With words on how it is the duty of citizens to become involved in the process of a democratic government, new Federal District Court Judge Alex R. Munson was sworn in by Governor Pedro P. Tenorio on Monday morning in the federal court room.

For the swearing in ceremony, the court room was filled with attorneys, and governmental officials. And after the ceremony, Munson and his wife, Kathleen, patiently greeted those who had come to witness his becoming the judge to replace departing Judge Alfred Laureta.

Associate Justice of Pohnpei State Supreme Court Judah C. Johnny spoke briefly before the actual swearing in ceremony began on the high qualifications Munson would bring to the court here. He spoke of how he had known Munson for quite some time and how he had found him to be a man of "sensitivity to the needs of the people."

"I envy the people of the Commonwealth," said Judge Johnny over the appointment of Munson to the bench.

A statement from U.S. President Ronald Reagan, dated Nov. 14, 1988, was read by the clerk court as a part of the proceeding, then Governor Tenorio administered the oath of office to Mun-

## Two Weekend Deaths Reported To Dept. of Safety

Over the weekend two deaths were reported to the Department of Public Safety. One death is being treated as a drowning, and the second death is from unknown causes, but in neither case is foul play suspected, said DPS Public Safety Officer Capt. Antonio Reyes.

Aimario Saggi, age 24, of San Antonio was found dead in his bed at the barracks of Sablan Construction Saturday. It was reported to DPS at 4:42 p.m. Capt. Reyes said Saggi's fellow workers tried to rouse Saggi from his bunk but were unable to and after checking him they realized he was dead. The cause of death was unknown and will be determined by an autopsy. There were no wounds of any sort on Saggi's body, said Reyes.

Rodolfo B. Calica, age 30, also lost his life over the weekend. Calica, an employee of Nikko Hotel, was spear fishing at Tank Beach along with eight other fellow employees, said Reyes. The other employees saw him swim out to far and be carried out to deep water by the current. They reported it to the DPS Boating Safety Division but because it was night when it was reported, around 10:30 p.m. Saturday, and because of rough seas, no search was immediately made, said Reyes.

The next morning the body of Calica was spotted at 7:50 a.m. floating about 50 to 75 ft. from the reef north of Tank Beach. The incoming current washed the body into shallow water where it was recovered. Calica was pronounced dead at 9:46 a.m. on Sunday. Reyes said the death is being treated as an accidental drowning with no criminal charges expected to be filed.

\*\*\*Aside from the two deaths, over the weekend there were also five cases of charges of assault with a dangerous weapon made against individuals.

Samuel Cango was charged with assault with a dangerous weapon for an attack on Bertha Villagomez in Tanapag, Reyes reported.

## Guilty and Not Guilty Pleas Entered Monday

Several felony charges were arraigned at the Commonwealth Court Monday morning with most defendants entering pleas of not guilty and a few pleading guilty to the charges against them.

Also more charges have been made against Nerson Ramon, an ex-immigration official who already faces multiple charges.

A plea of not guilty was made by Dominic Faiso to charges of

sexual abuse of a child and disturbing the peace. Faiso will have a status hearing on Jan. 3.

Jose Ayuyu plead guilty to possession of an unregistered firearm and was give one year in jail, all suspended, placed on one year probation and charged a fine of \$150.

Marino Camacho plead not guilty to seven counts of receiving stolen goods and will have a status conference on Jan. 3. Assistant Attorney General Ron Hammett said most of the goods

found in possession of Camacho were from burglaries in the Navy Hill and San Vicente area.

Joseph Ada, entered a plea of guilty to two counts of assault with a deadly weapon. Ada was charged with attacking two Filipinos in a bar with a knife. Ada was given 2 years with all but 18 months suspended.

Nerson Ramon was charged with theft by deception and misconduct in public office. Assistant Attorney General and Chief of Criminal Division Edward

Hayden said the charges against Ramon were not related to other charges of bribery, extortion, and misconduct of office which Ramon faces in a previous case against him.

