RUNS THE GAUNTLET IN THE HOUSE.

Has Now Passed Second Reading and Third Reading is Set for Thursday

Something of Interest

To the Ladies

The cable bill has made its fight in the House and has won. It passed second reading this morning after a debate and through proposed amendments which practically decide its fate as a winning measure.

Representative Atkinson for the Committee on Foreign Affairs reported favorably on it, as well as on Senate Bill No. 25, which simply harmonizes the present law with the cable

nizes the present law with the cable bill.

The committee in its report says: "These Islands need a cable; it is the most necessary institution outside of a sturdy population and an exuberent soil that we can have for the general welfare. Your committee has considered the possible misuse of a franchise which might result from hasty legislation upon so important a matter. The Legislature has not been been a very committee field. hasty. Your committee finds that previous efforts have been made in this line, but that they have proved abortive. It feels that every effort should be made to obtain a cable, at the same time it feels that no one for the sake of present advantages. for the sake of present advantages should wreck future prospects. But your committee, upon the most careful and thorough investigation, cannot see where present advantages can possibly wreck future prospects. The bill under consideration does not give an exclusive franchise between these Islands and the United States. The exclusive franchise is only asked for between these Islands and Japan, and the stations between these Islands and Japan are confined above the tenth north parallel of latitude, and the length of time is but twenty years. The penalties for commencing the line and forfeiture of privilege are ample."

Representative Achi offered an amendment striking out the words Pacific Cable Company and giving the franchise to the first company securing a franchise from the United States. Minister Cooper offered an amendment of similar import. This was opposed by Representative Robertson. Other members stoke strong. ertson. Other members spoke strong-ly in favor of the bill as it stood. The amendments were voted down and the bill passed. The third reading was set for Thursday.

EARLY CLOSING.

On Tuesday a British force to occupy the place will land from three warships which are now in the harbor. The British and Chinese flags will then be hoisted side by side. So soon as the buildings, arsenals and forts are taken over the Chinese flag will be lowered.

THE CABLE BILL IS SAFE MEN WHO FOUGHT TELL OF VICTORY

OFFICERS FROM MANILA ARRIVE ON THE BELGIC.

They Were in the Fight From Begining to End and Graphically Describe the Battle Scene.

There is an interesting party of travalers on the Belgig. It is made up of not less than four of Uncle Sam's officers who took part in the great fight in Manila bay on the morning of May 1st. They are

Colonel G. A. Loud, paymaster of the dispatch boat McCulloch;

Messrs. Loud, Kindleberger and Evans came direct from Manila, They left the scene of battle on the McCulloch on the morning of May 5th and loch on the morning of May 5th and it was that trip of the little steamer that brought the first American reports of the fight. Mr. Phelps was in Hongkong. He remained over there in charge of important business matters of the captain's.

Dr. Kindleberger and Gunner Evans are going home on account of the expiration of their sea time. They are now, under the rules, expected to perform shore duty for three years, but both will endeavor to go back to the sea again at once. Colonel Loud and Mr. Phelps are merely going on business and will return to the Mc-

These men, as may be expected from the important parts they took in the Manila fight, have each very interesting stories to tell. They speak first of all, however, of the valor and determination of their appo-

The roar was something ter-A terrific fire was kept up from the forts and the Spanish ships upon our fleet. It looked to us from the McCulloch that our vessels could not possibly survive the awful fusi-lade. Heavy shells and solid shot fell around them like hall from the clouds and many exploded immediately over

the ships.
"At one time I really thought we would be beaten. This was after the fire had been kept up for an hour. It looked like every gun on the Spanish ships had turned loose on us all together, and the shore line was a veritable blaze of fire from the batteries The din was simply indescribable. Tons upon tons of shot fell over our ships. Yes, there was steel enough to have sunk our entire fleet.

