

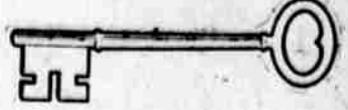

## KUHIO NAILS CAMPAIGN CANARDS ON KAUAU PASTORS DROPIAUEA; ATTACK DIVORCE

### Ministers Turn Down Thwing's Resolution In Favor of Iaukea

Sheriff Iaukea was this morning able to find out what an utterly ungrateful world this is. In spite of the fact that he has for many moons been following blindly the dictates of the Ministerial Union, thereby undoubtedly losing much support which he might otherwise have gotten, that body this morning turned down flatly a resolution of appreciation of his conduct. This was done on the ground that it might be looked upon as a political measure, and as the Sheriff is at present looking more than anything else for things which will have political effect, needing them badly in his business, this statement seems to add insult to injury.

And the men who did this were Theodore Richards, whose camp Iaukea declined to proceed against, and Doremus Scudder, backed by the entire number of members present at the meeting—except Thwing, who for months past has been sticking unto the Sheriff closer than a brother, and who, at least, stuck to him to the last.

The resolution was offered by Thwing as a sort of report of the committee appointed to look into the enforcement of the law. It recommended first of all that a resolution be passed expressing the apprecia-

tion of the Union for the work of the police department in conjunction with the Atlantic Fleet patrol in keeping law and order during the stay of that Fleet here, and, as a second paragraph, recommended that a general resolution commending the Sheriff in a general way for his efficient work, be passed.

It was Richards who took the first whack at the resolution.

"I do certainly not concur in this," he said. "Such action would surely have political significance, and while we recognize the value of the services of the Sheriff, that matter is now one of many months past, and if we should at this time pass this resolution it would undoubtedly be looked upon as a political move."

Doremus Scudder administered the death-blow. "I move to table the report," he said. "This is not debatable," he added, seeing that Thwing was about to speak.

"I second the motion," cried a number of voices, and the resolution was defeated by a vote which was unanimous, with the one exception of Thwing, who stuck by the Sheriff, murmuring that it was very unfortunate that such a thing should happen.

### Everybody Roasted at Meeting of Fusionists

The Home Rule-Achi combination opened its active campaign last Saturday evening with a meeting at Ania Park, which was attended by a listy large and enthusiastic audience.

With the exception of two Hawaiians who entertained the audience by dancing and hulaing to the tune of music, the meeting was most orderly.

"Send a Delegate to Congress to represent the rich and poor alike," said Charles K. Notley, candidate for Delegate to Congress.

"Shall the trusts rule or shall the people rule, the corporations such as the Standard Oil company or the Inter-Island Steamship Company?" was the tenor of the remarks of W. C. Achi, candidate for Mayor.

D. Kalaaukalanui Sr., vice president of the Home Rule party, presided. Before introducing Notley, as the first speaker, he made a brief address complimentary to the speakers and to the candidates of the Home Rule-Laborite party.

Notley Roasts Fear.

"Agriculture is the back-bone of the country," commenced Notley. He dwelt on the method of acquiring good government lands for agricultural purposes and denounced the land policy.

### FLEET STILL SILENT THOUGH NEARLY DUE

Nothing Heard From the Cruiser Fleet Or Colorado

With the Fleet due in two days, wireless communication with the cruisers has not yet been established at the Naval Station. Attempts will be made this evening to talk with the West Virginia, but it is hardly expected that any talking will be done before the following evening. The local wireless people have no one listening for the Fleet.

Piles of coal are now growing on the Alakea and Naval wharves, in order to have everything in readiness for the arrival of the ships. The Alakea wharf is now loaded down with cones of the black fuel, and they are being fed on the Naval wharf by a stream of carts which is going continuously along the city front. Twenty thousand tons must be put into the bunkers of the cruisers and the destroyers this trip—twice as much as was put in during their last stay here, a coaling operation of real magnitude. The Saturn is also loaded down to the water, and may be used as before in putting fuel into the bunkers of the fighting ships.

These are due to arrive on Wednesday. If they are proceeding according to the schedule they had when leaving this place, and only some very important circumstance would cause them to vary.

The cruiser Colorado, which was stated by cable some time ago to be due in Honolulu on the 5th—that is, today,—is not looked for just yet, as the investigation of her recent accident in going ashore on the Coast was completed only Saturday, and there is a report that some matter in connection with her ammunition delayed her departure for this port.

