Pledged to neither Side nor Party, But Established for the Benefit of All.
THURSDAY, OCT. 11, 1894.
In that hall will be framed the first political platform for candidates to stand upon while being voted for for office under a republican form of government.—Advertiser.
Oh, no, the platform will not be framed in "that hall." It is now being framed in some private office, with mighty few of the delegates to the convention asked to help in framing it. There will be a committee on platform fixed beforehand, who will retire and, within less time than any of them ever filled a letter sheet page, return with a perhaps not badly worded platform. Their entrance will be the signal for a rally of applause, with more of it at each period, all arranged in advance, and the platform will go through with little or no change. Honolulu will show as fit a political machine as New York.

Ka Leo's editor ought to read the constitution. There he would find that foreigners who receive letters of denization or special rights of citizenship are not required to forswear their native allegiance. Only British subjects who become naturalized—for instance, Mr. Scott of Hilo reported in this paper the other day—are required to renounce allegiance "particularly" to Queen Victoria. If all foreigners had to renounce their American, British, German, or other allegiance, before registering, the registry of voters would scarcely have enough names on it to make a quorum for a nominating convention. This is a hard saying, so far as the doctrine of "Hawaii for the Hawaiians" is concerned, but honest—that the affairs of the Hawaiian Islands are in the hands of aliens. With the BULLETIN the question was—when the United States had confirmed the undoing of the Hawaiian Government wrought by her own officials—whether to take a hand in practical politics, doing the best possible for the country under unfavorable circumstances for which others are responsible, or, on the other hand, retiring under a willow to waste wind in idle lamentations on what might have been if a lot of things had not happened—for instance, if those who are now howling for queen and country had not betrayed both, aiding and abetting the enemies of each, directly and indirectly, in the year 1892.

CATCH BY A PATROLMAN.

Result of Exploiting Chinatown Instead of Protecting the suburbs

The mounted patrol made an arrest last night, the first one in a long while, and a very important one at that. Patrolman Wiehart, while spying through Chinatown in the vicinity of Maunakea street, fell in with a Japanese woman. The patrolman stated in Court this morning that the woman made overtures to him, when he had her arrested. The woman told quite a different story. She stated that the "hooch" came to her place, and that she refused to have anything to do with him. Her story was corroborated by another woman, who happened to be in the room at the time. The Japanese woman was sentenced to fifteen days imprisonment at hard labor. J. K. Kauai noted an appeal on behalf of the defendant. It is generally supposed that the mounted patrol is maintained for the protection of the suburbs. Chinatown and the business quarter are understood to be look-after by the regular police on beat. Only within the past few nights a sneak thief or burglar has been disturbing the peace of residents on the plains. The mounted patrol should be taking care of such characters and not mooning about Chinatown.

JUDICIAL NOTICES

A Law Declared Unconstitutional—O. A. Brown Answers.

In L. Ahlo vs. J. P. Mendonca, petition to obtain right of way for water-dume, Judge Whiting has sustained defendant's demurrer, on the ground that a Judge of the Circuit Court has no jurisdiction under the statute, and, secondly, pro forma, that Chapter 27 of the Laws of 1876 is unconstitutional. With regard to the first ground, the Court holds that the Circuit Court was not in existence when the law was passed, and the provisions in respect to this case are specific in giving jurisdiction to a Justice of the Supreme Court. W. R. Castle and F. M. Hatch for plaintiffs; C. Brown for defendant.

Charles A. Brown, defendant to the suit of Irene Haalou li Brown, a married woman, and George li Brown and Francis Hyde li Brown, minors, by their friend, A. F. Judd, and A. F. Judd and Sanford B. Dole, has filed his answer to the complaint. He makes certain admissions, but the chief interest of the answer is, where, claiming ignorance of certain allegations in the complaint, he throws on A. F. Judd and S. B. Dole (the latter successor of J. Komoikehuhu), the burden of proving that certain words were omitted in the copy of the will of the late Judge li, and that the original will gave the estate into the hands of the executors as a trust during the life of Mrs. Brown. Magdonand Hatch are for defendant.

FOUND DEAD

A Chinaman Expires in the Night in His Lonely Crib

Goo Kim, Chinese Commercial Agent, telephoned to Deputy Marshal Browne at 10 o'clock this morning, notifying him that a dead Chinaman had been found in a house on Nuuanu street. The man lived by himself and for some time past had been in a weak and sickly condition. He went into his apartment and closed the door at 8 o'clock yesterday evening. During the night natives living in an adjacent building heard a noise as of some one choking. No investigation was made until this morning at 8 o'clock, when the room was entered and the Chinaman was found lying on the floor. He must have been dead for hours, as the odor was something shocking, and no one could be induced to enter. Goo Kim was notified and, on examination, the cause of death was found to be hemorrhage of the lungs. In view of this finding no coroner's inquest will be held.

PRO TEMPORE LEGISLATURE

Weekly Meeting of the Executive and Advisory Councils.

