FROM THE TRANSVAAL.

Advices From General Roberts and Also From the Boers With Conflicting Statements.

LONDON, May 8.—The War Office has received the following dispatch from Lord Roberts, under date of Bloemfontein, May 2:

"Gen. Hamilton met with considerable success and drove the enemy out of the strong position they had taken up at Houtnek with comparatively small loss to us. The Boers dispersed in several directions, mainly to the east and south, leaving many prisoners in our hands, including one commandant and six teen other wounded men. Gen. Hamilton is now in camp at Jacobsrust. As the men needed rest after fighting seven out of the last ten days, I ordered them to halt for the day. Gen. Broadwood's brigade of cavalry arrived upon the scene in time to afford valuable assistance by threatening the enemy's rear.

"During the afternoon Gen. Ian Hamilton was joined by Gen. Bruce Hamilton's brigade of infantry.

"The enemy admit having twelve killed and forty wounded yesterday. Among the former is Lieutenant Gunther, a German officer belonging to the Fifty-fifth Regiment, and amongst the latter was Maximoff, the Russian commander of the foreign legation. Twenty-one out of fifty-two of the enemy's casualties occurred among the members of that legion. Two Frenchmen were among the killed.

"Gen. Hamilton speaks in high terms of the good service performed by the Eighth Hussars under Col. Clowse, and of the regiment of Lancers which came into Gen. Broadwood's brigade and assisted in making the Boers vacate their position. The final stroke to the enemy's rout was given by the Gordons and two companies of the Shropshire Light Infantry, who cheered loudly when they got within 200 yards of the position.

"Kitchener's Horse is also spoken of in terms of praise."

PRETORIA, Wednesday, May 2.—An official war bulletin issued here reports that on April 28 the Federals captured nine prisoners and ten horses east of Thaba N'Chu, and that on April 30 a British mounted corps appeared near Brandfort. The Federals attacked them on two sides, and the British retired. Two Federals were wounded and eleven prisoners were taken. Another account, semi-official of this affair, says that the Wakkerstroom and Ermelo commands had a skirmish with the British near Brandfort. After a sharp fight eleven prisoners were taken and nineteen British were left dead on the field, including Captain Libby. A few Federals were wounded. The heavy bombardment by the British has been resumed at Fourteen Streams.

The correspondent of Reuter's Telegram Agency in the Boer camp at Brandfort wires that when the British appeared ten miles east of Brandfort. General De Larey ordered a charge by 500 Boers, who drove them back to their entrenchments. The Federals found four dead on the field and took seventeen prisoners, mostly wounded, including Lieutenant Crane.

Late in the afternoon General De Larey learned that the British had forced their way twenty miles east of Brandfort and seven miles north of the Modder river. With 250 men De Larey set out in pursuit of the British, who numbered 1,200. The forces met in the open country, a sharp engagement followed and the British retired. As the Boers had a heavy day, they were not pursued. The Federals had five men wounded.

An American has been arrested in connection with the Begbie explosion.

LONDON, May 8.—Lord Roberts'

latest dispatches throw no light on the object and possibilities of the extensive operations in the neighborhood of Thaba N'Chu. One military critic says the inference is justified that Lord Roberts' successful attack at Houtnek threatens the Boer center and puts the British in a favorable position to crush the Boer left, which is still facing General Rundle at Thaba N'Chu, or their right, which is somewhere between Brandfort and Winburg.

General Ian Hamilton's success at Houtnek elicits little enthusiasm, as the critics unanimously pointed out some time ago that the policy of the Boers would be one of slow retirement.

Col. Baden-Powell reported officially from Mafeking, under date of April 20, that all was well there. He adds:

"Thirteen native women tried to get away during the night of April 15th. The enemy opened fire on them and killed nine and wounded two. I wrote to Snyman, pointing out that he shells the native stadt, which is full of women and children, and that when they are trying to escape the Boers flogged them and sent them back, and at night they shoot them down, pretending to mistake them for night attacks. Snyman has not replied. The proportion of killed and wounded above speaks for itself."

Other news from Mafeking details the careful saving of the provisions, and says there are diminished rations for 9,000 souls within the beleaguered town.

The American hospital ship Maine, after having been inspected by Lady Randolph Churchill and others of the committee, sailed from Southampton for the Cape to-day.

Prices became buoyant on the Stock Exchange after a dull opening. This was due to a variety of rumors, all, however, requiring confirmation, including an important British victory in South Africa, the death of President Krueger and the relief of Mafeking.

