PRIZE DRILL OF THE N. G. H.

Companies of N. G. H. Will Complete For Money Prizes.

Judges Chosen from 6th Artillery - Detail of Drill as Arranged By Col. Jones - Regimental Orders.

The following regimental orders of the N. G. H. relative to the competitive drill tomorrow night will explain themselves:

Regimental Order No. 80. A competitive drill of the companies of the First Regt., N. G. H., will be held on Tuesday, Nov. 7th, 1899, commencing at 7 o'clock p. m., for which prizes of \$100 and \$50 are offered for first and second best drilled companies.

The companies competing will be required to go through the following exercises:

To form company: Fall in, alignments, rests, facings, open ranks, inspection arms, close ranks, complete manual of arms (as adopted by the 1st Regt. N. G. H.), loading and firing, turn and halt, turn and advance, being in line, march by the flank, being in line, form column of fours and halt; being in line, march column of fours to the front; oblique in column of fours and resume the direct march, on right or left into line, right or left front into line, pass obstacles, being in column of fours, form column of twos or files; being in column of twos or files, form column of fours; being in line, form column of platoons to the right or left; being in line, form column of platoons to the front, being in column of platoons, form company to the front. Extended Order Drill.

Being in column of fours, form line of squad to the front; being in line of squads, deploy a skirmishers; rally by squad and platoon, assemble, being in column of fours, form line of squads to right or left; deploy, lie down; fire three volleys, rally by squad and platoon; assemble, being in line, deploy as skirmishers on center squad, change direction to right or left, advance by rushes (see sect. 590), rapid fire, to the charge, charge.

Soldierly bearing, steadiness, silence in the ranks and maintaining correct distances, will be considered a part of the drill and will be marked accordingly.

MANAUESES' DELAY.

The Manauense was to have got away with the Tartar and Newport for Manila Saturday afternoon but an accident to her condensing plant sustained shortly after leaving San Francisco, made it necessary for her to remain until Sunday afternoon for repairs.

The damage was of such a nature that the water produced was unfit for drinking purposes and the troops aboard suffered greatly on the way from San Francisco.

The Manauense took in the neighborhood of fifty men left over here by the Tartar and Newport. This included a provost guard of about twenty men sent by the two transports after stragglers.

COLUMBIA TO RACE ABOARD.

New York, October 26.—It is stated on good authority that the victorious cup defender, Columbia, will participate in the regular circuit races in both the Mediterranean and in British waters. The Columbia will leave for the other side in the early part of December, and will be commanded by Captain Charles Barr, who piloted her to victory in the contests against the Shamrock.

STILL MORE TRANSPORTS

Athenian Last Night, Centennial and Westminster Today.

List of Ships' Officers and What Is To Be Found Aboard—Centennial Will Return To 'Frisco.

The U. S. Transport Centennial came in this afternoon at 12:30 o'clock and is now lying at the old fishmarket wharf. She left San Francisco October 28 with 215 horses, 35 of which belong to officers.

Very rough weather was experienced, but the stock arrived in good condition. Only two head were lost on the way.

Captain Hughes of the 4th U. S. Cavalry is in command and has with him six men of the 28th Infantry and five of the 29th.

Dr. Howell of the U. S. A. is on board for this trip only and Dr. McDonald is the veterinary surgeon in charge of the horses.

The officers of the vessel are: Captain Eagles, First officer Juhak, Engineer Jones and Steward Murry.

The Centennial will return to San Francisco as soon as possible.

The U. S. Transport Westminster from San Francisco entered the harbor at 9 o'clock this morning. She had a slight list to starboard, due to the shifting of coal in the bunkers.

The Westminster is lying at the Irmgard wharf. She is a British vessel of 2510 tons register and carries over 6000 tons of feed and stores. She was built for the Philadelphia Trans-Atlantic Line and had the run between London and Philadelphia.

The Westminster left San Francisco, October 27 and for the first five days, encountered head winds and heavy seas. This is her first trip here, she having already made one trip from Baltimore to Manila in the interests of the Government.

The officers of the vessel are: Captain D. Petrie, First Officer Yell, Second Officer Anderson, Third Officer Armour, Engineers Duncan, Preston and Bird.

