LEGISLATIVE.

The only actual business transacted in the Assembly yesterday, was the passage to engrossment of the bill making the harbor of Mahukona, Hawaii, a port of entry and departure for foreign shipping; and a resolution appropriating the sum of \$25,000 for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the Session of 1882.

A number of resolutions were offered, providing for the insertion in the appropriation bill of various amounts for internal improvements—among others, \$200,000 for a railroad through Hamakua, Hawaii—all of which were laid on the table until such time as that bill shall be introduced.

After a session of an hour and a half, there being no further business before the House, an adjournment took place.

CORRECTION.—The suggestion made by the Hon. Mr. Pilipo in the Assembly on Thursday, that a statue of His Majesty Kamehameha III. be erected, was not put to vote and consequently was not "carried by a large majority," as reported in the P. C. Advertiser of yesterday. It failed of a second. But the resolution for making a national holiday of the birth-day of Kauikeaouli the Good, was passed, without opposition. The Minister might with pertinency have inquired of the mover what day in the year he would prefer to have so set apart; for the fact is, it never was definitely settled exactly when he was born, at Keaulou in Kona, Hawaii. To be sure, the 17th of March was the day observed during the King's lifetime, but it was suspected that Irish influence had something to do with the selection of the day.

PRISON LABOR.—According to the Report of the Marshal to the Interior Department, the Prison receipts for the year ending March 31, amounted to \$38,358.58, being \$11,591.88 more than for the corresponding period in 1881. In the matter of expenditures for the support of prisoners, and the receipts of prisons, during the past two years, there is a balance to the credit of the latter of \$6,841.05—the prisoners have earned that much over and above their own support. Both the Marshal and the Minister seem to favor the idea of keeping the prisoners at work within the prison walls, if possible, and recommend the subject to the consideration of the Assembly.

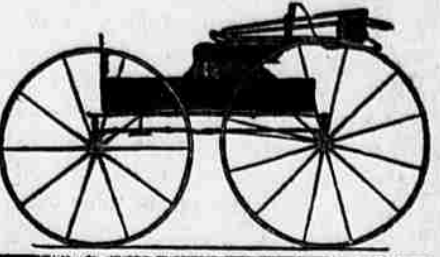

For Hawaiian bred horses; mile dash; catch weights. Entrance, \$10.
King's Plate, \$125—
For three-year-olds; open to all; best 2 in 3; to carry 100 lbs. Entrance, \$15.
Park Cup, \$75—
3-4 of mile; free for all two-year-olds bred in the Kingdom; catch weights. Entrance, \$10.
Reciprocity Plate, \$100—
Trotting Race; mile heats; best 3 in 5 to harness; free to all horses that have not a better record than 2:40 in any public race in this Kingdom. Entrance, \$15.
Queen Emma Plate, \$100—
Running Race; 3-4 mile dash; free for all to carry 100 lbs. Entrance, \$10.
Express Cup, \$75—
Trotting Race, one mile, free to all horses that have been driven in a public hack six months previous to this 11th of June. Entrance, \$10.

Reforms in Conveyancing.
In moving to bring about a radical reform in our system of conveying property the Bar Association of this city has undertaken a work whose achievement will be a boon to the public as well as the legal profession. The present methods of passing titles and recording deeds, mortgage, &c., are not only cumbersome and inconvenient to lawyers, but expensive and often unsafe to buyers of property. At a meeting of the association held last night favorable action was taken on the report of a committee which recommends various changes intended to simplify and improve the law and practice relating to forms of conveying, recording deeds of transfer, giving notice of liens, making searches, &c. The recommendation that short and simple forms of deeds and mortgages to be prepared under the direction of the Chief Judge of the Court of Appeals be adopted in the place of the ancient and absurdly verbose documents now in use will strike the community with special favor, as will also the suggestion that the Surrogate before admitting to probate a will of real estate be directed to require testimony showing who the heirs are. England has just reformed its system of conveying and there can be no question as to the advantages that will be gained by taking the same step here.—N. Y. Herald.

Giving the East what it Wants.
Chicago, April 13.—The Chicago Tribune has a long editorial seriously proposing the transfer of the Chinese from California to the Eastern States, where, according to their representatives in Congress, they are hungering for a Mongolian invasion. The editorial continues: There can, however, be no question that the voluntary migration of the Chinese from the Pacific to the Atlantic Coast, encouraged by bounties or otherwise, would be legal. The State of California would be justified, under the circumstances, in offering free transportation to any Chinaman who should desire to seek his fortunes in any of the Atlantic States. The experiment ought to have a fair and honest trial. The State would be glad to put in its next appropriation bill \$500,000 for the transportation of Chinese laborers, skilled and unskilled, to New York and Boston.

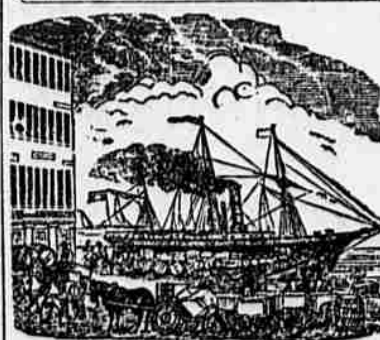
