## LAST OF THE ELELE SUIT

Judge Stanley Sentences Chinese Convicted of a Deadly Assault.

W. H. Hoogs Pays a Dollar Judgment—Decreases, Judgments and Other Documents Filed.

The case of the Republic of Hawaii vs Chew Man and Chew Fan, assault with a deadly weapon, was tried yesterday afternoon before Judge Stanley and the following jury: George R Carter, A N Tripp, George Dillingham, H J Rhodes, J F C Abel, J T Waterhouse, T M Starkey, Fred Leslie, John Effinger, D T Bailey and Fritz Rowald. A verdict of guilty was found, two dissenting. At this morning's session Judge Stanley sentenced each of the defendants to pay a fine of \$150 each. George A Davis for the Republic; A G M Robertson for the defense.

Judge Stanley next heard the trespass suit of Chung Yee vs Chew Man and Chew Fan in which a claim for \$1.00 damages is made. The case was submitted on the evidence in the criminal suit of Republic of Hawaii against the same defendants and the testimony of plaintiff as to damages. George A Davis for plaintiff; A G M Robertson for defendant.

The case of Wong Sang et al. vs. S. A. Macy et al. has been continued for the term by consent of counsel. A. S. Humphreys for plaintiff; E. P. Dole for defendant.

In the action for damages of M J. Andre vs. W. H. Hoogs. Judge Stanley has rendered judgment for plaintiff for one dollar. The defendant this morning paid into court the dollar together with \$15.60 as costs of court.

In the case of Anna dos Anjos Perry et al. vs. Mary Lucas and Charles Lucas, a bill to remove cloud to especial boundaries and for an injunction, Judge Stanley has signed a decree sustaining the defendant's demurrer and dismissing plaintiff's bill with costs.

In the case of M. G. Silva vs. A. Fernandez, defendant's bond on appeal in the sum of \$1500 has been filed, with H. E. McIntyre as surety.

In the bill for partition entitled M. P. Robinson et al. vs. Caroline J. Robinson, Judge Stanley has appointed Henry Smith, commissioner to make partition of the property if a partition can be made without prejudice to the parties, otherwise to sell said property at public auction. Kinney & Ballou for plaintiffs; A. W. Carter for defendant.

In the bill for separation of Thomas Dickson vs. Mary J. Dickson, the plaintiff files an affidavit that he is wholly unable to pay counsel fees or temporary alimony, and that if the defendant is without the necessities of life it is wholly through her own fault in deserting plaintiff.

In the case of Alexandre de Silva vs. Frank Cunningham on appeal from the District Court of Honolulu, the plaintiff by his attorney, Lyle A. Dickey, has filed a notice withdrawing the appeal.

In the ejectment suit of Kwong Lee Wai vs. Ching Sai, plaintiff by his attorney, W. A. Kinney, has filed a bill of costs amounting to \$117.50, exclusive of the clerk's costs.

In the matter of the estate of Julia K Campbell, deceased, W H

C Campbell as guardian of the minors Edward, Alexander, James and Julia K Campbell, files a receipt showing that he has received from A J Campbell, administrator of the said estate, certain property and cash belonging to the minors of the aggregate value of \$3362.08.

Cecil Brown, attorney for J F Bowler, has acknowledged full satisfaction of judgment for \$3694.02 in the suit of J F Bowler vs E C Macfarlane & Co. This is the case in which five defendants who endorsed notes resulting in the transfer of the old Elele printing office plant to the National Reform party were mulcted in \$769.20 each.

The judgment roll and cost bill in the case of Ving Fat & Co vs Oahu Lumber and Building Company was filed this morning. The judgment is for \$1786.48; interest \$111.65 and costs \$78.95.

In the matter of the guardian ship of Keo Puni, an insane person, Judge Perry has authorized the guardian, G J Waller, to execute for and on behalf of said Puni his written consent to the execution of a deed by his wife to certain real property.

Judge Perry is still engaged in the hearing of Lee Ling vs Kimo et al, replevin, on appeal from the District Court of Honolulu. J A Magoon for plaintiff-appellant; A Rosa for defendant.

### Iolani School.

A capital program of songs, recitations, etc., has been arranged for the Christmas breaking up entertainment at Iolani school, on Thursday next at 7 p.m. Through the kindness of several friends, among them many of the old boys, a huge Christmas tree has been loaded with useful presents, of which every boy will receive one after the entertainment. The boy who is fortunate enough to draw No. 1 will be the happy possessor of a very handsome volume of Shakespeare. Mr. Fenn, the head master, will be glad to see as many friends of the school as possible.

