WORLD'S COAL PRODUCTS

CHEAPEST COAL PRODUCED IN UNITED STATES.

Coal Export of Great Britain Exceeds Any Other Nation, as Also Does Per Capita Consumption.

In the five principal coal producing countries of the world the production in 1897, according to an English statistician was: United Kingdom, 292,129,000 tons; Germany, 91,055,000 metric tons; France, 30,337,000 metric tons; Belgium, 21,492,000 metric tons, and United States 178,769,000 tons. The average value at the pit's mouth was: United Kingdom, 5s. 1d.; Germany, 7s. 1½d.; France 8s. 8½d.; Belgium, 8s. 2¼d.; and United States, 4s. 7½d.

In the same year the production of Australasia was 5,862,000 tons, of which 4,284,000 tons were raised in New South Wales, while Canada produced 3,576,000 tons, Cape Colony 127,000 tons, and Natal 24,000 tons. The average value was: New South Wales, 7s. 7d.; Victoria, 9s. 2d.; South Australia, 9s.; Queensland, 7s. 10d.; Tasmania, 8s.; New Zealand, 10s.; Canada, 7s. 9d.; Cape Colony, 14s. 3d.; and Natal, 10s. The "excess" of coal exported was: United Kingdom, 4,121,000 tons; Germany, 6,318,000 tons; Belgium, 3,680,000 tons; United States, 2,418,000 tons; Japan, 2,034,000 tons; New South Wales, 2,965,000 tons, and Natal, 90,000 tons.

The countries which imported coal in excess of the amount they export were Russia, Sweden, France, Spain, Italy and Austria-Hungary, while the British colonies and possessions that do so are Canada, Victoria, South Australia, Queensland, Tasmania, New Zealand, Cape Colony and British India. The consumption of coal per head of the population in 1897 was: United Kingdom, 5.57 tons; Germany, 1.25 tons; Belgium, 2.70 tons; France, 0.98 tons; Austria-Hungary, 0.37 tons; Russia, 0.09 tons, and United States, 2.42 tons.

OLD MINIATURE.

Among the valuable objects which have been bequeathed to the British Museum by the late Baron Ferdinand de Rothschild is the famous mark of his Royal esteem given by James the first to Thomas Lyte, of Lyte's Cary, county Somerset (ancestor of the author of "Abide with Me, Past Falls the Eventide.") This historic souvenir is a Royal donor, surrounded by an open border of diamonds, protected by a grille of gold, which shows the monogram "J. R." in brilliant. The jewel passed from the Lyte family in 1847, and entered into the possession of the Duke of Hamilton. At the dispersal of the famous collection some years ago, the jewel was purchased by Baron Ferdinand de Rothschild for £2835.

NEW APPETIZER.

The story comes, says the Bulletin of Pharmacy, of a Russian physician who placed a dog in a room with the temperature lowered to 100 degrees Fahrenheit, below zero, by the use of liquid air. After ten hours the dog was taken out alive and with an enormous appetite. The physician tried the test himself. After ten hours' confinement in an atmosphere of still, dry cold, his system was intensely stimulated. So much combustion had been required to keep the body warm that an intense appetite was created. The process was continued on the man and the dog, and both grew speedily fat and vigorous. It was like a visit to a bracing northern climate.

GUARDIAN'S DUTY.

Question of Immediate Investment of
Funds Raised.

The question of a guardian's duty to
promptly invest the interest receipts of
his ward's estate was raised yesterday
in the report of Henry Smith, esq., as
master of the estate of Evelyn N.
Bidwell, a minor. The master says:
"No annual accounts having been
filed for the period from September 21,
1892, to June 30, 1899, the question arises,
is the guardian chargeable with interest
for credit balances from year to year?
A careful analysis of the account
shows that, in round numbers, the
guardian has had uninvested cash
balances in his hands of about \$100 for
three years, \$50 for four years, \$380 for
five years, \$550 for two years and \$500
for one year. At 6 per cent per annum,
interest would have been about \$189 on
all those balances, or 50 per cent more
if the rate was 9 per cent. The guardian
has charged only \$150 for commissions,
though he would have been entitled to
charge \$171.47 on income and \$116.40
on principal received. Possibly the
difference is now waived so as to
make it appear about 50 per cent more,
which, under the circumstances, would
appear to be as fair as could possibly
be, unless it is held that the guardian
should have lost no time in looking
around for safe securities in which to
make investments. In all probability,
too, the guardian may have entertained
an idea that he was not called upon to
invest his income receipts, his principal
receipts being only so recently received."

