GENERAL MERRITT'S ARMY
SAYS IT WILL BE A FIT FIGHTING FORCE.

He has Bent Every Energy to Make It the Best Army Ever Sent Out of the Country.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 20.—The City of Peking and the City of Sydney were ordered by the Navy Department today to crowd on all steam and make the best possible time in reaching their destination.

The United States has the advantage, as the transports taking troops to Dewey will maintain a greater rate of speed than the war vessels Spain is sending from Barcelona.

Should fortune favor the United States and the transports reach the harbor of Manila at the earliest possible moment, there will be but little time in which to prepare for the Spanish fleet. Dewey asked for men, siege guns and ammunition, so that he might take the city, so that Cavite arsenal and other fortifications commanding the entrance to the bay might be fortified and effectually manned to prevent Spanish reinforcements from entering the harbor.

General Merritt believes he is going to have the fittest fighting force ever sent out of the country, and he is accordingly happy. It has been decided to give the greater portion of the Fourteenth infantry now on the Pacific coast, the entire Eighteenth and Twenty-third regiments of infantry, two batteries from the Third artillery and four troops of cavalry. The remainder of the expedition will be made up of volunteers. The department today also gave orders sending the battalion of infantry from North Dakota to San Francisco to join the expedition.

The department is pushing with all speed for additional transports, and has already chartered the Zealandia, a sister ship to the Australia. Six months supplies go out with the first expedition and three months supplies with the second.

WASHINGTON, May 21.—Major General Wesley Merritt concluded his business at the State Department this afternoon and at 2 o'clock began his journey to San Francisco, whence he will take charge of the expedition to the Philippines.

The following named officers of the medical department have been ordered to San Francisco and will report to General Merritt for duty with the expedition: Lieutenant General Lippincott, deputy surgeon general; Captain William O. Owen, assistant surgeon, and First Lieutenant Henry Page, assistant surgeon.

THE GREAT RACE.

The question of a race for the Manila fleet by the United States and Spain is one of the most interesting phases of modern history, or in fact of the world's history. The point to commence with, is whether there can be such a chance. The difference in miles between going to Manila from Spain, and going to Manila from San Francisco is some 1,300 miles or more. This really means a difference of six days steaming at the rate of 250 miles a day. The question is who started first, how much time has been already expended and you have the problem in a nutshell. This would be clear, but as in all problems, there are many side issues to be considered, which modify the main proposition. The present one offers no difference to any others which have from time to time been presented in history.

The United States for years has maintained relations with the dominating Islands of the Pacific. Her influence has brought to these shores men whose bent of mind is entirely in her interest. In good repute, in bad repute, the men who believed in the United States have fostered the institutions and ideas which belong to the Great Republic, till they had to be heard. Then the Little Republic, own child of the Washingtonian idea, was born and has grown to vigor, but wants to be owned by its parent and not left as the off spring of a light of love to disgrace the source from which it sprung. No one in the broad United States can say that the men with the American idea here have ever disgraced their parent.

Holding, as the United States does, the influence in Hawaii, and finding in the mid-Pacific a community which was not only in sympathy, but which was ready and willing to throw its fortunes into the chances of the Great Republic, ready to stand or fall by them—she has a commanding position in the race for Manila which many do not realize.

What has Spain? She can send her ships through the Suez Canal, because that marine thoroughfare was made neutral by joint convention between Great Britain and France in 1857, and the adherence of the powers, even to the Sultan, was brought in by December, 1858. But that is all. Spain has the advantage of making a short cut. Where will her ships get their coal. At Suez? The expedition is a belligerent one. No coal. At Aden. The same answer. At Madagascar, but France has declared neutrality. Ceylon will not be able or willing to help, and thence toward the Malay peninsula, through the straits and into the China seas there is no help. A Spanish fleet starting on such an expedition will be utterly helpless long before it gets to Manila.

With the United States it is different. The troops of the Stars and Stripes, by means of the work done in the past and come to fruition in the present, have a "pied a terre," a foothold in the Pacific. The boys can and will refresh themselves, and the men-of-war and transports can take in coal as long as there is a pound of coal left on these shores.

Practically, Hawaii is the keystone of the arch between the Golden Gate and Manila, the pivot upon which the mightiest of events may turn. Surely by her conduct Hawaii has earned what she has for ears so earnestly desired—Annexation to the United States.

Another of those fanatical outbursts has occurred in China, this time directed against the Japanese Consulate at Shashi, a place near Hankow. The consulate was burned and so were many mercantile buildings belonging to European firms. The Chinese rough hates the "foreign devil" and goes on believing that he, the said rough, is the superior of the world. His ideas in this direction are fostered by the large literary class, whose writings are full of bitterness against foreigners. The Chinese government fosters the same idea. Whenever the Chinese government is obliged to pay for an outrage, it is represented to the common people as an act of clemency upon the part of the Emperor, towards the "miserable barbarians from inhospitable shores," which is the way Americans and Europeans are described, or "towards the dwarfs," as the Japanese are called. To combat

the dense ignorance of China and open her eyes will require a catalysm which will shake the rotten empire to pieces.