### CHANDLER SHUT OUT

Deputy Attorney General Whitney has rendered an opinion to the effect that the nomination papers received by Secretary Mott-Smith on Sunday should be accepted.

In this he advises against the action of Secretary Mott-Smith, who refused papers filed after Saturday at midnight.

Whitney holds, however, that the nomination papers of Chandler of Kauai, received today, should not be accepted.

### CHANDLER COULDN'T ACCEPT CHALLENGE

Could Not Back Charge He Made Against Kuhio

Jonah K. Katanianole, Delegate to Congress, who returned yesterday from Kauai, reports that the island is Republican. Of course there are some Democrats and Home Rulers, but very few of them dared to face the Delegate, when challenged to explain certain accusations made against him by the Democrats.

"I had a very encouraging trip around the island of Kauai," said the Delegate today. "Accompanied by George Fairchild and other Republican workers, I traveled around the island for the purpose of addressing the people at various places. We held meetings at Lihue, Kekaha, Waimea, and other places. The attendance was large and the people listened to the speakers most attentively. The most important thing that I had to do while there was to correct the false report regarding the disfranchisement of the Hawaiians.

"I was informed that Chandler, a Democratic nominee for Senator, told the Hawaiians that I had introduced a bill in Congress, urging the disfranchisement of the Hawaiians. At Kekaha, where I addressed a meeting and where Chandler was present, I challenged him to come forward and prove to the people whether I had actually introduced such a bill in Congress. He never came forward, nor did he attempt to say anything in regard to the bill.

"That was the most important subject that my attention was called to. The immigration question and the disfranchisement question had apparently been agitated by the Democrats, but after I had had my say, the people were satisfied with the situation.

"From my own observation, I believe that Kauai will vote the Republican ticket."

### How Dole May Decide

All indications point to a decision favorable to the Government in the test case of corporation contributions to campaign funds.

There is no absolute certainty about this but if a man were a gambler he would be taking good chances on the Government's end of it.

It is believed that Judge Dole will hold that while the corporations of Hawaii are not corporations organized by act of Congress, the election of a Delegate is on the same basis as a Representative to Congress from a State.

### MINISTERS WILL COMBAT DIVORCE

Thwing Heads Committee Which Will Fight Evil

The Ministerial Union at its meeting this forenoon decided to try to stem the tide of the divorce-evil, which appears to have become exceedingly prevalent in the Territory of late. A committee was appointed to look into the matter, and was instructed to report thereon at the next meeting of the Union.

The subject was brought up by Thwing.

"There has been a large increase in divorces here of late," he said. "During the month of September there was more than one a day. We ought to consider the matter and see if there is anything we can do to lessen the evil, as for instance having more publicity given, or to have a longer period before re-marriage, observed, at least, by our ministers. This concerns the welfare of homes and the honor of the sacred rites of marriage in their relation to the ministry. I therefore move that a committee be appointed to look into the matter."

Chairman McKeever, after this motion had been carried unanimously, appointed Thwing, Frank Scudder and Rev. H. W. Chamberlain as such a committee, with instructions that they report at the next meeting.

During this meeting the Union selected new officers for the coming year, namely Rev. Mr. McKeever for president and Rev. Mr. Ebersole for secretary and treasurer. The latter and Henry Jud were elected members of the Union.

### POWERS FOR PEACE

LONDON, England, Oct. 5.—A conference of the Powers has been called at which Great Britain will propose measures for preserving peace in Bulgaria and to revise the treaty of Berlin.

### TROOPS MOBILIZED

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Oct. 5.—Prince Ferdinand has proclaimed an independent government at Tirnova, the former capital of Bulgaria. His Cabinet was present and a government organized. It is reported that troops are mobilizing.

### UNITE WEST COAST

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Oct. 5.—A movement to unite all the commercial bodies of the Pacific Coast to press common interests before Congress has been started and is meeting with general success. The proposal is that all the bodies shall act as a unit when dealing with legislation of benefit to the West Coast.

### CARBOLIC ACID TO CLEAN MANILA

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Oct. 5.—The transport Thomas, leaving for the Philippines, will take a large shipment of carbolic acid for sanitary work in Manila.

### \$100,000. SAN FRANCISCO FIRE

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Oct. 5.—Fire in the coal pile at the Beale street wharf did damage amounting to a hundred thousand dollars.

