by officious meddling, and, when balked in that, in a childish pet secured the killing of the bill. The editorial Mr. Marques referred to might have been attributed to Mr. Macfarlane, but like ninety-nine out of a hundred guesses of that kind the guesser was wrong. As to Mr. Marques's "complete refutation of the BULLETIN'S charges," there was nothing of the kind. This paper said he misled the House in regard to the year for taking the census in other countries, citing all the countries of the British Empire against the statement of Mr. Marques. The work quoted by the hon. gentleman does not weigh against the known facts, which are that not only have British countries taken the census in 1891, but several of the continental countries of Europe have done likewise. There is as much of example and as much of reason for having the census taken in the "ones" as in the "noughts." The offense of Mr. Marques was twofold: working the defeat of the measure, and to do so misleading the Legislature.

1st. In payment of such employees including the wages already owing to the defendant's employees for a period not exceeding thirty days and also insurance on the property.

2nd. In payment of taxes now due and owing on the defendant's property.

3rd. In payment of rentals which, dating from the beginning of the present quarter, shall become payable on the leases of the defendant Company.

4th. In payment of the costs of court and legal expenses incurred in these proceedings and subject to further directions and after passing accounts.

5th. In payment of said First Mortgage Bonds and coupons.

6th. In payment of the moneys secured by said second mortgage bonds and coupons, and

7th. Paying the surplus, if any, into this Court, and let the said receivers have such other powers and discretions as in like matters are properly and usually exercised by receivers.

Let the receivers from time to time pass their accounts in this Court as the Judge shall direct, and have liberty to apply for directions as to any payments to be made by them and generally.

And let an enquiry be made what are the debts and liabilities of the persons interested in the moneys to come to the hands of the receivers, after payment of the items named in the 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th clauses above written, and for such enquiry let the said bondholders be ascertained and summoned and made parties hereto.

And further hearing of said Bill of Complaint is adjourned for further order and direction.

Liberty to apply as advised is given to any of the parties concerned in the premises.

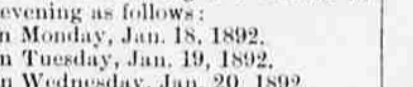

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FOREIGN PROTECTION.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—
 For a batch of falsehoods (and a
 tendency to bluff) from beginning
 to end, commend us to an editorial
 in the P. C. Advertiser of Jan. 12,
 headed: "The Bayonet Clause." It
 says: "At the time of the election
 of Kalakaua order was maintained in
 this city by the joint action of Amer-
 ican and English forces, though
 there were then, as now, no foreign
 element of disturbance, but only the
 probability of a faction fight in which
 foreign residents were likely to suffer
 in person or property." Instead of
 order being maintained by the Amer-
 ican and English forces as the Ad-
 vertiser says, there was a riot going
 on for three or four hours. The
 court house where the election took
 place, was gutted from cellar to
 dome, and a number of the Repre-
 sentatives were badly hurt. One of
 the Representatives died shortly
 afterwards through injuries received
 at the riot. The choice of the na-
 tives was for Queen Emma. The
 night before the election of Kalakaua
 a large majority of the Representa-
 tives were at the house of Queen
 Emma, and then there, agreed to
 vote for her the next day. But for
 some cause or other they voted the
 other way. Perhaps the Advertiser
 can explain why.

The war forces never came on
 shore until asked to do so by the
 authorities. A deputation of citi-
 zens was sent two or three times be-
 fore the war party came ashore for
 Queen Emma to come and quell the
 riot, which she could have done in-
 side of five minutes; but she refused
 to go, or have anything to do with
 it. Such are the facts briefly told.
 Again the Advertiser warbles thus:
 "During the time of the whalers,
 when the harbor of Honolulu was
 absolutely crowded with whalships
 and its streets with their men, there
 was regularly stationed here, year
 after year, three foreign men-of-war
 —French, American and British,
 throughout the season, avowedly to
 assist in keeping the peace, as the
 police were totally inadequate to deal
 with, maybe, many hundreds of sea-
 men frequently just in from a long
 voyage and with money in their
 pockets." The above is one of the
 biggest whoppers that was ever con-
 cocted within the editorial sanctum
 of the Advertiser office. There never
 was a time during the many years
 that the whalers visited the Islands,
 when there were three war vessels
 stationed here to keep the peace.
 Nor was there ever one man-of-war
 stationed here for that purpose.
 Whalmen were never turbulent and
 never gave the police or anyone else
 trouble but once; and that once, the
 whalmen were in the right, and
 some government officials were the
 aggressors. Those who are con-
 stantly holding up and shaking the
 "Bayonet Clause" at the public, are
 the guilty and the cowardly. "Only
 hat, and nothing more."

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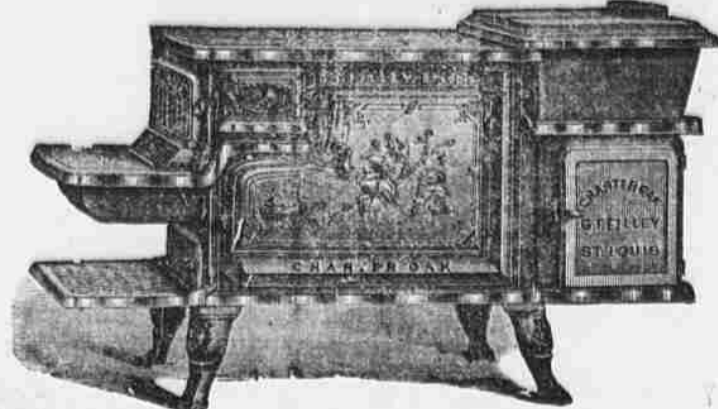