Rumored Hawaiian Territorial Appointments.

WASHINGTON, May 2.—From a good source it is understood that the President has decided upon Henry E. Cooper of Hawaii for Secretary of the new Territory. Walter F. Frear, at present head of the highest court of the Islands and a former member of the Hawaiian Commission, is to be made Chief Justice of the new Territorial Court. One of the Associate Justices will probably be William A. Whiting, Associate Justice of the present court. Judges Frear and Whiting are both New England men. Frear is a graduate of Yale and Whiting of Harvard. C. J. Ray, secretary of Senator Cullom, may get the Marshalship.

M. M. Estee is undoubtedly the President's choice for United States Judge, although the name of Judge Greene of Alameda County has been put forward. There is danger of California losing the place, however, if any division of support develops between the friends of candidate, for Senator Allison is pushing the claims of an Iowa candidate and Senator Burrows of a Michigan man. An appointment will be announced in a few days.

WHO ARE CITIZENS?

The morning paper publishes several paragraphs from the territorial act in regard to those who are citizens of the Territory of Hawaii. It does not emphasize the following section which will be of special interest to the members of the foreign colonies in Hawaii who have resided here during the past five years. The section reads: "That for the purpose of naturalization under the laws of the United States residence in the Hawaiian Islands prior to the taking effect of this act shall be deemed equivalent to residence in the United States and in the Territory of Hawaii, and the requirement of a previous declaration of intention to become a citizen of the United States and to renounce former allegiance shall not apply to persons who have resided in said islands at least five years prior to the taking effect of this Act; but all other provisions of the laws of the United States relating to naturalization shall, so far as applicable, apply to persons in said islands."

That means that any man who can prove that he has lived here at least five years, who can show that he understands the provisions of the constitution of the United States, and who takes the oath to support said constitution before a judge, becomes a citizen of the Territory and the United States.

It is very important that all those qualified to become voters and citizens under this section should thoroughly understand their rights. Judge Stanley under the section can become an American citizen if he chooses in thirty minutes even if he is an Irishman.

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

We are informed on official authority that the P. C. A. was incorrect in its statement that President McKinley had approved the appropriation bills. The publication of the incorrect item caused considerable inconvenience to government officials and creditors of the government.

The Primaries of the alleged Republican party have nothing to do with the election for the First Territorial Legislature. Our Hawaiian friends can take in the show, as a lesson in American politics, and need not sign any pledge or roll or any other old thing that may be urged upon them by renegades and false friends.

There is something reflectively amusing in the statement imputed to Mr. W. O. Smith by the P. C. A. that "all the present Circuit Judges will probably be retained, with possibly the exception of Judge Stanley, who is, unfortunately, an Englishman, and therefore not a citizen of the United States." Judge Stanley is an Irishman and not an Englishman and President McKin-

ley as the descendant of a Belfast Scotch-Irishman ought to be friendly disposed towards the Irish vote; and again if Judge Perry is to be promoted to the Supreme Bench there are no Judges of the Circuit Court to be reappointed, and yet again Judge Stanley was a citizen of the Republic of Hawaii on August 12, 1898.

On May 21 it will be the birthday of Queen Victoria, a day which has at all times been celebrated in every country where Britishers breath and men of all nationalities do honor to the noble woman whose brow is encircled with the crown of the country in which the Sun never sets. Is Hawaii to be behind hand this year? Shall the memorable day pass by without notice? It is time that loyal Britishers and their friends get a move on and arrange for a proper celebration of the birthday anniversary of their beloved Queen.

It is interesting to notice that a new Republican organization has been started, to be known as the Young Hawaiian Republican Club. The object of the club is to "educate" the voters and especially the youthful to be voters, who have not yet had the opportunity to learn the fine intricacies of republican politics as practiced in the United States. They are to be taught how to run primaries and an election and we presume they will learn the price to be paid to "bosses," voters and others for a nomination for office or a possible election. Ten years has been fixed as the age limit for membership in the new club, and we think the man who drafted the by-laws has been very lenient. To judge from the proceedings of the Republican mass meeting the other day, the actors in the circus were hardly ten years old from a political point of view. Let our young "Republicans" have ample scope. They amuse every one and hurt no one.

