Texas amended its license law by inserting a provision to fix the fee for a fight between man and man, or beast and beast, at \$500. This was openly acknowledged in the Legislature as intended to secure the attraction of the Sullivan-Kilrain battle for Texas soil.

A strange story is related of a view of the city of Montreal being reflected or refracted on an Arctic glacier nearly four thousand miles from the object, so distinctly as to make the picture reappear upon an amateur photographer's plate.

The Italians in New York are retorting in vigorous style against the Irish for a movement of the latter to suppress certain Italian small industries. The former are holding mass meetings at which tremendous speechifying is made against the alleged attempt at boycotting.

There is no reason why the agitators for relief against Chinese ascendancy should carry more weight than their actual policy involves. They are, however, being handicapped with the influence of false representations of their position.

It has often been urged that, before admitting fresh batches of coolies from China, the hundreds of idle Chinese in the towns should be compelled to dig for a living. An intelligent Chinaman has complained to the writer of this paragraph that the police authorities failed to respond effectually when Chinese merchants organized a movement to prosecute vagrants of their nationality.

There are breakers ahead for the Monroe doctrine in Mexico, that is if commercial interests develop political complications. The French have got a death grip on the Mexican dry goods trade. The Germans, to checkmate French influence, are reported to project a bank with ten million dollars' capital in the City of Mexico.

"DEPARTURE FROM PRINCIPLE." In connection with the proposed Anti-Chinese amendment and the complaint that it is a departure from what has always been considered a fundamental principle of the white race, it is interesting to note the steps that England has of late years after mature judgment seen fit to take in derogation of a principle considered almost as primal and fundamental as religion itself, i. e., the right of private ownership in property.

WASTED PATRIMONY. At considerable trouble and expense we have obtained from the Registry Office a complete list of sales of land by natives since January, 1876, together with a list of unsatisfied mortgages by them since 1880, which make the following startling exhibit:

Money received by natives from sales of their lands since 1876.....\$3,482,367 30 Money received by natives since 1880 from mortgaging their lands, said mortgages remaining unsatisfied to date.....\$2,159,397 44

A SUGGESTION. EDITOR BULLETIN:—A way of putting an end to two great evils at the same time. If a clause were introduced into the proposed Chinese restriction act to the effect that, any Chinaman convicted of opium smuggling, or of the use of opium in any way, or of breaking any of the laws either of the revenue or otherwise (any act against the criminal code) should be obliged to leave the kingdom; by this means a large class of very objectionable citizens would be deported hence to the benefit of mechanics and the community at large.

Gossip reminds us of a high building. Only one story out of a dozen rests on a foundation. When a public man has lost his grip, he will not do much handshaking with constituents.

FROM M. THOMPSON'S DIGEST OF HAWAIIAN SUPREME COURT DECISIONS.

In Preparation.

AGREEMENT.

An agreement by defendant to indorse bills drawn by His Majesty in favor of plaintiff when presented by B., in consideration of a commission for guaranteeing the amount, with further agreement that his Majesty will take all goods sent by plaintiff, where from the facts it appears that goods of said plaintiff were offered to his Majesty, and were by him refused, renders defendant liable to pay for the goods so offered, and entitles him to the commission stipulated to be paid, although no bill of his Majesty was presented for defendant's endorsement; and whether said goods were taken or refused or paid for or not paid for by his Majesty, Hoffnung & Co. v. Chung Faa, 4 Haw. 285.

An agreement to discharge the defendant's indebtedness in consideration of the surrender by defendant, of all his property to plaintiffs is an accord, and if executed by delivery of the property, there is a satisfaction which is a complete defence to an action to recover the indebtedness. Hackfeld v. Bal, 4 Haw. 478.

Written agreement by parties owing land in common, in regard to the management of their property, should be enforced by the courts as far as possible. Mahoe v. Puku, 4 Haw. 485.

ALIENS AND DENIZENS.

An alien cannot hold an office of profit and emolument under the Government without taking the oath of allegiance. 5 Haw. 167.

An alien, to whom letters patent of denization have been granted, has the status of a subject, and he need not take the oath of allegiance as a requisite to holding a Government office. Id.

ALIMONY.

ANIMALS, WILD.

Turkeys running wild on land, not being in the custody, control or possession, of the owner of the land, are not the subjects of larceny. The King v. Manu, 4 Haw. 409.

APPEAL.

See Error.—Petition for Review. The procuring of an order to the Marshal to dispose of the libelled property in the manner decreed by the court below, is not such an act as bars the libellant's right of appeal.

An appeal in admiralty may be taken at any time within six months after decree, unless said decree is fully executed.

An appeal operates as a stay of execution, subject to the necessary order for the safe custody, delivery or security, or sale of the property proceeded against. R. Coody v. 1,200 pounds oil, etc., 2 Haw. 55.

Allegations as to time and place of commission of an offence should be made with greater certainty before the appellate tribunal (the circuit court) than may be required to be shown upon the record of the district magistrate.

The court regard the proceedings of an appeal from a district justice with less technical precision than on an indictment. Rex v. Gillingham 2 Haw. 750.

A nolle prosequi of an appeal is no bar to a subsequent trial. The King v. Manner, 3 Haw. 339.

A writ of mandamus will not issue to compel a magistrate to grant an appeal, unless bond for costs be filed within one day, under the landlord and tenant act. Petition for mandamus, 3 Haw. 407.

In probate a new party can be admitted at hearing on appeal, but in such case the matter must be remanded to the Probate Court for rehearing. In re Estate of Puholo-wai, 3 Haw. 419.

Ah Lin was charged with the unlawful possession of opium. He pleaded guilty and was fined \$50 and sentenced to one hour's imprisonment. Costs \$1.

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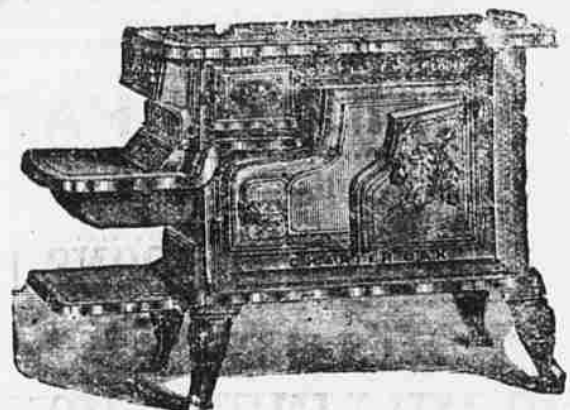

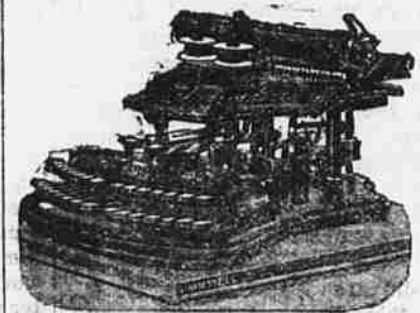
