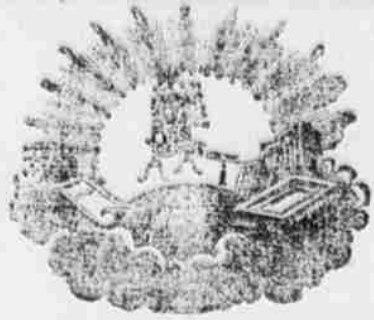

ADMIRAL BROWN ON HAWAIIAN AFFAIRS.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 4. I avail myself of the opportunity offered by the sailing of the Oceanic for Honolulu and China to-day to write a few lines to the BULLETIN. Outside of the revolutionary scare created by Admiral Brown of the U. S. Navy, on the arrival of the Charleston at Seattle, there is not much to write about, and of that incident it is perhaps advisable to say but little. The accompanying extracts from the local papers present the case without note or comment. The improbability of any revolutionary movement taking place at Honolulu while the Legislature was in session occurred to most people who read Admiral Brown's statement, and as it was known that letters had been received from well informed people in Honolulu of date August 4th, brought by the Charleston, which gave no intimation of trouble, most people were inclined to treat the matter as a newspaper "fake." But as Admiral Brown made no denial it came to be accepted as genuine. The Chronicle ridiculed the affair, and said that the Admiral wanted to go back again to Honolulu, as it was the most agreeable place for navy officers on the entire North American station.

On the arrival of the Alameda the report of a revolutionary movement was declared to be wholly groundless by Judge Bickerton, Mr. Lousion, and other prominent people from the Islands. Notwithstanding this fact, the Admiral received telegraphic orders on Sunday, August 31st, to proceed to Honolulu without delay, and accordingly the Charleston sailed from Port Townsend at noon on Sept. 1st, and expected to reach her destination on the 6th. Before his departure Admiral Brown reiterated his statement that he had received reliable information of a projected revolution, and that King Kalakaua's throne was in imminent danger of overthrow.

It is surprising that no one seems to know anything about the matter

except the Admiral and presumably the Navy Department, unless it be that Minister Stevens advised the State Department of a plot to overthrow the Government. Another singular fact or circumstance is that none of the other foreign representatives appear to have informed their Governments of the approaching dissolution of the Hawaiian monarchy. This is the more remarkable, as, from the Admiral's interview, Major Wodehouse, the British Commissioner, is suggestively identified with the revolutionary movement, in the belief that a return to the old regime might prove beneficial to English financial interests. This is a remarkable statement to make, inasmuch as it has been tacitly understood here that the British Commissioner did not disapprove of the movement of 1857 which destroyed the old regime; but he has probably changed his mind since then. At least this is the fair inference to be drawn from Admiral Brown's interview, which, as has been already stated, has not been disavowed or modified in any way.

Perhaps these two distinguished gentlemen can explain in what way English capitalists could be benefited by a revolution in the Hawaiian Islands while American and German capitalists would be injured. Capital is notoriously without patriotism or nationality, and takes fright at civil tumult and revolution. What would hurt American investments would quite as seriously affect French, German and English investments; therefore there must be some other motive than the hope of increasing English financial influence to explain the British Commissioner's sympathy with an alleged revolutionary movement, that is, if there is anything in the statement at all, or if, indeed, Admiral Brown ever made it.

But there is one thing of which there is not a shadow of doubt. The published interview with Admiral Brown has very seriously injured the business interests of the Islands. There is an end for the present and for sometime to come, of any great tourist movement. This is the more unfortunate inasmuch as quite an interest in the Hawaiian tour had been worked up all over the United States, and the outlook in this direction was very promising. Of course people will not visit, for pleasure, any place which is reported by such a high authority as being on the brink of a revolutionary outbreak, in which race antipathy may lead to the greatest excesses. Then again, merchants are inclined to be timid about shipping goods to the Islands under such conditions. Altogether the incident is unfortunate in every way. If Admiral Brown was imposed upon and gave currency to false information the source of such information should be sought and publicly censured. If, on the other hand, the information was correct, too great praise cannot be accorded to the United States Government for dispatching the Charleston to Honolulu to assist in protecting life and property at a time when her presence was needed in our own waters in view of probable complications arising out of the Behring Sea dispute. But in any event, this incident should impress upon all parties in the Hawaiian Islands the necessity for adhering strictly to lawful and constitutional methods for redress of grievances, instead of to revolutionary conspiracies and movements, which inevitably bring evil in their train and create a feeling of unrest and a disposition to turbulence long after the objects for which the original movement was set on foot have been attained.

ADMIRAL BROWN TALKS. [Special to the Examiner.] Port Townsend, August 30.—"I would give a great deal to know what news the steamer Alameda brought to San Francisco."

These are the words your correspondent heard Admiral George W. Brown utter to Captain George C. Remy, as he was ushered into the Admiral's cabin on board the Charleston shortly after 7 o'clock this evening. Just after the advent of the cruiser from Seattle your correspondent had informed Admiral Brown that advices from Honolulu stated that everything in the kingdom was quiet. Both he and Remy heaved a sigh of relief.

