The death of General William Tecumseh Sherman, which occurred in New York, on the afternoon of February 14th, removes one of the most prominent of the Union generals in the late war. It was he who gave to the rebellion its final fatal blow, in his celebrated "March through Georgia," which led to the surrender of the southern army under Lee.

A WELL-MERITED COMPLIMENT.

One of the Honolulu correspondents of the San Francisco Examiner, in a letter published in that paper, February 18th, has the following reference to Mr. J. O. Carter of this city:

"THE COMING MAN. "Whatever changes may be made it is now admitted that Hon. Joseph O. Carter of Honolulu, brother of the Hawaiian Minister at Washington, is the coming man. He is already the real adviser of Her Majesty the Queen, and he is certainly the very best choice the Queen could have made, as an able, conscientious and conservative man.

As is well known, Mr. Carter has been a faithful adviser of the Queen, since her accession, and has endeavored to form a Cabinet which would be acceptable to her and to the people, but without success. It has been rumored that Judge Widemann might retire from the position of Minister of Finance. In this event, should it occur, the appointment of Mr. Carter to that place would add greatly to the strength of the Government, and receive the approval of every one.

The city of New Westminster, B. C., was visited by a destructive fire on the 14th and damage to the sum of \$500,000 was done.

It is stated that Brazil is trying to import 1,000,000 emigrants from Germany. Already 140,000 have been landed at various Brazilian ports by the North German Lloyd Company.

OUR SAN FRANCISCO LETTER.

Per U. S. S. Monowal, San Francisco, February 20, 1891.

(From our special correspondent.)

Sugar. NEW YORK, Feb. 20.—Cuban Centrifugal, 96 degrees, 5 65-100 cents; granulated, 64.

The sugar market is about the same. Hawaiian is coming in at a lively rate, and is being unloaded as fast as possible in order to escape the operations of the McKinley bill, which goes into effect on April 1st.

S. S. Australia. The Australia arrived on the 17th, with a big freight and passenger list. Captain Houdlette reports a rough trip. The second day out of Honolulu the steamer encountered a heavy cross sea that forced him to slow the engines down to half speed.

Nicaragua Canal.

As yet the Senate has taken no important action on the Nicaragua Canal matter. In executive session on the 16th inst. the question came up for discussion and developed such a hot debate that in order to avoid the development of further ill-feeling the leaders secured an adjournment.

The Hawaiian Cable.

During the past ten days Congress has paid considerable attention to the bills providing for a subsidy for the construction of a cable to Hawaii. The first important step in the way of pushing the matter to success was the passage in the Senate on Feb. 10th of a local appropriation bill containing a clause providing for the survey of the route.

The Canadian Line.

A dispatch from Victoria, B. C., dated the 19th says: "The steamer West Indian arrived this morning seventy-two days from Liverpool. She is to go at once into trade between this province and Australia, being the pioneer ship of the British Columbia and Australian steamship line."

San Francisco News.

The State Board of Trade has recommended General N. P. Chipman of Red Bluff as head of the Department of Horticulture, Viticulture and Floriculture at the World's Fair.

The South San Francisco Land and Improvement Company has been incorporated with a capital of \$2,000,000. Among the incorporators are P. E. Her, the Omaha distiller, and others connected with the whisky interest.

Sam Nike, a native of Madras, who has been engaged for the past twenty years in this city as a laundryman, has been sent to the Pest-house, being afflicted with leprosy. He is seventy-six years of age, and first applied for admission to the Almshouse, not knowing what ailed him.

The Koch treatment for consumption has to all appearances been very successful at the City and County Hospital. Its effect on the lepers thus far treated has also been marked.

Coal has dropped to \$12 a ton, and the power of the coal ring has been broken. Private Albert Blackman of Battery B, Fifth U. S. Artillery, shot and killed Private Gottlieb Nonnenmann at the Presidio recently. It was a cold-blooded murder.

American News.

The President is about to issue a proclamation announcing reciprocity between the United States and Venezuela. The free coinage question is still the issue of the hour at Washing-

ton. The friends of silver are dependent upon their immediate prospects, deeming it next to impossible to get their measure through at once, though they are confident of ultimate success. In the course of the discussion, ex-President Cleveland took a hand, declaring against free coinage. This is believed to effectually destroy his chances for the Presidency in 1892, as the Farmers' Alliance of the West and South is committed to free coinage.

The Sioux chiefs have been to Washington and have laid their grievances before the President. All is reported as quiet in the Sioux country. Work has been temporarily suspended on the new World's Fair buildings in Chicago, because of labor demonstrations.

Jay Gould is credited with having formulated a plan for the consolidation of the principal railroads of the West. The aggregate capital of the companies is \$800,000,000.