W. C. Wilder, President of the Councils, took the chair at the usual time this afternoon, with him being present: Ministers Hatch, King and Damon; Councilors C. Brown, John Ewa, Henry Waterhouse, W. F. Allen, J. A. McCandless, D. B. Smith, J. P. Mendonca, John Nott, Alex. Young and E. D. Toney. Minister Damon read the weekly financial statement.

Receipts were \$51,456.73, including \$12,000 from the Postal Savings Bank. Interior yielded \$10,743.90, Customs \$11,049.75, and Taxes \$13,194.97. Expenditures were \$45,071.93. The net indebtedness is \$3,534.17.40.

The bill to amend the incorporation law passed third reading. The bill to amend the law relating to boundaries passed with amendments recommended by the Judiciary Committee.

Mr. McCandless asked an opinion as to whether an Advisory Councilor was eligible for election to the Legislature.

President Wilder said there was a difference of opinion on the matter, but he had no doubt in his own mind.

Mr. Waterhouse thought a Councilor must resign before he could be elected to the Legislature.

Mr. Hatch, after consultation with his colleagues, said the opinion of the Executive was that members of the Council were eligible to election.

President Wilder thought that in the constitutional convention a proposition to make an Advisory Councilor ineligible was voted down.

Mr. McCandless thought it was as competent for a Councilor to be elected as for a Senator to succeed himself.

At 2:20 the Councils went into executive session.

A steam launch was reported off Diamond Head at 2 o'clock this afternoon, making for Honolulu harbor. It is supposed to be the launch Ka Maile, in charge of A. McDowell, returning from the wreck of the Geo. N. Wilcox. There are four men in the boat.

Part of the wreckage from the Geo. N. Wilcox drifted ashore at Kapaa, Kauai, during the present week.

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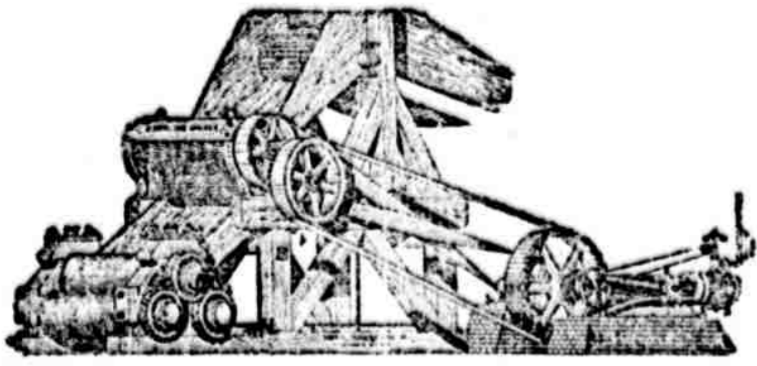

Fair Play Wanted.

EDITOR BULLETIN:-
Having known Billy Cunningham for some years and having been his companion on more than one of his hunting trips, I think I am able to throw some light on the discussion which is extant regarding the action of those people who are trying to prevent him from getting a shooting license.

First, I should like to know who has done more to improve the shooting on these islands. Billy, as is well known, has imported several varieties of pheasants at considerable trouble and cost to himself. It is true the actual value of the pheasants was paid to him after much bother in collecting the money. Some of these pheasants were given to Mr. Brown and turned down at Waipio, where they have done well. Billy has sent pheasants to Stockton, to the Golden Gate Park and to several other places on the Coast, and has received very satisfactory letters from the Park Commissioners and others in California with regard to them. This shows the interest he has taken in acclimatizing these birds on the Pacific Coast as well as in the Hawaiian Islands. He has imported Irish and English setters and pointers of the best blood to be obtained, thereby improving the breed of hunting dogs on the islands, and he is almost the only man who has done this. One of these dogs he refused \$50 for and sold to one of the signers of the protest for \$30 because he would sooner let a friend have the dog at a less price than sell him to a man he did not know so much about.

It is a well-known fact that Messrs. C. L. Brown, E. A. Melnery and Cunningham have been partners in their hunting trips for the past five or six years, and why should the signers of the protest so suddenly turn the cold shoulder on one of their number, and that one, he who has done more towards fostering and improving legitimate sport than all the rest put together. Some years ago one of the signers, Mr. Melnery, objected to the forming of a sportsmen's association, on the ground that it partook too much of the nature of a monopoly, and when a later association was proposed Cunningham objected to it for the very same reason. It appears to me and it must appear to all lovers of fairplay that the present proceeding is a glaring injustice and one utterly incompatible with true sportsmanlike feeling, and the sooner the whole business is settled either one way or the other the better it will be for all parties concerned. Messrs. Brown, Melnery & Co., who are so confident that they have proof positive to support their accusations against Cunningham, must have been in pretty close association with him at the time they obtained their alleged proof and it would be well for them to remember that it is dangerous for those living in glass houses to throw stones around to any great extent.