### GIANTS DEFEATED BOSTON

NEW YORK, N. Y., Oct. 5.—New York defeated Boston today, thereby strengthening the hold of the Giants on the baseball championship.

### COURT-MARTIAL OF LIEUT. EVANS

MANILA, P. I., Oct. 5.—The court-martial of Lieut. Evans opened today. The charges were read. The testimony will be given tomorrow.

### 50,000 LIVES LOST

HYDERABAD, India, Oct. 5.—The deaths from the recent floods will amount to 50,000.

### Canneries Not Exempt, Says Supreme Court

The Supreme Court this morning handed down a decision in the tax appeal cases of seven pineapple companies, rendering its opinion in favor of the Attorney General, in the contention that the pineapple forty-acre tax exemption does not include everything in sight.

The companies concerned are as follows: Wahluwa Pine Company, Hawaiian Pineapple Company, Pearl City Fruit Company, Honolulu Packing Company, Haku Fruit and Packing Company, Hilo Fruit Company, and the Kauai Fruit and Land Company. The decision is based on appeals taken from the various tax appeal courts.

The Court sums up the cases as follows:

"The above entitled cases, involving the taxation of the property of pineapple companies, were submitted together, the companies claiming an exemption of all real and personal property with the exception of forty acres of land each, including in their claim for exemption their establishments for canning pineapples. The Honolulu Packing Company, Ltd., holds more than forty acres of land under lease but has no cannery. The

**ISLAND SCHOOLS ARE OVERCROWDED**

Reports that have reached here from  
 the other islands show beyond a doubt  
 that Honolulu is not the only place  
 where the public schools are over-  
 crowded, and they also show that this  
 is a record-breaking year for the edu-  
 cational institutions of the Territory.  
**Would Turn Away Pupils.**  
 Mrs. Pauline Omsted, principal of  
 the Waimea, Kauai, school, states in  
 a letter to Superintendent Habbitt  
 that there were 320 children registered  
 in school on the opening day, and she  
 wants to know if she will be allowed  
 to turn away others. She says that  
 the school is sadly in need of both  
 room and teachers. At the last en-  
 tertainment given by the Waimea  
 school, enough money was realized to  
 purchase a Singer sewing machine, a  
 pair of scales and sixty-two new books  
 for their library.

**Fairchild's Outing.**  
 Cyril O. Smith, principal of the Ka-  
 paa school, has also made a written  
 report to Mr. Habbitt. He states that  
 thanks are due to George Fairchild  
 for a splendid outing which he gave  
 the children of that section of the  
 country. On a special train he took  
 nearly 200 people to view the whole  
 stretch of the famous Kapaa lands,  
 after which the whole party was en-  
 tertained at Col. Spalding's place.  
 George Fairchild has just resigned as  
 school agent for that section, and—  
 let's see,—yes, he is a candidate for  
 Senator.

**Mostly Sick.**  
 The teacher at Hanalei reports that  
 a number of the pupils at the school  
 there are suffering from the mumps,  
 and some from trachoma. The most  
 of them have very sore arms at the  
 present time, due to successful vac-  
 cinations.

**Quake Dumped Building.**  
 Another report has come from  
 Puna, Hawaii, stating that the earth-  
 quake did considerable damage to the  
 schools there. One school building  
 was moved two feet and tipped over,  
 the building falling one way and the  
 verandah toppling the other.

**SULPHURIC ACID** got loose on the  
 Hongkong Maru, when two Japanese  
 sailors dropped a case of the acid, and  
 together with some steerage passen-  
 gers were seared by the liquid. The  
 affair was reported to the harbor po-  
 lice, at Yokohama, where the Hong-  
 kong arrived on the 16th inst.

**Threat Of War**

BELGRADE, Servia, Oct. 4.—War  
 is threatened in the Balkans as the  
 result of a declaration of Independ-  
 ence on the part of Bulgaria, issued  
 in the Province of Rumelia.

Prince Ferdinand of Bulgaria will  
 assume the Czaralty of the Independ-  
 ent provinces.