THE CABLE.

It is to be hoped that the telegraph bill will pass the House of Representatives, as it has passed the Senate. The bill as it originally came before the Senate asked for an exclusive franchise between the Coast and these Islands. A dozen cable lines, should they pay, might be laid from the continent and find a landing on these shores, without interference from the company in question. To this there can be no valid objection.

The second part of section one asked for an exclusive franchise for twenty years "from and beyond the Hawaiian Islands to any other Islands in the Pacific Ocean and to Japan." This the Senate considered too extensive and struck out the words "to any other Islands in the Pacific Ocean," so that the sentence reads "from and beyond the Hawaiian Islands to Japan," and added "and any Islands or places necessary for such cables between the Hawaiian Islands and Japan that lie north of the tenth degree or parallel or north latitude in the North Pacific Ocean." This pins the exclusive privilege down purely to Japan, and has nothing to do with any other part of the world. Cables can be run to the southward as much as we please, and will have no effect upon the exclusive franchise.

Again the company must have its share done in the United States Congress within eighteen months after the date of this act or their contract becomes null and void. The company has to deposit twenty-five thousand dollars in Hawaiian Government or United States Government bonds as a guarantee of good faith, and the bonds can be forfeited if the work is not completed in time.

The rates are provided for, being not more than 35 cents per word for ordinary messages and one-fourth the rate for press messages.

The objections to the passage of this bill are by no means clear. As far as the Islands are concerned, the one thing which is desired is telegraphic communication with the Coast, that at once brings us into touch with the outer world. Whether we have direct cable communication with Japan now or twenty years hence really does not matter, and yet that is the sole reason to base objections upon. It looks a straightforward bill enough, and it looks as if the Pacific Cable Company meant business.

WHY THERE SEEMS DELAY

IT IS A BIG TASK TO CREATE AN ARMY.

Clothing, Arms, Accoutrements, Camp Commissary and Hospital Supplies. All Have to be Carefully Provided.

WASHINGTON, May 21.—The complaints of delay in pressing forward operations, which are being heard in some quarters arise from ignorance of the preparations that are necessary. Within a month 135,000 men have enlisted in the army of the United States. For these clothing, arms, accoutrements, tents, blankets, commissary provisions and stores, hospital appliances and supplies, have to be provided and sent to places where they are needed. All this takes time. The item of uniforms alone is a big thing. The clothes have to be made. To get them is more of a task than merely going to a store and buying a spool of thread.

When war was first declared the invasion of Cuba was one of the first movements decided on. The mobilization of troops and preparing their supplies was one of the first things begun. The efforts of the war department were directed to this end. With Dewey's victory came a call for another expedition and troops were to be sent there with all haste. General Miles, in charge of the Cuban expedition, naturally wanted a body of troops well provided in every way, and was leaving nothing undone to that end. General Merritt, when put in charge of the Philippine expedition naturally wanted the best troops and the best provided army he could get, and bent his every effort to that end.

The result of this has been some friction between the two commanders. Each wanted the whole effort of the department directed to fitting out his expedition. The Secretary of War is doing the best he can, all say, and he is on the best of terms with General Merritt and his plans. But General Miles is doing the best he can for Cuba, and undoubtedly, according to authentic information, grudges everything taken from the "regulars" and allowed to General Merritt.

Thus, while General Merritt, it was thought, would start to the Philippines with 6,000 regulars, it is now believed he will not be able to get more than 4,000 regulars. General Miles stands constantly in the way, I am told.
From a Spanish source telegrams were received today that the public and technical opinion in Spain is unanimous in advising the government to send the reserve squadrons with a strong contingent of reserves and artillery to Manila at once.

A DENIAL.
LONDON, May 21.—The Paris correspondent of the Sunday Special reports an interview with Secretary Sato of the Japanese Legation, in which Secretary Sato declared that there was absolutely no foundation for the statement that Japan has protested against American occupation of the Philippines. The Japanese government, he said, after the Chinese war, signed a convention with Spain renouncing forever all territorial rights south of Formosa.

THE PRIORY CONCERT.
Large Gathering of Town Folk to Hear the School Girls Sing.

The Sunday school room of St. Andrew's cathedral was crowded with people last night for the Priory concert. Excellent taste was displayed in the decorations, which consisted chiefly of flags, maile and bright lanterns. The program began promptly at 8 o'clock and was over shortly after 9:30.

The principal part of the program was a cantata enacted by seven young ladies. It was a pretty and striking affair, and was most excellently put on. This feature was preceded by two song selections and closed with nursery rhymes.