"Our salvation was in the bad marksmanship of the Spaniards. They handled their pieces like boys. Near-ly all of their shot went wide of the mark. Most were high, flying over the fleet and falling into the bay beyond. Some of the batteries, howeverer, were better trained. Several guns maintained a raking fire on the fleet, Nearly all of our ships were struck by both large and small shot, but no

"There will be no difficulty in hold-ing Manila and the Philippines. Complete subjugation of the Spanish for-ces in the group will be accomplished without trouble and with very little danger to American life. The insur-gents are very friendly and at the time we left were beseiging the town in large force. They are acting un-der orders of Commodore Dewey.

"We are glad to get out where we can here something of the battle of Manila," pleasantly jested the colonel. "For over two months we were shut up from the world, you might say, and knew nothing of what was say, and knew nothing of what was going on or what was being said on the outside. We learned at Honolulu this morning for the first time the result of the findings of the court of inquiry on the Maine disaster, and are now picking up the threads of happenings on the Atlantic since then."

Or. Kindleberger gives a graphic account of the terrific fight. He was on the Olympia through it all. In the first assault the flagship took the lead, the other vessels following in her wake at four ship's length. The Spanish fleet was approached by laps, each turn bringing the contestants nearer together. By this plan the American vessels frequently poured broadsides into the enemy, but were themselves more exposed to the fire.

At one time the smoke became so

At one time the smoke became so dense that it was necessary to draw aside, allowing the cloud to lift. The vessels were examined and it was discovered that they had sustained no damage. Breakfast was served to the men and in a few minutes they reentered the fight with the greatest enthusiasm. The second fight was even more flerce than the first. It

was in that the Baltimore was struck.

During the first fight the Spanish admiral's ship steamed bravely out to the line to meet the Olympia. The entire American fleet concentrated fire on her and she was so badly injured that she turned around to put back. At this juncture the Olympia let fly an S inch shell which struck her stern and placed the struck her stern and pierced through almost her en-tire length, exploding finally in the engine room, wrecking her machinery. This shell killed the captain and six-ty men and set the vessel on fire.

The Spanish admiral immediately transferred his flag to the cruiser Isla de Cuba. Several smaller vessels of the American fleet, led by the Boston, centered the fire on this ship and lit-erally tore her to pieces. The admiral was slightly wounded and escaped in a small boat into Bakor bay and dangly to Manila.



ed forty-eight hours. The American schooner Jessie Mi-nor, William Whitney master, brought 270,000 feet of lumber for Allen &

Robinson, and 88 hogs, The Claudine brought 4,257 bags of sugar, 127 bags of corn, 263 bags of

potatoes, 72 hogs, 32 hides, 2 horses and 129 packages of sundries, The Marie Hackfeld, which arrived vesterday, left Bremen December 30, 1897. She brings 2,700 tons of general merchandise. As a part of this cargo there are 6,000 barrels of cement which reaches here at a time when there is scarcely a barrel of cement in own and extensive building opera tions are in progress. It accordingly ought to strike a good market.

The Belgic brought 131 Chinese, 13 Japanese and 5 cabin passengers for Honoluly, She left Yokohama May 21st. There was one suspicious case found by the health officer and was taken over to the quarantine station. SAYS IT WILL BE A FIT FIGHTING

He has Bent Every Energy to Make It the Best Army Ever Sent Out of the

SAN FRANCISCO, May 20.-The City of Peking and the City of Sydney were ordered by the Navy Department today to crowd on all steam and make the best possible time in reaching their destination.

The United States has the advant-

age, as the transports taking troops to Dewey will maintain a greater rate of speed than the war vessels Spain is sending from Barcelona. Should fortune favor the United

States and the transports reach the harbor of Manila at the earliest possible moment, there will be but little time in which to prepare for the Spanish fleet. Dewey asked for men, siege guns and ammunition, so that he might be master of Manila harbor, so that he might take the city, so that Cavite arsenal and other fortifi-cations commanding the entrance to the bay might be fortified and effectually manned to prevent Spanish reinforcements from entering the har-

General Merritt believes he is going to have the fittest fighting force ever sent out of the country, and he is ac cordingly happy. It has been decided to give the greater portion of the Fourteenth infantry now on the Pa-cific coast, the entire Eighteenth and Twenty-third regiments of infantry. two batteries from the Third artillery and four troops of cavalry. The re-mainder of the expedition will be made up of volunteers. The depart-ment today also gave orders sending the battalion of infantry from North Dakota to San Francisco to join the expedition.

