THE LEGISLATURE.

Yesterday was a rather dull day in the Legislative Assembly, although some progress was made with the business on the Secretary's file.

HONEY FARMING.

Bee keeping and honey raising for profit have been long carried on successfully in most countries, and while there are certain disabilities which might interfere to some extent with honey farming for profit in these islands, there really seems to be no good reason why an experiment should not be made.

SUCCOR. Relief of the Dumnotter Castle.

Steamer Waialeale Despatched to Ocean Island.

Representatives of the Hawaiian and British Governments to Visit the Scene of the Shipwreck.

A Relief Station for Shipwrecked Seamen to be Established on the Island.

Early yesterday morning it was decided to send assistance to the shipwrecked crew of the British ship Dumnotter Castle, on Cure or Ocean Island, some 1,200 miles northwest of Honolulu.

Besides the stores, the Waialeale took some 80 tons of coal, which is supposed to last the vessel until she returns, her average consumption under ordinary circumstances being three and one-half tons per day.

The Waialeale sailed under the command of Captain John Hall, who was formerly her Chief Officer.

Colonel James H. Boyd, representative of the Hawaiian Government.

Dr. S. E. Craddock, representative of the Hawaiian Board of Health.

Mr. J. D. Strong, artist for the Hawaiian Government, to make sketches, etc.

Mr. Henry Norman, First Mate of the wrecked ship Dumnotter Castle.

Profiting by the occasion, the Hawaiian Government determined to send materials, and have a life-protecting station erected on the island for the benefit of those who may hereafter be unfortunately wrecked there.

Besides the house, the Hawaiian Government sent a lot of cocoanut trees, which will be planted, also a quantity of algaroba seeds, which will be sown on the island in the vicinity of the station, so as to insure both shade and cocoanut milk for the future use of shipwrecked mariners.

Captain Hall of the steamer Waialeale expects to reach Ocean Island in six days. He will remain there two days or longer if necessary, and thinks that he will make the homeward voyage in eight days.

Two hours before the Waialeale sailed yesterday afternoon the wharf was filled with people, among whom were seen the crew of the life boat of the wrecked vessel. Coal and provisions were put on the steamer until the last moment, and in the meantime groups of inquirers gathered around the shipwrecked sailors to hear again the story of the distance traversed, and pick up information concerning the island.

His Majesty the King arrived shortly after 3 o'clock, and departed shortly before the steamer was ready to sail.

Among those present were: His Excellency Hon. John O. Diminis, Hon. A. S. Cleghorn, H. B. M.'s Commissioner, Major James Hay Wodehouse; Colonel the Hon. Curtis P. Iaukea, His Majesty's Chamberlain; Hon. W. G. Irwin, Hon. Samuel Parker, Major A. B. Hay-

ley, Major W. H. Cornwell, Hon. Fred H. Hayselden, Secretary of the Board of Health, and Mr. F. P. Hastings, United States Vice Consul General.

Cure or Ocean Island, as stated yesterday, is situated in latitude 28 deg. 23 min. north, longitude 178 deg. 23 min. west, and is one of a long chain of scattered islets and rocks which extend northward from the Hawaiian Islands. These islets may be laid down to the point of the recent disaster in the following order: Bird Island, Necker, Basse Francaise, Gardner, Two Brothers' Rock, Maro Reef, Laysan, Lisianski, Philadelphia, Pearl and Hermes Bank, Midway Island, and then Cure or Ocean Island, which lies quite near Midway Island. The distance from here to Ocean Island in a straight line is 1,200 miles, although the actual distance sailed and rowed by the boat's crew, which arrived here night before last, was something over 1,800 miles.

Cure or Ocean Island is a barren coral island of no great extent and is surrounded by treacherous reefs, which extend some distance into the sea. The point where the Dumnotter Castle went ashore was between the points of two reefs which run around the island, one from the north and one from the south, the ends of the reefs almost meeting at a distance of about eight miles from the island. There is a narrow channel between the points of the two reefs, with a solid coral bottom upon which the Dumnotter Castle struck, and soon became a total wreck. The surf on those outer reefs is very heavy, although on the inside for several miles the water is comparatively quiet.

The island is without shelter and is almost destitute of water, although brackish water can be found by digging a short distance. It is stated that there is an abundance of turtles on the island, and before the present boat's crew left, the men had caught a quantity of fish from the sea. The greatest danger which threatens the remainder of the crew on the island is the want of water, as they have sufficient provisions to last them six or eight weeks if used sparingly. Another danger is that they may become discouraged and attempt to leave the island in boats before assistance arrives, and such a course would most likely result disastrously to all or part of them.

