THE ACTIVITY OF THE VOLCANO.

Views of Rev. E. P. Baker.

Mr. Editor: The most special feature in the condition of the Volcano (Nov. 5th and 6th when I visited it) was the hotness of the molten lava in the lake, which was so hot as not to crust over it, but was in a condition of continuous ebullition.

Very hot lava is lava which has freshly come up from below, and so has not had time or opportunity to lose its heat.

Two large lakes there were in Kilauea five, eight and ten years ago, and these large reservoirs, exposing an extended surface to the cooling effect of the atmosphere, the molten lava contained in them was kept at a sufficiently reduced temperature to enable the lake surface to become a solid crust of considerable thickness; an amount of liquid material coming up all the while from below, enough to keep the liquid of the reservoirs hot, but not enough to keep it boiling hot.

Now, however, the present lake being small, the cool of the atmosphere has a small area to act on, and the molten lava in the lake has but little of its heat abstracted by the outside air. My surmise is (which is to be taken for what it is of worth) that the molten lava of Kilauea has been engaged for a year or two past in pressing up under the solid lava just above, and filling up the various interior interstices and caverns with which the solidified lava of Kilauea abounds, and that now, these subterranean openings being all filled up, the liquid material is being pressed still higher up, and comes to view from its hidden recesses, charged with a high degree of heat.

The lake furiously boiling all the time is an impressive sight. There are likely to be a good many surface flows in time to come (there was one Nov. 9); and the hope is that the lake will keep on boiling very hard; that the flows and sulphur fumes will not shut off approach to it by those who come to visit it.

THE KING'S BIRTHDAY.

How the Event was Observed in Honolulu.

A LARGELY ATTENDED RECEPTION AT THE PALACE.

Yacht and Rowing Races in the Harbor—Baseball and Torchlight Procession, Etc.

His Majesty King Kalakaua's birthday falling on Sunday the event was celebrated throughout the Kingdom on Saturday the 15th. All Government offices were closed, the Government diplomatic and consular flags were flying, also the flags on the engine houses, and the vessels in port were decorated with bunting.

Between the hours of 6 and 8 A. M. His Majesty received the hookups of his people at the palace. Several riding parties, the ladies wearing pa-us, passed through the grounds to pay their respects, and presented a very gay sight.

At 10 o'clock different Hawaiian societies dressed in their regalia were received by the King, being presented by Mr. Jas. W. Robertson, H. M.'s Vice Chamberlain. Half an hour later the Hawaiian public was received.

Between 11 and 12 o'clock the Court, Cabinet, Privy Councillors, Nobles and Representatives, diplomatic and consular representatives, Government officials and the general public were presented by Col. the Hon. G. W. Macfarlane, H. M.'s Chamberlain, and at noon Admiral Brown, his staff, and the captains and officers of the war vessels. Their Majesties the King and Queen stood in front of the dais in the throne room, and there also present H. R. H. Princess Kaiulani, H. R. H. Princess Poomalanihewa, Hons. J. O. Dominis and A. S. Cleghorn. Mrs. J. W. Robertson was lady-in-waiting upon the Queen.

At 9:30 o'clock a baseball match took place on the Makiki grounds between employees of the Honolulu and Union Iron Works. There was a big crowd present and the score by innings was as follows: Union.....3 3 1 0 3 2 0 0—12 Honolulu.....0 0 1 0 1 0 0 2—4

At noon royal salutes were fired from the shore battery at Kakaaua, the U. S. Flagship Charleston, U. S. S. Mohican and H. M. S. S. Kaibaha.

During the day a large number of people availed themselves of the cheap rates to Pearl City, and went down on the cars of the Oahu Railway, and enjoyed themselves immensely.

The Regatta.

As usual, the chief event of the celebration of His Majesty's birthday was a regatta, and which included sailing and rowing events on the bay. The official programme indicated thirteen events, three of the items being connected with sailing races, the other ten with rowing races.

The regatta committee, consisting of Mr. Chas. B. Wilson, Chairman, Messrs. C. P. Lanika, S. Mahelona, S. Nowlein, J. G. Spencer, A. Fernandez and J. U. Kawainui, with W. F. Love, Secretary, are to be highly congratulated on the great success attending the regatta.