### Girls' School Concert.

The Christmas closing exercises of Kamehameha School for Girls took place yesterday evening. An important part of the program was made up of music. Miss Cora Albright recited in pleasing style. There were three splendid choruses by the school and one by the Normal classes. A vocal trio by three young ladies of the school, tenor solo by Mr. Macurda, and piano solos by Miss Clymer and Miss Lena Rosewarne were among the best features.

Principal Hosmer of Oahu college was one of the platform guests at the Bishop Memorial Chapel dedication. Deputy inspector Gibson, of the Education department, with his wife, Mrs. Thos. R. Foster and J. B. Atherton were visitors present but inadvertently omitted from the list in yesterday's paper.

## SUPREME COURT SESSIONS

Two Cases Argued and Submitted at Yesterday's Sitting.

Exceptions to Granting of a New Trial in Tuck Chew vs. Makee Sugar Company Now Being Argued.

The Supreme Court opened for the December term yesterday morning and at once took up the case of Republic of Hawaii vs. W. P. Hickey, the Kakuhihaele luna who was convicted of manslaughter in the second degree and sentenced to five years' imprisonment. The appeal was on exceptions taken during the trial and from the order of the Circuit Court refusing a new trial. Hon. Paul Neumann made the argument in support of his exceptions, at the conclusion of which the case was taken under advisement.

The Court next took up the case of Kanoii vs. Kaloipahia et al. on exceptions from the First Circuit Court, and after hearing argument from counsel took the same under advisement. Castle, Weaver and Johnson for plaintiff; Ma'ooa and Edings for defendants-appellants.

This morning the court was engaged in hearing the appeal of Tuck Chew vs Makee Sugar Company. In this case a jury gave plaintiff a verdict for \$29,000 but the defendant succeeded in obtaining an order for a new trial. This order is now appealed from. Robertson and Creighton for plaintiff-appellant; Kinney & Ballou for defendant. The argument will likely take up all of today's session.

## CHARITY DISOBLIGED.

Small Packages for Leper Children Received by the Mokohi Parao.

A Fort street merchant is greatly put out by the snubbing of his intention to send some little things for Christmas to the poor leper girls in the Bishop Home at Kalaupapa. He had done up two small parcels of goods for that purpose, addressing them to Sister Marianna, the Mother Superior at the Home. His errand boy was sent with them to the steamer Mokohi just before the time of sailing. The purser declined to take the packages, first, because "there was no room" on the boat! Then, when this idea struck the keeper of the treasure himself as absurd, he gave the terms of the pieman to Simple Simon—freight must be paid on the parcels to the amount of fifty cents before the steamship should be dangerously overloaded by receiving the burden from the boy's arms. The boy had to give the answer of Simple Simon to the pieman—"I have not got any money." Then he hied back to his employer, who, time being short, shoved the half dollar into his hand and hustled him off in a back to the wharf. But the steamer was just pulling out, and the girls at the Bishop Home will be so much short on their Christmas realizations. The charitable merchant is sorry that he had been under the impression that small donations to the lepers were not charged freight on the channel liners.

## TODAY'S CABINET SESSION.

Station House Addition Postponed—Talk of a New Steam Tug.

A lengthy Cabinet session was held this morning. Many matters were discussed through little was done. The business incident to the closing of the biennial period and recommendations to the Legislature for the next period were talked over at length.

Minister King brought up the matter of procuring a larger and more powerful tug for the harbor. It was generally agreed that the Eleu is too small and should be replaced by something more modern. The matter was left over for further discussion.

With respect to the improvements to the station house it was decided to do nothing until after the close of the biennial period, which will be December 31. It will be easier than to figure on, as it may be necessary to leave it over for the next appropriation.

## SUGGESTED NO AMOUNT.

Error Made in Interview with Minister Cooper Printed Yesterday.

A BULLETIN reporter misunderstood the Minister of Foreign Affairs in yesterday's interview. Mr. Cooper did not say that \$200,000 had been agreed on as a limit to Japan's claim. This Government has simply contended all along that Japan should fix a limit on her claim before arbitration.