"I am not surprised yet. The facts upon which I base my information of the uncertainty in the country's affairs are notorious throughout the Islands. My information before I left was to the effect that Kalakaua's crown was very much of an uncertainty. The King himself knows what is the state of affairs and has resigned himself to it."

Admiral Brown will to-morrow notify Secretary Tracy of his arrival here, and expects to receive orders as to his future movements by Monday. Now that no immediate necessity exists for the Charleston's presence at Honolulu he does not expect to receive orders to sail from Puget Sound for at least ten days. He will have target practice in the Straits of Fuca as soon as the weather permits, and will make Port Townsend his headquarters.

The last communication received by the Admiral from the Navy Department was yesterday, when he was ordered to remain on Puget Sound unless informed to sail elsewhere. Yesterday morning he wired Secretary Tracy that, unless there was objection, he would before night steam to this port. He had no counter order when he came. He

was asked if he intended going to Esquimaux and replied that that depended on the Washington authorities. If he remains here any length of time he will pay his respects to Admiral Hotham.

ORDERED TO HONOLULU.

Port Townsend (Wash.), August 31.—Port Townsend society has received a shock. Admiral Brown will not assist in locating the dry dock and naval station on Puget Sound, neither will he aid in receiving Secretary of War Redfield Proctor.

The Citizens' Committee, which has been awake nights devising a programme for the entertainment of Brown and his officers, has been sadly disappointed. The Admiral to-day received the following:

WASHINGTON (D. C.), August 31. To Brown, commanding United States Pacific Naval Squadron—Proved to Honolulu with dispatch. TRACY, Secretary of the Navy.

"I do not know the cause of the sudden order," said Admiral Brown, when approached by your correspondent. "Notwithstanding the news of quietness on the islands published in this morning's papers, affairs are, and I have all along thought, in a most turbulent condition. The Navy Department must have received telegraphic advices yesterday from Honolulu at San Francisco, the news being sent from the latter city by telegraph."

"I have 645 tons of coal aboard and expect to arrive at the islands in six and a half days. I have no further orders than the dispatch I showed you, but am looking for more instructions every minute. Should I not get them, I will simply look after American interest there. When I arrive at Honolulu I shall place myself at the control of our Minister Severance."

The Charleston will leave this port to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

The San Francisco Chronicle of August 24 publishes a long letter from its Seattle representative in which Admiral Brown is represented to have said, in regard to Honolulu affairs:

"The revolutionists want the offices at the disposal of the Government. The malcontents have, in meeting with the Mechanics' Union, passed resolutions asking that this patronage be given to the natives and to the members of their own party and this request has been ignored by the Government."

"Back of these things are several other factors which enter into the calculations. The constitution proposed by the revolutionists gives more authority to the King, so, naturally, he favors it and lends his support to the party. Then, too, the English Commissioner, Major Wodehouse, would probably not be sorry to see a return to the old regime, by which the English capitalists might win advantage."

"Our own Minister, John L. Stevens, is an accomplished and a clear diplomat. Being from Maine he is, of course, a close friend of Blaine. Everybody knows that though he has lived in Honolulu but a year he is equal to any emergency which may arise, but when it comes to a revolution a Minister cannot take the place of soldiers, and so the United States, knowing the unsettled condition of affairs, sent the Charleston out there about three months ago to protect our citizens and our interests."

"A good deal of American property has accumulated on the islands, which I was instructed to protect," said the Admiral. "During all of my stay there matters were becoming more and more perturbed, and an uprising by the revolutionists had actually been planned for the 4th of August. I learned of it on the 1st day of the month, but we received sailing orders on the 2nd."

"The news of our intended departure, which could not be concealed because of our taking in coal and supplies, led the revolutionary party to postpone until after we had left, the execution of their design; but I confidently expect to hear by the next advices from Honolulu that there has been an actual outbreak and revolution attempted if not really accomplished."

"Those anxious for a change have, as I think, played upon the King and have drawn him into their scheme by promises of additional power, such as he had under the old Constitution. But they are simply making a tool of him. As soon as they can get their hands on the Government, the thing which they desire, they will force him out and put in as Queen, his sister, Princess Liliuokalani, who will suit their purposes even better than would King Kalakaua."

"Thereafter the reform party will oppose any movement to put in the Princess, and further disturbance will ensue, resulting in anarchy, which will be followed by a provisional government, and after that, in my opinion, a republic."

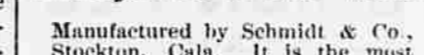

SEVENTY-SEVENTH DAY. THURSDAY, SEPT. 12.