A short while ago we were at dagger's point with those who disputed the century in which we are living. Ink and fortunately not blood was shed in proving the views of the contestants of the important question. Now we are glaring at each other because some say that June 14 is the day on which the territorial bill takes effect and others say it is June 15. To smooth the combatants we suggest that a general holiday be observed from June 11 to June 15 and that during the week all make merry. Mr. P. C. Jones who, as a litter of pups, according to his own statement, got his eyes opened and returned to the Republican Camp, said in one of his annexation speeches that upon the day that annexation was accomplished he would close the business houses in which he is interested for three days and he would allow his employees to whoop-it-up. Mr. Jones has not responded to his promise but now is the time for him to redeem it. We are anxious to celebrate the territory with Dole, Cooper, and Frear, and we want Jones to start the ball rolling by announcing on behalf of our merchants, a general holiday from the 11th of June till the 15th (or 14th, as may be decided,) and the "spiritual" condition of those who revere Kamehameha day will be in prime order on the great territorial day.

Decision in the Rooke Cases.

The Supreme Court handed in a unanimous decision this afternoon in the case of C. K. C. Rooke vs. The Queen's Hospital and the Bishop Estate, and vice versa, both in favor of C. K. C. Rooke, nephew and godson of the late Dr. T. C. B. Rooke and adopted father of the late Queen Emma. The opinion is by Justice Frear, concurred in by Justice Whiting and Circuit Judge Stanley, the latter in place of the Chief Justice, absent. Magooon and Silliman and J. M. Long for Rooke Kinney, Ballou & McClanahan and H. Holmes for the Bishop Estate, A. S. Harwell, Robertson & Wilder, W. E. Castle & P. L. Weaver for the Queen's Hospital.

The Tennis Singles.

The second rounds, gentlemen's singles, in the tennis tournament were played yesterday afternoon on the courts of the Pacific Tennis Club.

S. G. Wilder beat B. F. Beardmore, 8 6, 6-4.

P. M. Lansdale defeated E. H. Paris, 6 3, 6-4.

E. R. Adams won from A. L. Castle, 6 3, 7-5.

F. C. Atherton defeated Donald Ross, 6 0, 6-4.

The Atherton-Brock match, scheduled for yesterday, was not played. It will take place on the Pacific courts this afternoon at 4 o'clock. This is a second round contest.

The players left in the semi-finals are Messrs. S. G. Wilder, P. M. Lansdale, E. R. Adams and the winner of the Atherton-Brock contest. They have drawn and will play as follows:

Messrs. G. P. Wilder and Lansdale, Messrs. Adams and Atherton or Brock, on Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock, on the Pacific courts. The final will probably be played the same afternoon.

Charles Elston, winner of last year's singles, will meet this year's finalist at the conclusion of the ladies' singles next week.

Parkhursts Defeated.

The Japanese procurers who, through the efforts of well-meaning but ill-advised would-be Parkhursts, were discharged by Judge Frear this morning. It was a surprise to people acquainted with law that the frivolous charges against the men could ever have been brought. The attorneys in the case evidently banked on the sympathy of Judge Frear, but Mr. Frear is a jurist and a judge before he is a man as long as he holds the ermine of his office. All regret the result of the case but the legal result was a necessary conclusion. Mr. Paul Neumann defended the men and was as brilliant as ever although his sympathies were the other way.

Finances of Uncle Sam

WASHINGTON, May 1.—The monthly comparative statement of the Government receipts and expenditures shows that during April the receipts aggregated \$45,039,326, and the expenditures \$40,903,927, leaving a surplus for the month of \$4,135,399. The receipts during the month show an increase of \$3,500,000 as compared with April, 1899, and the expenditures a decrease of \$25,000,000. The receipts from the several sources of revenue are given as follows:

Customs, \$18,765,017; increase, \$1,120,000.

Internal revenue, \$23,600,291; increase, \$1,400,000.

Miscellaneous, \$2,674,017; increase \$900,000.

The total receipts for the ten months of the present fiscal year were \$472,387,067, an increase over the receipts for the same period of last year of more than \$48,500,000. The disbursements during last month on account of the War Department were \$10,244,147, a decrease of nearly \$6,000,000 over the same period last year; Navy, \$4,700,078, decrease, \$73,000. The disbursements during the last ten months were \$119,584,000 less than for the same period last year.

Hon. H. M. Sewall has invited the members of the Historical Society to his house at Waikiki this evening. He will read a carefully prepared article on "The Partition of Samoa and the Past Relations of that Group with Hawaii and the United States," a subject on which he is an authority.

