LEGISLATIVE.

Wednesday, July 5.—The special Committee to whom was referred the matter of Court houses and jails reports, recommending an appropriation of \$39,540 for the building of same in districts where required. Laid on the table.

The report of the special Committee to whom was referred the salaries of Custom officers, recommending the reduction of same, was laid on the table for future consideration.

The Committee on the Palace appropriations reported recommending the passage of \$62,500 for completing the same, which also was laid on the table.

The Committee on Commerce reported recommending that petitions on the total prohibition and the full use of liquor be laid on the table to be considered together with the bills relating to liquor. Also on the petition of merchants to increase the license fee of travelling agents to sell goods, &c. Both reports were adopted.

Mr. Kalua gave notice of a bill to prohibit the sale of lands by mortgage.

The bill to reconstruct the Board of Immigration was read a second time and referred to a special Committee consisting of Hons. Preston, Aholo, Kapena, Gardner and Nakookoo.

On the third reading of a bill relating to evils arising from the law to mitigate, and repealing same, was passed finally.

The bill increasing the permanent settlement of Mr. Henry S. Swinton was indefinitely postponed.

The bill granting to Mrs. Nihou Kipi an appropriation as permanent settlements to Hon. Kūhelani and J. P. E. Kahaleaahu was passed.

The bills to regulate the sale of liquor was referred to a select Committee.

Mr. Kalua gave notice of a bill to prohibit the importation of liquors. Adjourned till to-morrow, at 10 A.M.

The British steamer Escambia, which capsized while starting out to sea, on the 19th June, had on board 53,368 cts. of wheat, valued at \$90,726, which was insured in the following offices: Swiss Combined, £5,000; Hutcheson & Mann, £10,000; Thames and Mersey, and New Zealand, £5,000.

Apathy.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—I saw in yesterday's BULLETIN that you are of opinion that the great trouble in bringing about sanitary reformation among the natives of these islands lies in the "ingratitude and apathy" of those concerned. Long residence in the country and somewhat intimate knowledge of the people's habits of thought and life convince me of the truth of your statement. I know that some people contend—and honestly too—that to enlighten the Hawaiians in matters that affect their physical and social well-being is all that is needed to incite them to exertion. Those who talk thus are either limited in Hawaiian experience or superficial in observation. There are foreigners who have lived many years on these islands who know as little of the real state of feeling and way of thinking of this people as they do of the man in the moon. The missionaries have been abused and blamed for having done so little for the natives, for having studied their own comfort and advanced their own material interests at the expense of the natives. I would ask, what have those traducers of the missionaries done themselves for the good of the natives? What are they doing now? I am no missionary and I have no missionary connexion; but I believe in common fairness, and am willing to accord them the credit of having worked hard with an earnest desire to improve the condition of the natives. A class of lewd, immoral, loose-living foreigners has been the principal element in retarding and undoing the work of the missionary. Why the missionaries should be execrated for the existing state of apathy and indifference regarding their own best interests among the natives, I cannot see. That such indifference does exist will not be denied by those who have mingled freely with the natives, and learnt from their own mouths and through the medium of their own language, their inner feelings and sentiments. I would not say that every individual Hawaiian shares this feeling of indifference: I know of some exceptions. But I speak of Hawaiians in general as a people. A thousand times, particularly during the small-pox epidemic, I have heard the natives declare that it was useless for them to trouble themselves; that death would terminate all *pilikia*, therefore, death is better than life. Kanai Items.

(From our own Correspondent.) A Chinaman, Ashee, was convicted of selling liquor, on the information of two informers, and sentenced to a term of imprisonment. The Chinaman has appealed on the following grounds: He states that the informers, Christian and Cupper, came to his house with the liquor in their possession, and after asking them what they wanted, left and swore an information against him. In support of his statement there is the fact of the admission of a Chinaman that he sold the liquor, and was going to run away to avoid capture and did so, also of several kanakas who state that they saw the liquor in the possession of these men when they went into the house. As the case is "sub-judice," I give no opinion on the merits of the case.

Having been invited to a *hulahula* at Hanalei, I got myself up in the most killing manner, and having provided myself with cigars, a "sine qua non," as pipes are not considered "the thing," you see Madame Etiquette is all powerful even here, I started. On my arrival I was handed in by a lady, who was on a visit from Honolulu, in a most lady-like manner, she was M. C., and the manner in which she carried out her duties would do credit to a Parisienne. The young men were exceedingly polite to the ladies, and requested them to dance in the most orthodox style, promenaded, flirted, &c., somewhat as we are used to see these matters done in a fashionable ball room. The dancing was excellent, and the manners of some of the young men and ladies those of an habitue of a ball room; I was much astonished and pleased and passed a very pleasant evening. The music consisted of a Concertina played by one or other of the party in all cases in a masterly manner, the time being excellent for dancing. There was but one thing to regret, the room was rather too small.

Horses for the Fire Department.

MR. EDITOR:—In view of the increased number of steam Fire Engines for the city and suburbs of Honolulu, it may be found necessary that horses will have to be employed in conveying these somewhat heavy machines about. Good serviceable horses at the present time are expensive—and will probably be so for some time to come—and their purchase would considerably reduce the appropriation for the Fire Department. With a little Legislative action at the present time, all the horses needed for the engines may be procured without the expenditure of a single dollar, by enacting a law similar to one now in force in St. Petersburg, which reads, "That when a horse, attached to a vehicle, runs away, the vehicle is confiscated to the Government, the owner of the runaway, etc., fined, and the horse handed over for the use of the Fire Department." The necessity of a very strict law, with heavy penalties, is greatly felt here, and one similar to the above would not only provide horses for our fire engines, but help to swell the coffers of the Government. Scarcely a day passes but what some mishap occurs through the neglect and carelessness of those in charge of horses. In this city there are over twenty Chinese who own and drive express wagons. Now, it is a well known fact that John does not understand the care, management and driving of horses; and the same may be said of many of the Hawaiian drivers of expresses who are extremely careless. The drivers of all public hacks should be licensed and also compelled to wear a badge. This plan is adopted in almost every city, and no man can obtain the badge unless he is a competent driver and understands the management of horses. Some strict regulation is greatly needed here, and the sooner it is adopted the better for the public safety. Yours, JACKO.

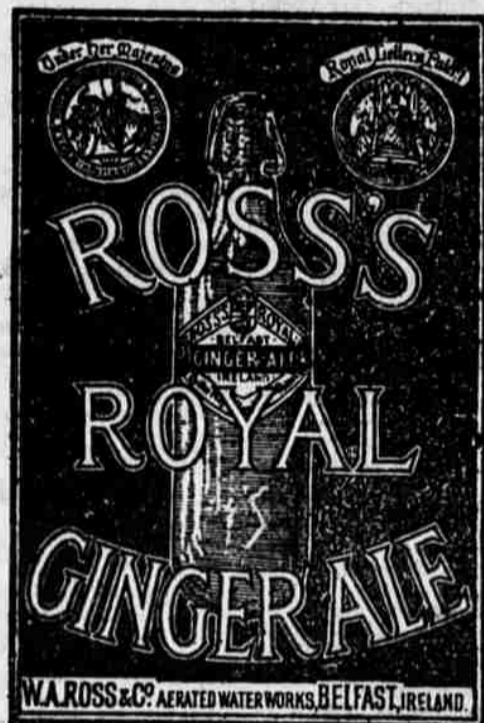
