Someone has circulated a report that the two clubs will not play a game here between themselves. The report is entirely erroneous, as at 1 o'clock in the afternoon the Chicago and All-Americans will play a game, and if there is time one of the above teams will play with the local team.

CABLES UNDER THE PACIFIC.
The "Electrical Review" for Oct. 27th, says: The laying of cables under the Pacific Ocean has given a curious importance to several otherwise insignificant little islands. One among them is the island of Fanning, south of Hawaii, discovered in 1824 by the American captain whose name it bears; it is but a few miles in area, and has only 150 inhabitants; but it has excellent water and a good harbor. Another is the island of Christmas, south of Java, which is almost inaccessible. Yet both of these have been annexed by the British Admiralty, and are likely to be of importance in the political geography of the future.
Along the course of the American line to Japan, 1,500 nautical miles from Hawaii to the island of Moretti, whose very existence has been questioned by most chartmakers; this must ultimately, in spite of the Mongol doctrine, fall under American influences.
But the French have already large interests in the Pacific, and confident of the ultimate success of the Panama Canal, "Electricite," from whose pages we draw these facts, does not hesitate to pill on the map, though in dotted lines, the course of two more cables that must soon be laid, the one to Tahiti, the other to New Caledonia.
It is further interesting to note how much shorter the longest of these lines is than the Atlantic cables.

MADAME JAFFA'S REGITAL.
There was not a large audience at the Y. M. C. A. hall last evening to hear Madame Jaffa's piano recital, but those who were fortunate enough to be present had a rare musical treat. The programme contained fifteen numbers, thirteen of which were played by Madame Jaffa. Her interpretation of the works of the great masters was a surprise, and she was warmly applauded for the manner in which she represented a high degree of artistic excellence. Madame Jaffa does not display mere mechanism, but is able to make the piano sing and tell the story that is hidden behind the magnificent compositions. The wonderful retentiveness of her memory is of itself an important endowment, the whole of the programme being played without a note before her. Particular notice must be made of the Madame's brilliant playing of Liszt's Illustrations du prophete, and the five numbers by Chopin.
A most enjoyable feature of the evening was the singing of Mrs. John H. Paty whose beautiful voice was heard to much advantage in two songs by Millard. Her rendition of the song "Darling" was so charming that she was compelled to respond to an encore. The recital was a pronounced success.

A GOOD IDEA.
It is stated that a Hamburg locksmith named Wolff, has constructed an apparatus whereby all the doors in a theatre may be opened simultaneously. The other day experiments were made with the apparatus at the Concordia Theatre, and on somebody shouting "fire" the inventor turned the handle of the apparatus, fixed in the refreshment bar of the theatre, on which every exit in the whole building opened at once. The arrangement does not preclude the opening of each door in the usual manner.

ENGLAND'S SUPREMACY NOT SECURE.
It must not be overlooked that although Great Britain may have reached the summit of her political greatness, she has not yet by any means established a firm foothold upon it. The structure has been reared on a solid foundation, adequate to the circumstances, but it is not yet finished: the roof is still wanting, the scaffolding have not been removed; and it may be well assumed that the often-tried Anglo-Saxon tenacity of purpose is not likely to relax and fail them just on the eve of the completion of the work.—[Professor Vambury in the November Forum.

THE NEW ZEALAND LAND POLICY.
The land policy of the New Zealand Government promises to prove eminently successful. The method of allowing each applicant to select the tenure under which he is prepared to purchase has caused keen competition for suitable sections without involving the outbidding which prevailed. As showing how eagerly suitable areas are competed for, the case of some education reserves in Southland is to the point. For twenty-nine sections, varying from 300 to a few acres in extent, there are no less than 400 applicants, as many as sixty applying for one allotment. During the past six weeks 35,564 acres have purchased for cash, 22,262 acres on deferred payment, and 51,714 acres taken up on perpetual lease.—[Town and Country Journal.

A PLEASING INCIDENT.
The consecration of a Sepher Torah, even when attended by a special ceremony, is usually an event of Jewish interest only. A remarkable exception of this rule has been made at Zundorf, Prussia, where practically the entire town participated in the rejoicings, which were carried out on an extensive scale. Christians vied with Jews in the decoration of their houses with flags and flowers, especially in that part of the town through which the procession escorting the Scroll of the Law passed on its way to the synagogue. This procession, which was swelled by many visitors from Cologne and Mulheim, was headed by a number of girls dressed in white and adorned with flowers, and by boys carrying banners. When in other parts of Germany evil-minded persons are doing their worst to sow discord between Jews and Christians, it is refreshing to read of the pleasing incident of which Zundorf has been the scene.—[Town and Country Journal.

A NOVEL SCHOOL IN MINNESOTA.
The Seventh Day Adventists of Minnesota have organized a conference school at Minneapolis, the rules and regulations of which are rather interesting. Nobody who uses profane or unbecoming language, who uses tobacco or intoxicating liquors or is in any way immoral will be admitted. Manual training is to be one of the features, and tent-making is mentioned as a very pleasant as well as useful employment to be taught. It is also the plan to have the general domestic work of the school done by the students, and the work embraces dining-room, kitchen and laundry work, sawing and splitting wood, etc. Aside from the ordinary branches, physiology, civil government and algebra are named in connection with missionary and Sabbath-school work as a part of the course. Another novel feature is that the young men, among other things, are required to provide themselves with flannel or colored shirts and with celluloid collars and cuffs, as linen shirts, cuffs, etc., will not be laundered at the school.