Bulgaria, of which Rumelia be-  
 came a part in 1886, is under the su-  
 zerainty of Turkey. Bosnia and Her-  
 zegovina is a province of Austria, and  
 over it, according to the latest maps  
 and encyclopedias at hand, Turkey has  
 no suzerain authority. The province  
 of Bulgaria touches no portion of  
 Austrian territory, while between  
 that province and the other provinces  
 named in the above despatch lies the  
 Kingdom of Servia. The above cable  
 is about as clear as the usual politi-  
 cal situation in the Balkans, how-  
 ever.

Secretary Mott-Smith is waiting for  
 an opinion from Deputy Attorney Gen-  
 eral Whitney to decide whether or not  
 he will receive the nominations for  
 Representatives that came in yester-  
 day from Kauai. Judge Whitney has  
 already decided that nominations com-  
 ing in today should not be accepted,  
 and this will probably throw John S.  
 Chandler, whose nomination for Sena-  
 tor reached Mott-Smith only today,  
 out of the race. The Secretary, how-  
 ever, has not decided this point to his  
 own satisfaction as yet.

Whitney is at present puzzling over  
 the question as to whether Mott-Smith  
 should have accepted nominations that  
 reached him yesterday. The nomina-  
 tions of D. Kanehili, M. A. Mikaele,  
 and John Halemanu, for Representa-  
 tive, were received by him at his  
 house yesterday morning about ten  
 thirty, and according to his published  
 statement, he must refuse them, un-  
 less the Attorney-General's opinion  
 says that they should be received.

Should the opinion hold with Mott-  
 Smith's first decision, mandamus pro-  
 ceedings may be brought to compel  
 him to receive the tardy nominat-  
 ions. Whitney will have his decision com-  
 pleted this afternoon.

**CANNERIES NOT EXEMPT**

remaining Oahu corporations have  
 each more than forty acres either in  
 fee simple or leasehold and their  
 own canneries. The Tax Appeal  
 Court of Oahu allowed the total ex-  
 emption claimed and the tax assessor  
 appealed. The Haiku Fruit and  
 Packing Company, Ltd., holds more  
 than forty acres of land and owns its  
 own cannery. Its claim of exemption  
 was sustained by the Tax Appeal  
 Court of Maui and the tax assessor  
 appealed. The Hilo Fruit Com-  
 pany, Ltd., does not maintain a plan-  
 tation but owns a cannery. The Tax  
 Appeal Court of Hawaii sustained the  
 assessment made by the assessor and  
 the taxpayer appealed. The Kauai  
 Fruit and Land Company, Ltd., owns  
 less than forty acres of land and a  
 cannery. The Tax Appeal Court of  
 Kauai held that S. L. 1907, Act 77,  
 did not go into effect until the com-  
 pletion of the five-year term of ex-  
 emption granted by R. L. Sec. 1223,  
 and granted a full exemption under  
 that section, from which decision the  
 tax assessor appealed.

The conclusion of the Court is  
 stated in the following language:  
 "Our conclusion is that the statute  
 exempts from taxation all per-  
 sonal property and all real property  
 other than land, solely and actually  
 used in the cultivation and produc-  
 tion of pineapples, and all land up to  
 forty acres so used by any one per-  
 son, firm or corporation, but does not  
 exempt establishments for the can-  
 ning of pineapples, whether owned  
 by the planter or by an independent  
 corporation."

The syllabus reads:  
 "Taxation; exemption under statu-  
 te.—S. L. 1907, Act 77, exempting  
 all property, real and personal, used  
 in the cultivation and production of  
 pineapples does not exempt establish-  
 ments for canning pineapples.  
 "A proviso that such exemption  
 shall not apply to land in excess of  
 forty acres does not limit the exemp-  
 tion of personal property.  
 "Constitutional law; repeal of ex-  
 emption.—A general exemption from  
 taxation for a definite period is re-  
 pealable by subsequent legislation."

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## JAPAN WILL NOT FIGHT UNCLE SAM

An exceedingly interesting and instructive address on the relations of Japan and the United States was given before the Ministerial Union this forenoon by Rev. J. H. De Forrest, D.D., a Christian worker of thirty-four years standing in Japan, whose intimate acquaintance with most of that country's foremost military men and diplomats places him in a position to speak with authority.