The House was opened at 10 o'clock, but a quorum was not present till twelve minutes later.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES. Rep. HOOKER presented the report of the Judiciary committee on a resolution that the Cabinet consist of two Hawaiians and two foreigners

Rep. MARQUES presented a voluminous report of a majority of the select committee on post office affairs. It ensures the Postmaster-General for objectionable conduct in general, and violent manners toward subordinates in particular

Minister BROWN moved that, as the report was extremely lengthy, its interpretation be deferred, and he laid on the table to be considered with the majority report

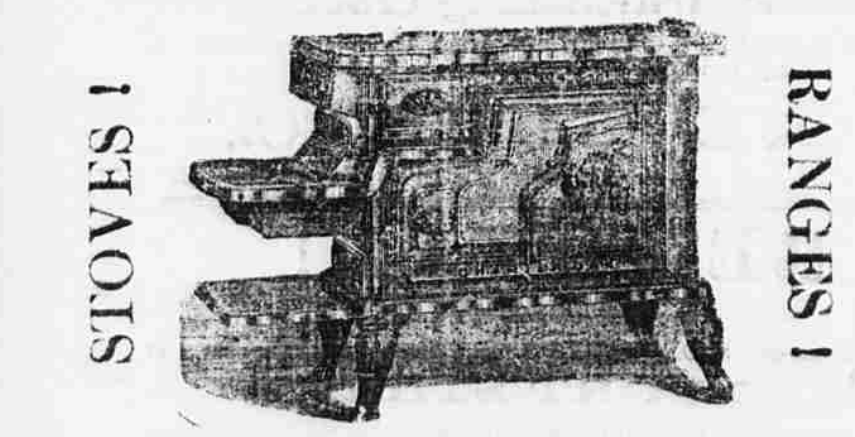

THE LEGISLATURE.

SEVENTY-SIXTH DAY. THURSDAY, Sept. 11. AFTERNOON SESSION.

The House at 1:35 resumed consideration of the Paradise of the Pacific bill.

Rep. Brown was not in favor of the bill. The proprietor appeared before the committee, and said \$500 per month would pay for 20,000 copies, otherwise the paper was supporting itself. If the Government paid this money, the receipts of the paper would be turned into profits.

Noble J. M. Horner endeavored to square his actions according to the needs of the country, but he could not see the use of this bill. The country was not opened up yet, so that anything could be done with the bill after they did get here.

Rep. Cummings supported the bill, but moved to insert \$300 instead of \$500 a month. Rep. Kauhi was speaking in native, when he broke out in English, pointing toward a previous speaker, "The steamer ran to the volcano!"

Noble Widemann said the world was large, and these islands were comparatively unknown in some countries. He was here twice many years ago, the second time in 1845, and when he returned home he found a man in the very heart of Germany who could tell him all about the Sandwich Islands.

Noble Cornwell could not conscientiously support the bill in its present shape, yet he could not agree with the hon. Noble from Honolulu. That man in the heart of Germany who knew all about these islands was only one in a thousand.

Rep. White spoke without interpretation, but read in English, from a foreign paper just arrived, the news that the U. S. S. Charleston was returning to Honolulu on account of rumors of an impending revolution.

Second reading of bill to prohibit barbed wire fences. Rep. Brown moved that the first section pass.

Noble Widemann moved to amend by substituting "along" for "upon" before "highways," and striking out the words "of a like nature."

Minister Brown proposed an amendment limiting the prohibition to towns and villages, school grounds, and Government roads.

only kind of fence that would keep out some cattle.

Rep. Brown proposed a similar amendment, but reading "such Government highways as the Minister of Interior may designate."

The amendment to the amendment was accepted and passed.

Noble Widemann and Rep. Brown proposed an amendment to the second section, conforming it to the first, and it passed as amended.

Noble Marsden moved to strike imprisonment out of the penalty, in the third section, leaving it a fine of not more than twenty dollars. Carried, and the section passed as amended.

Noble Muller moved to amend the fourth section, so as to bring the Act into effect three months after, instead of from and after the date of approval.

Rep. Brown said the bill provided \$1500 for each round trip, and, if the company put on two trips a month the subsidy would have to be paid for both, as this bill would have the force of a contract.

Minister Brown thought some members misapprehended the subject. The company had been getting two thousand a month all along, of which \$1500 was supposed to be for the steamer Australia and \$500 for the through mail steamers.

Rep. Rickard supported the motion to indefinitely postpone the bill. Since the House had appropriated the \$48,000, the expenditure should be left in the hands of the Minister of Finance.

Noble Baldwin advocated passing the bill with the amendment proposed by the select committee. The company found the carrying of bananas less profitable than that of sugar by two dollars a ton.

Rep. Pachaote supported the bill as proposed to be amended by the committee. Rep. Rickard supported the motion to indefinitely postpone the bill.

Noble Widemann said these steamers were as good, if not quite as large, as the best on any waters in the world. These steamers had done good service for us, and were entitled to our preference.

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Minister Brown proposed an amendment limiting the prohibition to towns and villages, school grounds, and Government roads.

Noble Marsden did not agree to the amendment. There were great lengths of Government roads, where there was very little travel and liability to accident, which were lined with these fences, and it was the

Rep. White moved the previous question, which carried. The bill was deferred, and referred to the printing committee. The House adjourned at 4 o'clock.

THE GUANO TRADE.
