### Strikes in Germany.

Certain startling figures have been made public to show the increasing frequency with which strikes occur in Germany. Incidentally they destroy the prestige of the United States as a strike center.

During one year, for instance, the year 1899, 1,207 strikes took place in Germany, says the Bauer Zeitung. The year before there had been only 985, which indicates the rapidly growing strength of organized labor, and perhaps also the multiplication of the causes of discontent.

At all events, it was a hard year for employers as for strikers, as 1,920 establishments were obliged to shut down completely at different times during this one year. It is plain from this that the German workman has not only acquired weapons of self-protection, but uses them. As for the number of workmen concerned in the strikes of 1899, the same interesting statistics fix it at 100,779, while the entire number of establishments affected was 7,133. Of these, all not obliged to shut down altogether were seriously disabled.

Further indications of the serious character of the labor-capital war in Germany lie in the fact that the total number of strikes extended over 3,976 weeks and cost \$625,254. Of the total number 542 had an offensive and 420 a defensive character.

The least gratifying feature to the friends of organized labor is that only 526 strikes were completely successful; 205, however, were partially successful, and 213 failed altogether.

### Foolish Distinctions.

One of the factors which contribute to the continued abasement and robbery of workers of all classes, says the Brisbane Worker, is their failure to recognize that in every respect and detail their interests are identical. The sub-class and caste distinctions which are in evidence throughout Australia are many. We have the spectacle of the bricklayer looking down on the bricklayer's laborer. The shearer who holds himself as of finer clay than the roustabout. The low-paid clerk, who, because he goes to work in a collar and tie and black suit, and does not take off his clothes to work, falls to see any point of contact between himself and the man who goes to work in moleskins, minus neckwear, and takes off most of his clothes to labor. Then the educated teachers of all kinds hold aloof from all the grades of workers who do not possess an education, or who cannot accurately decline the verbs to work, to eat, and to love. Yet the whole of these people live and eat and work and love on common lines. But "divide and conquer" is the rule of their masters, the capitalists. Set the shovel worker against the pen worker, the thinker against the doer, and while they revile, condemn and fight each other they can take them singly and strip them for their own profit. "They all work, but the capitalists reap the profit." "What fools these thieving mortals be!" The gods of Rent and Interest and profit may well cry, "They slaughter each other and their life-blood is incense and sacrifice on our altars and shrines." And they are fools—blind, stupid and purposeless. If they would only unite—

## TOPICS OF THE DAY.

One set of cranks want to have territorial laws passed for the manner in which liquor is to be sold in Honolulu, while at the same time they support a bill establishing a municipal government for this city, by which the voters are given the right to manage the affairs of the municipality. Another lot of cranks, mostly of the tribe which are here to "reform" us for a financial consideration wants to break down the stockade of Iwilei and turn loose upon this city hundreds of prostitutes and thousands of men whose passion these "reformers" can neither change by legislation or preaching. The city of Honolulu knows what is best for its own good, and it is an insult for any legislator to attempt to regulate by law matters which should be and are wholly within the province and jurisdiction of the men the city will chose to govern and advise its inhabitants.

Mrs. Gougar is very muchy on the warpath in Judge Humphreys' paper in regard to Iwilei which has always been a sore spot to the Judge, although the place where the "stockade" is situated is the property of a grand juror. "Heathen customs must give place to Christian practices," cries this reformer, "and will be the demand of American womanhood." We like the sentence, because it sounds well but it seems to us that the Christian practices of the Christian country from which the lady and the newspaper judge hail, are not exactly an improvement on our "heathen" customs. We try to protect our homes by giving to human passion a field where no great harm is done. We fail perhaps to a certain extent but we have at least the consolation of knowing that we have done our best to protect our families against the "Christian practices," the cause of which is being espoused by people of the stamp of Mrs. Gougar and her fellow "reformers"

A morning paper has a very "yellow" column in its issue yesterday morning in regard to an alleged wholesale smuggling of cigars from the U. S. transport Solace. The men on board the boat naturally deny the soft impeachment; but the reflection cast on the local Customs Bureau is unjustifiable and insulting. Says the official organ:

It is a well known fact that a great many cigars have been landed here in the last few months. It is said, however, that the local customs force is altogether too small to look out for everything that goes on in the way of smuggling on the water front.

