THE Y. M. C. A.

regular monthly meeting was held on Thursday evening in their Hall. A good number of members were in attendance. The discussion on extending further aid to the Chinese mission was again postponed, and the instructions to the building committee in regard to the unfinished room were deferred. It was announced that Captain Bray would leave for the coast next week probably by the Falkenburg and thus there would be a vacancy in the position of General Secretary. The number of visitors for the past month to the building has been 1,290. Some 7 new members joined. The estimated expenditure for the forthcoming twelvemonth will cause a deficit of \$1,500 which must be met.

KAWAIAHAO SEMINARY.

Anniversary Exercises were held yesterday morning in the Kawaiahao Church which was neatly and tastefully decorated for the occasion. This is the first year that a scholar of the Seminary has graduated, Miss Julia N. K. Kawewehi having attained that proud distinction. The programme was a long one comprising compositions, recitations, and vocal music, and an extremely interesting Kindergarten exercise by 23 little girls under the able leadership of Mrs. F. M. Simpson. Amongst the most appreciated were a song, the "Old Black Cat," by sung one little girl with three others assisting her in the refrain, interesting compositions on a Pony by Miss A. Puuo. hau, China, by Miss M. Kwai Ziang, Cruelty to Animals, by Miss E. Powers, and two able and valuable essays on the Past History and Present condition of Hawaii by Misses E. Kanepuu, and J. Kawewehi respectively which would have done credit to any school. "The valley of Chamouni," a musical selection, and Miss Kealohapuanole's recitation, "I Spin," deserve special mention. After the exercises the first graduate was presented with a neat and handsome diploma. The results of the exercises and examinations have been extremely creditable to Miss Norton and her able and well-trained corps of assistants, who have built well on the foundations so well laid by the former principals, the Misses E. and L. Bingham.

MACCABE

deserves to have a whole newspaper to himself in which his praises should be recorded and a special minstrel to sing them for he certainly has done a wonderful amount of driving away of the settled "Molloncolly" of the "hupper orders" of this city. Thursday night was another instance of how his versatility in character representation with his powers of shrewd and witty observation could be appreciated by a Honolulu audience.

The new features of the programme were, an imitation of Mr. Henry Russell with characteristic song and accompaniment "Back Again," and a "Mellow"-dramatic burlesque entitled "Vanquished Villainy" or "Virtue Victorious" written by Mr. Maccabe himself.

The introduction by Mr. Maccabe in which he described how he came to his original idea of beginning the play in the middle and thus sparing the audience the misery of seeing the dull and stupid first acts was inimitable. The raucy drollery and

dry humour of his asides were responded to by positive convulsions of laughter on the part of the audience. Each of the dramatic personae was introduced, Wagner-like, by a characteristic motif, thus the villain was introduced by villainous music. The rapidity of the changes of costume by which Mr. Maccabe was enabled to take each part in the play and the happy thought of getting the audience to imagine the scenery so that each had what suited him best were only surpassed by the fidelity to type of the characters played in transpontine theatres in London. The tripping of the village maiden, the talk of the heavy villain, and the shrill tenor of the lover were reproduced to the life. But "the acme of sartorial surprise" was reached when Mr. Maccabe took both parts of villain and maiden at the same instant, and one moment was loving to "subtraction" and the other exploring to be released. We won't give away the modus operandi but expect all our readers who haven't seen it to go and see this wonderful laughter-raising next-door-to-instantaneous transformation. In the villain's death scene the local hit on the papers (newspapers) by which he proved the rightful heir was somebody else and so on by reference 1st to the Gazette, then to the Viser, and for final and convincing proof to the BULLETIN was immensely applauded. So also was the letting of the audience into the secret of how stage vil aims revive after death behind the curtain and stalk wearily off. The usual olio of characters were given in the second part with all his former verve and vivacity. His remarks on the subject of piano lessons to children were sound and sensible.