The speaker brought out very strongly the point that Japan feels more friendly towards the United States than towards any other nation, not even excepting her ally, England, and that the rumors that Japan was contemplating war against America were absurd. The reason for Japan's friendship he gave as follows: the fact that Commodore Perry opened Japan peacefully, while any other nation under similar circumstances would have used force; the magnificent line of diplomats who had been maintained by the United States at Tokyo, where they had often prevented other powers from taking aggressive steps; the fact that thousands of Japanese who had been educated in the United States, felt friendly towards that country on account of kindly treatment received there; that the United States was the only country which had ever returned an indemnity to Japan; the sympathy shown by the United States during the war with Russia; the prompt relief which came from the United States during the time of famine which succeeded the war; and finally because the United States was the first nation to recognize the right of Japan in Korea.

Dr. De Forrest spoke strongly on the attacks made by Representative Hobson on Japan. "I was amazed at the defuge of malicious slander circulated against Japan," he said, "especially were the attacks of Hobson the silliest nonsense, ignorance and slander. I undertook to punish him, and I think I did, only he is so thickskinned that I do not think he felt it."

"There will be no treacherous step taken by Japan against the Philippines," said Dr. De Forrest in conclusion. "You could not induce Japan to make a hostile move against Hawaii. They want us to have the Philippines and would hate to have any other nation have them. As far as Japan is concerned it is of no use to build naval stations and fortifications in our insular possessions."

of the Democrats, because the Territory would lose revenue from the government lands. He condemned the Republican party, because of the Governor's sympathy with the planters and of his disregard of the Hawaiians. "When a certain Hawaiian hui petitioned the Governor for a piece of land, it was turned down, but the planters asked for it, and it was granted," said Notley.

"Another thing that the Republicans and Democrats in Hawaii are working for is the immigration of European laborers. Why there are enough field hands in the islands today and if the planters would only raise their price, the laborers would be satisfied with it. In spite of the severity of the Federal immigration law, the planters, in violation of that law, are trying to bring European immigrants to this country at their expense. The Attorney General of the United States has ruled that assisted immigration was a direct violation of the United States immigration law. The planters of Hawaii today are trying to break the law."

**Kuhio Negligent.**  
"Delegate Kuhio has been and is doing his best to see that the planters' wishes are granted by Congress. Judging from his work, it is apparent that he represents the rich and not the poor people."

Notley before concluding, stated that Kuhio had been negligent in his duties in not seeing to it that the Federal law regarding the raising of Federal furor fees to \$3 a day was extended to Hawaii.

He told the audience that the Democratic candidate for Delegate to Congress was simply talking about the principle of the Democratic land policy in order to get votes, when in fact he knew that it would be to the disadvantage of the Hawaiians.

**Ignored Laborites.**  
During his long address, Notley, who occasionally turned back and looked at the nominees, failed to recognize or make mention of the Laborites' candidates.

**Beckley on Himself.**  
George C. Beckley (Mooheau), independent candidate for treasurer, first read a written Hawaiian speech, in which he recited his genealogy, showing his connection with Kamehameha the Great. He then called upon the Republicans, Democrats, Home Rulers, Laborites, poolas and everybody else to vote for him.

His written speech was:  
"I have the honor to appear before you as an independent candidate for County Treasurer. I am an independent candidate, because it is the people who rule, and not the parties, and because, if elected, I do not wish to be under obligations to any machine or ring of any kind."

"The gentlemen opposed to me are capable and honest men, but I know that I, too, am honest and have the capacity to fill this office to the satisfaction of the public."  
"If I am honored by your votes, I will devote my time and attention to the duties of the office, and will not run it as a side issue to any other business, or as a feeder to a private enterprise. I was born and grew up in Hawaii, and here I expect to live and die; I have property interests in this County, as elsewhere in the Territory, and am concerned in honest and economical government, just as much so as any man in the Territory of Hawaii. I have for more than forty years held positions of great responsibility and trust, have handled thousands of dollars belonging to other people, and no man can truthfully say that I have ever violated my duty in any respect whatever. I ask you to give me your earnest support, and faithfully promise you that you will never have cause to regret it."

people today is "Shall the trusts rule or shall the people rule—the corporations such as the Standard Oil Company or the Inter-Island Steamship Company?" thundered Wm. Charles Achi.

Having asked the indulgence of the audience, Achi spoke first in English, making a comparison of the Republican and Democratic parties on the mainland with those of Hawaii, condemning each party here for not adopting the principles of the mainland parties.

"What did Bryan do?" questioned Achi, forcibly. "Why, because he done that, Haskell was removed from being a treasurer for the Democratic party in the great United States."