The local force may be too small, and we think it is, but we don't believe that the Advertiser can substantiate its charges, which reflect on the honesty and intelligence of the men employed by the Treasury Department in the Custom House. We cannot always say that Collector Stackable is in the right, but no man has ever said or proved that he is guilty of negligence. Should he call upon the Dole organ to prove its assertion he would find that the Manila cigar story has gone up in the smoke.

## The Legislature In Session.

The Senate convened at 10 a. m. to-day. Senator Russell was elected temporary president upon motion of Senator White, and upon motion of Senator Achi, Mr. F. J. Testa was elected temporary secretary by a unanimous vote. The following committee on credentials was appointed: Wm. White, J. T. Brown and David Kanuha, who after a brief recess presented this report: "We, the undersigned, your committee to whom was referred the Election returns of Senators for the Territory of Hawaii for examination into the credentials of each member so elected, do make their report as follows, viz: As Senator for Hawaii, J. T. Brown, J. B. Kaohi, Nicholas Russell; for Maui, S. E. Kaiue, Wm. White; for Oahu, Cecil Brown, W. C. Achi, Geo. R. Carter, Clarence Crabbe, D. Kalauokalani, D. Kanuha; for Kauai, L. Nakapashu, I. H. Kahilina, which we respectfully submit, [signed by the Committee]."

The report was adopted and the Senate adjourned until to-morrow morning to await the arrival of two absent member, Senators H. P. Baldwin and J. D. Paris.

The House of Representatives met at the appointed hour this morning. Representatives R. H. Makekau and Wm. Mossman acted as speaker and secretary while the House organized. On unanimous votes Representative J. A. Akina was elected Speaker, F. W. Beckley, Vice Speaker; John H. Wise, interpreter; Solomon Meheula, Secretary; J. K. Nakookoo, Sergeant-at Arms and Chas. Hanapi, janitor of the House.

A joint resolution that the House of Representatives was organized was passed and sent to the Senate to be acted upon when that body has organized.

The governor will then be officially informed that the Legislature is in session and awaiting his message.

**LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS.**

The Kinau left yesterday with a large number of passengers.

General A. S. Hartwell left by the Claudine yesterday for Maui.

The Maile-Ilima basket ball team is practicing on Monday nights at the High School grounds.

There was a raise in stocks in the office of a certain young stockbroker. Quotation: one new girl.

The flags were flying this morning over the Executive building, announcing that the Legislature is in session.

Judge Wilcox disposed of a large calendar this morning. Most of the culprits were charged with being "drunks."

The Consul for China, Mr. Yang Wei Pih, held an informal reception yesterday in honor of the Chinese New Year at his residence.

Charles Bellina is able to drive around again, but not yet fully recovered from the painful accident to his right knee, which occurred a few weeks ago.

On Friday due observations will be made of the anniversary of Washington's birthday. Public schools and offices will be closed and the Legislature will adjourn.

A Hawaiian woman fell from the upper verandah of a two story house yesterday afternoon, on the corner of Vineyard and Liliha streets and was found unconscious and sent to the Hospital in the patrol wagon.

The police officers on duty at the Drill Shed last evening showed the efficiency of the force. The entrance to the building was kept clear, and no disturbance among the numerous "rubber necks" on the big square was permitted to occur.

Forty ducks were locked up in the police station this morning and will be quacking there until their owner, a konohi-celebrating Pake sobers up and is bailed out. The man with his load of ducks drove into a tramcar this morning on King street. Three small children on the wagon were thrown into the street but fortunately not hurt, and the driver who had too much samshoo on board was locked up, and charged with heedless driving.

