IMPERIAL FEDERATION.

A late paper from the Coast contains, in an accidental, but highly suggestive conjunction, two widely contrasted items of news. One refers to the plan of Imperial Federation so extensively agitated, between Great Britain and her colonies. The other contains some figures as to the military and naval expenditures of the European Powers.

The plan of Imperial Federation is a move in the interests of peace and civilization. It is a negation of the possibility of future war, extending over a very wide portion of the earth's surface. The present relation between England and her colonies must inevitably be a transitory one. The government of a great and growing population in a new country can not be permanently conducted from beyond the sea. Such a population has a steadily increasing consciousness of itself, of its needs, its power and its unity. The result is that it is finally satisfied with nothing less than complete autonomy.

This is pre-eminently true of Canada and Australia. They are bound by nothing but a sentimental tie, the bond of family affection. England is a half century beyond the stage of coercion, she is not likely even to desire to offer any resistance, when her colonies finally decide to strike out on their own account. Such action on the part of the colonies is bound to come soon, unless Imperial Federation come in its place.

England is essentially committed to a policy of peace. Her influence in Europe counts against war. This fact is one of the very brightest jewels in her crown, and makes her relation to France, Germany and Russia from a moral point of view, so enviable a one. If the tie which now binds her to her colonies is replaced by a permanent federation, a great area will be won for peace, and civilization will achieve a new triumph. The binding together of England, Australia, New Zealand, Canada and perhaps India into one great political society, will be a happy anticipation of the golden time when the relation of all parts of civilized human society will be regulated by law. Imperial Federation will not be merely a partial anticipation of this great social idea but it will distinctly hasten its coming.

Some will regard this view of Imperial Federation as wild and Quixotic. We think it a natural and practical standpoint. War is an anachronism, and every year it becomes more glaringly, more flagrantly out of date. It is not merely primarily even, the growth of the moral sense which will abolish war, but the commercial development, the growing intricacy of intercommunication, the increase of mutual dependency, which is binding all society closer together, and making war more than ever a suicidal process. The disorganization which it involves is necessarily more profound with every new decade. It may be added that the growth of invention bids fare to increase the destructiveness of war so appallingly that the most pugnacious nations will be afraid to fight.

It is of course by no means certain

that the plan of Imperial Federation will be adopted. Its future, however, seems favorable, and the present amicable relations subsisting between England and her Colonies—a relation which seems likely to continue—ought to do much to forward the movement. The world has a wide interest in the result, and an interest in seeing it succeed.

SUPREME COURT--AT CHAMBERS.

BEFORE HIS HONOR JUSTICE BICKERTON. FRIDAY, MAR. 28. Mary C. Beckley vs. George Lucas, executor and trustee of the will of Margaret Keegan et al. In equity, bill for specific performance.

OPINION OF THE COURT. Statements in this case are so fully set out in the decision of Mr. Justice Dole on the demurrer, and also in the banco decision on appeal, that it is not necessary to restate it here. The demurrer was overruled, and it was held that there was a real and valuable consideration.

Defendant in his answer claims that complainant hath not performed the covenants contained in the agreement and has not and did not do all things as therein required, and did not do and perform the commands of said Margaret Keegan and leave the home of said Margaret Keegan, and did refuse to perform her commands. I cannot find any evidence in support of this. On the contrary, all the evidence leads me to the conclusion that while the complainant was under the legal guardianship of Margaret Keegan, she did do and perform all that was required of her.

The point relied upon mainly by defendant's counsel is, that the premises are not so fully and clearly described as to enable the Court to decree specific performance; that the covenant is too indefinite to compel the covenantor or her representatives to specifically perform it. The words of the agreement are as follows: "Convey or devise to her the said Mary Risely, a piece of land situated in Honolulu aforesaid, and fronting upon Nuuanu street, together with the cottages thereon, now in the occupation of Mr. Smith." * * * Mr. Grieve testifies that Mrs. Keegan told him that those premises were mentioned in the adoption papers as the consideration, that she looked upon it in that way. * * * It seems to me that the description is sufficiently definite, and that the property intended and mentioned in the agreement is properly identified as the property claimed and described in the bill of complaint.

The complainant is entitled to specific performance, and a decree will be signed accordingly on presentation.

WISDOM OF A RAT.

How a Shrewd Rodent Secured a Supply of Hard-Boiled Eggs. The railroad station at Plainfield (Ct.) Junction is a rat metropolis. They increase and prosper, and are so little interfered with that they are not shy. When there are only a few people in the station the rats come out, walk leisurely about and help themselves to provender. One day last week, a lady employed there heard a thumping noise on the restaurant counter, and, looking in the direction of the noise, saw a rat taking a hard-boiled egg from the counter. When the rat jumped down with his booty the lady called a clerk, who was the only person in the station, beside herself, and watched the rat as he returned and took the second egg from the plate. He was apparently an old and knowing rat. The eggs were covered with a wire screen or turret. The rat had been there before. BIRDS OF A FEATHER.