The United States steamer Saginaw, wrecked on Ocean Island in 1870, was built at Mare Island Navy Yard, in California, about the year 1860.

From there she went to the China Station, and was afterwards condemned by the United States Government, and was brought back to San Francisco.

She was again refitted at Mare Island, and was afterwards sent to Plover Bay, Behring Straits, with an ocean cable, to be laid for a Russian Telegraph Company across the Straits. But as the project failed, the Saginaw came back to San Francisco, where she was re-fitted with naval cadets and was placed under the command of Lieutenant Commander Siccard, and was sent to survey Cure or Ocean Island.

Through the ignorance of the officers, who were all green hands, she was run ashore on the reef on a clear, bright day, and was lost. The Saginaw was a side-wheel steamer of about 400 tons. She carried two fifteen-inch rifled pivot guns, one forward and one aft, and four twelve-pound howitzers, two on each side of the ship. She carried not to exceed 120 men, besides the officers. After the vessel was wrecked, which occurred in the latter part of September, 1870, the officers erected shelters on the island and constructed a water-condensing apparatus, which was left on the island when they were rescued, but it was afterwards taken away by the captain of a ship which happened to call there, and the place has been without any life-saving accommodation since that time.

Word of the disaster was brought to these islands by four of the crew of the Saginaw, who came a distance of over 1,200 miles in thirty days in an open boat, but three of them were drowned in attempting to land at Waimea, Kauai, which place they reached on the 29th of October, 1870. The survivor of the boat's crew, a sailor by the name of Handford, is now a gunner in the naval service of the United States. In reaching Kauai the boat passed through three heavy gales of wind, and only made land by the greatest chance.

The steamer Kilaueta was dispatched to Ocean Island to rescue the remainder of the officers and crew, and made the passage there in twelve days, under the command of Captain Long, who brought the shipwrecked men to Honolulu.

Captain Long was afterwards rewarded by the American Government with a fine gold watch, suitably engraved, together with a written testimonial, which were sent to him through the President of the United States.

Work of the Lost-Car Agent. A great many consider the work of keeping run of cars owned by a railroad company a stupendous task, and marvel at the ease with which a line can usually locate its missing property. That it is a great task is true, but there is nothing marvelous in it at all. It is simply systematic. A daily record is kept of the loaded and empty cars on our own and other lines, where there are Missouri & Pacific cars, the telegraph making it possible for such a record to be kept.

It is often necessary to locate a car which slips out of the record, and for that purpose a lost-car agent is regularly employed. He begins by the beginning, to make it plain, ascertains where the car started from originally and how billed, its destination and contents, and follows it up till run down. It is an impossible task to lose a car. They can not get away. The distribution of empty cars is a task which requires quick thought, a thorough understanding of the resources of the company in the way of empties and where they are located, all of which work is speedily executed because it is done systematically. It is all system, no sleight-of-hand whatever.—Superintendent Brock in Globe-Democrat.

Art of Making English Cheese. The famous British sirlon of beef is being gradually ousted by its American succulent competitor, and the art of making English cheese to perfection is gradually disappearing from the English grazing counties. Lord Tolemache, one of the most liberal and intelligent landlords of England, recently addressed a letter to his tenants, in which he remarks: "The quality of American cheese has greatly improved. Consequently it is more important than ever that you should spare no pains in making cheese of prime quality to enable you to compete successfully with the foreign producers. The Rattlesnakes of Pyramid Lake. One of the small, rocky islands of Pyramid lake, Nevada, is alive with rattlesnakes. It is supposed that the progenitors of these snakes were wafted to the island on bunches of floating driftwood. There are thousands, if not millions—the people about the lake say millions—of the rattlers on the island, and their right to it there are "none to dispute." The reptiles have their homes among the rocks, and feed upon the eggs and young of waterfowl and dead fish that are cast upon the island. Stories have been told of these snakes rushing forth in a body, hissing and rattling, to attack any one landing upon the island. The rattlesnakes of the island, when disturbed, glide away and hide themselves in the crevices of the rocks, just as would similar snakes on the mainland, though they halt and show fight when hard pressed.—Chicago Herald.

Alaska a Great Island Region. Alaska is a great island region. One of its archipelagoes is 300 miles from north to south and about eighty miles wide. It contains from 1,000 to 5,000 separate islands, and the aggregate area of these islands is more than 14,000 square miles. Six hundred miles further west there is another group which contains over 5,000 square miles, and the total area of the islands of Alaska is larger than the state of Maine.—Exchange.