**Will Press Their Claims.**

A large number of Hawaiians, who were sufferers from the fires during the so-called plague epidemic met at the Orpheum last evening, at the call of Messrs. Kaulia, Testa and Prendergast, a committee appointed to watch the interests of those Hawaiians who lost their homes and property during the "official" burning. J. K. Kaulia presided, and upon motion the present committee together with S. K. Pua, E. Johnson, C. H. Rose, J. D. Holt, Jr., and J. M. Kanekus, will receive the claims and put them in proper shape for presentation. All claims for losses incurred must be accompanied by an affidavit when presented to the committee, and claims should be sent in as soon as possible.

**In a Flourishing Condition.**

The following report of the treasurer of the Kapiolani Maternity Home shows that this great institution is in an excellent financial condition:

To the President, Officers and Members of the Hoo'u and Hoola Lahui Society:

Your Highness, and Ladies: The past year has in many ways been a good one for our Home.

The Balance sheet for the year ending January 31, 1900, shows the receipts to be: Balance on hand February 1, 1900, \$3,084.45; amount of receipts for the year, \$9,434.30; making a grand total of \$12,518.75 for the past year's income.

A great source of increase to this income has been the sum of \$5,000 donated by the Charles R. Bishop Trust, which is deposited in Bishop & Co.'s Bank, until such time as the Trustees decide how it shall be used.

This payment of \$5,000 ends the donations of \$300 annually from the C. R. Bishop Trust.

The hundred dollars per month from the Estate of the late Queen Dowager Kapiolani, has reached the sum of \$2,000 which is in Bishop & Co.'s Savings Bank, drawing only 4 1/2%. Your Treasurer would suggest that this amount be in some way invested, so as to draw more interest—this is a matter for the attention of the Trustees.

The expenditures for the past year have amounted to \$5,985.22. Referring to the Balance Sheet, the expenditures in May, viz.; \$1,509.09 may appear large, but it must be borne in mind that out of that amount \$1,082.70 was expended for repairs and painting the building.

A strenuous effort is being made to add to our income, by establishing a Surgical Department for women; this has the hearty endorsement of the leading physicians of the Islands. An earnest appeal has been made to the public to help us in this work, which will necessitate an outlay of at least \$10,000. So far, unfortunately, the appeal has not met with much response. People are profuse in good wishes but very backward with donations.

The past year has been a record one for births at the Home—the total number being 65, the highest number in former years being 56.

For all houses one story in height, covering a greater area than six thousand square feet, there shall be added one dollar for each additional five hundred square feet or fraction thereof, and the further sum of 50 per cent of the first floor rate for each additional story.

Where a house or building is occupied by more than one family the general rate for each additional family shall be three quarters (3/4) of the foregoing rates, except where two or more families occupy the same floor, in which case the rate for each family on the same floor shall be the rate for the floor surface occupied by such family, according to the foregoing table.

Section 5—Water shall be furnished and delivered to shipping lying alongside any of the wharves on the waterfront where water pipes or mains are laid, between the hours of 6 o'clock a. m. and 6 o'clock p. m. daily, at the rate of one-half cent per gallon.

### STRIKE AT A FUNERAL.

Union Hackmen Tie a 'Last Sad Rites' Procession in San Francisco.

Out of the struggle between the union and non-union hack drivers of San Francisco has come a unique, and in some of its phases, a distressing condition of affairs. Virtually, there is an embargo on cabb funerals, and its enforcement has resulted in the tying-up of twenty-two non-union burials within the last two weeks and in the delay and disturbance of many others.

The union, which was organized about two months ago, originated among the independent drivers, men who own or lease their hacks, and are in business for themselves, says Organized Labor.

