



A PLANT TO BE AVOIDED.

Facilities of the Rhus venenata, or Poison Sumach—Symptoms—Antidote. (Cor. Philadelphia Ledger.)

Rhus venenata, the poisonous species, is known in different localities under the several names of poison ash, poison alder, poison dogwood and poison or swamp sumach, and is commonly found in damp or swampy situations, where it usually grows from eight to fifteen feet in height.

The main stem and principal branches are ashen gray in color, though the recent shoots and the leaf-stems are of a fine crimson or purple hue, while those of the older growth are green in color, with purple veins. The flowers are of a greenish-white hue, and their clusters much more open than those of the other species mentioned, while the fruit is also of a greenish-white, not red as in the case described. It occurs in clusters of separate berries instead of in clove bunches.

The plant, as a whole, is more delicate and attractive in appearance than are other species of sumach.

There is something remarkable about the sumach poison. Some persons may handle the plant, breathe its fumes when burning, or even touch the leaves and flowers with impunity, while others are affected with dangerous swelling and inflammation from the least exposure to its effluvia. Some become sensitive after being once poisoned, while others who were equally affected when young may outgrow the susceptibility and become able to handle the plant in safety. Perhaps the minority are susceptible, while those who habitually dwell in the woods are non-sensitive to its dangerous properties.

Many methods of cure are employed, with more or less success, but with little to mention but one. On the fourth of July last I chanced to be in a piece of rough woodland in northern New Jersey, and unexpectedly found myself in the midst of a thick growth of poison sumach, which I had rubbed against without observing. Knowing my susceptibility, I was naturally alarmed, and the more so when the next morning I found my face swollen and feverish, with other premonitory symptoms of a severe case of poisoning. Having heard of hot water as a cure, I at once began bathing face and hands in water as hot as could be endured. This treatment, repeated several times during the day, proved remarkably efficacious. The swelling and the feverish symptoms quickly disappeared, and the next day there were only one or two faint indications of the blisters. Since then a friend has tried the same remedy with the same effect. The poison symptoms are at once allayed.

My experience is that when the eruption has once appeared no remedy can cause its rapid disappearance. It seems to run its course in defiance of antidotes. Yet, even then the hot water remedy allays the itching, which is its most disagreeable symptom. I have very recently been affected by ivy poisoning, and have removed every sensation of pain by bathing in very hot water, though the blisters took their own time to dry up and disappear.

Another story of Grant. (Continued Equivocal.)

If the statutes of limitation do not run against an incident relating to Gen. Grant, the following is a good one, related by himself to Hon. James Hubbell, of Delaware. He illustrated how a trial in domestic life, the destinies of men and affairs. In 1863 Mr. Hubbell, who was then a member of congress, was on his way to Washington, and he met Gen. Grant, whose name was being mentioned as the successor of Mr. Johnson. Allusion was made to the matter, and Gen. He was led to talk about himself, and he said: "It is strange how the most trivial affair affects the destiny of men. It is not generally known that I owe my appointment to a little incident in domestic life. My folks were living at Georgetown, Ohio, at the time, and my mother sent me to a next door neighbor to borrow some butter for supper. A letter had just come from a son who had been appointed to West Point. It is said he had been allowed to pass the examination, and would return home at once. I learned this while at the house, and when home I told our folks, and I hunted up Tom Hamner, who had just returned from congress. I asked him to appoint me, and he said: 'There is no vacancy, and my term expires to-morrow.' But there might be, I said. He replied: 'Well, if there is I will appoint you.' The next mail brought the information to me that the father had died, and he was as good as his word, and I was appointed. If my mother had not sent me to a neighbor to borrow butter I never would have gone to West Point."

A Nautical Note. (San Francisco Chronicle.)

"So that's the old California, is it?" soliloquized an aged pioneer, standing on Spear street, when under the hoist of a bark-rigged vessel, whose battered sides bore evidence of many a year's struggle against wind and wave.

"Yes, that's the California," was the reply from the man in charge of a repairing crew who were replacing the forward part of the ship. "She was the first steamer that ever entered the port of San Francisco. Her boilers were taken out of her in 1875, and since that time she has been the lumber and coal trade, with an occasional cargo of tea from Yokohama. She's an old-timer, I tell you. Queen's Hospital. The semi-annual meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Queen's Hospital was held Friday morning at the room of the Chamber of Commerce, the Vice-President, Hon. C. R. Bishop, in the chair. The Visiting Committee for the past quarter presented their report for the past quarter, which was very satisfactory, and spoke in high terms of the general appearance of the hospital.

To His Excellency, Minister of Interior—Sir: I have the honor to furnish this, the fifty-third semi-annual report of the Treasurer of the Queen's Hospital, showing the receipts and disbursements during the half year ending November 30, 1885, and of the present financial condition of the corporation.

The following is the report of the House Physician for the past quarter: HONOLULU, November 30, 1885. To the Trustees of the Queen's Hospital—Gentlemen: I have the honor to submit the following report for the quarter ending November 30, 1885:

The highest number of indoor patients was 68, lowest 52; daily average 60. Number of prescriptions, 3,113; calls at the dispensary, 608. The number of patients treated at the Hospital was as follows: September, 166; October, 102; November, 87.

A Decorated Goblet.

An interesting home-made method of natural decoration consists simply in taking a glass or goblet, and placing in the interior a little common salt water.
