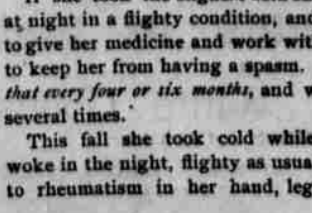

THEIR FIRST REUNION WAS A GRAND SUCCESS. Reception—Supper—Music—Address—Various Speakers and Remarks. Between 400 and 500 members attended the union of the Citizens' Guard at the Drill Shed Saturday evening.

After several selections by the Government band, the stereopticon exhibition opened with C. B. Ripley as lecturer and Mr. Heidemann and Dr. Pratt handling the machine. Fifty splendid pictures were thrown on the screen. All rose in their place when the fall of Chas. L. Carter appeared.

Timely Topics.

In all the accounts of the explosion of the powder mills near Berkeley it is gravely stated there is no explanation of the cause. The chances are that this information was taken hence by one of the fifteen men torn to shreds and blown to atoms by the concussion.

Some very able arguments are being made in the Prince Cupid habeas corpus case and the Supreme Court, when its decision is ready, will doubtless present an exhaustive paper. In the debate the fundamental laws of three countries came into evidence prominently. British and American citations have been numerous and the Hawaiian constitution has been probed to the very depths.

A BOARD of officers will shortly be created in the Department of the Missouri by a general order of the War Department of the United States for the purpose of considering the preparation of an emergency ration, which will combine the qualities of wholesomeness and nutrition and at the same time be appetizing, keep well and be portable. Similar boards will be created in all the departments, in the hope that out of a multitude of counselors a ration better than the old-time hard-tack will be evolved. Taro flour and banana flour should be brought to the attention of some of these boards.

THE Citizens' Guardsmen had a very happy social as men and citizens and supporters of good Government were drawn closer together. The Guard is a representative body and an active factor in public affairs. The speeches were all very good. A couple of the orators, however, were a trifle to belligerent in their utterances. You can't gain converts to the cause of annexation by painting the word across a block of coral and rubbing the face of a man who has his doubts. Devotion to a principle may at times be manifested too positively. There are seasons when moral suasion in various forms is more effective than threat or show of force.

On account of advice from the States, the government has deemed it wise to name a Minister to Washington in advance of the period heretofore tacitly fixed upon. Wm. R. Castle, attorney, President of the Board of Education, ex-member of the Legislature and one of the annexation commissioners sent to Washington in 1893, has been chosen.

GOOD HEALTH. Surprising Length of Life Amid the Worst Sanitary Conditions. And yet we seem some distance removed from a complete solution of the phenomena of disease and death. It would seem natural that sickness and death should be most prevalent in the tenement house quarters of the great cities, like New York, where the conditions are, from the sanitary point, most unfavorable, and where there is neither pure air, pure water, decent food, cleanliness, nor, it might almost be said, morality; yet, according to an exchange, the recent investigations into the tenement houses of New York show some surprising facts. One of these is the fact that among the Russian and Polish Jews of the South ward of that city, where the crowding is most dense, and where the sanitary conditions are apparently among the worst known in this country, the death rate is decidedly below the average for the rest of the city, being annually but about 17 for each 1,000 persons.

Simple Preventions. The value of cold water douches to the entire frame of workers is seldom sufficiently considered. Sea salt in the bath and rapid friction with a loofah will remove the weary constitution capable of enduring fatigue and greatly improve the circulation. In cases where nervous centers are unhinged from such railway travel and massage is extremely useful. A great deal of the friction and jarring of locomotion by steam might be saved if the simple precaution of not leaning back or allowing the heels to rest on the ground were adopted. The spinal troubles caused by over-journeing would thus be saved.