"What did the Republicans and President Roosevelt done to Senator Foraker?" continued he. "Why, Senator Foraker, a well-known statesman and orator, was cast out of the party because of his connection with the Standard Oil Company. That was the same trouble with Governor Haskell of Oklahoma."

"Right here in Hawaii, the corporations are controlling everything; the poor people are not in it. The local Republican and Democratic leaders do not adopt the principles of the mainland politics."

"Here, the lion and lamb sleep on the same bed," he continued, meaning thereby that the Republican and Democratic parties in the Territory both favor the trusts and monopolies.

**Standard Oil Senators.**  
Achi then commenced to attack Lane and Chillingworth for working for the Standard Oil Company's bill in the last session of the Legislature. On account of the passage of the bill the Territory's revenue was reduced by \$6,000, through the control of the Government oil warehouse by the Standard Oil Company.

"Chillingworth and Lane are double-headed squid," cried Achi. "I dreamed that Lane, the Standard Oil and Inter-Island candidate for Mayor, had told a certain individual that he (Lane) could not do anything without the approval of Chillingworth, Atkinson, and Cooke. Such being the case, Lane, if elected, could not do anything independently."

"If Achi was elected, by the help of God he will do what he thinks best without submitting his good judgment to the approval of anybody else."

Achi then announced that Lane and Fern were alike. Either one of them, if elected, would be dictated by the president of the Inter-Island Company.

**Platform No Good.**  
"There is nothing anything worth while in the Republican platform. It speaks of favoring the erection of a County building, extension of Queen street to Pearl City, and making a belt road around this island. It makes no provision by which money can be gotten. How can all these things be done without money?" asked Achi. "No man would believe such platform."

"If I were to tell you that I could make a bridge from here to Kauai no sensible man would believe such a wonderful story. Money is the principal thing and without it such a clause in the Republican platform could not be compiled with."

Achi then spoke of the present license law as being unjust, in that the large and small business houses are taxed alike. He favored the system of taxation according to wealth. "We will all benefit the wealthy by having good roads to run their automobiles on all round the island and the poor by getting work building those roads," he said.

**Unqualified Candidates.**

Achi further stated that there are only two Republicans and one Democratic candidate who can be counted upon as being able to "make laws" in the Legislature. The former were Douthitt and Long and the latter was Watson. J. M. Poepeo, the legal light of the Home Rule party, if selected as Senator, would surely make good laws, because of his ability and experience.

Charlie Reilly, proving his title as a ring general of exceptional ability, on Saturday evening last, put a terrific right into Charlie Weber's mid-section in the course of the fourth round, that ended that boy's aspirations for the time being.

At no stage of the game was Weber in it. From the first pass, when Reilly jabbed him in the face, until the last, when he came up helpless after that right to the wind and was sent to dreamland under a volley of lefts and rights to the jaw, it was perfectly clear that he was entirely out-classed. Reilly jabbed for his face until he had Weber guarding there, and then drove some wallops home to the wind that would have stopped the town clock. They beat Weber.

**Reilly Is Brilliant.**

The bout was a beautiful exhibition because of the clean work, the cool head, the excellent judgment, the lightning speed of Reilly. He has improved since his appearance with McFadden, even. His footwork is simply great. And the force of his blows has evidently improved very considerably. That stinging right, for instance, which tucked Weber's heart right up under his chin, seemed to sink into the softness of the body up to the wrist.

Weber was evidently no slouch, in his class, but he was not anywhere near the class of the peerless Reilly.

**Chalmers to the Fore**  
Chalmers Graham, acting as master of ceremonies, opened the big show by bringing forth Jack Lamphere of China and introducing him as the challenger of any heavyweight in the islands. Chalmers further announced the fact that Lamphere had boxed three rounds here with Jack Johnson at one time in the past.

Charlie Mack and Charlie Boquet, two boys who were to furnish the preliminary event of the evening, were then introduced, at 140 pounds. Though this fact was not announced, the circumstance that Mack is a marine and Boquet a sailor added an interest to the bout.

Frankie Smith of San Francisco was then introduced as the referee of this bout. The men agreed to break clean.