Mrs. Hubert Voss, nee Helen Coney, is in Paris according to letters received by the last mail. She will arrange for the hanging of her husband's paintings at the international exposition, while Mr. Voss is attending to several important professional orders in New York. Mrs. Voss expected her talented husband to join her within a few weeks after the writing of her letters.

On the 15th of this month the business year of the Hawaiian Board of Mission will close. At it will require about \$5,000 to meet all obligations for for the balance of the year it is hoped by the treasurer, W. W. Hall, that all friends of the Board and its extensive work among the various nationalities on the Islands, who have not already contributed, will do so before the 15th of May.

The race track is in an excellent shape and the prospects are that the meeting on June 7 and 11 will be extraordinarily successful. The new buildings are being finished rapidly, the track is "speedy" and the horses and trainers are straining every point in making the event do justice to the new Territory, and to our reputation as a sporting community. Seven runners are expected to arrive here in time for the June races. Sam Parker's Cormorant has gone to Chicago and will be entered here.

The jury who tried the vagrancy case of H. Keaweamahi, which is the Arlington Billiard Parlors robbery case, Wednesday afternoon retired at 5:30 o'clock and returned ten minutes after with a verdict of not guilty, two dissenting. E. P. Dole, Deputy Attorney-General, and J. W. Catheart for prosecution, J. T. De Bolt for defendant.

In the midst of the trial of the trespass case of Kauai (w.) vs. W. C. Achi Wednesday afternoon, plaintiffs attorneys stated in open court that the defendant offers to give a paid-up lease of the house lot in controversy, also a perpetual right of way (4 feet wide) to the graveyard and a fee simple deed of the graveyard land about 30 feet square. Upon this proposal the plaintiff accepted the proposition and discontinued the suit and will release all claim to other portions of the land. Defendant also agreed to pay costs and an attorney's fee of \$50. Jury discharged. Robertson & Wilder for plaintiff; Kinney, Ballou and McClanahan for defendant.

Judge Stanley yesterday morning heard a motion by defendant in the John II Estate, Ltd., vs. R. Kahinu Mele, ejectment, to have the cause transferred from the mixed jury calendar to the Hawaiian jury calendar. After arguments by respective counsel the Court grants the motion and the case is set as No. 48A. Exceptions noted. J. A. Magoon for plaintiff; Robertson & Wilder for defendant.

A stipulation is filed in W. C. Achi vs. Keopulupulu, action to quiet title, to have the cause placed upon the jury-waived calendar and that it be tried in vacation. Achi & Johnson for plaintiff, T. McCants Stewart for defendant.

Jury is also waived by stipulation in the contest to the admission of the will of the late Annie N. Holokahiki, deceased. S. K. Kane for proponent; Edward Kekoa, contestant, in person.

A petition for the probate of the will of S. L. Kamaka, deceased, of Waianae, Oahu, is filed by the widow, Susan K. Kamaka. The deceased leaves estate to her as sole devisee, which is situated at Waianae, and valued at \$500. C. F. Peterson for petitioner.

In the ejectment case of Pelani vs. Kaaao Opio, T. McCants Stewart for defendant, has filed a motion in the Circuit Court asking that the default decision be opened. The attorney alleges that the defendant lived at Punaluu, Koolauloa, and was unable to enter Honolulu at the time the case was to be heard, by reason of the quarantine restrictions then in force. C. F. Peterson for plaintiff. The defendant has also filed a general denial to the plaintiff's petition.

A claim against the estate of Annie Holokahiki has been presented by Dr. H. C. Sloggett for \$375 alleged to be due for professional services rendered to Judge Holokahiki, deceased.

The defendant in the case of I. R. Burus vs. S. Ahmi, makes a general denial of plaintiff's complaints, alleging misrepresentation and fraud.

Acting Judge Davis yesterday afternoon heard the case against W. C. Achi for non-compliance with Board of Health regulations, on appeal from the District Court.

The trial of R. Wally Davis for assault and battery on Alice Gay, his foster daughter, was held yesterday before Judge Stanley, after taking all the forenoon to impanel a satisfactory jury. After six challenges the following were found satisfactory: G. H. Karratti, Jos. Ross, J. W. Koakau, Jno. M. Bright, D. A. Dowsett, J. K. Mersberg, Chas. Notley, Jr., E. E. Mossman, John Ahsing, E. J. Crawford, G. S. Mokuahi and H. Meek, who found a verdict of not guilty, two dissenting.