In order to force in the outside: the union decided two weeks ago to refuse to participate in funerals where non-union men appeared on the box. Whenever a man outside the fold was seen occupying the driver's seat at a funeral, he was told to get out unless he was willing to join the union and to pay his dues on the spot, and the undertaker in charge was warned that if the objection was not removed, the union hacks would draw out of the solemn procession. In cases where the funeral directors have been obstinate, trouble has generally followed. As a result, there was a great accession to the ranks of the organization at its last meeting. Thursday night (last week) both independent and attached men coming in wholesale. The only large body of men now outside are those of the United Carriage Company, the largest employer of drivers in the city.

Certain undertakers who are careless about ascertaining the status of men driving hacks employed by them have been in hot water every time they took charge of a funeral. Perhaps the longest tie-up occurred at the funeral of W. H. Wiggins, Jr., held at the parlors of a Powell-street undertaker on Tuesday, the 8th January. While the services were going on inside, it was discovered that there were four non-union hacks in the procession. Two of these were allowed to stay after the drivers had promised to join the union. The drivers of the other two vehicles remaining obstinate, were sent away, and two more hacks were summoned by telephone. The mourners waited just one hour and five minutes after the end of the ceremony before the march to the grave began.

It paid Spain \$20,000,000 for territory which was already the country's by conquest; it has spent hundreds of millions of dollars and thousands of lives in efforts to get from the Filipinos the title to this territory, which Spain did, and could not give, and it has been paying tribute to the Sulu Sultan to enable him to perpetuate slavery and to maintain polygamy in noble state.—Philadelphia Ledger.

### Strikes in Germany.

Certain startling figures have been made public to show the increasing frequency with which strikes occur in Germany. Incidentally they destroy the prestige of the United States as a strike center.

During one year, for instance, the year 1899, 1,207 strikes took place in Germany, says the Bauer Zeitung. The year before there had been only 985, which indicates the rapidly growing strength of organized labor, and perhaps also the multiplication of the causes of discontent.

At all events, it was a hard year for employers as for strikers, as 1,920 establishments were obliged to shut down completely at different times during this one year. It is plain from this that the German workman has not only acquired weapons of self-protection, but uses them. As for the number of workmen concerned in the strikes of 1899, the same interesting statistics fix it at 100,779, while the entire number of establishments affected was 7,133. Of these, all not obliged to shut down altogether were seriously disabled.

Further indications of the serious character of the labor-capital war in Germany lie in the fact that the total number of strikes extended over 3,976 weeks and cost \$625,254. Of the total number 542 had an offensive and 420 a defensive character.

The least gratifying feature to the friends of organized labor is that only 520 strikes were completely successful; 205, however, were partially successful, and 213 failed altogether.

### Foolish Distinctions.

One of the factors which contribute to the continued abasement and robbery of workers of all classes, says the Brisbane Worker, is their failure to recognize that in every respect and detail their interests are identical. The sub-class and caste distinctions which are in evidence throughout Australia are many. We have the spectacle of the bricklayer looking down on the bricklayer's laborer. The shearer who holds himself as of finer clay than the roustabout. The low-paid clerk, who, because he goes to work in a collar and tie and black suit, and does not take off his clothes to work, falls to see any point of contact between himself and the man who goes to work in moleskins, minus neckwear, and takes off most of his clothes to labor. Then the educated teachers of all kinds hold aloof from all the grades of workers who do not possess an education, or who cannot accurately decline the verbs to work, to eat, and to love. Yet the whole of these people live and eat and work and love on common lines. But "divide and conquer" is the rule of their masters, the capitalists. Set the shovel worker against the pen worker, the thinker against the doer, and while they revile, condemn and fight each other they can take them singly and strip them for their own profit. "They all work, but the capitalists reap the profit." "What fools these thieving mortals be!" The gods of Rent and Interest and profit may well cry, "They slaughter each other and their life-blood is incense and sacrifice on our altars and shrines." And they are fools—blind, stupid and purposeless. If they would only unite—