The department is pushing with all speed for additional transports, and has already chartered the Zealandia, a sister ship to the Australia. Six months supplies go out with the first expedition and three months supplies with the second.

May 21,-Major WASHINGTON. General Wesley Merritt concluded his business at the State Department this afternoon and at 2 o'clock began his journey to San Francisco, whence he will take charge of the expedition to the Philippines.

WHAT SAMPSON CAN DO WITH THE SPANISH ADMIRAL.

Supplies and Ammunition Brought for Blanco Have Not Reached Him Yet and May Never Arrive.

WASHINGTON, May 21.-The Spaniards will not think of returning to Spain without meeting our vessels and hence if they do not remain in Santiago harbor they will make for Cienfue-gos with all speed. It is true that Santiago harbor is naturally the best fitted for defensive purposes, but as no railroads reach there any sup-plies landed for Blanco would be plies landed for Blanco would seized by Garcia's insurgents which now infest southeast Cuba. Even if the expedition succeeded in eluding the rebels these supplies would have to be hauled three hundred miles over-

Although Admiral Cervera has been congratulated upon eluding our vessels and entering Santiago harbor, his mission has not yet been successful, for he crossed the Atlantic to bring supplies and ammunition to General Blanco. For him to now return to Spain without having either delivered his goods or engaged our fleets would be most humiliating to Spain as well as dangerous to the welfare of the

BIG TASK TO CREATE AN ARMY.

Clothing, Arms, Accourrements, Camp Commissary and Hospital Supplies, All Have to be Carefully Provided,

WASHINGTON, May 21 .- The complaints of delay in pressing forward operations, which are being heard in some quarters arise from ignorance of the preparations that are necessary. Within a month 135,000 men have enlisted in the army of the United States. For these clothing, arms, accourtements, tents, blankets, arms, accourtements, tents, blankets, commissary provisions and stores, hospital appliances and supplies, have to be provided and sent to places where they are needed. All this takes time. The item of uniforms along is a big thing. The clothes have to be made. To get them is more of a task than merely going to a store and buythan merely going to a store and buy-ing a spool of thread. When war was first declared the in-

vasion of Cuba was one of the first movements decided on. The mobilization of troops and preparing their supplies was one of the first things begun. The efforts of the war department were directed to this end. With Dewey's victory came a call for an-other expedition and troops were to be sent there with all haste. General Miles, in charge of the Cuban expedition, naturally wanted a body of troops well provided in every way and was leaving nothing undone to that end. General Merritt, when put in charge of the Philippine expedition naturally wanted the best troops and the best provided army he could get. and bent his every effort to that end. The result of this has been some friction between the two comminders. Each wanted the whole effort of the department directed to fitting out his expedition.

The Secretary of War is doing the best he can, all say, and he is on the best of terms with General Marrit and his plans. But General Miles doing the best he can for Cuba, and undoubtedly, according to authentic information, grudges everything tasen from the "regulars" and allowed to General Merritt.

Thus, while General Merritt, it was thought, would start to the 1'h'tip-pines with 6,000 regulars, it is now believed he will not be able to get to re than 4,000 regulars. General Mides stands constantly in the way, I am



OLD CITIZEN'S PROTEST UPON THE OPIUM BILL.

A Ringing Appeal Against Passing the Act to Increase the Use of the Juice of the Poppy.

Colonel Allen makes the following appeal to the Legislators:

You are about to vote for or against the bill to license the sale of opium. Be sure you give this bill the careful thought it is worthy of, for, as you decide, it will be a power for good or evil in these Islands.