After discharging her cargo, the Westminster will proceed to San Francisco direct.

The U. S. transport Athenian from Manila, via Hongkong, came in Sunday afternoon and berthed at the Pacific Mail dock.

The Athenian was built for the Southampton-Cape passenger traffic and until purchased by her present owners was engaged under the C. P. R. flag in the Vancouver-Hongkong line.

On her last trip the Athenian took 393 horses from Seattle to Manila direct, landing the cargo in first class condition.

The Siam which arrived two days later lost all but sixteen head of her cargo, having lost the rest in a typhoon near the Philippines Islands.

The officers of the ship are: Captain H. Mowatt, first officer Readon, engineer James McGowan, purser T. A. Blyth and surgeon G. A. Sutherland.

A full cargo of stock, left here by the Leelanaw, will be taken on and the Athenian returns to Manila direct.

Saturday's Football Game.

FIGHTING FACTIONS ABOARD

Members of Baker—Howard Feud of Kentucky Going to Manila.

Six of Each Aboard City of Peking—Have Promised to Suspend Hostilities While in Army.

There are aboard the Transport City of Peking six members of the Howard and as many of the Baker faction of Kentucky, known all over the United States as a people who shoot each other at sight and yet they lie down peacefully together aboard the transport and never even say an unkind word to each other.

The Baker-Howard feud of Kentucky is one that has lasted from the early forties until the present time and the descendants of the instigators today have but a vague impression of what their differences are. The peculiar combination which now exists aboard the City of Peking in the ranks of the 31st Infantry came about in this way.

The Regiment was recruited at Fort Thomas, Kentucky and when the call for volunteers came many of the sturdy mountaineers rode down out of their forest fastnesses and gave in their names for service in Uncle Sam's army.

When the requisite number was recruited it was found that a dozen of these desperate men who shoot each other at sight, had been enlisted.

Of course, there was a fear at once on the part of the officers that a deadly fight would be the outcome.

Finally it was decided to call the men together and to find out their intentions. The outcome of this meeting was that the dozen men promised on their sacred word of honor to suspend hostilities while fighting for the one common cause—the supremacy of Uncle Sam in the Philippines.

VERY NARROW ESCAPE

Mr. and Mrs. Pullar and their two children who live on Kukui street went up on Tantalus ridge Sunday afternoon. On the return they stopped on the causeway and Mr. Pullar went up to get a view of the town.

As Mrs. Pullar was sitting holding the horse Mr. Da Roi came down on horseback. The horse became frightened, shied off and backed the rig toward the steep embankment on the Ewa side.

Mr. Da Roi jumped from his horse and caught the other animal by the bridge but it was too late. The carriage was already going over. He cried to Mrs. Pullar to jump. Grasping her two children, one a little one of eight months, she jumped toward a place about fifteen feet down the side. Luckily she was caught by bushes and held, she and her children suffering only bruises.

Mr. Da Roi lashed the horse with the whip, making the animal veer to one side and thus saving Mrs. Pullar and children from being crushed. Continuing on down the side, the horse landed at a place about 75 feet below.

People came along and rendered all the assistance they could. The horse was secured by a rope and led up. He fell again but was finally landed safe. Mrs. Pullar and children came down in A. V. Gear's carriage. Their escape was miraculous. Had it not been for Mr. Da Roi, they must have perished.

There is a crying need for a fence along the Tantalus causeway.

A HONOLULU WOMEN'S CLUB

To Be Established As a Place of Rest and Recreation.

Location at Waikiki—Complete Gymnasium—Lounging Lanai and Lunchroom—Physical Training—

If everything goes right the plans for a women's club in Honolulu will be complete and ready to be acted upon very soon. The formation of the club is the outcome of the interest taken by a great many of the ladies in the athletic class lately organized.

Several of the ladies have got together and propose having a building of their own and to this end E. C. Macfarlane was approached with the proposition of erecting a suitable place at the beach in the grounds of the Annex. The building will be equipped with a complete gymnasium, showers, lounging lanai and lunch room. The lanai will be made especially commodious for use if desired as a dancing pavilion. The building will be entirely separate and apart from the Annex and solely for the use of members of the club and such friends as may be invited to use it. The advantage of sea bathing as a part of the physical training will be obtained along with the gymnasium work as the lanai will of course open on the beach.