## TOPICS OF THE DAY.

One set of cranks want to have territorial laws passed for the manner in which liquor is to be sold in Honolulu, while at the same time they support a bill establishing a municipal government for this city, by which the voters are given the right to manage the affairs of the municipality. Another lot of cranks, mostly of the tribe which are here to "reform" us for a financial consideration wants to break down the stockade of Iwilei and turn loose upon this city hundreds of prostitutes and thousands of men whose passion these "reformers" can neither change by legislation or preaching. The city of Honolulu knows what is best for its own good, and it is an insult for any legislator to attempt to regulate by law matters which should be and are wholly within the province and jurisdiction of the men the city will choose to govern and advise its inhabitants.

Mrs. Gougar is very muchy on the warpath in Judge Humphreys' paper in regard to Iwilei which has always been a sore spot to the Judge, although the place where the "stockade" is situated is the property of a grand juror. "Heathen customs must give place to Christian practices," cries this reformer, "and will be the demand of American womanhood." We like the sentence, because it sounds well but it seems to us that the Christian practices of the Christian country from which the lady and the newspaper judge hail, are not exactly an improvement on our "heathen" customs. We try to protect our homes by giving to human passion a field where no great harm is done. We fail perhaps to a certain extent but we have at least the consolation of knowing that we have done our best to protect our families against the "Christian practices," the cause of which is being espoused by people of the stamp of Mrs. Gougar and her fellow "reformers"

A morning paper has a very "yellow" column in its issue yesterday morning in regard to an alleged wholesale smuggling of cigars from the U. S. transport Solace. The men on board the boat naturally deny the soft impeachment; but the reflection cast on the local Customs Bureau is unjustifiable and insulting. Says the official organ:

It is a well known fact that a great many cigars have been landed here in the last few months. It is said, however, that the local customs force is altogether too small to look out for everything that goes on in the way of smuggling on the water front.

The local force may be too small, and we think it is, but we don't believe that the Advertiser can substantiate its charges, which reflect on the honesty and intelligence of the men employed by the Treasury Department in the Custom House. We cannot always say that Collector Stackable is in the right, but no man has ever said or proved that he is guilty of negligence. Should he call upon the Dole organ to prove its assertion he would find that the Manila cigar story has gone up in the smoke.

### The Legislature In Session.

The Senate convened at 10 a. m. to-day. Senator Russell was elected temporary president upon motion of Senator White, and upon motion of Senator Achi, Mr. F. J. Testa was elected temporary secretary by a unanimous vote. The following committee on credentials was appointed: Wm. White, J. T. Brown and David Kanuha, who after a brief recess presented this report: "We, the undersigned, your committee to whom was referred the Election returns of Senators for the Territory of Hawaii for examination into the credentials of each member so elected, do make their report as follows, viz: As Senator for Hawaii, J. T. Brown, J. B. Kaohi, Nicholas Russell; for Maui, S. E. Kaue, Wm. White; for Oahu, Cecil Brown, W. C. Achi, Geo. R. Carter, Clarence Crabbe, D. Kalauokalani, D. Kanuha; for Kauai, L. Nakapaahu, I. H. Kahilina, which we respectfully submit, [signed by the Committee].

The report was adopted and the Senate adjourned until to-morrow morning to await the arrival of two absent member, Senators H. P. Baldwin and J. D. Paris.

The House of Representatives met at the appointed hour this morning. Representatives R. H. Makekau and Wm. Mossman acted as speaker and secretary while the House organized. On unanimous votes Representative J. A. Akina was elected Speaker, F. W. Beckley, Vice Speaker; John H. Wise, interpreter; Solomon Meheula, Secretary; J. K. Nakookoo, Sergeant-at Arms and Chas. Hanapi, janitor of the House.

A joint resolution that the House of Representatives was organized was passed and sent to the Senate to be acted upon when that body has organized.

The governor will then be officially informed that the Legislature is in session and awaiting his message.