That the advocates of the license

are good, conscientions men must be

are good, conscientions men must be admitted, and they no doubt think licensing the drug the best way to control its use. Others only look at the financial gain to the treasury, and others hope it may be a means of checking the smuggling now going on. All these arguments have more or less weight with some who use and those who hear them. The same arguments were used when the previous opium license was passed, but the facts did not bear out the arguments. It did not control the use of opium; on the contrary, more opium was used and especially by the Hawaiians. It was the evidence of all the mana-gers of plantations that when the drug was licensed the users of it were more and more unfitted for work on Mondays and Tuesdays from its effects, and on those days most of the

trouble with men occurred.

When not licensed the men get it but they use it in a very guarded manner and are careful that it does not incapacitate them for work.

The argument that the treasury will be benefitted has two sides. It was proven that when the license was running the cost of court trials, police expenses, the insane asylum and hospital expenses were largely increased, so that the amount received for the license, although a large sum, was by no means all on the credit side.

There are two sides to the argument that with a license smuggling is checked to some extent. It was not so proven before. If the demand in-creases with a license, then smug-gling will increase also. The holders of a license will be very apt to buy where they can get the best rates and not question how or where it was obtained. Another argument against it. proven when the license was in force, is the fact that the native Hawaiians in much larger numbers used it than they ever did before, or have since the license was abolished. Should not Hosiery, Men's Clothing
Hats, Shoes, Underwear,
Ouilts, Shawls, enforced well enough to protect the licensees any more than the laws against smuggling can prevent it. Do you law makers realize how the passage of such a license will be construed in the United States, what

an argument it will be against annex-ation for which you are all pledged? This 30th day of May marks the forty-eighth anniversary of my arrival at Honolulu and in all these years the good men and women of all nationalities have done what they could to aid the Hawaiians to rise above their surroundings. Let me express the hope that our present law makers will do nothing adverse to the good that has already been done.

> BISHOP HARTZELL'S MISSION. Bishop Hartzell, the Methodist Episcopal bishop of Africa, has just been to England on a mission from the President of Liberia to Great Britain and the United States. His mission is to obtain a treaty with those countries and with Liberia, guaranteeing the integrity of the little republic as against Franco-German encroach-ments. He was well received at the British foreign office, where every sympathy was shown toward his plan but it was suggested that it would be better, considering the interests of the United States in Liberia, if the suggestion of a treaty came from the suggestion of the s sail for New York on March 17th.

CEREBRAL NERVOUS IMPRESSION. The researches and experiments of Broca and Richet, specialists in this line, says the New York Tri-bune, have led them to the interestng conclusion that the cerebral nerv ous system is really incapable of per-ceiving more than the average of ten separate impression per second. The mental phenomena in this case shows that after each excitation of nerves a period of inertia follows, lasting about one-tenth of a second, and dur-ing this brief period no new or ap-preciable impression, they declare can possibly be made. Further, acnent authorities, an individual cannot make more than ten, or, at most a dozen, separate voluntary movements of any kind or nature in a second, although the muscles, independently of the will, are capable of making as many as thirty or forty.

THE SOLDIER BOYS.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 21.—There are now in camp in this city about 10,000 troops and others are on their way. Part of the troops are at the Presidio. The remainder are camped on the site of the old Bay District track, Those at the latter place are the First Nebraska, the First Kansas, Third Minnesota, First Colorado and battalion of four companies from Wyoming.

At the Presidio are the Fourteenth Infantry, Regulars, the First and Seventh California Volunteers, besides two battalions of another regiment, nine battalions of United States artillery, four troops of United States cavalry, Second Oregon Volunteers and Second Washington Volunteers.

Among the troops on their way to San Francisco are the Tenth, Fifteenth and Twenty-third regiments of regu-lars, the Second, Third and Fourth Colorado, the Second, Third and the Fourth Minnesota, the Third Kansas, the Tenth Pennsylvania and battalions of infantry and batteries of artillery from Idaho, Montana, Wyoming. 