The Samoan claims will have to come out of the pockets of American and British taxpayers in all probability. This will not add to the popularity of the tripartite arrangement which holds good at present. Samoa, itself, is far too poor at present, to pay any such sums as are demanded, why it was hard to get even \$50 a month salary for the "king."

The ceasing of the lava flow will be a great disappointment to many of the sightseers. Fortunately there have been a considerable number of careful observations of it, and sets of photographs have been taken which are unique in the history of volcanic eruptions. Though it has not been a long flow, it has been well described, and the scientific world will have some excellent data to go upon in forming opposing theories.

There is considerable anxiety felt among the teachers as to the appointments which will shortly be decided upon by the Educational Commissioners. Many of the teachers who have worked in the country for years are desirous of having a chance to come in to town to places which have become vacant. Others who have been in out of the way places consider that they have earned a right of transfer to places where there are greater social advantages, than they at present have. Where teachers have had long service and have given satisfaction, they certainly have justice on their side if they look for promotion to some of the more desirable positions. Not all teachers in the country desire to change, many of them prefer to stay where they are, having formed ties of friendship with the people around them, and taking a deep interest in the progress and growth of the locality in which they are stationed. But for the younger teachers continued drudgery in one place becomes irksome, and they should have opportunity for advancement where it is practicable. The commissioners have a great responsibility, not only for the welfare of the children, but for the welfare of the teachers whom they may make or mar.

AN OBJECTIVE POINT.

The eight questions which the Call correspondent has forwarded to some three or four hundred responsible people on the Islands, will doubtless call forth a considerable variety of answers. Of course it is impossible without a list before one, to know in what manner the selection has been made, and so it is impossible to judge of the value of the result. But any one who knows Mr. Wright, the correspondent, knows that whatever his personal opinions may be, he is eminently a gentleman, and therefore eminently fair.

As a voting result the answers will be worth all, as an individual expression of opinion they may be worth a great deal. It is therefore quite worth while to answer the questions. If they are not answered by all it would give a majority to only one side. Every man has an opinion upon these matters and there is no reason why he should not express that opinion.

The ultimate influence of these answers is very questionable. However fair Mr. Wright may be, it is doubtful whether the Call itself will be, for it is a paper making a political fight inimical to the development of these Islands. The more answers setting forth views pointing to the Americanization of these Islands, and their progress as a self-governing territory of the United States the better.

If any set of people want anything they should put one main object before them and drive for that point, leaving aside all modifications. Modifications and reasoning may come after, but the main thing is to obtain the object aimed at. As things now stand there is one point which the inhabitants of these Islands may unite and will do well to unite for their mutual advantage. Whatever might have been individual opinions in the past, what has to be faced is the present. It is no use expressing views upon the might have it is upon the what is that we must talk. Now there is one certain thing that can be, and that is a territorial form of government. We want nothing less than that, we are very certain we shall get nothing more than that.

Territorial government, as it is understood in the United States, is clearly defined. Our friends in Congress are going to do their best to get us territorial government, and we should strengthen their hands as much as possible, by expressing our views that way. If we unite in asking for this we will probably get it. If, however, we have our request by asking for various kinds of modifications of territorial government, we are very liable to be put down as a very irreconcilable conglomeration of cranks who do not know what they want, and propound theories as varied and as useless as the learned

idiot of Laputa, whom Gulliver describes in his travels.
If we get territorial government as it is now carried out we are then in the direct line for statehood, which of course is our ultimate aim. If we were to get a modified species of territorial government, after all the cranks on the mainland and here had tinkered at it, we should be by no means be in the direct line for statehood. We should, in fact, be entirely off the track. The people of the United States know what is the political result and political teaching of the present system of territorial government, but they would be utterly at sea as to the results and teaching of some new departure, and it would be constantly held up as a bar to our further political progress. Territorial government as it now is, is what we want, and we had better drop hickering and unite on that issue. square.