There was a raise in stocks in the office of a certain young stockbroker. Quotation: one new girl.

The flags were flying this morning over the Executive building, announcing that the Legislature is in session.

Judge Wilcox disposed of a large calendar this morning. Most of the culprits were charged with being "drunks."

The Consul for China, Mr. Yang Wei Pih, held an informal reception yesterday in honor of the Chinese New Year at his residence.

Charles Bellina is able to drive around again, but not yet fully recovered from the painful accident to his right knee, which occurred a few weeks ago.

On Friday due observations will be made of the anniversary of Washington's birthday. Public schools and offices will be closed and the Legislature will adjourn.

A Hawaiian woman fell from the upper verandah of a two story house yesterday afternoon, on the corner of Vineyard and Liliha streets and was found unconscious and sent to the Hospital in the patrol wagon.

Three small children on the wagon were thrown into the street but fortunately not hurt, and the driver who had too much samshoo on board was locked up, and charged with heedless driving.

Kaulia, Testa and Prendergast, a committee appointed to watch the interests of those Hawaiians who lost their homes and property during the "official" burning. J. K. Kaulia presided, and upon motion the present committee together with S. K. Pua, E. Johnson, C. H. Rose, J. D. Holt, Jr., and J. M. Kanekua, will receive the claims and put them in proper shape for presentation. All claims for losses incurred must be accompanied by an affidavit when presented to the committee, and claims should be sent in as soon as possible.

**In a Flourishing Condition.**

The following report of the treasurer of the Kapiolani Maternity Home shows that this great institution is in an excellent financial condition:

To the President, Officers and Members of the Hooulu and Hoola Lahui Society:

Your Highness, and Ladies: The past year has in many ways been a good one for our Home.

The Balance sheet for the year ending January 31, 1900, shows the receipts to be: Balance on hand February 1, 1900, \$3,084.45; amount of receipts for the year, \$9,434.80; making a grand total of \$12,518.75 for the past year's income.

A great source of increase to this income has been the sum of \$5,000 donated by the Charles R. Bishop Trust, which is deposited in Bishop & Co.'s Bank, until such time as the Trustees decide how it shall be used.

This payment of \$5,000 ends the donations of \$300 annually from the C. R. Bishop Trust.

The hundred dollars per month from the Estate of the late Queen Dowager Kapiolani, has reached the sum of \$2,000 which is in Bishop & Co.'s Savings Bank, drawing only 4%. Your Treasurer would suggest that this amount be in some way invested, so as to draw more interest—this is a matter for the attention of the Trustees.

The expenditures for the past year have amounted to \$5,985.22. Referring to the Balance Sheet, the expenditures in May, viz.; \$1,509.09 may appear large, but it must be borne in mind that out of that amount \$1,082.70 was expended for repairs and painting the building.

A strenuous effort is being made to add to our income, by establishing a Surgical Department for women; this has the hearty endorsement of the leading physicians of the Islands. An earnest appeal has been made to the public to help us in this work, which will necessitate an outlay of at least \$10,000. So far, unfortunately, the appeal has not met with much response. People are profuse in good wishes but very backward with donations.

The past year has been a record one for births at the Home—the total number being 65, the highest number in former years being 56.

Your Treasurer regrets very much to inform you that Mrs. Maria Martin, the Matron's Assistant has felt obliged to resign owing to ill health. She is now very ill in the Queen's Hospital. Her place is now filled by Mrs. Annie Aylett Poole, a Hawaiian who gives much promise, and of whom we hope much.

Your Treasurer sincerely hopes the meetings in the future will be more fully attended, as with the increase of work at the Home, there is increase of work for the Boards—both Managers and Trustees. We sincerely regret the absence of Their Highnesses Prince and Princess Kalaianaoles now abroad on a foreign tour.