Thompson's being on the ground saved a heap of trouble and time to both court and bar. Mr. Armstrong is still laid up in the Wailuku hospital.

## THE NORWEGIAN SYSTEM

How Leprosy is Treated by the Government of Norway.

Lepers May Reside in Government Leper Asylum or Remain in Their Own Homes.

The Berlin Congress of Leprologists has recommended the adoption of what is called the Norwegian system of dealing with lepers. As this is a matter of grave importance to this community, and the public generally knows little about the way lepers are treated in other countries, a BULLETIN reporter was detailed to interview a prominent physician and get some facts as to the Norwegian system, and he kindly furnished the following:

"In Norway lepers can reside in Government Leper Asylums, or they can remain in their own homes. Those in the asylums are not confined as prisoners for life, as our poor lepers are at Molokai. They are permitted to leave the asylums at certain times and travel on the public roads as ordinary people travel, but must return to the asylums at night time. Hence, the asylums are merely healthy homes for them and not prisons.

"Lepers who choose to live in their own houses have to comply with the following regulations: Their residences must be kept in a sanitary condition; they must have a room for themselves; they must have their food cooked and kept separately from that of other members of the household; they must have their own separate clothes and their linen must be washed separately from that of other persons.

"The best Norwegian authors and authorities on leprosy say that segregation, or isolation, need not be carried to anything like this degree, and they would be quite satisfied if lepers had a room to themselves or, at any rate, a separate bed.

"It must be remembered that the climatic conditions in Norway are vastly different from those in Hawaii, and these must be carefully studied before any more should be made here toward giving Hawaiian lepers the same freedom as their unfortunate brethren in Norway."

### KILLED THE SPANISH COCK

American Eagle Too Much for Pride of the Cuban Pit.

An Old Story Revived by Presence of the Author in Honolulu—Capt. McDonnell Owned Barnum's Famous Eagle.

Many people of Honolulu will remember the story of P. T. Barnum's great American eagle. This noted bird flourished in the famous circus over 40 years ago, and was seen and admired by immense crowds in every haole country in the world. In Europe people recognized in the bird the creature upon the American standard; and many stories of its being the "original," the "only," etc., found their way into the continental prints and public gossip.

There is a story connected with this eagle which is of interest here. Captain McDonnell, the veteran G. A. R. man, was the original owner of the bird. The captain and George Hardy of Honolulu were in the same vessel at the storming of Vera Cruz during the Mexican war. They were afterward with Taylor at Chapultepec and entered Mexico with Scott's victorious army. It was at Vera Cruz that Captain McDonnell found the eagle tied to a log in the woods. The bird was the bald kind and its wings had been clipped.

A few months later the American fleet was at Havana on its way home. There was a big cockfight in the town. A game fowl had bested everything in sight. "My bird will whip anything with feathers on it," triumphantly declared the owner. Captain McDonnell heard this. His eagle was brought ashore in a bag. The even beats aggregated \$1800. There was but a couple of passes when the eagle seized the famous fowl by the neck and tore his head off. Spaniards draw their knives; 300 American sailors drew pistols. The Spaniards backed down.

When the war vessels reached New York all the papers devoted columns to the cockfight in Cuba. The Herald continued the story in two issues. Barnum heard the story and went to see the bird. Captain McDonnell accepted his offer of \$500 and the eagle became circus property. There is perhaps not a G. A. R. veteran in the world who has not heard of this eagle and the fight mentioned, but few in Honolulu have known the connection of Captain McDonnell with the incident.

#### Helm's Ship More Horses.

The Helms of Ellensburg, Washington, have another shipment of fine horses now on the way to Honolulu. C. D. Helm of the Pacific Cycle and Manufacturing Company has an interest in the stock and the ranch from which the animals come. His father is sending them out. They were out to sea before the merchant discovered that he had not shipped a sailor. After battling alone with the wind and billows for a number of hours he reached his original moorings—a wiser man but with rheumatism up and down his 5 feet and 10 inches.

