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## HAWAII'S "BLUE" LAWS CONSTITUTION and LAWS

Framed by the Missionaries

## LAWS of the HAWAIIAN ISLANDS.

At the present time children entirely free a man from Gov-  
ernment work, also from the land tax, and poll tax.

Formerly, the chief, could call the people from one end of  
the Islands to the other to perform labor.

At the present time this is prohibited, and the people can  
be required to work only near by their home.

Formerly, if the King wished the people to work for him  
they could not refuse. They must work from month to  
month. So also at the call of every chief and every landlord.

At the present time there is nothing of the kind. If any  
chief should attempt to pursue such a course, it would be a  
crime such as would free all his tenants from laboring for  
him at all until the time specified in the law.

Formerly, the people were regularly required to work  
every Tuesday and Friday, that is four days in a month for  
the King and four for the landlord, eight in the whole, and  
as many more as the chiefs chose.

At the present time the whole number is limited to six  
days in a month, leaving twenty laboring days for the peo-  
ple.

Formerly, if the people did not go to the work of the King  
when required, the punishment was that their houses were  
set on fire and consumed.

Now if they do not go, they must pay a rial, or at most a  
quarter of a dollar,

But still, the people are wailing on account of their present  
burdens.

Formerly, they were not called burdens. Never did the  
people complain of burdens till of late—till these dreadful  
weights mentioned above were removed. This complaint of  
the people however would have a much better grace, if they  
with energy improved their time, on their own free days,  
but lo! this, is not the case.

They spend many of their days in idleness, and therefore  
their lands are grown over with weeds, and there is little  
food growing.

The chiefs of their own unsolicited kindness removed the  
grievous burdens mentioned above. The people did not first  
call for a removal of them. The chiefs removed them of  
their own accord. Therefore the saying of some of the peo-  
ple, that they are oppressed, is not correct. They are not  
oppressed, but are idle.

In view of these complaints of the people, and in view o  
their idleness on their own free days, the following new law  
is enacted.

1 If a farm be seen to be grown over with weeds and lit-  
tle food upon it, and yet a good farm for cultivation, in such  
a case, the tenant shall be dispossessed, though he shall not  
be dispossessed without a trial, nor at the mere suggestion  
of his landlord. The criminal person shall be dispossessed,  
whether it be the landlord or the tenant.

**SELF-CONVICTED.**

The Rev. Sereno E. Bishop appeared the other evening before the so-called "consins" society and refuted a statement made by the arch-enemy of the reverend gentleman, James H. Blount. The commissioner whose report has more value than any other historical work on Hawaii says:

"It may be remarked as a significant fact, that with two exceptions, the children of the missionaries neglected to enter the chosen field of their fathers, they seeming quite content to let the souls of the gentle Islanders take their chances, while for themselves they generally preferred lives which gave promise of more tangible rewards for thrift and energy."

It will be seen that Mr. Blount only refers to those sons of missionaries, who have devoted their time to save the souls of the "gentle Islanders." Mr. Bishop answers him by mentioning the name of twelve "sons of missionaries" of whom the very large majority have not done duty as soul-saviors in Hawaii-nei.

Mr. Blount did not say a word about the efforts of these missionary sons in other spheres. He simply said, that only two had devoted their time and strength to do the "soul-business" in Hawaii-nei.

And according to the Reverend Sereno E. Bishop, he certainly was correct.

The following "sons" are mentioned as missionaries, but they certainly did not work in the Hawaiian field of religion where their fathers and brothers made fortunes, but confined themselves to other climates:

1. L. H. Gulick spent his time in the South Seas, America and in a pleasure trip to Spain and Italy where he "converted" Roman Catholics.

2. J. T. Gulick is an "evolutionary" scientist in Japan.

3. Hiram Bingham devoted his time in translating the bible to the Gilbert Islanders—and we trust they digested it.

4. O. H. Gulick preaches Christianity—not to Hawaiian—but to Japanese in Hawaii.

5. W. Gulick is trying to Christianize the most Christian country called Spain which according to the A. B. C. F. (and the rest of the alphabet) is in a sad state of heathenism, and he is also a connoisseur of Spanish wines.

6. T. L. Gulick also considered Spain a successful field for conversion and he used earthquakes and dynamite explosions in a most sensational manner.

7. F. W. Damon, whose father was not a "missionary" is saving Chinese souls but take no interest in Hawaiians.

7. S. C. Armstrong educated niggers and Indians in the United States but devoted no time to assisting Hawaiians to heaven, as did his ku-i dancing brother when he at Kalakaua's court plied them with bad gin.