Also Sylvano Alfonso plead not guilty to two charges of rape, and four counts of sexual abuse of a child, and a charge of assault with a deadly weapon. Alfonso was arrested on Friday and has been detained since then with a bond set at \$20,000, said Hayden.

There are times when people in the media feel a bit down about everything as it is their job to talk to the police about rapes, and murders and other gruesome stuff.

It is our job to look at politicians closely in their actions and at other members of government also who play their politics from office to office instead of district to district.

Yes, by and large we are a cynical lot. We are not necessarily born that way or start off in the profession that way. We have just gotten burned a few too many times, lied to by sources, and generally attacked by those who do not feel we write their side of the story all the time. But we can still feel pretty well the pain and triumphs of our fellow beings.

At the Rotary Club party we saw a child that had been affected since birth with a handicap. That child could not speak, nor see, but only hear. We do not know why it takes all too often the confrontation with someone less fortunate than us for us to understand just how blessed we are. It is not a good thing to appreciate things only when confronted with the loss of those things.

The death of the man who was just picking up cans at the dump was another time we really felt something as we imagined how the family of the man must feel when they learned of the circumstances of his death. Or the drowning death of a person who came to Saipan on a vacation and was taken to the Grotto for a dive. Again there is tragedy in these events which we as members of a media which is forced to put out thousands of words each week do not always give the full due to the event.

We hope there are more events like the Rotary Club party to write about, more things positive going on in the Commonwealth. And to a large extent we have to rely on you to tell us about them.

We know the usual criticism that the media only wants the bad news, the controversial news, the scandals, and crimes of one sort or another, but this is not the full scope of the media. We do not just want to make your blood pressure rise, but to inspire, and give you enjoyment as well.

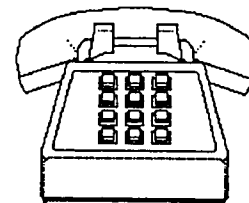

blame on teachers, talk of crime that lays all the blame on the police and the court system. He said it is the duty of citizens in a democracy to share the responsibility for the community they live in and to be involved in the process.

There are three types of government, he said, as he named government by one person, government by a few persons or government by all persons as in the case of democracy. "With a democracy you can have a good form or a corrupt form," said

Munson. The difference being that of whether or not the members of that government act in the interest of all the people or act only in light of their own self-interest.

Because of the uniqueness of the Commonwealth, Munson said he was proud to hold the office of federal judge in the Commonwealth. "It is the smallest district but the most interesting one," he said. Since many of the cases a federal judge would review on a district level in the U.S. are "run of the mill" cases,

Munson said, he would enjoy the challenge of the Commonwealth district as many cases are being decided for the first time and precedent was being set.

Also Munson said the Commonwealth was being viewed by the world because of its unique compact of agreement with the U.S.

"The eyes of the people of the Pacific are on the Commonwealth and indeed the eyes of the super-powers are also," he said.

Munson term of office is for ten years.

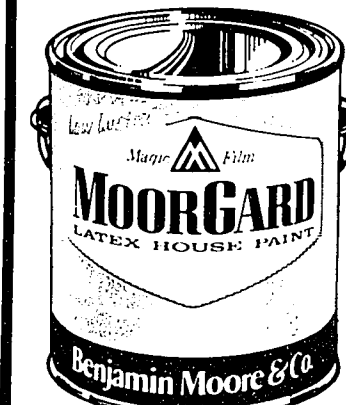

**Sore Eyes on CNMI**

(CNS) - A tidal wave of pink eye is once again washing over the Northern Mariana Islands. Babies, children and grown ups are experiencing redness in the eyes and eyelids with mucous discharge, according to Dr. Jose T. Villagomez, Director of the Department of Health and Environmental Services.

Dr. Villagomez said this is a viral disease, like the common cold that spreads rapidly from person to person through touch or towels. There is no cure. "In fact, medicine put in the eyes may make them worse due to allergic reaction to antibiotics," Dr. Villagomez said. "However, warm compresses may shorten the symptoms." The infection usually lasts for three days to a week. There may be a mild discomfort. If the pink eye is not cleaning in a week, if there is much pain or large amounts of pus discharge or trouble seeing, Dr. Villagomez recommends visiting a physician.