Promptly at 9:30 o'clock the preparatory work for the first class yachts to get in readiness, was fired, and the white-winged cruisers were allowed a half an hour of preliminary tactics to try the strength of boom and sheet. The wind was light north east, but the cloud-capped summits of the mountain range at the back of the city seemed to indicate a more forcible visit before the day was over.

At 10 sharp the starting signal was fired, and the Helene being in close proximity to the line glided gracefully across, the first, followed by the Hawaii, Healani and Spray in the order named, and each a few minutes apart.

The race was well contested and fairly won by the Hawaii, who will take first prize; the Helene second, the Healani third, the Spray arriving a long way in the rear. It is but fair to say that the wind was too light to try the qualities of the yachts. Time: Hawaii, 3h. 59m. 15s.; Helene, 4h. 0m. 43s.; Healani, 4h. 10m. 45s.

The second-class yachts were started about half an hour after the first class yachts had got away and all of the eight entries were represented. The light wind gave them all opportunity to carry a protusion of canvas and to make the course a safe and not speedy manner.

The third event of the sailing races was the contest between boats of the men-of-war in port, there being five entries. The boats looked well on their entry and ran out the channel, the Emma and Lively both showing up immediately as the probable winners. The light wind gave them a somewhat lengthy voyage, the Emma arriving back first, however.

In the afternoon, Their Majesties were entertained at dinner by His Ex. J. A. Cummins, Minister of Foreign Affairs, at his residence. The Hawaiian band was in attendance.

A Strange Superstition.

The San Francisco Examiner has the following: Now, though all this may seem ordinary politics, it is in fact extraordinary. A Noble of the House, San Parker, as he is usually known, has met with some misfortune, and is unable to use his right arm. He has been very sick, but now attends meetings of the Legislature, carrying his right arm in a sling. Being a very rich man, he has had the best medical advice. He is, moreover, highly respected and well liked by everybody, and has been considered as the very best specimen of the native Hawaiian on the islands. The story goes that notwithstanding the advice of his physician, the kahunas or witches influenced Mr. Parker into getting up from a sick bed and walking a number of miles at midnight, at the imminent risk of his life, giving him a setback from which it will take him some time to recover. Moreover, it is said they have told him that he will never be a well man till he gets into the Cabinet, and unless he gets into the Cabinet soon he will die. It seems that he is able to command eighteen votes, and it is remarkable that such a noble specimen of manhood should be so superstitious.

Meeting of Hilo Teachers.

On Saturday, November 8th, a number of Hilo teachers met in the town of Hilo to form a Teachers' Association. This preliminary meeting was well attended. Mr. Lord was elected president, Mr. Matthews, secretary. It was decided to hold meetings once a month, and a committee was appointed to prepare topics for study and discussion, the members to be informed in good season of the subjects selected for each approaching meeting.

The star Likelike brought from Maui, Nov 15, 75 tons iron, 4 horses, 125 sacks potatoes and 120 packages sundries.

The star Claudine brought from Maui and Hawaii, Nov 15, 154 bags potatoes, 95 sheep, 100 hides, 37 pigs, 14 crates turkeys, 2 horses and 120 packages sundries.

The American bark Wakefield, Capt B C Howes, arrived Sunday morning, 151 days from New York, with a cargo of general merchandise, consigned to Castle & Cooke. Capt Howes reports heavy weather round the Horn, and a very tedious passage. No damage was done.

The brig W G Irwin, Capt McCulloch, arrived Saturday, 145 days from San Francisco, with four passengers and 330 bbls flour, 22,000 pounds sugar, 2,500 galls wine, 530 sbs bran, 255 pkgs machinery, 325 cks 60 lbs and 120 cs beer, 747 cts barley, 708 sbs fertilizer, 20 bbls 15 lb 40 and 50 cs salmon, etc, valued at \$33,563.

The British bark Girvan, Capt Angus, arrived Sunday morning, 134 days from Liverpool, with a cargo of general merchandise, consigned to Theo H Davies & Co. She reports fair weather. A sailor was washed off the boom while furling sail, she was immediately hoisted about, and every effort made to find the lost man, but of no avail.

