THE FORGERY CASE.

Decision Given by His Honor the Police Justice F. H. Hayselden Acquitted.

In the Police Court yesterday afternoon at 1.30 o'clock, His Honor Police Justice Dayton gave his decision in the case of Rex vs. F. H. Hayselden, forgery in having on the 15th day of February, 1885, within this Kingdom, contrary to section 5, chapter 29, of the Penal Code, altered a writing, to wit, a bill of account rendered by one E. C. Rowe, dated February 6, 1883.

His Honor said that he could have given judgment in this case on the day of trial, but owing to the gravity of the offense, he thought it best to take time and review the evidence. After quoting from the evidence of Col. Hauka, and Messrs. Hayselden and E. C. Rowe, His Honor said: The Court must come to the conclusion that the forgery was made between the time the bill of Rowe was paid and the time the summary of the bills in the vouchers was made up. Now, is there any evidence to show that the defendant knew the amount of those two drafts? I am unable to find any. There is the evidence of the defendant that others besides himself were employed in the Foreign Office at the time, and would it not be reasonable to suppose that they had the best opportunity to know what amount was necessary to make the bills fit the two drafts. Then, again, defendant and Colonel Hauka had private bills. Would it not have been quite natural for defendant to have added \$30.00 to his own bill rather than commit a forgery, which must have taken some time to find a place to make figures fit the amount. I find fifteen bills in the vouchers. The summary of the bills is dated February 20, 1883, and the bills were paid at different times. Rowe's bill was paid on February 15, 1883, five days before the bills were summarized, and the defendant and Rowe agree as to \$136.90 having been paid. When the bill was brought to the notice of the Attorney General by Rowe, it was the duty of the former to prosecute the defendant and investigate the matter, as without doubt a forgery has been committed. Now, the question is who was the person that did it? There is no evidence to show where the bill was between the time it was paid and the date the bills were summarized, and further, there is no evidence to show that the defendant knew the amount of those two drafts at the time he paid the bill or at any other time; therefore he is discharged.

Hon. Paul Neumann and Mr. F. M. Hatch appeared for defendant; the Attorney General, C. W. Ashford, for the Crown.

Credit. As the subject of credit is one that has been much written about in this city, we present the following data regarding the terms of credit allowed in various countries derived from reports of United States Consuls and published by that Government:

In Germany the credit system is widespread, and the purchasers in settling their accounts are generally much longer than in France or England. Nearly every commercial and manufacturing branch of business has its own particular terms of credit, and there is no uniformity in this respect.

In England a payment of the price of the goods delivered is required at the end of three months, dating from the day of shipment.

In France a four months' acceptance is required to be sent in settlement of the invoice.

In Italy but little credit business is done, and none without good security being given.

In Spain four-fifths of the transactions are done on a cash basis, while in Portugal great liberality is shown, and quite a long credit is usually allowed.

In Austria it is scarcely possible to do business without allowing a very long credit, which is nearly always one of six months.

In Turkey even objects of prime necessity are sold on credit, and in this country, as well as in Russia, the time allowed is in most cases twelve months.

In Canada settlements are made at the end of thirty days, with a discount of 5 per cent. Sometimes a credit of from three to six months is allowed, but in this case there is no discount.

In Mexico the large commercial houses willingly give credit of from six to eight months, and in the retail trade longer terms are given customers in which to settle their accounts.

In Costa Rica a credit of from six to twelve months is given in case of merchandise imported from Europe, in order that the goods may be easily and quickly disposed of. But since this system of credit has often led to losses, it is now being given up.

In Cuba the time fixed for payment is generally from four to five months after delivery of the goods.

The Consul General of the United States at Rio states that one of the greatest drawbacks to commercial intercourse with Brazil resides in the necessity of allowing too long a credit. At Rio Janeiro, as at Buenos Ayres, minimum credit is six months.

In the Bermudas accounts are settled but once a year. The 30th of June is the day usually fixed for payments.

In Asia Minor a credit of but two or three weeks is in most cases all that is allowed.

In China it is not customary to give credit. Money is obtained from lenders who exact an interest of from 8 to 12 per cent. Business is nearly always conducted upon a cash basis.

In Australia a credit of six months is generally allowed.

Hawaiian Exhibits at the San Francisco Mechanics' Institute Fair.

The Mechanics' Institute Fair in San Francisco will be held the first two weeks in September. The San Francisco "Bulletin" of July 30th, referring to the Fair, has the following: "In a further endeavor to secure the success of the exhibition, application was made to the Secretary of the Treasury for a ruling that would admit free of duty goods consigned for exhibition only, and this ruling was promptly made. This will insure exhibits from Mexico and Hawaii. Consul Coney of the former country has worked assiduously in the matter, and has succeeded in interesting his Government, which, appreciating the benefits likely to be derived from an attractive array of goods, has decided upon making an entry. Mr. Coney, however, expects to do much better at the Fair of next year. An invitation has been sent to Hawaii, requesting an exhibit, and Consul McKinley of that country has taken great interest in promoting the designs of the Directors. A large and varied array of the products of the island Kingdom is expected, as well as implements of husbandry, dwellings, native clothing and other features of native life. It is expected that this exhibit will be very unique and quite a feature."

Giffard scorer.

That Sea Born Baby.

The Port Townsend "Daily Argus" of July 15th has the following: "The infant daughter of Captain Armstrong, of the bark Kalakaua, reported from Honolulu papers as having been born in mid-ocean between Valparaiso and Honolulu, was born alongside of the wharf at Port Townsend. It was baptized here by Rev. J. B. Alexander, and Judge Swan, Hawaiian Consul, was godfather. The affair was duly published in the "Argus" at the time.