There consequently of the list presented by the Reverend Bishop remain only four who staid in Hawaii. We leave it to the public to say what benefit any of them ever had upon the natives or how many souls they ever tried to save. Not as many as the *tuleanas* which they did see. There is 1, the reverend Sereno E. Bishop. He has worked as a surveyor and land-speculator and has occasionally driven the old Fort Street congregation into insanity through his idiotic and somniferous sermons. He is supposed to be an expert on sun spots, but we don't think that the great register which we are told is kept above will show many souls to his credit. As we can say nothing good about the old man we refrain saying anything disparaging. His unchristian and uncharitable conduct towards the Queen on whom he at one time was fawning is a sufficient proof of his character.

The fact, that Mr. Blount kicked

him out of doors, on account of his boorish impudence is the true reason of his attack on that highly educated and shrewd commissioner.

2. Henry H. Parker, the one son of a missionary to whom Blount referred has worked in his church since 1863. He is an honest and an honorable man, and if the rest of the breed had followed in his footsteps not one word would ever have been said against the missionaries and their sons in Hawaii-nei.

3. A. O. Forbes was never a very active worker among the Hawaiians. To his credit be it said though, that he did his duty in a modest and unselfish manner and never for a moment tried to take any undue advantages or enrich himself.

4. O. P. Emerson has done more than any other man to alienate the Hawaiians from the church and to estrange them from christianity as it is preached here. He may be as Mr. Bishop aims an efficient secretary of the Hawaiian Board, but he is certainly not among those, who have devoted their times to save the souls of the "innocent islanders."

It will therefore be seen that Mr. Blount was more than correct in his statements. By stretching a little, it can be admitted, that two sons of missionaries took up the work of their fathers among the Hawaiians. The rest did not.

And let us finally ask the Reverend gentleman who speaks to the old ladies (male and female) who form the consin's society, what has become of the sons of the most genuine and most earnest missionaries?

What are the Baldwins, Alexanders, Smiths, Baileys, Castles, Cookes, Rices, Lyman and other descendants of the pioneers doing today?

Everyone is doing well on the good things of this world, and everyone of them have deserted the mission of their fathers.

**A Gratuitous Insult.**

Mr Arthur White, who was charged this morning in the Circuit Court with assault with a deadly weapon, pleaded guilty this morning. Judge Cooper sentenced White to 24 hours imprisonment and to pay a fine of \$300.

Anybody knowing something about court proceedings would realize, that the judge only desired to give the accused a nominal imprisonment, and that the real punishment was the fine. The executive officers thought differently.

Mr. White was promptly furnished with a striped suit and marched to the photographer where he had his picture taken and given a place in the "rogue's" gallery of Mr. Low.

The court never intended that such a humiliating process should have been gone through by the prisoner.

If he should be punished severely a different term of imprisonment would have been given. A similar procedure has never been used in this country, and the foolish and autocratic act of the petty official, who is responsible for this outrage should be disavowed by the authority as well as condemned by every citizen immaterial of individual opinions in regards to White's offense.

It is understood that the attorney general, and his deputy have disapproved of the treatment of White, and that the blame falls altogether on the heads of Marshal Hitchcock and jailor Low.

The offense of White is well-known.

After a base-ball game between certain local teams the pitcher in one of them admitted, that he had "sold" the game. A considerable amount of money were lost and "base-ball" virtually broke up for the season.

The corrupt pitcher claimed, that White was the briber. White denied it and there was ill-feeling between them. White then got the boy out to Waikiki and thrashed him. The boy ran and White who was considerable under the influence of liquor fired a shot for the purpose of scaring the fellow. It was a pitch dark night and White's attempt to

shoot in the air was not a success. The bullet took effect in the leg of the corrupt youngster and the case is the consequence of this attempt of White.

Taking these circumstances into consideration; the provocation of punishing the young fellow and the non-intention of shooting him the judge gave White the comparatively light sentence above mentioned.

The executive officers should be taught to adopt the same spirit as that expressed by the decisions of the courts, and they should promptly and positively be prohibited from airing their personal spite on any man given into their charge by the courts.

And W. O. Smith is the man who should prevent it.

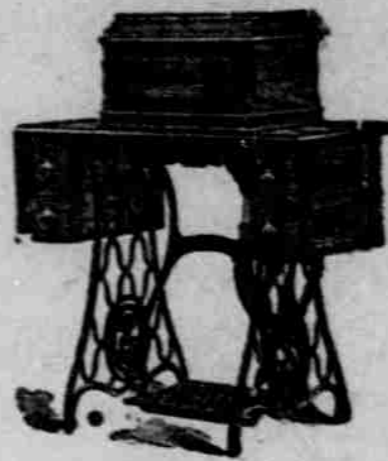