Stanford's land loan scheme has perished at the hands of the Finance Committee of the Senate. Three steamships loaded with samples and merchandise are soon to be sent to Brazil from New York. Rio will be visited first and then a trip may be made to Bahia and possibly Buenos Ayres.

John Jacob Astor was married, February 17th, at New York, to Miss Ava Willing. Foreign News. A dispatch from Chile announces the bombardment of Pisagua by the insurgents. The blockade at Valparaiso has been raised. The insurgents have thus far had things all their own way.

The Newfoundland legislature has declared for reciprocal trade with the United States as against trade with Great Britain. The British Imperial Government, it is announced will shortly establish a line of steamers to Canada across the Atlantic and will also subsidize the Pacific lines.

The rupture between Kaiser William and Bismarck is widening if that is possible and there are reports that Bismarck is to be prosecuted for revealing State secrets.

The new Chinese Church on Emma street was consecrated Sunday morning by the Bishop of Honolulu. The consecration service was in English and the Holy Communion in Chinese. The Bishop preached an appropriate sermon which was translated by Si Yung. The Chinese congregation turned out in fair numbers. The church is a neat building and erected mainly through the efforts of the Rev. H. H. Gowen, ably assisted by leading members of his congregation and others.

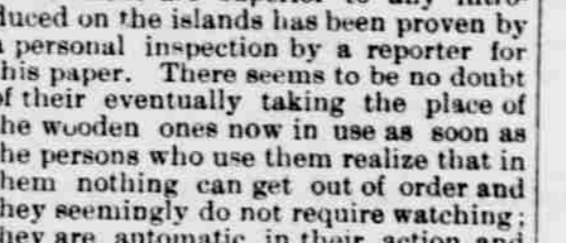

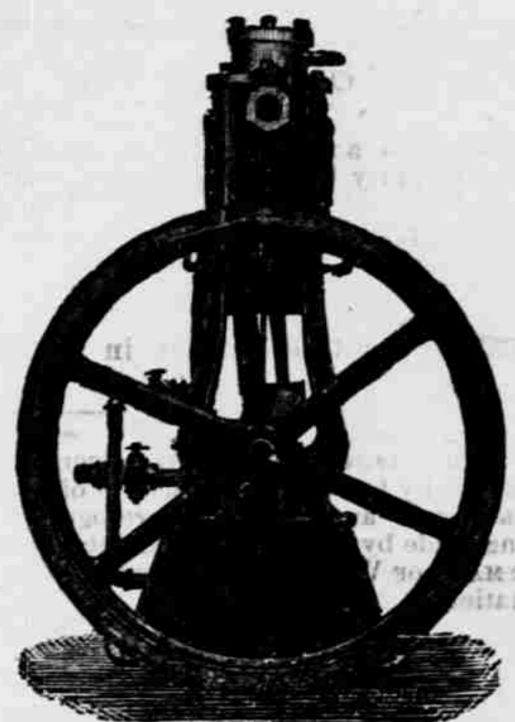

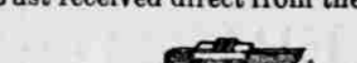

FREE SUGAR REGULATIONS.

The Secretary of the Treasury has promulgated the following regulations governing the importation of free sugar:

"After April 1, 1891, under the new Tariff Act, in order to facilitate the immediate delivery to importers of sugars which under the above act are free of duty, appraisers are instructed to furnish examiners with samples representing in shade or color what is known as No. 15 D. S. and to instruct the examiner to test sugars landed on the wharf under free permits as they are discharged from the vessels by comparison with the samples so furnished.

Every bag or other package which is of no higher grade than the official sample will be delivered by the discharging inspector to the importer, but packages which appear to the examiner to be of higher grade than the sample shall be marked by him with the letter D and shall be detained by the inspector until he receives a special order from the Collector for delivery thereof. In all cases where sugars are detained for further examination delivery thereof may be made upon payment of estimated duties after the same has been duly weighed.

Should the inspector report any package on an invoice as above No. 16 D. S., duty will be collected as soon as provided in paragraph 237, section 1, of said act. When samples drawn in accordance with this regulation show a grade not above No. 15 D. S., they may be gathered into a common receptacle, but samples apparently above No. 15 D. S. will be placed in separate tin boxes and numbered for identification. Articles 1,444 and 1,463 of regulations of 1884 are hereby annulled after April 1, 1891, in so far as they relate to landing and weighing of cargoes of free sugar. The examination of the packages withheld from delivery by the examiner will be promptly made by the appraiser and the facts reported to the Collector without delay.—S. F. Grocer.