Caroline Herschel.

Please tell the date of Caroline Herschel's birth, the chief events of her life and as much as possible about her character. CONTRAST READER. Born in Hanover, March 16, 1750. Died there Jan. 19, 1848. In her 23d year she went to England to join her brother, Sir William Herschel, and assisted him in astronomical calculations. Between 1786 and 1805 she discovered eight comets, being the first observer of five. She contributed largely to her brother's works, in his name, making the original observations of several remarkable nebulae in his catalogue, and computed the places of 2,500 nebulae. In 1798 she published her catalogue of stars taken from Flamsteed's observations. After her brother's death she returned to Hanover. In 1839 she completed a catalogue of stars and nebulae observed by her brother, receiving therefor a gold medal from, and an election to the Astronomical society of London. She was modest, patient, devoted to a fixed purpose, and to her brother, to whom she was as necessary at home as in the computing room.

OH TEN.

The following is taken from an old manuscript: "January 4th, 1774, then reckoned with S—G—, and to balance all our accounts and there was due him in old ten \$24 1/2c. Please tell me what is meant by 'old ten,' sometimes, though rarely, written old tenner?" OSMAK.

At the commencement of the last century, owing to overvaluation of silver in France, the heavy silver coins rapidly disappeared from circulation in Great Britain, only the light and worn ones (often 25 per cent. below the standard) remaining. The government undertook to recoin the entire remaining and worn silver, and to make it full weight without raising its value. This only facilitated its export and rendered its circulation more difficult at home; the real value of the coins being so uncertain that the guinea fluctuated in price, as measured by silver, from 21s. 6d. to 38s. It was therefore, in 1774, declared that silver should no longer be a tender, except by weight, beyond 253. The amount due, as you have stated, was to be paid with reference to this, or in accordance with the old tender.

MEETING OF HAWAIIANS

Held Last Evening at the Kaunakapili Church—Ticket for Representatives Nominated.

The basement of the Kaunakapili Church was filled to overflowing last evening with an audience principally composed of Hawaiians, to nominate candidates for Representatives at the coming election.

The meeting was called to order by J. M. Poepee, and the Rev. J. Waiaman was appointed Chairman.

On motion of W. C. Achi, Enoch Johnson was appointed Secretary.

Mr. Poepee read a paper purporting to be a contract between those who are to be nominated for Representatives and the people to work for each other. Mr. Henry Waterhouse read the document in English.

Mr. Poepee then said that they had assembled to nominate candidates for Representatives and Nobles under the New Constitution. They were all allowed equal rights and franchises. He urged upon his hearers not to listen to outside talk. There were a large number of foreigners who were very good men.

Hon. Mr. Rosa read a letter from T. R. Lucas, in which the latter declined the nomination as a candidate for representative. He hoped good men would be nominated.

W. C. Achi said they had met to nominate candidates, and he hoped they would be no discord in their ranks. He announced the number of delegates present as follows: First Ward 7, Second Ward 6, Third Ward 9, Fourth Ward 7, Fifth Ward 9, Sixth Ward 5, Seventh Ward 9, Eighth Ward 5. Total 57.

Messrs. Achi, Poepee, Rosa, Pua, Kean, Hanaamooe, Kane, Kaunaki, Kuniaka and Kani were appointed a committee to judge upon the qualifications of the delegates. They were found in order.

W. C. Achi said that as there were 57 delegates it would require 29 votes to elect a Representative.

The delegates then proceeded with the nomination of candidates, the following names being presented: Antone Rosa, W. C. Achi, J. M. Poepee, S. M. Kaunaki, D. W. Pua, J. P. Hanaamooe, A. N. Kuniaka, J. Kanui, J. Kean and S. K. Kane.

While the nominations were being made Mr. Rosa was called upon for a few remarks. He said the new Constitution, with a few exceptions, was a good one. A great many foreigners were with them. He scouted the idea of foreign intervention. They were able to govern themselves.

The delegates then cast their votes, the result being as follows: J. M. Poepee 55, W. C. Achi 52, A. Rosa 40, S. K. Kane 36, J. Kean 24, Kaunaki 12, Kuniaka 2, Kanui. The first four were declared elected, amid applause.

Mr. W. O. Smith asked the meeting if they were satisfied with the candidates, and there was an unanimous cry of "Ae" (yes).

W. C. Achi then announced that a meeting for the nomination of nine Nobles would take place Monday, August 22d, at 7 o'clock. Those who desired to be candidates were requested to send in their names to him or any other member of the committee at once.

J. M. Poepee made a few remarks, in which he said that if elected to the Legislature he would carry out the wishes of the people and uphold the dignity of the Throne.

W. C. Achi followed in a similar strain.

Mr. Rosa thanked the meeting for the honor they had done him in electing him as a candidate, and he would try his best to forward the interests of the people. It had been said that native Hawaiians could not conduct an orderly meeting, but the result of this meeting showed the fallacy of such a statement.

S. K. Kane also made a few remarks. Mr. Henry Waterhouse on being called upon, read the platform of the Reform Party. He was there to advocate for good government for the benefit of all.

Mr. W. O. Smith at first said he thought he would not make any remarks until after the Nobles had been nominated, but reconsidering the matter he made a short but pithy speech. He did not like to see strangers in the Legislature. There were enough born on the soil to attend to the affairs of the nation.

The meeting, which was a very enthusiastic and orderly one, then adjourned.