ANTI-SEMITISM.

The United States is beginning to feel the wave of anti-semitism. Exactly how to account for it is difficult. The attack has not come from the Europeans settled in the republic, but has come from a fanatic son of the soil, one Wilson W. Dunlap of Philadelphia, who has started a mission to convert the Jews on the East Side of New York. If the attack had come from the French or German colony it would be understandable, but it comes from an excess of intemperate zeal on the part of a bigoted American. There can be no doubt that in the rioting which followed the efforts of Mr. Dunlap, a good deal of the feeling which springs up among the ignorant peasants of Russia, France and Germany was aroused and gave vent to itself.

It would be a national calamity if the anti-semitic spirit should take root even in a portion of the United States. It has been the curse of every nation that has indulged in it. The acrimony of the Dreyfus case has been due to it in a great measure. "Vive l'Armee," long live the army, and "a bas les Juifs" down with the Jews, have been the war cries of the contending parties. Hatred of Jews has been the mainspring of the hatred against Dreyfus. The feelings of the unthinking French mob could be easily aroused by such a catch-word. And the Dreyfus case has certainly brought France to the verge of revolution.

Spain in her fanaticism drove the Jews from out of the state and has remained impoverished ever since. It was, during the Middle Ages the proper thing to harass and ill use the Jews, every nation in Europe had a hand in it. There were massacres and spoliations of the Jews in Great Britain, in France, in Germany and at the present day in Russia. But the British grew tolerant, and during this century swept away all the disabilities of the Jews, and Great Britain has afforded a great field for their talents. The United States commenced by being tolerant and had no disabilities to sweep away. In consequence the Jews have thriven, and alongside of them others have thriven. Some of the wealthiest, most charitable, and most progressive people of the Great Republic are Jews.

It is then a noticeable thing that anti-Judism should have lifted up its head in New York. The good sense of the American people would not tolerate such narrow-minded fanaticism. It does not belong to this century, nor does it belong to the genius of the Republican West. But there are plenty of Europeans resident in the United States who have not risen from their medievalism, and who can be led away, as they were led away by their European prejudices. One could not picture such an outbreak of intolerance, but it has come. It is to be hoped that the poison may only have a local effect.

PRESERVE FOREST LANDS

UNIQUE MOTIVE OF A LEASE
MADE TODAY.

Lessee Wants to Increase Water Supply and the Government Wants to Preserve the Forests.

A lease of Government lands was sold today in which the motive of the Government in making the lease and of the lessee in getting it, is to make an attempt to preserve forests and increase the water supply.

The lands are mountain lands on Kauai, at Moloaa and Pappa, and embrace about 2000 acres. Cattle have been allowed to run through it for years, until it is in some extent deforested. The lease is on condition that the lessee fence it in and keep cattle off for the term of the lease. The Government reserves the right to enter upon any part of it at any time, during the term of the lease, and open any part of it up for settlement, that may be found suitable for cultivation, providing the lessee is not himself cultivating it or making other use of it, permitted by the lease at the time. This condition is put in simply to cover the possible contingency that there may be found some land in the tract suitable for home-steads and cultivation, without interfering with the general purposes of the lease and of the lessee.

The lease was sold at public auction at noon at the door of the Judiciary building by Agent for Public Lands J. F. Brown. The upset price was \$500 a year, at which price it was knocked down to J. F. Morgan for E. J. Morgan. The lessee is interested in some plans on the Island of Kauai, which makes an increase of the water supply desirable.