Children may be kept home from school to prevent spread among classmates. Hand washing is the best way to prevent the spread.

Garapan and Alberta Remoket also of Garapan.

At a job site in Puerto Rico, a dispute between two security guards led to one of them being charged with assault with a dangerous weapon. After an argument over the radio, the attacker showed up at the job site with a .22 cal. rifle and threaten the other man, said Capt. Reyes.

And at another job site a dispute between to workers led to

one of them attacking the other with a plastic pipe and charges were filed, said Reyes.

In addition to those cases, DPS responded to five burglaries, 16 thefts, 7 simple assaults and batteries, five DUIs and 16 traffic accidents over the weekend.

For the month of November, DPS responded to 651 calls. There were 125 traffic accidents, 70 cases of DUI, 132 thefts, 73 burglaries, 55 assault and batteries, and three deaths.

**1989 ANNUAL ALIEN REGISTRATION SCHEDULE IMMIGRATION SERVICE**

The Chief of Immigration and Naturalization wishes to remind all aliens that the CNMI Immigration Law requires that an Annual Registration be made at the beginning of each year. All aliens must register and receive a 1989 Registration Card. Aliens or any persons who are not United States Citizens or U.S. Nationals, C N M I Certificate of Identity holders, CNMI citizens, CNMI permanent residents, U.S. Green Card holders, or Trust Territory citizens. Failure to register and failure to have the card in your possession is punishable by 90 days imprisonment, a \$500 fine, and deport-ation.

Registration on Saipan will begin on January 3, 1989. The Registration will be conducted on the second (2nd) floor of the Nauru Building, Susupe. Registration will be daily. Aliens will be scheduled according to their present Entry Permit Number. The schedule will be posted at post offices, the main Immigration Office, and other public places.

Registration on Tinian will be conducted at the Tinian Immigration Office. Registration on Rota will begin January 3, 1989 and will be conducted at the Rota Immigration Office. All aliens must bring with them (1) a completed alien registration application; (2) employer affidavit form; (3) original copy of current entry permit; (4) non-resident workers labor certificate (if in the CNMI for employment); (5) previous alien registration card; (6) two identical photographs; and, (7) \$10.00 for payment of the registration application fee.

Registration application forms must be obtained in advance at the respective Immigration Offices.

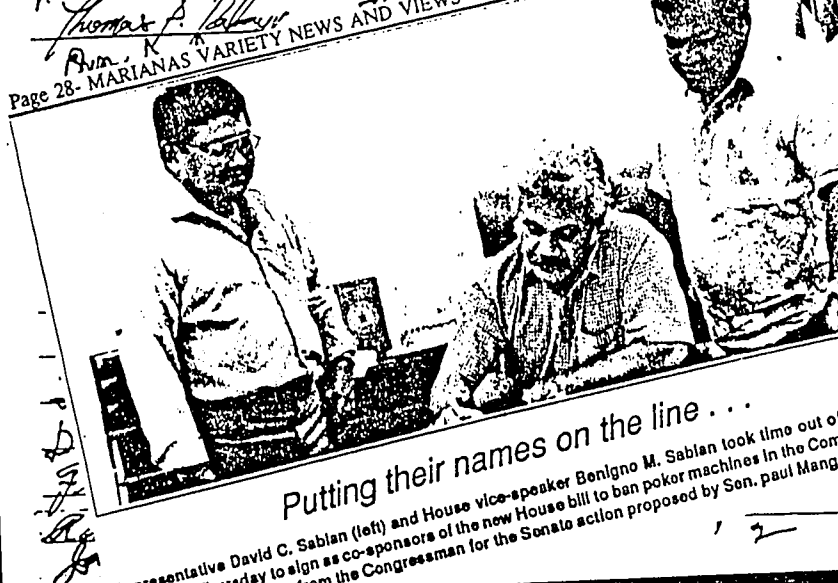

**Machine Was Broken, L & T Claims**

Claiming that its poker machine broke, and was "malfunctioning," L & T International has filed a counterclaim against Jesus A. Arriola, and has accused Arriola of deception.