Straws Show Which Way the Tide Runs. The following translations from John E. Bush's paper, the "Leo o ka Lahui," contain food for reflection on the part of this community:

"THE SPLIT IN THE CABINET. During these days the Cabinet of the Reform Party are disagreeing with each other. As we hear it, three of the Ministers oppose Minister C. W. Ashford. This is a thing that was sure to be the fruit of the doings of the missionaries and the revolutionary Christians of Fort Street Church, because in everything that has been done the majority of the Cabinet have been the King's things not authorized by law with the King and the people. These things were kept up until the time came that they thought they had everything in their own hands, then they turn and ill-treat Col. V. V. Ashford, and his brother, Mr. C. W. Ashford, and so they have been doing a little at a time until now they have quarrelled with each other. But the Ashford brothers are not afraid, and as they are men of some knowledge, and have more experience than the hypocritical missionaries, they think like men, and they know that there are others who have an interest in the country outside of the sugar planters, mortgage takers and others. During the last few days, one of the Baby Ministers tried to do a little with the Auditor-General, and in no time he was made to take his seat, because of his mistaken assumption of authority.

It seems as if to-day the Attorney-General was leaning towards the King, and on account of his legal advice given to the meeting of the Cabinet, some of the dirty work of the missionaries fell through that was being advocated by the three who are now against Mr. C. W. Ashford." "WHO IS THE PROPER ONE TO BE PREMIER?—IT IS R. W. WILCOX. Wilcox is a fit person to be chosen Premier for several good reasons, for the people know that he is eligible for that position. Here are the reasons: 1. He is a learned and an educated man. 2. He has a good name. 3. He recognizes you—the poor and low. 4. He is a man much loved by his people. 5. He is the man that will save this race, who will stop the moorings of the people and stop the shedding of tears on the highway. 6. This man will not hooplaize behind these grasping of riches who are fond of honor; this man is not like that; therefore, for these reasons, he is fit to be chosen forthwith as Premier.

Not to do as the people are informed is proposed, concerning a new Cabinet being made, should the present Cabinet go out? And that is this: Antone Rosa, Attorney-General; Thurston, Minister of Interior; Saunders, Minister of Finance; C. P. Lanke, Minister of Foreign Affairs.

On my own race, we now see this list of new Ministers for us, which the Leo has made known to us, the former two Ministers whom the people have no confidence in, are being forced again before our eyes; the people do not like their names—Thurston and Damon. They are the present Ministers; they are Ministers to skin the bones of the people. As for Lanke, he is a fit man, for he is a true Hawaiian, but he is a man that has no love for his race nor for his King; he is a man that readily gives way for the benefit of others; he is a hooplaizer, a man that hangs at the heels of the merchants; he leaves the people in the lurch. And as for Antone Rosa! Now you hit the breadfruit that has the milk, a breadfruit you can't catch without a pole, a breadfruit that hangs at the highest limb; that breadfruit is on the limb that hangs far out, where one cannot reach.

Here is his mate that will sit well—his whose name appears at the head of this article; that is the name so popular among the people—R. W. Wilcox, the one name that piled through this ticket: Representatives and Nobles of the People. Honolulu, March 3, 1890.

Tidal Phenomena and Currents.

Wrecks do and will occur, no doubt, as long as ships remain to be wrecked. Steamers one after another, in command, not of masters who have a first acquaintance with the coast, but captains who have grown grey in the coastal service, are poked here and there ashore, under lighthouses or upon headlands, until one would think they could not hit against water to try. Such mishaps sometimes happen almost without any apparent cause, often, seemingly, without any want of skill or care on the navigator's part, though perhaps upon a casual inquiry into the cause of a casualty, it is discovered that had soundings been taken the misfortune might have been avoided. But it may be that the astronomical influences by which, according to the explanations given by astronomers, the oceans of the world are affected, are not sufficiently borne in mind and allowed for in regard to their mode of operation, and perhaps it is open to question whether the stranding of ships, which so frequently occurs, may not sometimes arise from causes connected with the tidal condition of the ocean, as to which no satisfactory solution has been arrived at by astronomical and geographical experts. As affecting navigation, then, it would manifestly seem to be a safe rule that, with reference to any coast or shallow water which a ship may be approaching, or in the proximity of which she may happen to be, it is never safe to rely upon the ship's dead reckoning, or upon anything else than actual verification of position, whether by unmistakable lights or landmarks, or by the use of the sextant. If lights or landmarks, and the sun, or the moon and stars are obscured, a navigator, even in waters which he knows full well at all times of the year, may discover, when it is too late, that the tedious process of plying his lead would soon be followed by disaster, and that he has saved him from disaster, these days of iron ships and of cargoes of machinery or other iron goods or ores, with a break-neck pace of steaming, it would seem especially desirable to bear in mind, not only that the magnet has its varying, but that tidal effects are ever added those connected with the progressive and retrogressive, or it may be the permanent though gradual changes in the direction and velocity of currents which are ever taking place, the adoption of these possible incidents as a casualty would seem to be the more particularly expedient on the navigator's part.—[Sydney Herald.]