One of the ladies most interested in the movement said: "The organization of the club will be a most valuable thing for the members as it will give them a place to rest without going out of town. In this climate a woman must occasionally find some relaxation from household duties and very often a day spent at such a place as we intend having will be the means of saving a spell of illness. Some of us have talked the project over and the co-operation of all the ladies who favor the idea will be asked to carry the plans to a successful issue. Of course the plans are not finally perfected but we will have a general meeting called soon to talk over the matter and find out just what we want the club to be and all that. It will be a very fine thing and I hope the efforts of the promoters will be successful."

Flourished a Revolver.

The manager and keeper of the Makiki store had a little difference Sunday night. The latter, J. S. Ferreira by name, flourished a revolver, was arrested and fined \$5 and costs in the Police Court this forenoon on the charge of carrying arms without a license. Ferreira will appear in the Police Court tomorrow on another charge, that of using threatening language.

ON THE PALI ROAD. Any one who has been up along the new Pali road to the place where operations have practically stopped will certainly vote for its completion to the very Pali at the earliest possible date. But a stumbling block has been reached and the government is in a quandary. The stumbling block is to be found in the fact that the appropriation for the road has run out and now the work proceeds very slowly with a much diminished force. It is understood that a movement is now on hand to ask public spirited men of Honolulu to come forward and make up the requisite amount of money, this to be refunded when the next Legislature meets. This is a step that has often been taken heretofore when it has been a question of very much needed public improvements and it is hoped that there will be forthcoming in the near future, guarantees from various minded men of Honolulu to be added to this list it is purported has already been made up. Hundreds of tourists pass over the Pali road annually and a good impression with the new road will always be of much greater value to the islands than an indifferent opinion caused by riding over the old road.

WEEKLY FOR WAILUKU.

Wailuku, Nov. 4—G. B. Robertson, the Wailuku attorney, has forwarded an order to the Pacific States Type Foundry of San Francisco for a \$1200 printing press, job press, and material for a printing establishment. Mr. Hoeger of Messrs. Alexander & Baldwin, Kahului, who is now in San Francisco, will attend to the shipping of the above order from San Francisco to Kahului direct on a sailing vessel due next month.

Mr. Robertson will produce a weekly newspaper to be known as the "Wailuku Journal," and it will be a 24-paged paper of the size of the Honolulu Independent. Mr. Robertson himself will attend to the Editorial department. An experienced man will be sent from San Francisco to attend to the mechanical work. The first edition is expected to be out about New Year's Day. Subscription \$2.50 per annum. About fifteen well known residents of Maui have subscribed \$100 each towards purchasing the plant.

Broke Into a Saloon.

Six soldiers of the 28th Regiment that departed for the Philippines Saturday and seven police officers under Captain Holi had a tussle in one of the uptown saloons early Saturday morning. The soldiers came off second best. The latter broke into the saloon and proceeded to transfer the contents of various bottles to their stomachs. The police broke in and a fight in the dark was the result. The soldiers were landed in jail but not until Captain Holi had had his leg bitten and some of the officers became exhausted. The soldiers were later allowed to go on their way.

New York, October 26.—At the office of Harper & Brothers to-day it was denied that the alliance with Doubleday & McClure had led to a revolution in the older house.

It was admitted, however, that Mrs. Margaret Sangster had retired from the editorship of Harper's Bazar, her successor being J. A. Sears.

The change took place July 1st. The Round Table, a paper for boys, had never been profitable, and long ago it was determined to suspend its publication and in its place issue a new monthly magazine, to be called the Franklin Square, under the editorship of Albert Leo.

Still another Harper McClure magazine will be issued, with James Finley as editor. Henry Loomis Nelson retired from the editorship of the Weekly about July 1st. Henry G. Paine is now editor.

When the Harper-McClure alliance was announced it was inferred that the McClure company was to be absorbed by the older firm. However, Mr. McClure and Mr. Doubleday seem to be dominant force in the allied concern.