WAILUA SUITS TO BE HEARD.
Will Come Up Before Judge Perry on Monday.

The case of Col. Soper against B. F. Dillingham growing out of the Wailua plantation stock controversy is set for trial before Judge Perry for next Monday. This suit involves about \$1,000,000 of the stock of the plantation.

The petition for letters of administration on the estate of the late Queen Dowager Kapiolani will be heard next Friday.

Judge Perry will hear the registry cases of the ships Euterpe and Star of Russia next Tuesday.

Judge Stanley today approved the accounts of Godfrey Brown and others as executors of the will of James Woods, for the year ending April 12, 1899. The assessed value of the property is about \$75,000. The income for the year was \$11,892.66.

The bond of J. F. Hamburg for \$4500, as guardian of August, Frederick and Waldemar Podyen, to sell real estate has been approved by the court. W. Walters is the surety.

Plaintiff in the case of James Hoare vs. S. C. Allen, has filed exceptions to the decision of Judge Stanley, rendered Thursday last. The suit involved the construction of a mortgage of a ward's property.

IN THE POLICE COURT.

John Absanda was brought up before Judge Wilcox this morning on a charge of selling liquor without a license. He was convicted and fined \$100 and costs.

Chun Chee, pake, convicted of having obtained in possession was fined \$25.

A native, Kapiml, was sent to the ref for fifteen days for larceny in the second degree. Ah Sin, convicted of same charge, got three months.

The United States cruiser Badger, James M. Miller, commanding, which arrived here from Apia last Wednesday, sailed for San Francisco this morning at 10 o'clock.

She did not carry mail as she will in all probability, be beaten in by the Hongkong Maru, which sails today at 4 p. m.

FOOTBALL MEETING.

A meeting of the friends and members of the Honolulu football team is being held this afternoon. J. Q. Wood who has been manager for two years is able to report that the debt of \$250 which the club owed when he took hold, has been reduced to \$41. Plans for the coming season are being discussed.

WERE NOT SPANISH GUNS

REASON FOR REPORT OF A YEAR AGO

Which vivid imagination turned into the Boom of Artillery.

A year ago, when the Spanish warships were supposed to be off the coast of Maine, hundreds of truthful and imaginative residents of the shore-towns heard strange sounds which they mistook for the firing of cannon, says a Maine correspondent of the New York Post. At the time the Minneapolis and Columbia were patrolling the New England coast from Cape Cod to Quoddy Head, the people of Milbridge, Jonesport, Lubec and Seal Cove were startled as often as once a week by hearing a dull, booming note, like the firing of distant guns, come rolling in from the sea.

Few persons were able to give any definite account of the noises, which came at uncertain intervals between 1 and 2 o'clock in the afternoon and which were most frequent and pronounced in times of dense fog. As a result of this scare, Bar Harbor charmed as a summer resort fell off greatly and a good number of desirable cottages were deprived of tenants for the season. Among the men who heard the boom of the ghostly cannons was Dr. G. H. Hay of Philadelphia, who was passing his vacation on Cranberry Island. Dr. Hay is a practical man, who knows a cannon when he hears its talk. He was firmly convinced that the sounds were caused by some form of explosion, either from blasting of ledges or quarries or from signal guns on board yachts. As the explosions were kept up long after the fog had been wrecked on the shores of Cuba, he made a record of weather conditions, in order to solve the mystery. The reports were never heard except in foggy weather, and were loudest and most pronounced on hot muggy days when the fog was lifting to let in the bars of sunlight. Meantime he had hunted up some French and German books and read accounts of similar sounds which have been heard near the North Sea and near Antwerp.

These noises were caused by fog rumbles which were common on warm days. The natives called them "mist-poppers," which literary translated means fog hiccoughs. Dr. Hay was certain that the mistpopper of the old world is found on the coast of Maine. The sounds have been heard again this year when there was no Spanish ship within 3000 miles of Maine, but nobody cares for them now that the war is over and the louder and oftener they come the higher goes the price of cottage-rent.