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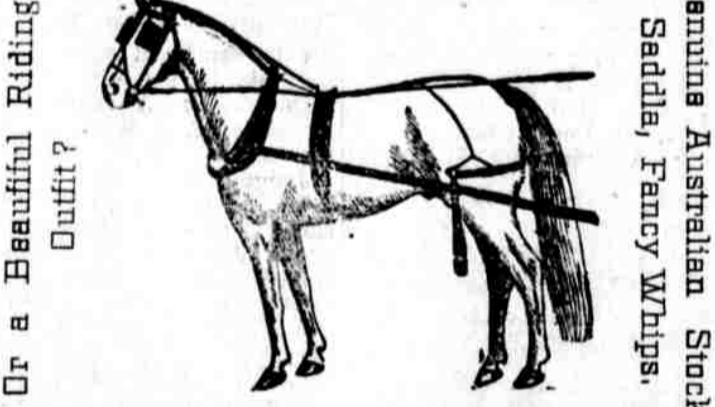

**LATE NEWS OF THE ORIENT**  
**Japanese Sake Brewers May Curtail Its Production One Half.**

No Dividend for the Nippon Yusen Kaisha—The Partitioning of China—Epidemic at Amoy.

Mr. C. Imbault-Huait, Consul for France at Canton, is dead.  
 The new battleship Yashima arrived at Yokosuka on the 30th ult.  
 Count d'Eu, the grandson of Louis Philippe, and the Prince d'Orleans are visiting Japan.

The Sake Brewers' Guild, at a recent meeting, decided to actively canvass in order to secure the election of candidates opposed to the present Cabinet, at the next general election; that in the event of the Sake Tax Increase Bill being enacted the guild shall form a company for the import of alcohol with a capital of over a million and that the amount of sake to be brewed this year shall be reduced to one half that of a normal year.

At the general meeting of the Nippon Yusen Kaisha held on the 29th ult., it was decided not to declare any dividend for the past half year. The reason, as stated by the President, was that though, on the whole, the coasting traffic had been very successful, the Company incurred a loss of over 400,000 yen on account of its foreign services, and required a larger disbursement in consequence of the rise in the market price of commodities.

The recent weather has been unusually hot at Amoy, and an epidemic is raging there, to which from seventy to eighty deaths daily in the city are attributed.  
 The cargo steamer Candia, of the P. & O. line, has established a record run from Hongkong to Sydney. She left on the 5th October, and arrived in Port Jackson on the 22nd, taking 17 days on the passage.

It is freely reported in Hongkong that Germany, Russia, and France have decided to partition China. Germany is to get Kiaochow and the whole of Shantung; France to get Formosa and Fuhkien; Russia annexes Korea and Manchuria and the whole of north east China. The three Powers hope to overawe Japan by acting in concert.

**Another Light Mishap.**  
 About 8 o'clock last night the lights in E. W. Jordan's store went out. There were several customers in the store at the time and the accident was unfortunate. Merchants are very hopeful that the accident's of the past two nights to the light system will not occur on Christmas eve, when they are in the midst of their best business of the year.

**Cutting Down the Hill.**  
 The tram track on the Fort street hill above Beretania has been sunk from a foot to a foot and a half below the level. This is the beginning of a move, which will be immediately executed, to raze the hill. The driveways and sidewalks will be taken down to conform to the grade above and below, toward town.

**Regimental Bar Shooting.**  
 Medal shooting at Kakaako was slow yesterday. Four men of Company F scored. Corporal Hirschmann was the only one to win a bar. He made 38 and is entitled to a bronze trophy. Captain Coyne is officer of the range this afternoon. Captain Zeigler will have charge tomorrow from 1 p. m.

**A Famous Bird.**  
 The falcon which alighted on the mast of the Takachiko Kan at the time of the naval war with China, and which was so much talked of in consequence, died lately in the Shinjuku Imperial farm, where it had been kept. It is to be stuffed by order of the Emperor and exhibited at the Museum.

Queen Wilhelmina, the pretty young ruler of the Dutch, took to the bicycle some time ago with girlish enthusiasm. Her mother deeming the pastime incompatible with the dignity of the crown, the matter was referred to the Privy Council, specially convened for its consideration. The grave and reverend seigniors adopted the mother's view, with the added opinion that riding a wheel involved risk of injury to Her Majesty. They therefore concluded to implore her not to expose her precious life to this danger. It is related that the Queen pouted but obeyed, and accepted for a solace the gift of a Shetland pony. What will the Dutch statesmen say if a plebeian scoundrel come into collision with the pony and bring fair young royalty in grief and humiliation to the ground?