Speculation, Jr.'s dam was sired by Easton's David Hill, the sire of Geo. Treat, record 2:25 1/4; also, Black Swan, 2:28, and a number of other fast ones. Speculation became very noted several years since as siring the two celebrated trotters, Oakland Maid, record 2:22, and Crown Point, 2:24, two as game trotters as are often seen on a race track. It is a fact worthy of note that the breeding of Speculation, Jr., is almost identical with that of the great champion trotting stallion Maxey Cobb, whose record of 2:13 1/4, made only last year, stands at the head of the list of all stallions. Maxey Cobb was sired by Old Hambletonian, and his dam was by Prince Neco, son of Old Long Island Black Hawk. Speculation, Jr., by Speculation, he by Old Hambletonian, and his dam by Easton's David Hill, who was also a son of old Black Hawk, making them bred exactly in the same blood lines. This is a fact that should not be lost sight of by breeders, and to say that he will sire fast horses, when coupled with good mares, would be superfluous, as if he should fail to do so it would be strictly against the law of Nature that like produces like, or the likeness of some ancestor. SPECULATION, JR., in addition to his fine breeding and great individual excellence, is a fast and game trotter himself. He has never been trained or prepared in any manner, having been kept as a private mount by his owner, so that his speed is only purely natural and undeveloped. He was never in but one race, and that was last year. His owner started him in a matinee trot to see how he would behave in company. This was against the advice of his friends, who stated that it was dollars to a rotten egg that he would get the flag in his face in short order; but contrary to their expectations, and to the surprise of everyone, he went off and beat a large field of old seasoned campaigners with such ease, and apparently with such little effort, making a record of 2:36, that it immediately stamped him as being nothing short of a trotting wonder, and making it doubly certain that could he have had the advantage of the long continued, careful training from day to day, week to week, month to month and year to year, that is given the great turf performers, he would long ago have placed a sensational mark to his credit, perhaps equal to that of his celebrated brother in blood, Maxey Cobb, whose untimely death early in the present year was so greatly deplored by all horsemen in America. His owner, Mr. Colmfield of New York City, refused \$50,000 for him a few days before his death. SPECULATION, JR., and Maxey Cobb are not the only horses of this famous Hambletonian and Black Hawk cross that have won distinction on the turf. Some years since there appeared at every meeting through the Grand Circuit in the East a little brood horse named Gloster, that literally swept everything before him. He would trot around on the extreme outside of a large field of horses the whole mile, and win with such apparent ease that it was plain to everyone that he had several times the speed in reserve every time. At the end of the trotting season he had made a record of 2:17, won in a jog, and had earned the title of the trotting whirlwind of the East. Shortly after this he was suddenly taken sick with lung fever and died, and it was then that his owner, Mr. Goldsmith, unbosomed himself concerning him, and declared that if the horse had lived he would certainly have trotted a mile the next year in two minutes, as there really seemed to be no limit to his wonderful speed. The whole country was then anxious to learn his breeding, which was as follows: By Volunteer, he by old Old Hambletonian, dam by Stockbridge Chief, son of Old Black Hawk, being identically the same combination of blood lines heretofore alluded to. A mare called Molly, by Old Black Hawk, produced a brood mare named Sister, record 2:28 1/4, full sister, their sire, Admiral, being by Volunteer, he by Hambletonian, their dam being by McCracken's Black Hawk, a son of the old original Black Hawk. These mares have a full sister (younger) called Nona S., that is said to be faster than either of them, and will no doubt be driven to a fast record soon. Their sire, Admiral, although bred to a great many fine mares of other blood, has never produced any other trotters with records. Other instances could be cited, but these are sufficient to establish the fact that horses possessing the blood lines of Speculation, Jr., stand at the head of the list as producers of extreme speed. 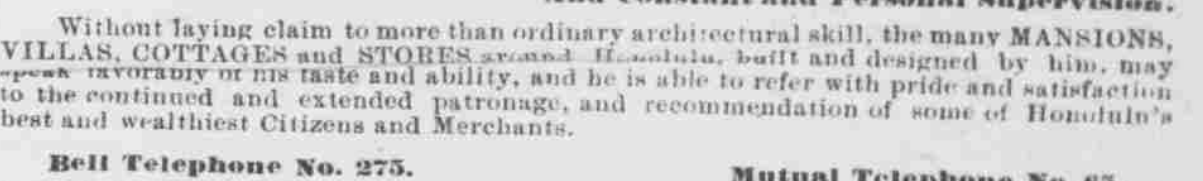