R. M. S. Alameda.

The Royal Mail steamship Alameda, Capt. H. G. Morse, arrived Friday afternoon from the Colonies. She left Sydney October 29th at 6:30 p. m. and for the first thirty hours strong N. and N. E. winds were encountered, and thence S. E. breezes with moderate weather prevailed to Auckland which was reached on the evening of November 24. She took on board at Sydney 800 bales of wool the first shipment of the season for the States. After taking in a large quantity of coal, specie and some shipments of gum the Alameda left Auckland November 3d at 4:52 p. m. Stopped off Tutuila on the 7th at 10:40 a. m. for half an hour. Mr. Peres, a Portuguese minister from Jacksonville, Illinois, gave a Bible reading to his countrymen at Hali Church, on the 9th inst. in the afternoon, and preached at the foreign church in the evening. He is to address his countrymen at the school house, Waikona Plantation, on the 13th inst. He will remain only a short time, and is much pleased with his reception.

No work is being done on the Volcano road. We all want to see this road work pushed and completed as soon as possible. J. A. M. Nov. 13th.

FROM THE HILLO RECORD, NOV. 11TH.

We notice that the new Spreckels' building is almost completed.

On Thursday Hilo was visited with a most violent thunderstorm. The rain came down in torrents, and has done considerable damage to roads and young plant canes. It lasted about six hours.

The volcano maintains its great activity and well repays one a visit thereto.

The Circuit Court commenced its sittings on the 4th, Judge Dole presiding. The business before it has proceeded with dispatch.

At the directors meeting of the H. H. Telephone Co. a vote was taken to put a telephone in at the Hilo Boarding School, and it was unanimously carried.

A dividend will be paid to all telephone stockholders on the 15th of December.

As Mrs. E. G. Hitchcock was wending her way to church, her foot caught on a tree root, causing her to slip and break the small bone in her left leg. She is progressing as well as can be expected.

The Sheathing of Vessels.

Fleet Engineer Philip Inch of the Flagship Charleston, it is thought, says a San Francisco paper, has solved the question of sheathing the ships of the new navy. The untreated plate showed rust, barnacles and grass, while the other was as clean as when first placed in the water. It is said that a German syndicate is trying to get the process.

From there she will go to Coquimbó, and thence to Panama to await the arrival of a crew of supernumeraries from England. It has been stated that since her arrival on the Pacific station, 104 men have deserted, most of whom were marines, and it is for this purpose she goes to Panama, to await the arrival of another crew.

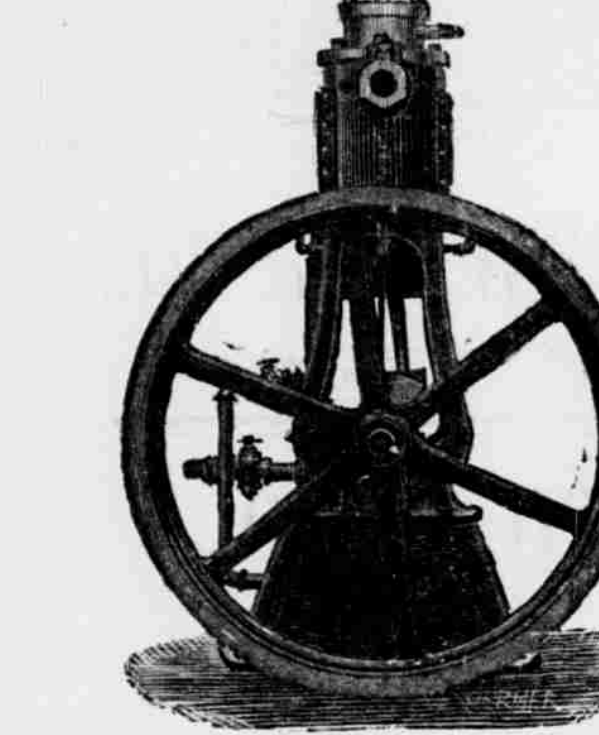