In conclusion I would state, that the very prosperous condition of the Home is greatly due to our indefatigable Matron, who has not only won the approbation of the community, but the love of the Hawaiians—as well as the confidence of the physicians and foreign patients.

For all houses one story in height, covering a greater area than six thousand square feet, there shall be added one dollar for each additional five hundred square feet or fraction thereof, and the further sum of 50 per cent of the first floor rate for each additional story.

Where a house or building is occupied by more than one family the general rate for each additional family shall be three quarters (¾) of the foregoing rates, except where two or more families occupy the same floor, in which case the rate for each family on the same floor shall be the rate for the floor surface occupied by such family, according to the foregoing table.

Note—The general rate includes water for general house hold purposes, but does not include any of the following specified rates:

**SPECIAL RATES.**

Section 2—For horses or mules, including water for washing vehicles:

- For 1st horse—\$3.00 per annum.
- For 2d, 3d, 4th and 5th horse—\$2.00 per annum each.
- For 6th to 50th horse—\$1.00 per annum each.
- For 51st and above—.75c per annum each.
- For 1st cow—\$1.50 per annum each.
- For 2d, 3d, 4th and 5th cow—\$1.00 per annum each.
- For 6th cow and above—.75c per annum each.

Section 3—Irrigation, where confined to such four (4) hours of the day as are published from time to time by the Superintendent of Water Works, at the rate of one-half cent per square yard per annum; no annual charge to be less than (\$5.00) Five Dollars.

Irrigation, where the hours are not restricted, three cents per square yard per annum; minimum charge as above.

Section 4—Stores, banks, bakeries, offices, warehouses, saloons, groceries, eating houses, barber shops, butcher shops, book binderies, blacksmith shops, confectioners, hotels, lodging houses, boarding houses, churches, halls, laundries, photograph galleries, printing offices, steam engines, green houses, markets, market stalls, horse troughs, soda fountains, and other places of business, each to be charged according to the estimated quantity used.

Section 5—Water shall be furnished and delivered to shipping lying alongside any of the wharves on the waterfront where water pipes or mains are laid, between the hours of 6 o'clock a. m. and 6 o'clock p. m. daily, at the rate of one-half cent per gallon.

### STRIKE AT A FUNERAL.

Union Hackmen Tie a "Last Sad Rites" Procession in San Francisco.

Out of the struggle between the union and non-union hack drivers of San Francisco has come a unique, and in some of its phases, a distressing condition of affairs. Virtually, there is an embargo on seab funerals, and its enforcement has resulted in the tying-up of twenty two non-union burials within the last two weeks and in the delay and disturbance of many others.

The union, which was organized about two months ago, originated among the independent drivers, men who own or lease their hacks, and are in business for themselves, says Organized Labor.

In order to force in the outside: the union decided two weeks ago to refuse to participate in funerals where non-union men appeared on the box. Whenever a man outside the fold was seen occupying the driver's seat at a funeral, he was told to get out unless he was willing to join the union and to pay his dues on the spot, and the undertaker in charge was warned that if the objection was not removed, the union hacks would draw out of the solemn procession. In cases where the funeral directors have been obstinate, trouble has generally followed. As a result, there was a great accession to the ranks of the organization at its last meeting. Thursday night (last week) both independent and attached men coming in wholesale. The only large body of men now outside are those of the United Carriage Company, the largest employer of drivers in the city.

Certain undertakers who are careless about ascertaining the status of men driving hacks employed by them have been in hot water every time they took charge of a funeral. Perhaps the longest tie-up occurred at the funeral of W. H. Wiggins, Jr., held at the parlors of a Powell-street undertaker on Tuesday, the 8th January. While the services were going on inside, it was discovered that there were four non-union hacks in the procession. Two of these were allowed to stay after the drivers had promised to join the union. The drivers of the other two vehicles remaining obstinate, were sent away, and two more hacks were summoned by telephone. The mourners waited just one hour and five minutes after the end of the ceremony before the march to the grave began.