Knowing he had not accumulated 60,344 points. [Arriola] falsely represented to L & T that he had accumulated said points with the intent to deceive L & T," the counterclaim reads.

"L & T did rely upon this deceit and paid counter-defendant \$5,000. Counter-defendant refuses to pay back any part of this \$5,000," the court filing continues.

On February 1st, Arriola had filed suit against L & T, claiming he had won \$15,086 on a poker machine he was playing at the Bras Restaurant in Garapan. L & T paid Arriola \$5,000 but has refused to pay the balance, and Arriola sued for the \$10,086 he claimed is still owed him by L & T. L & T filed its countersuit on February 11.

In a separate response to the suit, L & T stated that it "intends to rely on the defense of mistake." "Defendant's machine clearly indicated that a malfunction voids all plays." L & T is arguing.

Attorney for L & T in the case is Bob O'Connor. Mike White is representing Arriola.

"We maybe back to square one," said Rosario referring to the chance a new US representative would be appointed and that person would have to become acquainted with the issued involved in the 902 talks.

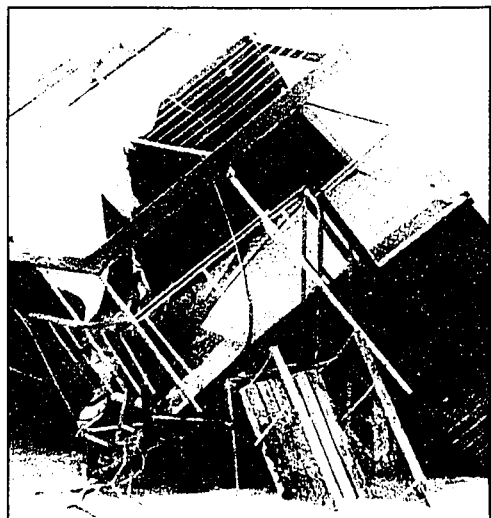

## Alcohol Abuse Help

Persons who want to know the facts about alcohol and drug abuse have on island a source to turn to and that source is Debra Rogers whose office is at the Public Health section of the hospital.

Rogers has been on island since late September offering the knowledge and experience she has gained in her ten years in the field of drug and alcohol abuse counselling to those who seek her aid.

Brought here under a grant, she is a part of the expanding programs on substance abuse and mental health at the hospital and Public Health. Rogers said a person need not have a serious problem with alcohol in order to visit her. "I am willing to answer questions on alcohol and drug abuse, and I am here for one to one counselling."

And should a person become frustrated with the official system of finding just where to go for help and who to ask for, she said, "I am willing to take people through the individual steps they need to take."

Already Rogers has become involved with those who may have a problem with alcohol abuse as she regularly gives a presentation in the Alcohol Awareness Classes that are given to persons convicted of DUI.

Also she has given presenta-

tion at various schools and is available on request to the public school system.

But Rogers said she does not want to wait until a person has been ordered by the court to start to offer her help. Just a desire to want to know more about alcohol abuse and its effects on personal and business relations is enough to get into her office door.

"A person can gain access to me directly," she said. "I can be reached by calling the Public Health Division and asking for me."

One of the steps she takes a person through who seeks her advice is to have them make a personal history of their use of alcohol and to show them what the consequences of that use has been in their lives.

"The first big step is to overcome the denial of a person that they do have a problem," she said. "I have to show them that when they got into a jam, alcohol was a big factor is causing them to have that trouble."

In addition, Rogers is able to refer persons to other specialist who may be able to help a person and to make suggestions as to what other action the person needs to take to settle their problems, whether it is a problem of finances, a job related problem, or a problem related to marriage or family.