It must be wonderfully helpful to this Government, in preparing its case with Japan for arbitration, to be told by newspapers professedly friendly to it things about its position which it does not know. For instance, this oracular statement in the morning paper: "The chief point now made by Japan in the dispute is, not that the convention had been abandoned but that the treaty of 1871 has been violated. The chief point made by our own Government is, that we have the 'inalienable' right to violate it, under certain conditions. The arbitrator must decide the question." This presentation of the case is away off from the published views of members of this Government. They have contended all along that the treaty of 1871 is confined, by its terms, to the granting of mercantile privileges, in each country, to the citizens or subjects of the other party to the treaty. And that if it granted freedom of entry into this country to Japanese laborers, the privilege being superior to the Hawaiian laws for the regulation of immigration from any and all countries, then there would never have been any need or use for the labor immigration convention of 1886. That is, no need or use for it outside of its evident purpose of providing limitations at both ends - in Japan and Hawaii - to the admission of Japanese laborers into this country. Without the convention, assuming Japan's present claims to have a good fighting chance in law, the Japanese might pour into Hawaii until doomsday, without the check of permission to leave at the other end, nor the check of selection operated from this end. In the opinion of the BULLETIN the fact of the convention is a very material element in determining the controversy. It seems to show, unmistakably, that Japan in 1886 joined Hawaii in imposing limitations—restrictions is as good a word—upon the now claimed "inalienable" treaty rights of Japanese to enter this country at their sweet will. If Japan has the right, at its end of the line, to make a convention overriding its subjects' privilege to go to Hawaii when and how they pleased, then Hawaii surely has the right, at its end of the line, to make laws to govern the reception of people of all nationalities under treaties east in the same mould as that with Japan and inclusive of that compact. There is justly and equitably only one question at bottom of the whole controversy, and it is this which the BULLETIN stated at the outset: Did the Hawaiian authorities, or did they not, in the immigration cases in dispute, adminis-

ter the laws of this country without undue discrimination against Japanese subjects? If it prove that one or more Japanese subjects, possessing the conditions qualifying immigrants of any nationality to land, were turned away from our shores, in all probability this Government will be adjudged liable for pecuniary indemnity for the wrong to the extent of its commission. This paper is fully aware that the Advertiser refuses to grant the privilege of any other organ of public opinion to hold views upon the Japanese or any other important question. It is always cavilling or sneering at the presumption of independent discussion on this insulated streak of coral reef, while it-elf peddling out the secondhand views of authorities far afield, from Tokio to Timbuctoo, as supreme wisdom. Nevertheless, the oracle should be reconciled to things as he finds them. The alternative will be his own making if, failing capacity for breathing a free atmosphere, he become stifled with the aroma of his own bumptious fatulence.

#### NEW PENAL CODE OUT.

Hawaiian Version Now in the Hands of a Special Committee.

At the Judiciary Department a pile of law books was seen on the clerk's counter this morning, which upon enquiry proved to be copies of the Compiled Penal Laws, being sent to the courts of the Republic. Copies of the work were also ready to be mailed to several of the United States law libraries.

The last Legislature threw out the attempted revision of the Codes, for which Judge Foster put in a couple of years' work, but authorized the expenditure of \$8000 by the Interior Department for the compilation of both Civil and Criminal codes. The work has been done by Attorney Ballou, who has merely made a new compilation of existing laws by discarding obsolete laws and rejecting such portions of former laws as have since been amended. No revision of the laws has been attempted, as that must be done by a legislative committee.

The Hawaiian version of both codes is now in course of preparation by Attorney J. M. Poepoe, assisted by James A. Thompson of the Judiciary Department.

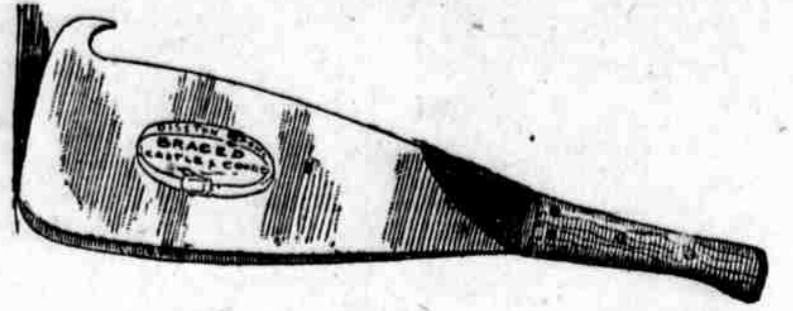