**The Preliminary**

Mack led, but in the first exchange Boquet drew blood from the other's left eye. From that time, Mack was a bloody spectacle. They clinched, and as they came out of it Boquet sent him to the floor with a hard right. He came up groggy and was forced into the ropes. Blood from his eye covered Boquet's shoulder. Mack recovered and rushed as the gong sounded. Mack forced the pace for a minute in the second, but Boquet soon opened the sore eye again, and, a moment later, when Mack missed a wide swing, dropped him cleanly with a left to the chin. Mack came back gamely, and was rushing when the gong sounded.

Mack began to fight under for the body, but seemed to be somewhat weak, and the bout looked through the third and fourth like all Boquet's. In the fifth he had Mack stalling, and it seemed as though he would have put his man out had he followed up the wide leads left him.

**Mack Stronger**

But in the sixth Boquet was apparently tired, and Mack came up strong. Boquet missed, and they clinched. Boquet landed with right on the face, but his left slipped, and Mack swung in two hard rights to the body, and repeated. However, Boquet presently staggered him with another right, and they staled out the round. Stalling most of the time in the seventh, Mack took the count as the gong sounded. Boquet had much the better of the eighth round, but failed to tuck his man away. When Smith held up Boquet's arm as a sign that he was victor, the crowd yelled its approval of the decision.

**The Usual Challenges**

Chalmers Graham announced that Frankie Smith challenged the winner of the main bout. The referee, who does not wish to appear in the limelight, was introduced, and received quite an ovation. Chalmers then

introduced "Jack McFadden, whom everyone knows," who also challenged the winner of the coming contest. Joe Leahy was introduced, and challenged any lightweight in the islands. He was dubbed as the champion amateur featherweight of the Pacific Coast.

Reilly entered the ring first, amid cheers from the house, and took the corner nearest the audience. Weber followed him immediately into the ring. They were introduced, and weights announced as 128 pounds. Mike Patton was announced as time-keeper.

**The Bout by Rounds**

Round One—They shake hands. Reilly jabs with his left to the face twice, and they clinch. Reilly jabs twice again, and they clinch. He jabs, and again they clinch. Weber sends his left to the jaw, and they clinch. Reilly ducks a left lead, and jabs Weber in the face. Reilly shoots in left and right to the head, and ducks a wild rush. Weber scores with a light left to the face. Reilly jabs, with his left, jabs, jabs, jabs, until Weber misses a wild right and they clinch. Reilly sends a hard left to the body and uppercuts his man in the face with the same wicked hand. They clinch again, and Weber stalls out the round. The men are breaking clean at the word of the referee.

Round Two—Weber blocks two left jabs, but Reilly shoots over a left to the chin, to the stomach, and to the face again in quick succession. They clinch, and Reilly comes out jabbing again. He counters Weber's lead with a left to the body and right and left straight to the face. Weber puts his right to the ear. Reilly closes the round in a whirlwind of blows, sending his left to the chin, his right and left to the face, jabbing again and again, and swinging his right on the head. He jabs Weber four times before the other can move, and that implacable left is darting out into Weber's face with terrific regularity and the speed of chain lightning as the gong sounds, with the beaten man bleeding profusely, and staggering into a clinch, almost out, as the time of respite comes.

**Gong Saves Weber**

Round Three—Reilly comes out jabbing. He scores six times on Weber's face, and changes off to a wide left to the body that hurts. But Weber comes back gamely with his last flash in the pan. He sends in two right crosses to the face. Reilly comes at him fiercely. Every blow in the catalogue is sent into the unfortunate Weber. Reilly is working for the body, and Weber hanging on, trying to save himself. But it seems that he can't by any means get away from Reilly's terrible fists. The gong saves Weber, who is being beaten about the ring mercilessly.

**The Knockout**

Round Four—Reilly sails in hard. His first jab tosses Weber's head. They clinch, and Reilly sends in a left to the face, following with a rush that has Weber staggering wildly into a clinch. Again he goes after Weber hard, and the beaten one clinches to ward off the inevitable. He is weak. As they square away from the clinch, Reilly sinks his right with pile-driver force into the stomach, and Weber leans against him, gasping, going to the floor, under a volley of rights and lefts. He takes the count, and as he comes up he is met with a left that fairly cracks as it meets his chin. The left darts out again, and a stunning right shot out straight to the chin drops him. Weber is counted out.

A goodly crowd attended. The show was excellently managed, and in every way a clean and most satisfactory exhibition, characteristic of the usual good exhibitions given by Promoter Fred. Smith.
